2	This is a hearing before the Kentucky Public
3	Service Commission in the matter of Reuben
4	Barnette versus South Anderson Water District,
5	Case Number 99-431. My name is Paul Shapiro, I'm
6	a Hearing Examiner for the Public Service
7	Commission and I've been asked by the Commission
8	to conduct the hearing this morning. Is the
9	complainant ready to proceed
10	MR. THOMAS:
11	Yes, we are Mr. Shapiro.
12	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
13	And is the defendant ready to proceed?
14	MR. EDELMAN:
15	Yes, sir.
16	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
17	Are there any prewell, let me get appearance of
18	counsel first for the complaining party?
19	MR. THOMAS:
20	Reginald Thomas for the complainant Reuben
21	Barnette.
22	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
23	And your address Mr. Thomas?

MR. THOMAS: My address is Post Office Box 1704, Lexington, Kentucky 40588-1704. 3 **HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:** And for the Water District? MR. EDELMAN: Ray Edelman, Attorney, 150 South Main Street, 7 Lawrenceburg 40342. 9 COURT REPORTER: Would you spell your last name please 10 11 MR. EDELMAN: 12 E-d-e-1-m-a-n. 13 HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO: 14 And for the Commission Staff? 15 MR. PINNEY: 16 Jim Pinney appearing for the Commission Staff. 17 COURT REPORTER: 18 Is that P-i-n-n-e-y? 19 MR. PINNEY: 20 Yes, do you need my address? 21 COURT REPORTER: 22 No, I don't think so. 23 **HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:**

Are there any preliminary matters that need to be

1	addressed at this time?
2	MR. THOMAS:
3	I don't believe so.
4	MR. EDELMAN:
5	I have a motion that I want to put on the record
6	thatat the appropriate time before we begin,
7	whenever you would like to hear it.
8	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
9	Well, this would be the time.
10	MR. EDELMAN:
11	Okay. For the record, my name is Ray Edelman, I
12	represent the South Anderson Water District in the
13	matter of Reuben Barnette versus South Anderson
14	Water District, Case Number 99-431 before the
15	Public Service Commission. The Commission entered
16	its Order dated January 7, the year 2000,
17	requiring the parties to complete certain proof
18	and to file certain direct testimony. And
19	pursuant to paraand all of that was done.
20	Pursuant to paragraph 13 of that Order the
21	Commission noted that the complainant bears the
22	burden of proof in this matter. And as such, he
23	should be held to his direct testimony as
24	submitted. Based upon the testimony that is

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submitted today--prior to commencing this hearing, the complainant has not introduced any evidence. not one scintilla of evidence that indicates that the water district in any fashion has unreasonably excluded him from this particular project. fact, the only expert that has testified in this action is the water district's engineer, Kent Taylor, who indicates that as in all water district projects a three prong test was used to determine which parts of which roads, and which roads would, in fact, be selected. And that is number of households along each roadway, a combination of the community development block grant qualification, that is low to moderate income versus number of households, and the construction costs. At the time this project was scooped out Willow Creek Road, which is now Aaron-Barnette Road, had a petition which we have filed in the record for users for the first 1.8 They had a road captain. These are the individuals, or nine or ten that signed up, Mr. Barnette was not one of them. On his portion of the road, which crosses the creek, which is an additional 1.3 miles, there were two households

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and one that was vacant for 1.3 miles which, according to Mr. Taylor's testimony, \$51,000 in additional construction cost would require--would entail that additional construction, it would be unreasonable to construct that -- to add that to the My point is this, we can chase rabbits all day but the real issue here is has Mr. Barnette been unreasonably excluded from the project? He has introduced no evidence to that effect. He is not an engineer, I asked him interrogatories -- and I'll be brief and I'll end this soon. I asked him for: "Any documents relating to supporting his position that he should be included in the project." "None at present but will supplement." Nothing came forth. number six: "All documents in your possession which will support your position from an engineering standpoint that is practical and efficient to complete a loop along Aaron-Barnette Road." "None at present, will supplement." engineering evidence. Final request was: "All documents in your possession which support your assertion before the PSC that a reasonable estimate to construct this line will be \$40,000."

1	There is no estimates. So, to go forward at this
2	time, for the record, based upon the testimony
3	that is in the record, just gives the complainant
4	an opportunity to rehabilitate his case. He
5	hasn't proven it yet. That's all I had to say at
6	this point, Your Honor.
7	MR. THOMAS:
8	May we respond, Mr. Shapiro?
9	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
10	Well, let me just ask a question of Mr. Edelman
11	first. How does the proof differ from what was
12	alleged initially in the complaint? Isn't it
13	pretty consistent? I mean, the proof that Mr.
14	Reuben Barnette submitted?
15	MR. EDELMAN:
16	Well, it depends on what your standard is. If you
17	are going to chase the rabbit of notice, there was
18	plenty of notice. All of these nine or ten people
19	had notice. And my position is that it really is
20	irrelevant. I think he had notice, but whether he
21	did or he didn't it really makes no difference
22	because this has tothis case has to fall on
23	expert testimony, what the reasonable expectation
24	of the district is in terms of scoping out a

project and having individuals come back after the project is scooped out and say I'm developing land, I want to sell land, I've sold land, now I should be included in the project.

HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:

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Well, what I'm getting at is this, there was a complaint filed by Mr. Barnette. You filed the response, there was proof submitted to the Commission after reviewing the complaint and the So, apparently the--they themselves would consider sufficient to raise their question for the Commission to consider at least initially. As far as I can determine from reading the proof, everything is consistent with what--with the pleadings. In other words, his position hasn't changed, he has just supported it with testimony. And your position hasn't changed, you have just supported your with testimony. So, you are asking us now, at this point, after all of the, you know, if after all the pleadings have been presented and after all the proof has been put in in support of those pleadings, to dismiss the complaint based-you are saying that they have not stated a cause of action.

1 MR. EDELMAN: 2 No, I'm saying based upon the pleadings and the expert testimony that we have introduced. 3 could have hired an engineer to come back and say 5 you didn't appropriately consider the roads. 6 should have included his road for these reasons. 7 They didn't do that. They have got lay testimony that is unfounded, unsupported and the expert, our 8 9 expert, is the only one that is testifying. that is cause for the Summary Judgement, Judgement 10 11 on the Pleadings, and I think, you know, my point 12 is I don't expect you to grant this, but we are going to chase rabbits for three or four hours and 13 14 we ought not have to do that. 15 **HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:** 16 Well, I'm going to overrule the objection, or deny 17 the motion--I guess it is a motion--and allow the 18 case to proceed on the evidence. 19 MR. 5	Q	Mr. Barnette, you filed this complaint. My name
6		is Ray Edelman, I represent the South Anderson
7		Water District. I just have a few questions for
8		you. In this matter you initially indicate that
9		you didn't receivelet me just ask you, did you
10		or did you not read the notices that were in the
11		newspaper, Anderson News, regarding this project?
12	A	The first notice I read was sometime in the
13		later part of `98 which said they were going
14		to run Willow Creek Road.
15	Q	Is that what it said Mr. Barnette?
16	Α	That's what it said, they was going to run

18	Q	Now, are you talking about the exhibit that
L9		is attached to your testimony? May I

11		indulge me for a second, let's read what the
12		Notice says, okay. "Public Notification for
13		Informing the Public of Possible Impact to an
14		Important Land Resource. The United States
15		Department of Agriculture, Rural Development
16		is considering an application for financial
17		assistance sponsored by the South Anderson
18		Water District. The specific elements of
19		this proposed action involves the
20		construction of water line extensions
21		comprised of approximately 25,000 linear feet
22		of eight inch water mains, 240,000 linear
23		feet of four inch water mains, 11,000 linear
24		feet of three inch water mains a numn

1		station and system appurtenances such as gate
2		valves, air release valves, blow-off valves,
3		meters, et cetera." "The following roads and
4		communities will be affected," and it talks
5		about Ballard, Dugansville Road, Hoophole,
6		Puncheon Creek, Searcy School, Fairview, Lick
7		Skillet, Drydock, Anderson City, Buntain
8		School, Kentucky 44 east of Glensboro,
9		Burgin, Cox, Willow Creek, 44 west of
10		Glensboro, Ashby Road, Gilberts Creek,
11		Wooldridge, Rice Road and Fox Creek. It says
12		if additional funds become available the
13		following roads will be considered: Dawson
14		Ferry, Ashby, Bear Creek, Dennis, Burke, Mays
15		Branch and Leathers. It says if implemented
16		the proposed action may impact important
17		farmland and designed flood plan within the
18		corridors or sites
19		MR. THOMAS:
20		Designated.
21	Q	designated flood plains within the
22		corridors and/or sites of the proposed
23		improvements. The purposethe purpose of
24		this notice is to inform the public of the

1		impact on the proposed locations of farm land
2		and flood plain. Alternative sites or
3		actions that would avoid these impacts and
4		methods that can be used to reduce these
5		impacts. The proposed action is available
6		for review at the following Rural Development
7		Office, and that is in Shelbyville. Any
8		persons interested in commenting on the
9		proposed action may do so by sending comments
10		within 30 days following the date of this
11		publication to Thomas G. Fern, State
12		Director, 771 Corporate Drive, Suite 200,
13		Lexington, Kentucky. And at the end there is
14		a notice of public need that is going to be
15		held at nine o'clock March 8. Now, Mr.
16		Barnette, what was the purpose of that
17		meeting as indicated in thisas you take it,
18		as I just read it, what was the purpose of
19		that meeting?
20	A	That March 8?
21	Q	Yes, what was the purpose of the meeting,
22		according to this notice?
23	A	I don't know what it was, what business would
24		I have there when they had on there they was

1		going to run Willow Creek Road?
2	Q	Where in this notice does it say that South
3		Anderson Water District is going to run water
4		on Willow Creek Road? Show it to me.
5	A	Well, I just showed you, what does it mean
6		then?
7	Q	I'm asking you where does it say that the
8		South Anderson Water District was going to
9		run water on the Willow Creek Road?
10	A	You read it off the top up there, that the
11		following roads was going to be run.
12	Q	Show me, just show it to me where it says it
13		is going to be run
14		MR. THOMAS:
15		He has the right to cross-examine him
16		but he has asked him three times and Mr.
17		Barnette has responded three times that
18		it says Willow Creek Road. I mean, I
19		don't know what more he wants my client
20		to say. He has asked and answered the
21		question.
22	Q	Well, let's go over it one more time. The
23		beginning says the United States Department
24		of Agriculture Rural Developing is

+	considering an application for financial
2	assistance.
3	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
4	Well, I think the witness has testified
5	essentially that he understood that
6	notice to be a notice informing the
7	public that the road will be runthat
8	the line would be run along those areas
9	described or mentioned and one of them
10	was Willow Creek Road. Now, you are
11	asking him where does it say,
12	specifically, and he has told you that
13	he says where it says it on the top.
14	That is whatI take it that is what he
15	understands it to say.
16	MR. EDELMAN:
17	Well, as long as you understand, I'm
18	trying
19	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20	I understand what you are saying but I
21	understand what he is alsoI also
22	understand what he is saying. And he is
23	telling you what his impression of it
24	is.

