ORDER

Crittenden-Livingston Water District ("Crittenden-Livingston District") has applied for an adjustment of its rates for water service. By this Order, the Commission establishes rates that will produce annual revenues from water sales of \$2,352,837, an increase of 17 percent over normalized revenue from water sales of \$2,009,423. The increase will occur in three phases over 28 months and will ultimately increase the monthly bill of a customer who uses 5,000 gallons of water monthly from \$52.40 to \$61.33, or 17 percent.

On August 30, 2012, Crittenden-Livingston District applied for a rate adjustment pursuant to 807 KAR 5:076. On October 26, 2012, after reviewing the application and Crittenden-Livingston District's records, Commission Staff issued a report containing its findings and recommendations regarding the proposed rate adjustment. Commission Staff recommended approval of Crittenden-Livingston District's proposed rates. It further recommended that the Commission direct Crittenden-Livingston District to revise its method for calculating and recording depreciation expense for accounting and

ratemaking purposes.² In its response to this report, Crittenden-Livingston District advised the Commission in writing of its acceptance of the findings and recommendations contained in the report and requested that the matter be submitted for decision based upon the existing record.³ On November 16, 2012, the Commission closed the record and declared the case submitted for decision.⁴

Having reviewed the evidence of record and being otherwise sufficiently advised, the Commission finds that:

- 1. Except where they conflict with the findings contained in the Order, the findings contained in Commission Staff's Report are supported by the evidence of record, are reasonable, and should be adopted.
- 2. Crittenden-Livingston District is a water district organized pursuant to KRS Chapter 74.
- 3. Crittenden-Livingston District owns and operates facilities that distribute water to approximately 3,485 customers in Crittenden and Livingston counties, Kentucky.⁵
- 4. The calendar year ending December 31, 2011 should be used as the test period to determine the reasonableness of Crittenden-Livingston District's existing and proposed rates.

- 5. Based upon pro forma test-period operations, Crittenden-Livingston District's pro forma annual revenue from Water Sales, Other Operating Revenues and Interest Income is \$2,063,350.⁶ Approximately \$2,009,423 of this revenue is from water sales.
- 6. The statement of Crittenden-Livingston District's test-period operations, as adjusted for known and measurable changes, is set forth at Appendix A of this Order.
- 7. Based upon pro forma test-period operations, Crittenden-Livingston District's pro forma total operating expenses, after adjusting for known and measurable changes, are \$1,415,784.
- 8. Crittenden-Livingston District proposed to reduce reported depreciation expense by \$131,856 to reflect a change to the service lives that it assigns to certain assets.⁷
- 9. In lieu of conducting a depreciation study to determine the service lives of its assets or reliance upon its own historic plant records, Crittenden-Livingston District has relied upon the results of the survey of the National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners ("NARUC") that contained "a range of average service lives currently being used by water utilities throughout the country for water facilities designed and

installed and maintained in accordance with good water works practice" to make revisions to the service lives of several classes of its assets.9

- 10. The Commission has previously used the same survey to establish the service lives of utility assets.¹⁰
- 11. Crittenden-Livingston District's use of the survey to determine the service lives of certain classes of assets is reasonable.¹¹
- 12. Crittenden-Livingston District compared previously assigned service lives to certain classes of assets and, where these service lives fell outside of or narrowly within the NARUC survey range for an asset, assigned that asset a new service life within the NARUC survey range. Finding that these assets were "at, or near, optimum"

condition," Crittenden-Livingston District assigned new service lives that were at the highest portion of the range. 12

- 13. Appendix B to this Order sets forth the classes of assets whose service lives Crittenden-Livingston District has adjusted; the previously assigned service life to each class; the newly assigned service life to each class; the service life range that the NARUC survey suggests for each class; and the effect of revising the service life of that class on the level of Crittenden-Livingston District's test-period depreciation expense.
- 14. Crittenden-Livingston District's reassignment of service lives for ratemaking purposes is not unreasonable.
- 15. Crittenden-Livingston District's long-term creditors, the average annual principal and interest payment for the five-year period from 2013 through 2017 on the outstanding Crittenden-Livingston District debt that each creditor holds, and the debt service coverage requirement of each creditor is shown in Table 1.

