

Pursuant to the Commission's Order of November 14, 2013, an informal conference was held in Case No. 2013-00172 on November 21, 2013. Attending the conference were:

Beginning the conference, Ms. Ramser stated that Commission Staff would prepare minutes of the conference for the case record, that a copy of the minutes would be provided to all parties, and that all parties would be given an opportunity to submit written comments upon those minutes.

Ms. Ramser explained that the Commission had concerns regarding the salaries of Shelly Lewis and Thomas Lewis and the family health insurance benefit for Ms. Lewis. During the September 10, 2013 hearing, Ms. Lewis testified that she could obtain health insurance through her employment as a teacher for \$600 per month (\$7,200 per year). Mr. Gaudiano stated that the insurance through Ms. Lewis' employment as a teacher would only cover Ms. Lewis and not her family.

Ms. Ramser advised the parties that the 2012 Bureau of Labor Statistics for the Eastern Kentucky nonmetropolitan area reflected an annual salary of \$20,410 for landscaping and grounds keeping; an annual salary of \$33,920 for first line supervisors

of landscaping; and an annual salary of \$18,820 for security guards. The annual salary of \$18,820 for the security guard did not include any overtime. A copy of the referenced statistics is attached.

Mr. Asher indicated that reductions in salary for the full time employees could lead to less security and less mowing.

Mr. Wuetcher stated that the Commissioners reviewed various scenarios based on the salary and benefit information. Based on these scenarios, the Commissioners found insufficient evidence to support the stipulated increase in revenues of \$54,905.

Mr. Samford stated that Fern Lake Company is entitled to a staff report and a specific recommendation regarding the utility's revenue requirement. Mr. Wuetcher responded that the Commission Staff report contained specific findings and recommendations and that the Commission in its Order of November 14, 2013 had rejected them. After some additional discussion, Fern Lake Company proposed an increase of \$38,000 over test-year revenue requirement level. Mr. Samford stated that the proposal was contingent upon no further hearings in the rate proceeding and a final decision upon the proposal before January 1, 2014. Other counsel agreed to discuss this proposal with their clients. Mr. Wuetcher stated that he would confer with senior Commission Staff members as to whether the proposal would merit serious consideration from the Commission and apprise all parties no later than November 25, 2013. Mr. Samford stated that, upon learning that the proposal was acceptable, Fern Lake Company would prepare a proposed stipulation for the parties and submitted an executed stipulation to the Commission for its consideration.

The conference then adjourned.

(3) The relative standard error (RSE) is a measure of the reliability of a survey statistic. The smaller the relative standard error, the more precise the estimate.

(4) Wages for some occupations that do not generally work year-round, full time, are reported either as hourly wages or annual salaries depending on how they are typically paid.

(5) This wage is equal to or greater than \$90.00 per hour or \$187,199 per year.

(9) The location quotient is the ratio of the area concentration of occupational employment to the national average concentration.
