ORDER

KRS 74.020(7) requires that this Commission "encourage and promote the offering of high quality water district management training programs that enhance a water district commissioner's understanding of his or her duties." Pursuant to this statutory mandate, the Commission has conducted a training seminar in Frankfort, Kentucky. This seminar included instruction regarding trends in applicable law and regulations and utility administration.¹

Based upon a review of the course curriculum, the Commission finds that:

- 1. The course of instruction provided at this seminar would enhance a water district commissioner's understanding of his or her duties.
- 2. The seminar conducted at Frankfort, Kentucky should be approved for 6 credit hours of water district management training.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that the 2008 Last Chance Water Personnel Training Seminar, which the Commission conducted on December 10, 2008 in Frankfort, Kentucky, is approved for a maximum of 6 credit hours.