1	A	I'm not no lawyer.
2		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
3		Well, wait a minute, you just answer
4		questions and you let the lawyers argue
5		among themselves.
6	Q	I'll finish up with this then. Will you
7		agree with me, Mr. Barnette, that the plain
8		language of this notice says that the purpose
9		of this notice is to inform the public of
10		this possible result and request comments
11		concerning the impacts of the proposed
12		location of farmland and flood plain to
13		alternationalternative sites or actions
14		that would avoid these impacts and three
15		methods that could be used to reduce these
16		impacts. Is that not what it says?
17	A	Well, I guess that is what it says, but what
18		does it mean? What does that mean, my farm
L9		is different than all the rest of them? I
20		don't see no difference in none of them.
21	Q	Okay. Well, let me ask you, did you attend
22		that meeting?
23	A	No, I didn't attend that meeting.
24	Q	Did you attend any meeting regarding the

1		South Anderson Water District in this
2		project?
3	A	Not until I hired an attorney.
4	Q	Were you aware that your road had a road captain?
5	Α	Road captain?
6	Q	To solicit names of people that were
7		interested in the project in `96 and `97?
8	A	I'm not getting what you are saying?
9	Q	Were you aware that on Aaron-Barnette Road,
10		Willow Creek, that your road had an
11		individual who was in charge of getting a
12		petition together to see who was interested
13		in water?
14	A	I didn't know nothing about it until after I
15		found out they wasn't going to run water all
16		the way through.
17	Q	Okay, if I may approach the witness, Your
18		Honor. Do you know Dwight Conway?
19	A	Dwight Conway, yes.
20	Q	Does he live at 1121 Willow Creek?
21	A	He did live on Willow Creek I don't knowI
22		don't know what the address, he don't now.
23	Q	Does Rudy Jewel live at 1210 Willow Creek?
24	A	Jewel lives on Willow Creek, I don't know the

- 1 address.
- 2 Q Does Allen Chambers live at 1282 Willow
- 3 Creek?
- 4 A I don't know him.
- 5 Q Doug Armstrong and Sheila Barnes?
- 6 A Doug Armstrong?
- 7 Q 1316 Willow Creek?
- 8 A Doug Armstrong?
- 9 Q If you don't know that's fine, I'm not trying
- 10 to trip you.
- 11 A Maybe the one you are talking about they
- might call him Danny but it is the only
- 13 Armstrong that I know on that road.
- 14 Q Cathy and Steve Drury?
- 15 A Yes.
- 16 Q The Drury's live on Willow Creek?
- 17 A Yes.
- 18 Q Mike Tipton?
- 19 A Mike, yes.
- 20 Q Now, they all live--the ones you know all
- live on the first 1.8 miles of Willow Creek
- that has been included in this project; is
- 23 that not correct?
- 24 A Yes.

1	Q	Okay. I'd like to show this to Mr. Thomas,
2		we have already introduced this as part of
3		the record in the pleadings, Your Honor, but
4		I'd like to makethis is a list of the sign-
5		ups of individuals on the first 1.8 of Willow
6		Creek that were solicited and petitioned the
7		District for water.

MR. THOMAS:

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Your Honor, I don't have any basic objection to this, but what I think this really is are the people who signed up for the first 1.2 miles on Willow Creek, because I think as we go through this hearing today what Your Honor will find out is that, initially, the water district proposed to only do 1.2 miles of Willow Creek. And at some point between June and today they decided to add in an addition 6/10 of a mile, so I think when the road captain went along the road to look at these addresses, Your Honor, these are only to include the first 1.2 miles. So, I don't have any objection to Ray introducing this

1		but I'm saying it is not for the first
2		1.8 miles, it is really for the first
3		1.2 miles.
4		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
5		Well, all we think this witness can
6		identify, though, is that these people
7		lived on Willow Creek Road, where they
8		lived and how far down the road they
9		lived, he can't testify, because he
10		doesn'tunless he knows that they live
11		within a certain area. That's all he
12		can do.
13	Q	I can ask him. Do any of these individuals
14		live on the 1.3 miles that you are discussing
15		today?
16	A	That I'm asking for?
17	Q	Yes, sir.
18	A	No.
19	Q	Okay. Now, your name is not on this list, is
20		it
21	A	No. Or you didn't read it off, I ain't
22		looked at it.
23	Q	Well, I'll let you look at to make sure.
24		

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1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		Do you want to introduce that as an
3		exhibit?
4		MR. EDELMAN:
5		Yes, Your Honor.
6		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
7		Let's mark it for identification, then
8		as Defendant's Exhibit 1.
9		MR. EDELMAN:
10		Thank you, Your Honor.
11	Q	Mr. Barnette, have you had an opportunity to
12		look at it?
13	A	Yes, my name is not on it.
14	Q	Do you know
15		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
16		Do you want to introduce that?
17		MR. EDELMAN:
18		Yes, Your Honor.
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		For the purpose of showing that these
21		are the peoplethat these people live
22		on Willow Creek Road?
23		MR. EDELMAN:
24		For the purpose they live on Willow

1		Creek Road and Mrwe will later on
2		support it with testimony, Lynn Hughes
3		testimony supports that those people
4		signed up for the project.
5		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
6		Okay.
7		MR. EDELMAN:
8		And that Mr. Barnette's name is not on
9		the list.
10		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
11		At this point all you are offering it
12	٠.	for is to show that these people live on
13		Willow Creek Road?
14		MR. EDELMAN:
15		Yes. Once we introduce the engineer's
16		testimony it will be incorporated.
17		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
18		Let it be introduced for that purpose at
19		this time.
20		(EXHIBIT SO MARKED: Defendant Exhibit No. 1)
21	Q	Mr. Barnette, are you aware that there was another
22		hearing held inregarding the community
23		development block grant money that was advertised
24		in the Anderson News on August 5, 1998?

