Learning Objective: The management conference will be directed toward the operators, managers, office personnel, and decision-makers of water and wastewater utilities. This year's conference will offer discussions on trends and ideas affecting our industry and will present ideas for planning and preparing for the future of drinking water and wastewater services in the Commonwealth.

Most water and wastewater utilities regulated by the Public Service Commission use the alternative rate filing (ARF) procedure to obtain a rate adjustment. This presentation explains that procedure and the ratemaking process in general. Practical suggestions for preparing an application will be addressed. Discussion will include suggestions for identifying issues that frequently slow down the review process, adversely affect the size of rate adjustment, or create embarrassment for an applicant, and how to successfully address those issues. Core Content: Finance, budget, and rate setting

Topic: Accounting and Auditing Issues for Water and Wastewater Utilities

Presenter: Brian S. Woosley, Stiles, Carter and Associates, CPAs

This session is a review of current issues that water and wastewater utilities encounter through accounting for transactions and the audit process. The presentation will provide insight into auditor selection, management and board responsibilities, the fraud triangle, preparing for and undergoing an audit, and current GASB statements (including statement 68, which significantly changed the accounting for pension obligations).

Topic: Portable Flow Meters for Validation/Calibration - Know the Difference

Presenter: Jeff Merman, Automatic Controls Company

Clamp on ultrasonic meters are the most misunderstood meter as a management tool. Ultrasonic meters can be a great trouble shooting tool and can even be used to calibrate certain devices. However, they can also get utilities in trouble when they are misused. This session teaches the use of meters in wastewater & drinking water utilities for proving flow and where calibration may be acceptable.

Core Content: Water treatment, disinfection by-productsTopic:It's Not What You Know; It's How Fast You Know it!

Presenter: Bob Cashion, S4 Water Sales and Service

As water professionals we are now under the microscope more than ever to provide water free from contaminates and pleasing to site, taste and smell of our customers. With the recent issues of lead and copper from corrosive waters we must learn new methods of continuously monitoring corrosion and scale. This presentation will discuss corrosion monitoring utilizing current and new technologies, to provide on-line corrosion rates from within the water treatment process and in the distribution system. The new systems provide real time data which allow for pH changes and increased inhibitor feed rates without waiting months to determine corrosion rates.

Core Content: Security, financial and technical capacity

Topic: Cyber Security and Utilities

Presenter: Earl Rose, Department of Homeland Security

Numerous drinking water and wastewater utilities have websites and/or take credit card payments. Many utilities also have SCADA systems that use web based information transfer or can be viewed remotely on portable devices. New technology can be very convenient and can make access to information instantaneous. However, ensuring that these information sources are secure from threats is a major concern. This session will focus on what the Department of Homeland Security views as the major cyber security threats utilities may face, who the bad actors are, and what is being done to combat them.

Core Content: Capacity development, regulations

Topic: Certified Operator Staffing Requirements and Strategies

Presenter: Ruth Lancaster, Louisville Water Company

The presentation recaps regulatory staffing requirements for drinking water and wastewater operators in the state of Kentucky, discusses the innovative alternative staffing program implemented by the KY Division of Water, discusses recruiting and retention strategies, and provides a current snapshot of the number and level of operators certified in Kentucky.

Even the best run utilities can make mistakes. This topic will be broken into three sessions and will cover a variety of issues managers need to be aware of for maintaining compliance in wastewater and drinking water utilities. Reporting and recordkeeping requirements will be outlined to help utilities avoid a common cause for violations. Information provided in these sessions will include inspection requirements and policies, the enforcement process, Notice of Violations, and Corrective Action Plans. Also covered will be relevant regulations including acronyms and a Quick Links reference for finding pertinent regulations online. Updated information on DOW personnel changes and their move to new offices will be provided. Utilities have a bewildering array of information to keep track of in order to maintain compliance with state and federal regulations. These sessions offer information to guide utility personnel through the compliance maize.
