JOINT STIPULATION

Blue Jay Communications, Inc., and the Kentucky Public Service Commission, Division of Inspections, stipulate to the following:

- Blue Jay Communications, Inc. ("Blue Jay") is in the business of, among other things, installation of underground communications cable.
- On October 31, 2018, Blue Jay was installing underground cable as a contractor for Spectrum in Louisville, Jefferson County, Kentucky.
- Prior to the installation of the cable, LG&E was notified, and the "Approximate Location" [as defined by KRS Section 367.4903 (11)] of gas line was properly marked.
- 4. Blue Jay hand dug, or "pot-holed," various locations on the job site it was working on to expose the location of the utilities marked by LG&E or its locating company. See attached diagram.
- Blue Jay utilized mechanized underground boring equipment for this installation.
 The cable was mechanically pulled through from a large spool and cannot be pulled by hand.

6. The boring, as depicted in the diagram, crossed Wynbrooke Circle and necessarily traversed the LG&E's plant south of the roadway, and close to the road.

 Blue Jay hand dug or "pot-holed" in the "Approximate Location" prior to drilling in that area, exposing the gas line. See attached photographs.

8. Blue Jay initially traversed, or drove through, the exposed "Approximate Location" with a mechanized underground bore head without damaging the gas line; however, when the boring equipment was pulled out, the bore head stuck and damaged the gas line.

The withdrawal of the mechanized bore head was a "dead pull," meaning that the bore head was not turning at the time.


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