1	A	No, I don't understand that one.
2	Q	If I may approach the witness and let him
3		looks like Mr. Thomas had an affidavit of
4		newspaper gentlemen and this is part of our
5		previously filed proof, Your Honor. Let me
6	,	let your read that notice of public hearing
7		and ask you if youyou said you haven't read
8		it before so let me give you a second just to
9		review it before I ask you some questions on
10		it.
11		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
12		Can you read it Mr. Thomas?
13	A	This is not the first one that came out that you
14		read a while ago?
15	Q	No, sir.
16	Α	When did this one come out then?
17		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
18		Well, right now, Mr. Thomas, you just
19		answer the questions. Do you havehave
20		you read that before?
21		MR. THOMAS:
22		Ray, can you tell me where this is in
23		your exhibit? This is Exhibit 2
24		under Kincer?

1		MR. EDELMAN:
2		This is afterthis is attached to our
3		answer.
4		MR. THOMAS:
5		This is attached to your answer?
6	Q	Reuben, let me help you with that if I can
7		Mr. Barnette. For the record, this is an
8		advertisement that appeared in the Anderson
9		News, certified by Don White August 5, 1998,
0		styled Public Hearing Notice South Anderson
.1		Water District Expansion Project. "All
.2		interested citizens from Anderson County,
.3		Kentucky, the Kentucky Department of Local
.4		Government is accepting applications under
.5		the 1998 Community Development Block Grant
.6		(CDBG) Program. The following information
.7		concerning the CDBG Program is available for
.8		public inspection. A. Amount of funds
.9		available and range of activities that may be
0		undertaken. B. Estimated amount of funds
1		proposed to be used for activities benefiting
2		persons of low to moderate income. C. Plans
:3		for minimizing displacement persons as a
4		result of activities assisted with CDBG funds

1		and plans for providing assistance to those
2		persons to be actually displaced with all the
3		CDBG funded activities." And it goes on to
4		say in the end that the county will hold a
5		public hearing prior to the submission of any
6		application. The Public Hearing will be held
7		August 18, 1998, 6:00 in the Anderson County
8		District Courtroom. The purpose of the
9		hearing is to obtain views on housing,
L O		economic development, community development
L1		needs, review of the proposed activities,
L2		review any proposed applications, solicit
L3		public comment and inform citizens of
4		technical assistance available to help groups
. 5		representing low, moderate income persons in
.6		developing proposals. And they say that a
.7		copy is on file with the County Judge-
.8		Executive's office from August 18 through
.9		August 25, 1998. So, your testimony is that
0		you didn't read that in the paper?
1	A	That is different, no, I didn't.
2	Q	Okay, let me ask you.
3		MR. EDELMAN:

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If may, Your Honor, I'd like to make

1		that Defendant's Exhibit 2.
2		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
3		He can't identify it. How are you going
4		to identify it?
5		MR. EDELMAN:
6		I'll do it through the engineer.
7	Q	Do youdid you go to the meeting?
8	A	No.
9	Q	So, that meeting held on August 18 that
10		talked about the community development block
11		grant funds, you didn't attend that meeting
12		either?
13	A	If I didn't read it, I didn't know they had a
14		meeting, no.
15	Q	So that's a yes, you didn't attend the
16		meeting. Did youwere you aware of any
17		other meetings that were held?
18	A	No.
19	Q	That were advertised in the paper?
20	A	Not unless it is on this ad here, and I can't
21		hardly see this ad the way it is read here.
22		That's the only one I've seen in the paper
23		until one come outthe last one come out in
24		2000, I reckon.

- 1 $\,$ Q $\,$ Did you ever call the Water District prior to June
- of 1999 as you testified to, do you remember ever
- 3 calling them before June of 1999 inquiring about
- 4 the project?
- 5 A No.
- 6 Q Mr. Barnette, you testified in your
- deposition, given which is now part of your
- 8 testimony, that you have developed property
- 9 in Anderson County; is that correct?
- 10 A Yes.
- 11 Q And you developed property on Rice Road; is
- 12 that not correct?
- 13 A Yes.
- 14 Q And you have had a prior dispute with South
- Anderson Water District; is that not correct?
- 16 A Yes.
- 17 Q Okay. And that occurred some four or five
- 18 years ago?
- 19 A Yes.
- 20 Q And you filed a complaint with the Public
- 21 Service Commission?
- 22 A Yes.
- 23 Q And how was that complaint disposed of?
- 24 A I was refused to give a hearing in front of

