ORDER

On October 21, 2016, Teleport Communications of America, LLC ("Teleport") filed a petition requesting that this Commission review and overturn a determination by the Pooling Administrator.¹ The petition was filed pursuant to 47 C.F.R. § 52.15(g)(4), wherein the Commission is granted the authority to "overturn the NANPA's [and the Pooling Administrator's] decision to withhold numbering resources from the carrier based on its determination that the carrier has demonstrated a verifiable need for numbering resources and has exhausted all other available remedies."

In its petition, Teleport explains that it has requested numbering resources associated with telecommunications services requested by a specific customer, the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS"), in the Covington rate center located within the 859 Numbering Plan Area ("NPA") in Kentucky. The IRS has requested 3,500 consecutive numbers to be used in support of its function of supporting the public.

¹ The North American Numbering Plan Administrator ("NANPA") and the Pooling Administrator are independent non-governmental entities selected by the Federal Communications Commission ("FCC") and are individually responsible for administering and managing the North American Numbering Plan and national thousands-block number pools, respectively. Neustar, Inc. is currently contracted by the FCC as both the NANPA and the Pooling Administrator.

On October 6, 2016, Teleport applied to the Pooling Administrator for the required numbering resources in the Covington rate center.² The application process with the Pooling Administrator requires the submission of information used for a Months-To-Exhaust ("MTE") and Utilization Certification Worksheet ("Worksheet") pertaining to the affected rate centers.³ Based on the submitted information and resulting calculations, the Pooling Administrator concluded that Teleport did not meet the FCC's utilization threshold requirement of 75 percent.⁴ Therefore, the Pooling Administrator determined that Teleport's requests for additional numbering resources should be denied.

The Pooling Administrator is not a policy-making entity. In making assignment decisions, the Pooling Administrator follows regulatory directives and industry-developed guidelines. The Pooling Administrator's responsibilities are defined in FCC rules and in comprehensive technical requirements drafted by the telecommunications industry and approved by the FCC.⁵

Pursuant to 47 C.F.R. § 52.15(g)(4), this Commission may overturn the Pooling Administrator's determination if the requesting carrier has demonstrated a verifiable need for numbering resources and that all other available remedies have been

exhausted. The Commission finds that Teleport has demonstrated a verifiable need for the assignment of numbering resources by presenting a request from a specific telecommunications customer, the IRS, for four thousands-blocks of 3,500 consecutive numbers to be utilized for the purpose of providing service within the Covington rate center in Kentucky. Teleport asserts that it does not have sufficient numbering resources available in the affected rate center, and due to the Pooling Administrator's denial of its application, Teleport cannot provide service without the requested resources. The Commission further finds that Teleport has exhausted all available remedies to the extent that no combination of existing numbering resources in the associated rate center can be employed to meet the need for four thousands-blocks of 3,500 consecutive numbers in the rate center.

This Commission finds that the Pooling Administrator's determination to deny Teleport the additional numbering resources described herein should be overturned and the Pooling Administrator directed to assign Teleport four new thousands-blocks (NXX-X) for the Covington rate center in Kentucky. The Commission notes that the numbering resources considered in this Order are to be assigned for the sole use of serving Teleport's customer, the IRS, in the Covington rate center. If the numbering resources requested by Teleport are not needed to meet the service requirements of its customer, the associated numbering resources approved in this Order should be returned to the Pooling Administrator and may not be utilized for other service arrangements without first meeting the industry numbering resource guidelines.

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IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that:

1. Teleport's petition regarding the Pooling Administrator's denial of its application for assignment of additional numbering resources is granted.

2. The decision of the Pooling Administrator denying Teleport's request for the assignment of four new thousands-blocks for the Covington rate center in Kentucky is hereby overturned.

The Pooling Administrator shall assign Teleport four thousands-blocks of
3,500 consecutive numbers for the Covington rate center.

4. The numbering resources considered in this Order are to be assigned for the sole use of Teleport's customer, the IRS. If the numbering resources requested by Teleport are no longer required to meet the service, the associated numbering resources approved in this Order shall be returned to the Pooling Administrator.
