- A. I believe I became aware of it in the end of December 2003 when the company made -- I think the case was filed December 29th, '03, and that's, I believe, when I became aware of it.
- Q. All right, sir. Were you sent a copy of it by the company?
- A. I think LG&E made the rounds and came -- personally came and visited myself and my partner, and I believe they said that they were making the rounds with the other major players in the case.
- Q. All right, sir. Do you -- do I take it you and your partner, Mr. Boehm, had represented KIUC before the Kentucky Public Service Commission before?
- A. Yes. I've done it for 18 years, and he's represented them for 25 years or thereabouts.
- Q. Just for my edification, do you know how long KIUC has been an organization?
- A. Probably like about the 25 years that I mentioned.
 - Q. All right, sir. Let me first show you the letter that I sent you, and we're going to mark

that as an exhibit to this statement.

Q. And simply stated, I sent this to you to arrange for your statement and to explain what I was doing, which is investigating various activity with regard to the rate-making case, and specifically ex parte contact between individuals and the PSC staff and/or the PSC commissioners.

I have, as I indicated to you prior to going on the record, taken the sign-in sheets which, as you know, is the practice here at the PSC, to determine who actually comes to the various functions. And I am communicating to you that April the 28th, 2004 was the first informal conference with regard to this matter. I did not see your name or Mr. Boehm's name on the sign-in sheets. Do you have a recollection of having participated in an informal conference --

- A. It would have --
- Q. -- in these two rate-making cases?
- A. It would have been -- we certainly would have been advised. We certainly would have tried to attend. I don't remember if one of us did attend. It's possible that we just didn't sign the

sign-in sheet because that is definitely the type of thing we would have been in, as KIUC is -- and the attorney general are considered generally to be the two major players.

- Q. All right, sir. Now, prior to -again using April 28th, because that is the first
 getting together of all the parties, did you have
 opportunity to talk to KU or LG&E counsel about the
 rate-making case? This is prior to April 28th, 2004?
 - A. Yes, yes.

- Q. Okay. And do you believe you had opportunity to talk to, in addition to LG&E and KU counsel, the attorney general staff prior to April 28, 2004?

- Q. All right. Any other than those two?
- A. We met with them at the Embassy Suites also, I think, in Lexington, right across from the Griffin Gate. Sort of a middle place to meet in their efforts to try to, you know, address the -- the issues that were raised by the parties, which probably would have occurred after we filed our testimony and we stated what our issues were.
- Q. And do you have a date that you can refer to of when that would have occurred?
- A. I don't have my calendar with me, but it -- it's very possible it's in my calendar.
- Q. I trust that would have been after the beginning of the proceeding, meaning after April 28, 2004, of the first informal conference?
- A. No. The beginning of the proceeding is when they filed their case. I mean, they -- they filed their case -- I don't remember if they filed their case on December 28th, 29th, or if that was the notice, the 30-day notice that they were going to file. But once they filed their testimony, their case is laid out. Typically the commission establishes a schedule where there's two rounds of discovery and then intervener and attorney general

- 1 testimony is due, and then our position is laid out,
- 2 and there was some more discovery and then a hearing.
- 3 So by April 28th the case was well under way. The
- 4 | company's -- all their testimony was filed. There
- 5 | were many, many -- there were rounds of discovery.
- 6 Not many, many. There were only a couple. And then
- 7 I wouldn't be surprised if our position was stated in
- 8 pretrial testimony as well.
- 9 Q. And you remember a conference with
- 10 LG&E/KU at around the time you filed your testimony.
- A. I don't remember when we filed. If

And I -- with this Α. 24 clarification, I'm not sure if there were three or 25 two or --

 - Q. I'm sensing, just for frame of reference, that you had -- they came to see you at your office shortly after filing, that you remember one in Northern Kentucky and one in Lexington.
 - A. Yes. And the one -- I think this is the case where they came to our offices and announced that they were filing. I think this is the case.