1		the Public Service Commission.
2	Q	And your complaint was really about you were
3		attempting to get some monies back from the
4		district. You thought they owed you some
5		monies for water lines that you had put in
6		for developing the Rice Road property; is
7		that not correct?
8	A	I didn't think, they did. That was it, yes.
9	Q	However, the complaint you filed was
10		dismissed by the Public Service Commission?
11	A	Not exactly, no.
12	Q	What happened?
13	A	Well, South Anderson Water District, when I
14		went in front of them to hire them to run the
15		water down to the bottoms where I was making
16		eight lots, they told me of two ways it could
17		be set up where I could draw my money back.
18		And I accepted one of them and when people
19		started hooking on, Allison Walker, Manager
20		of South Anderson Water District, told me one
21		day that a house or two in the bottoms had
22		hooked on, he needed to get with me and pay
23		me for 50 foot of each one of them, and I
24		told him no that wasn't the way it was agreed

	on. It was agreed on the people outside of
	the bottoms paying me back so much, not the
	people in the bottoms where I sold lots. And
	he disagreed. But I had a contract at home
	where he signed it, where he got the water
	commissioners to approve it and he signed it

2	Q	How many households in June of `98 or early
3		`98, prior to the time you sold to Mr. and
4		Mrs. Rucker, how many users were there on
5		Willow Creek?
6	Α	On Willow Creek?
7	Q	Well, on your portion, on the 1.3 that we are
8		talking about today, on your portion?
9		Obviously there was you?
10		MR. THOMAS:
11		Mr. Shapiro, I'm going to allow him to
12		ask the question, but he says users, and
13		I'm not sure that is an appropriate
14		term, households, maybe.
15		MR. EDELMAN:
16		We can say households.
17		MR. THOMAS:
18		Households may be more appropriate.
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		The witness doesn't understand the
21		question.
22	Q	How many households or potential users, how
23		many potential households, including
24		yourself, were on the 1.3 portion of Willow

Creek which we are discussing today for 1 inclusion in this project? In June of `98 3 Α 4 0 Before you sold to Mr. and Mrs. Rucker and before you sold to the other four or so other 5 individuals the property you were developing? 6 7 Four, I reckon. Four and one house that my Α aunt used to live in, abandoned. 8 Who were those four? 9 0 It was a trailer on the bottom of the hill 10 Α that I owned, where my mother-in-law used to 11 live, and we divorced and she moved out, I 12 13 hadn't got it remodeled. So, let me stop you there, so nobody was 14 Q 15 living in there but there was a trailer you owned on your property? 16 17 Yes. Α 18 Where your house sets? 0 19 No, not where my house sets. Α Okay. Well, then explain to me on what 20 21 property? It's on a different farm where I live, it's 22 Α 23 on my land, but--

What other -- in addition to those two, what

- other two are we talking about?
- 2 A Ray Ellis and Rucker, what's his--I don't
- 3 remember his first name.
- 4 Q Are you talking about Mr. Rucker or is there
- 5 a different individual?
- 6 A Huh?
- 7 Q Are you talking about Mr. Rucker that
- 8 testified in this matter?
- 9 A No. What do you mean testified?
- 10 Q Well, that put proof in the record for you, a
- 11 Mr. and Mrs. Rucker, are we talking about
- 12 those individuals?
- 13 A Yes.
- 14 Q Now, they testified, Mr. Barnette, that they
- bought in June of `98. Does that sound about
- 16 right?
- 17 A Well, no, it don't. No.
- 18 Q Okay. Now, you are developing out there on
- 19 Willow Creek, are you not?
- 20 A I was.
- 21 Q Well, you sold how many tracts of land out
- 22 there?
- 23 A Eight, I think.
- 24 Q So, you have sold eight tracks of land on Willow

2	Α	Seven or eight, I think it is eight.
3	Q	Did you hirehave you hired an engineer to
4		take a look at the 1.381.3 miles of roadway
5		that we are discussing today to determine the
6		feasibility of running a water linewhether
7		it is feasible to run an extension of water
8		lines in this project?
9	A	No.
10	Q	Have you sought out any other expert
11		testimony to come before this Commission to
12		tell this Commission that in fact it is
13		feasible, given the numbers that exist in
14		`98, that this 1.3 miles should be included in
15		this extension?
16	A	No.
17	Q	Have you supplied the Commission any
18		information that would verify that your
19		number of \$40,000 would be the number it
20		would take to construct this additional 1.3
21		miles of water line
22	A	I estimated what I thought it would take, I
23		didn't say what it would take. I don't know
24		what it would take, you know, I estimated
l		

1	what I thought it would take.
2	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
3	But you haven't hired an engineer to
4	tell you?
5	A No, I haven't hired nobody.
6	MR. EDELMAN:
7	I think that's all I have right now Your
8	Honor.
9	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
10	Any questions?
11	MR. PINNY:
12	I have no questions.
13	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
14	Any redirect?
15	MR. THOMAS:
16	Yes, Mr. Shapiro.
17	
18	REDIRECT EXAMINATION
19	BY MR. THOMAS:
20	Q Mr. Barnette, Mr. Edelman on cross-examination
21	indicated that there were road captains along
22	various projects proposed by the South Anderson
23	Water District. Did a road captain ever come by
24	your house?