16. Given that Crittenden-Livingston District is a water district, the use of the debt service coverage methodology to calculate its revenue requirement is appropriate and consistent with the Commission's historic ratemaking practices.¹³

- 17. Applying the debt service coverage requirements to Crittenden-Livingston District's average principal and interest payments for the years 2013 through 2017 results in an annual revenue requirement from water sales of \$2,653,094, or \$643,671 more than the normalized annual revenue from Crittenden-Livingston District's present rates.¹⁴
- 18. Crittenden-Livingston District proposes to increase its rates for water service in three phases. Based upon normalized test-period sales, the rates proposed for the final phase would produce annual revenue of \$2,352,837. 15
- 19. The annual revenue produced from Crittenden-Livingston District's proposed rates is \$300,257 less than the level of revenue deemed reasonable using the debt service methodology.
- 20. Throughout all phases of the implementation of the proposed rate adjustment, Crittenden-Livingston District's proposed rates will produce sufficient

revenues for Crittenden-Livingston to remain in compliance with all outstanding debt instrument obligations. 16

- 21. The record contains no evidence that permitting Crittenden-Livingston District to assess its proposed rates will result in any degradation or reduction in the quality of service that Crittenden-Livingston District currently provides.
- 22. A utility may propose rates that fail to produce a level of revenues that accepted ratemaking methodologies would regard as insufficient or inadequate. Absent evidence that the quality of the utility's service will decline or be degraded as a result of this level of revenue, the proposed rates should accepted.¹⁷
- 23. Crittenden-Livingston District's proposed rates should be approved for service rendered on and after January 1, 2013 in accordance with the proposed implementation schedule.
- 24. Commission Staff has *sua sponte* recommended that the Commission require Crittenden-Livingston District to use the service lives set forth in Appendix B for both ratemaking <u>and</u> accounting purposes when calculating and reporting depreciation expense.
- 25. As Crittenden-Livingston District had not objected to Commission Staff's recommendation, as the proposed service lives are within the ranges set forth by the NARUC study, and as a single approach to ratemaking and general accounting

treatment of this issue will avoid confusion and incorrect reporting, Commission Staff's recommendation should be implemented.

26. Commission Staff's recommended action has implications beyond this rate case proceeding. Absent a showing of a change in circumstances, it will require the use of these service lives in future rate case proceedings. It may also affect Crittenden-Livingston District's financial statements and reports to all governmental authorities, financial institutions, and lenders. Should Crittenden-Livingston District upon further consideration find that it does not agree with the implementation of Commission Staff's recommendation, it should exercise its right pursuant to KRS 278.400 to petition the Commission for rehearing within 20 days of the date of this Order.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that:

- 1. Except where they contradict or conflict with the findings contained in this Order, the findings contained in the Commission Staff's report are adopted and incorporated by reference into this Order as if fully set out herein.
- 2. The rates set forth in Appendix C to this Order are approved for water service that Crittenden-Livingston District renders on and after January 1, 2013.
- 3. The rates set forth in Appendix D to this Order are approved for water service that Crittenden-Livingston District renders on and after March 1, 2014.
- 4. The rates set forth in Appendix E to this Order are approved for water service Crittenden-Livingston District renders on and after May 1, 2015.
- 5. Between February 1, 2014 and February 15, 2014, Crittenden-Livingston District shall notify its customers of the implementation of Phase II rates by causing to

be published at least once in a newspaper of general circulation in its territory notice of these rates or placing an insert notice in bills rendered to its customers.

- 6. Between April 1, 2015 and April 15, 2015, Crittenden-Livingston District shall notify its customers of the implementation of Phase III rates by causing to be published at least once in a newspaper of general circulation in its territory notice of these rates or placing an insert notice in bills rendered to its customers.
- 7. Within 20 days of the date of this Order, Crittenden-Livingston District shall file the revised tariff sheets with the Commission setting forth the rates approved in this Order.
- 8. Crittenden-Livingston District shall for, accounting and ratemaking purposes, use the "Newly Assigned Service Lives" set forth in Appendix B to this Order for the listed classes of assets when calculating and reporting depreciation for all reporting periods after the date of this Order, but shall make no retroactive adjustment to its books to account for the cumulative effect of this change in accounting estimate.