 I'm not exactly sure about that. And if it was, that was nothing more than we filed for a rate increase and it was this many dollars. I think they had done that before on a different case, but I'm not exactly sure.
 - Q. All right, sir.
 - A. That would have been mostly just a courtesy, a nonsubstantive courtesy.
 - Q. You could check your calendar for me and just send me a letter at this address and tell me what dates that you have, if you can find them. Go ahead.
 - A. No. I was just going to ask for a copy of your letter --

1 0. Sure. 2 Α, -- or your card so --I will get that to you. 3 Ο. Α. That's fine. 4 Do I take it, then, the only persons 5 Ο. 6 who participated in those meetings were you, 7 Mr. Boehm and LG&E/KU personnel? 8 Α. Yes. 9 Q. Okay. Did you have occasion at any 10 time after filing the rate-making case in December of 11 2003, to meet with the attorney general's personnel? 12 Α. Yes. And who from the attorney general's 13 Q. 14 office did you meet with? 15 Α. Betsy Blackford and/or Dennis Howard. 16 0. Okay. And tell me what you recall of 17 your meetings with them. 18 Α. Well, they were involved -- we were 19 involved in negotiations with the attorney general 20 and the company and I believe the staff to try to get 21 resolution of some of the issues. Like I say, we had 22 an earnings sharing mechanism case where there was 23 not all the interveners from the rate case. It was 24 just -- just LG&E/KU, the attorney general, KIUC I 25 believe were the only interveners. That case was

intertwined with the rate case, so we were trying to settle that matter as well as the rate case.

I remember going down to the attorney general's office on a Friday afternoon to meet with LG&E/KU and the attorney general. And I remember at that point the staff lawyer, Richard Raff, was called by the cell -- he was not at the meeting, but we got to the point where everyone, including the attorney general, felt it was appropriate to call Mr. Raff, and we did on his cell phone. This was in context of the settlement negotiations of all the cases.

- Q. And was the attorney general present in the room?
- A. Absolutely. In fact, we placed the call from their conference room to Mr. Raff. I believe -- I believe he was at Churchill Downs attending the race right before the Kentucky Derby. I believe that was a Friday afternoon we talked to him. We were very close to settling all the cases, and for some reason we all felt, including the attorney general, that we needed to get a staff's input. So I believe a call was placed to him from the attorney general's office. I'm sure.

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1 Α. With Mr. Raff -- we met -- I drove 2 down to Frankfort Friday afternoon to meet with the 3 attorney general and the companies. We were very 4 close to getting a resolution. I remember -- I don't 5 remember what the issue was, but there was one 6 sticking point issue. And Dennis Howard told 7 Kendrick, "Don't come down unless you're willing to 8 budge on that issue." And we all came on over, 9 first the company didn't budge on that issue, 10 whatever it was. Eventually they were worn down and 11 they did make some concessions. 12 I think the phone call went out to 13 Mr. Raff to -- I don't know, to get his impression, 14 his opinions. We all felt it was appropriate to call 15 Richard at that time, and ultimately, as you know, of course, the attorney general pulled out of the 16 17 settlement that we reached on revenue requirements. 18

- Q. How long was Mr. Raff on the phone?
- Α. Probably ten minutes, fifteen minutes.
- Ο. All right, sir. And do you have a recollection of the conversation as it involved Mr. Raff? If you don't, you don't.

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It was involved with the rate-making aspects of the case. And this case was also complicated by the fact that I believe there was an

1 environmental surcharge issue intertwined in all 2 these cases involving KU and the appropriate rate-making for the power contract that it has with 3 Owensboro Municipal Utilities and how that would be 4 factored into the rate case versus the environmental 5 6 surcharge. And I think that could have been one of 7 the issues discussed that afternoon at the attorney 8 general's office. 9 All right, sir. Do you have a Q. 10 recollection of that being the day before Derby? 11 I'm pretty sure of that. I'm pretty Α. 12 sure of that because I don't think Richard Raff, 13 who -- typically goes to the Derby or horse races in 14 general, but he was not in the office on Friday and 15 we reached him on his cell phone. I believe that's 16 where he was. 17 All right. And do you know where the 18 attorney general was? Was he in his office? 19 I've only met the attorney general one Α. 20 time at the commission, and I have no idea where 21 he -- where he personally was at this time. 22 Q. All right. Did he participate in the

Q. Okay. Other than that particular meeting, do you have a recollection of having met with the attorney general's personnel other than as a meeting of all the parties involved?

- A. Oh, absolutely. Meeting in the sense of phone calls.
 - Q. Phone calls and/or --
- A. Absolutely. We had numerous calls with Dennis Howard and Betsy Blackford about the case, about their position versus the company's position, where we could compromise, where he could compromise, what -- where our case was strong, where our case was weak, how we would resolve all of these intertwined cases, these environmental surcharge cases, the earnings sharing mechanism case, the gas case, the two electric cases. And so there were a lot of phone calls, as there would typically be on a case of that complexity in any state in any jurisdiction. And I've practiced in front of probably 15 public utility commissions around the country. That's absolutely standard.
- Q. All right, sir. Just in terms of ballparking the number, any way for you to do that with the attorney general?