- 1 A No.
- 2 Q Were you ever told by anyone affiliated with
- 3 South Anderson Water District that a road
- 4 captain would be getting in contact with you?
- 5 A No.
- 6 Q So, you don't have any knowledge of any road
- 7 captain going along, coming along Willow
- 8 Creek Road?
- 9 A Yes, I do now.
- 10 Q You do now, but you didn't back in June of
- 11 \ \ \ \ \ 98?
- 12 A No.
- 13 Q Or, for that matter, the entire calendar year
- 14 of 1999?
- 15 A There was some time--after I found out they
- wasn't going all the way through the road,
- then I went to talking to people up and down
- 18 through there and I found out that they had
- 19 been down on the other end of Willow Creek
- 20 Road but not up around home.
- 21 Q Not to your house?
- 22 A No.
- 23 Q Now, for the Commission's own information,
- 24 what was your understanding in terms of how

1		far they were going to go on Willow Creek
2		Road when you found out that the notice
3		wasn't exactly as indicated, they were only
4		going through part of Willow Creek Road. How
5		far did you find out they were going to go?
6	A	One mile and two tenths.
7	Q	A mile and two tenths?
8	A	Yes.
9	Q	By the way, Mr. Shapiro, before I forget,
10		since I already have that exhibit in the
11		record, I'd like to have that blown up copy
12		made a part, formal part of the record,
13		because I think it is really
14		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15		Is it part of his testimony
16		MR. THOMAS:
17		It is part of his testimony, it is
18		already in the record.
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		Part of the prefiled testimony?
21		MR. THOMAS:
22		Yes, sir, it was.
23		MR. EDELMAN:
24		I don't have any objection.

1	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2	Well, what would be the purpose?
3	MR. THOMAS:
4	Well, I mean, I think it just highlights
5	what the wording of the language was in
6	terms of the roads, desire to be part of
7	this project by the South Anderson Water
8	District, I think a clear copy of the
9	actual notice submitted by South
10	Anderson Water District.
11	MR. EDELMAN:
12	I'm going to object, Your Honor, I mean
13	desireit speaks for itself, it says
14	what it says.
15	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
16	Well
17	MR. THOMAS:
18	It's your call Mr. Shapiro.
19	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20	If you have no objection to it
21	MR. EDELMAN:
22	I don't have any objection, it is the
23	same thing that is attached to his
24	testimony.

	1	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2	2	I would just introduce it, I will just
3	3	let it be a part of the record as a copy
4	1	of what is already in the record. I
5	5	mean, there is no sense in having two
6	Ó	exhibits that say exactly the same thing
7	7	and giving it separate numbers. But if
8	3	you want to leave that as a copy of what
9	l	is in the record, that will be fine.
10)	MR. THOMAS:
11		Okay, thank you Mr. Shapiro.
12	Q	So, when you found out, Reuben, that they
13	i	weren't going to come entirely along Willow
14		Creek Road, you found out they were only
15		going to go 1.2 miles.
16	Α	Yes.
17	Q	Okay. Is it true that you have now been
18		informed that that distance has changed?
19	A	Yes.
20	Q	And now how far is the South Anderson Water
21		District going to go along Willow Creek road?
22	A	I've been told a mile and eight tenths.
23	Q	So, there has been a change then from what
24		was initially proposed to what they are going

1		to do now?
2	A	Yes.
3	Q	Now, on his cross-examination Mr. Edelman
4		provided you with a copy of an August 1998
5		notice promulgated by the South Anderson
6		Water District. Ray, did youI didn't get a
7		copy of that, do you still have that?
8		MR. EDELMAN:
9		I haven't introduced it yet.
10		MR. THOMAS:
11		Okay, but you made reference to it, may
12		I see it for a minute?
13		MR. EDELMAN:
14		You can look at it, you've got a copy of
15		it, but you are welcome to look at it.
16		MR. THOMAS:
17		Do you have any problems if I show it to
18		Reuben?
19		MR. EDELMAN:
20		No, sir, go ahead.
21	Q	Now, I show you that same August 1998 notice that
22		Mr. Edelman showed you and I'll ask you does that
23		notice indicate in any way or any mention of
24		Willow Creek Road or for that matter any roads?

1	A	No, I don't see no roads on it.
2	Q	Okay. It's just a general notice to the
3		public of the possibility, I'm going to be
4		precise here, of the South Anderson Water
5		District expansion project, but it doesn't
6		indicate any roads on here?
7	A	I don't see it, I hadn't noticed it until you
8		said that just now.
9	Q	So, since it didn't mention Willow Creek Road
10		specifically, you didn't know whether that notice
11		applied to you or to anyone else? It didn't
12		personally indicate that it was going to affect
13		your property?
14		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15		I think the witness has testified that
16		he had never seen that notice; is that
17		right?
18	A	Yes, I testified that I didn't see it, so I
19		wouldn't
20		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
21		Is that correct, you haven't seen that
22		notice before?
23	A	No, I said I don't remember seeing that one.
24	Q	Now, I want to go back to another question Mr.

	1		Edelman asked, because I think it is very
	2		pertinent to this hearing. After you get past the
	3		1.2 miles in June of 1998, how many houses were
	4		there remaining on Willow Creek Road after that
	5		1.2 miles? MrI'm gong to establish that there
	6		were at least nine in the 1.2 mile corridor and
	7		all the documents submitted by the South Anderson
	8		Water District substantiate that. After that 1.2
1	9		miles in 1998, how many houses were there?
	10	Α	From the mile and two tenths on through?
	11	Q	Right.
	12	A	Eleven, not counting the one abandoned.
	13	Q	Eleven?
	14	A	Yes.
	15	Q	Okay. And your testimony is that included in
	16		that 11 would have been your house, the
	17		Redmon's house, the Elliott's house and the
	18		trailer where your mother-in-law lived?
	19	A	Yes.
	20	Q	Okay. So, there were 11 houses in that
	21		additionalin that 1.9 miles?
	22	A	1.8 miles I think.
	23	Q	1.8, 1.9 miles, okay.
	24	A	Yes. There was one more started along about
Ш			

