In order to correct the filing deficiencies noted by the Commission Staff, Highland Telephone Cooperative, Inc. ("Highland") hereby supplements its Application for Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity for Construction to Fiber-To-The Home that was filed on September 20, 2010. Each of the deficiencies is restated below, followed by Highland's corrective information.

1. ***807 KAR 5:001: Section 9(2)(f) An estimated cost of operation after the proposed facilities are completed.***

Correction 1: The costs of operating the "fiber to the home" system are estimated to be approximately the same as the costs of operating the existing copper cable system. The primary cost will be labor, but no need for additional employees is anticipated. In fact, replacing copper cable ranging from 25 to 40 years old with new "fiber to the home" cable will hopefully reduce operational cost, but Highland is unable to quantify that at this time.

2. ***KRS 322.340 Engineering plans, specifications, plats and report for the proposed construction. The engineering documents prepared by a registered engineer, requires that they be signed, sealed, and dated by an engineer registered in Kentucky.***

Correction 2: Three copies of a map showing the routes for the construction of the fiber to the home, which have been signed, sealed and dated by an engineer registered in Kentucky, accompany this supplement.

Based upon the foregoing, Highland requests that its Application, as supplemented by this filing, be found to be complete and that the Commission enter an Order authorizing the Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity for Construction of Fiber-To-The Home and granting all other relief to which Highland may be entitled.