A. With the attorney general's lawyers,

Ms. Blackford and Mr. Howard, couldn't ballpark the

number. Well, I'll try to ballpark the number.

Probably in those -- in those hectic days right

before we had these marathon negotiation sessions at

the commission, probably a half dozen phone calls.

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- Q. Okay. Other than the ten-minute phone call when Mr. Raff was presumably at the racetrack, do you recall him participating in any other conversations other than those where all parties were present?
- Α. First of all, I don't remember or it wouldn't be out of character if he was. Remember, all parties -- in the rate case there were lots of -pretty much anybody can intervene in a rate case. The commission has very loose standards, as do all commissions, and you get any number of very minor parties. For a while there, there was an individual out of Louisville, just a residential customer named Robert Madison who would intervene and come to the commission and watch as sort of a hobby. So he was a rate payor, so he had standing, the commission ruled. This rate case had department of -- Kentucky Department of Energy, who fully participated in the settlement talks at the commission but was in no way

part of the core settlement negotiations because they
didn't file revenue requirements testimony.

See, people have the right to state their positions in pretrial testimony. And if they don't testify on it, the presumption is that they don't have a position on it. So these negotiations probably early on were divided between core and noncore participants.

Kroger Company was a core participant. They filed testimony on revenue requirements and other things and -- so -- but some of these -- these secondary players -- I don't remember who it was. There's probably -- for example, some of the low income groups, Joe Childress and some of his clients, they may not have participated in very many conversations at all. They were -- and they probably didn't file testimony to speak of either. So that's the way these rate cases are -- are handled everywhere that I'm -- that I practice.

- Q. All right, sir. Going back to my question, you do recall participating in what you described as marathon negotiations, 3rd, 4th, 5th?
 - A. At the commission.
 - Q. At the commission.
- A. Yes.

Q. Okay. And with regard to those conversations, do you recall any sidebar conversations with any member of the staff where other -- all persons did not participate?

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- I'm sure there were. Sidebar in the Α. sense that we were there for three solid days and into the nights. And the way those negotiations went was all the rate payors, including staff typically, would be on one side, and then the companies, the utilities, would be isolated on the other side. And there were oftentimes situations where the company was asked to leave the room and all of the rate payor entities, including staff, conferred about what would be a reasonable counteroffer to what the utility was proposing. The utility was isolated and off by themselves, and it was typically all of the other parties who sort of teamed up on the utilities, which also is standard fair for the way these cases go all around the country.
 - Q. All right. I may have misled you with the use of the term "sidebar." I take it that this was a negotiation amongst a group of people that was fluid in nature but that ultimately all conversations reported to the whole group as a function of the negotiation.

A. Yes, absolutely. That's exactly the way it -- it resembled a large bankruptcy settlement process where there would be big meetings followed by large spaces of time where people were conferring with their clients and trying to work things out. And in that context, I mean, you couldn't help talking to someone from the staff, although this staff is particularly close to the vest, particularly tight-lipped and particularly very sensitive about not communicating very much to anybody, far more close to the vest than any other staff I've dealt with. So to the extent that there were conversations with staff, they were probably fairly limited.

- Q. All right, sir. And I take it part of this whole large process of negotiation with all the parties.
- A. Yes. It -- everybody who was a party to the case was invited to these large settlement negotiations. And like I say, it was pretty much everybody against the utilities. The low income people had their little pet issue which got resolved in the settlement. The department -- Kentucky Department of Energy had their energy conservation pet issue that got resolved as part of the settlement. They were in it for very limited

purposes, the parties that were sort of more global,
more KIUC, the attorney general, the staff and the
companies. The other parties were second tier and
had very limited understanding and very limited
issues.

Q. What was your sense of how many days the negotiation took?

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- A. I'm going from these three sheets that it was three days, and that sounds about right. Oh, and North American Stainless was in there as well, and they had -- they had their own particular issue, and they had probably three or four lawyers at a time in there.
 - Q. And when you say three days, 4th, 5th and 6th, I take it?
 - A. I'm assuming that those are correct.
 - Q. All right, sir. The 12th is the date that the settlement was announced. Do you have a recollection of having been here at the Public Service Commission?
 - A. Well, then, I am confused because I remember we announced the settlement -- there were two aspects of the settlement. There was revenue requirements and then there was everything else.

 Everyone, including the attorney general, agreed to

the "everything else" settlement, and that was announced whenever it was announced. If it was announced May 12, then the agreement was reached the day before, would be my recollection.