1		that time but I don't know whether it had
2		started, but there wasn't nobody living there
3		for sure.
4	Q	And today how many houses are there after
5		that, goinghow many other houses have been
6		added after that 1.2 miles?
7	A	It is one more living there and it is one
8		more getting ready to move into in the next
9		two weeks.
10	Q	The one more living there would be Tom
11		Redmon's house; is that correct?
12	A	Yes.
13	Q	And the one more that is getting ready to
14		move there would be the Riddles house; is
15		that right?
16	Α	Yes.
17	Q	That's correct. So, that would make then, if
18		you add those two to eleven, it would make
19		13.
20		MR. EDELMAN
21		I don't have anyI want to object for a
22		second. I don't have any problem with
23		Mr. Thomas leading him a little bit, but
24	•	I'd like for him to ask him questions

1		about who these individuals are if he
2		knows. I'm not trying towell, in
3		terms of his asking him one would be the
4		Riddles and one would be the Redmons,
5		and I'd like to know if Mr. Barnette
6		knows who these people are. He didn't
7		seem to know who they were when I was
8		asking questions on the front end of the
9		road. I'm just objecting to the leading
10		a little bit is where I'm coming from.
11		MR. THOMAS:
12		I'll be glad to rephrase my question.
13		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
14		Have you asked himwhere are weare
15		you objecting to the last question that
16		was asked? Okay, rephrase the question.
17		MR. THOMAS:
18		I'll be glad to rephrase the question.
19	Q	You said there are two additional houses, do
20		you know who those two additional houses are
21		Mr. Barnette?
22	Α	Tom Redmon and Gaines Riddle or how you announce
23		it.
24	Q	And that would make a total of 13 as of

- 1 today, after that 1.2 mile termination by the
- South Anderson Water District?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 Q Now, finally, Mr. Edelman asked you a
- 5 question about you being a land developer.
- And you acknowledged on answering the
- question that in the past you have sold land
- 8 on Willow Creek Road?
- 9 A Yes.
- 10 Q Are you still selling land on Willow Creek
- 11 Road Mr. Barnette?
- 12 A Yes.
- 13 Q How many lots do you have to be developed?
- 14 A Two.
- 15 Q And where are those two located?
- 16 A Well, I guess the best way I can put it is
- one is located between a mile--the last mile
- and two tenths, and then one of them between
- 19 the six tenths that they added on later.
- 20 Q So, only one of the lots then is going to be
- 21 excluded from this project?
- 22 A Yeah.
- 23 Q And you have some other lots for sale but
- they are located on US 62?

- 1 A Yes.
- Q And they already have access to city water?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 Q So, as of today, there is only one lot that
- 5 you have undeveloped for sale that would
- 6 benefit from this roadway, from going all the
- 7 way through Willow Creek Road?
- 8 A Yes.
- 9 Q Only one lot?
- 10 A Yeah, six acres.
- 11 Q And the remaining property is your homestead
- property; is that correct? The only other
- 13 property that is on Willow Creek Road would
- be your homestead property, right?
- 15 A Yes.
- 16 Q Where you personally live?
- 17 A Yes.
- 18 Q That is not for sale; is that correct?
- 19 A Not for sale.
- 20 Q And where your children live?
- 21 A Yes.
- MR. THOMAS:
- I have no further questions, Mr.
- Shapiro.

	1		RECROSS EXAMINATION
	2	BY I	MR. EDELMAN:
	3	Q	Sounds like you have been pretty successful
	4		selling lots out there on Willow Creek or Aaron-
	5		Barnette Road?
	6	A	I didn't understand you.
	7	Q	I said it sounds like you have been pretty
	8		successful selling lots on Aaron-Barnette
	9		Road?
	10	A	Well, I call it more tracts, not lots.
	11	Q	Well, what sizewould you agree with me that
	12		you have been pretty successful selling these
	13		tracts?
	14	A	Yes.
	15	Q	When did you start selling these tracts?
	16	A	Probably four years ago, I don't know the
:	17		exact day, but approximately.
:	18	Q	And just for the record, how many tracts have
	L9		you sold?
2	20	A	Seven, I reckon.
2	21		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2	22		Are you talking about Willow Creek Road?
2	23		MR. EDELMAN:
2	24		Yes, sir.

			HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
	2		Seven on Willow Creek Road?
	3	A	Yeah.
	4	Q	And there is one remaining
	5	A	One remaining. Well, one
	6	Q	Actually, there is two remaining, one is on the
	7		portion where you are requesting to be included in
	8		the project and one is already included in what
	9		would be in the current project?
	10	A	Yes.
	11		MR. EDELMAN
	12		That's all I have right now Your Honor.
	13	HEARI	NG OFFICER SHAPIRO:
	14		Staff, any questions?
:	15	MR. P	INNY:
:	16	1	No questions.

	18		REDIRECT EXAMINATION
1	19	BY MR	. THOMAS:
2	20	Q :	In keeping with the rules of evidence, just to
2	21	:	follow up on Mr. Edelman's statement. These lots
2	22	1	that you sold, Mr. Barnette, you have sold,
2	23	C	obviously, without there being city water
2	24	ć	available to the buvers of these lots: correct?