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There was a tentative agreement the night before on revenue requirements, but then the next morning the attorney general pulled out of the But my recollection was we negotiated -- we clearly went to the hearing at the commission. was an announcement to the commissioners that maybe it would be more productive if we all broke off and started settlement talks rather than hold the The commissioners agreed and we started these marathon sessions. I thought that as a result of those marathon sessions we stayed there until we announced a deal on the nonrevenue requirements aspects of the case. And then everybody except the attorney general who agreed and then unagreed, announced an agreement on the revenue requirements. That's my recollection of how it occurred.

- Q. All right. And you have a recollection and memory of an announcement being made by the parties that there was some form of settlement on whatever issues were agreed to?
- A. I believe so. There must have been.

- Q. And do you have knowledge of whether or not a more formal agreement was subsequently submitted?
 - A. Oh, perhaps that was it. Maybe the more formal agreement was issued on May 12th, but we announced agreement I guess maybe the last of these May dates.
 - Q. May 6th?

- A. May 6th. That could have very well been what happened.
- Q. All right, sir. Tell me what you recall about the process whereby the attorney general you thought was in agreement on both issues and then suddenly you were informed that he was not. When I say "attorney general," I'm really talking about his staff.
- A. They agreed -- they agreed to the nonrevenue requirements issue where they did very well. They got their litigation position on many issues on cost allocation. Then there was also tentative agreement on revenue requirements. We'd been back and forth and back and forth, and we all reached a number that we thought was -- was fair. And then the next morning we learned that the attorney general himself had decided that the deal

wasn't good enough, apparently. And then we were informed that they were out of everything except the revenue requirements.

And by the way, I should add, the biggest -- the biggest victim of that, so to speak, was the utilities, because what happened to the utilities is they went forward with their agreement and gave the attorney general a free shot. In other words, we had established a ceiling, an effective ceiling that in reality the rate increase was not going to be more than the announced revenue requirements settlement. So the company was at risk that it may go lower, but it certainly wasn't going to go higher once it was publicly agreed to at that number.

So the utilities gave the attorney general a free shot to try to get -- to try to get a lower revenue requirement. But, of course, the attorney general was not successful because the commission ultimately concluded that the revenue requirement agreed to by everyone except the attorney general was reasonable.

Q. And you say -- your use of the term "revenue requirement," am I taking that as the overall rate increase?

A. Yes.

- Q. So to put it in a sort of vernacular, the attorney general did not agree -- well, he agreed and then disagreed subsequently to the amount of the rate increase.
 - A. Yes.
- Q. But he was at all times in agreement with how the increase was to be divided up.
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. Where -- we structured a settlement where the attorney general got its litigation position on that issue. Did as well as it could have possibly done.
- Q. All right, sir. Other than -- this is you, Mike Kurtz personally. Other than the 10 minutes of phone conversation where other parties were present with Mr. Raff, were you aware of any other conversations between any of the parties with PSC staff other than during this large negotiation period?
- A. Like I said at the beginning, it would have been common to talk to the staff attorney about procedural matters, how the case progressed and these type of things. It would not be uncommon for

Mr. Howard or Ms. Blackford to pick up the phone and call Mr. Raff about the same topics. So it's very possible that I spoke to Mr. Raff about something related to the case other than that one horse race phone call. It's very possible. I don't remember.

- Q. Okay. You simply have no recollection.
 - A. Correct.

- Q. All right. Now, let me ask you that same question. Other than Mr. Raff, did you have any conversations with any other member of the staff other than at the joint negotiating session of all the parties?
- categorically I never spoke to any of the commissioners. And I'm fairly well certain I spoke to no member of the staff, although that is a far more rare occurrence that I would have a technical accounting type of question where I'd pick up the phone and call a staff person on that. I don't recall if it happened during this rate case or not. It would certainly -- if such a call occurred, it would have been advert -- I mean, the attorney general and KIUC are on the same side of revenue requirements, of how big the rate increase should be.

1 We both want it to be as small as possible. So the attorney general and all of the rate payors gang up, 2 3 so to speak, on the utility, who is the only party to 4 the room that wants the rate increase to be as large 5 as possible. Staff sides with the rate payors in an 6 effort to get the rate increase to be as low as 7 possible. 8 Let me give you some names of some 9 individuals who are staff members and/or 10 commissioners and ask you a specific question, 11 whether you had any conversations with any of these 12 persons other than as part of the negotiation where 13 all parties were present. 14 Ms. Beth O'Donnell? 15 Α.