1	Α	Right.
2	Q	And you have been successful doing that?
3	A	Yes.
4	Q	So, why do you want water now, Mr. Barnette,
5		why do you want city water now?
6	Α	Well, anybody wants city water. That is one
7		thing
8		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
9		I don't know that this is like follow up
10		from what he covered.
11		MR. THOMAS:
12		Well, let me tell you where I'm going
13		Mr. Shapiro. If he has been successful
14		doing it without city water and he only
15		has one lot for sale, then it stands to
16		reason that the reason that he wants
17		water has to do with something other
18		than his desire to sell lots.
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		But he has already testified on his
21		direct testimony that he wants water
22		becausehe wants city water because
23		city water is better to use than cistern
24		water. It is cleaner and it tastes

1	better and his little boy liked to drink
2	it.
3	A Well, that's not the only reason.
4	MR. THOMAS:
5	Okay. Then I'll stand by that Mr.
6	Shapiro.
7	MR. EDELMAN:

5		2000, before the court reporter there in
6		Lawrenceburg, Kentucky?
7	Α	Yes.
8	Q	And, Tom, do you adopt that testimony as you
9		stated on that day?
1.0	A	Yes.

1	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2	Can these witnesses then be excused?
3	MR. EDELMAN:
4	As far as I'm concerned Your Honor.
5	MR. THOMAS:
6	They are, certainly, are excused but they may want
7	to stay Your Honor.
8	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
9	Right, I understand that. Just so that people who
10	have come here will understand what is going on, I
11	think you need to giveyou should be informed of
12	what just happened. And the way this proceeding
13	is being conducted all the testimony that we
14	referred to as direct testimony, that is the
15	testimony that the attorney who called you to
16	testify on his behalf will present itwill put
17	into evidence. That is called direct testimony.
18	And they have agreedthat was filed in advance
19	and the testimony that you gave when you
20	essentially gave the deposition in this
21	proceeding. Now, the parties have agreed that
22	that will be part of the record as evidence and
23	Mr. Edelman has stated that he has no questions to

ask these witnesses on cross-examination and Mr.

1	Pinny has also indicated the same. So, your
2	testimony will not be needed here today. Now, we
3	didn't know that before the hearing began so that
4	is why you had to be here, but, now that we know
5	that, you are free to stay if you want to stay but
6	you have been excused and you can leave any time
7	you want to. And that will conclude the case for
8	the petitioneror complainant. I take it,
9	though, that you will have some questions of Mr.
10	Kincer and Mr. Taylor?
11	MR. THOMAS:
12	Yes, sir, I will.
13	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
14	Okay, we are not going to get off that easy.
15	MR. EDELMAN:
16	It's at least kind of you to ask.
17	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
18	Call your first witness.
19	MR. EDELMAN:
20	I just want to renew for the record, before I call
21	Mr. Kincer, I'd just like to renew the motion I
22	made prior to the beginning of this hearing if
23	that would be okay with Mr. Thomas, rather than
24	have to go through that diatribe again.

	L2	sworn, testified as follows:
	13	DIRECT EXAMINATION
	L4	BY MR. EDELMAN:
1	.5	Q Would you state your name for the record?
1	.6	A Bob Kincer.
1	.7	Q Mr. Kincer, I have handed to the court
1	.8	reporter a copy of your verified testimony
1	9	that was given in my office in verified form
2	0	in front of the court reporter on February 2,
2	1	2000. Do you adopt that testimony as your
2	2	testimony today in verified form?
2	3	A Yes. Did you say February 3?
2	4	Q I believe it was February 3.

- 1 A Yes, okay. Yes, I do.
- 2 Q As your direct testimony on behalf of South
- 3 Anderson Water District?
- 4 A Yes, sir.
- 5 Q Along with the attached exhibits?
- 6 A Yes.
- 7 MR. EDELMAN:
- 8 Your Honor, I pass for cross-
- 9 examination.
- 10 HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
- 11 You want to offer this into evidence; is that
- 12 correct?
- 13 MR. EDELMAN:
- 14 Yes, Your Honor, as I quess number two.
- 15 HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
- 16 It will be number three.
- 17 MR. EDELMAN:
- Number three. We didn't get the other notice in.
- 19 COURT REPORTER:
- I just have one.
- 21 HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
- Okay, the notice--that will be Defendant's Exhibit
- Number 2, then, I'm sorry.
- 24 (EXHIBIT SO MARKED: Defendant Exhibit No. 2)

1	MR.	EDELMAN:
2		Thank you.
3	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
4		Any objection?
5	MR.	THOMAS:
6		No, sir.
7	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
8		The witness is tendered for cross-examination?
9	MR.	EDELMAN:
10		Yes, Your Honor.
11	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
12		Mr. Thomas
13		
14		CROSS EXAMINATION
15	BY M	R. THOMAS:
16	Q	Mr. Kincer, does the South Anderson Water District
17		have a mission?
18	Α	Yes, sir.
19	Q	Could you please tell us what that mission
20		is?
21	A	The mission of South Anderson is to serve
22		every household in our boundary as soon as
23		possible but within a feasible range of pay
24		back in the money that we are obligated to

1		make yearly installments on.
2	Q	Now, clearly, at some point there was a
3		determination made by South Anderson Water
4		District that you wanted to engage in another
5		expansion, what you call your Phase 5
6		expansion.
7	A	Right.
8	Q	Now, tell me, Mr. Kincer, how you determined
9		the feasibility of this particular expansion?
10		And I think it was somehowI want to avoid
11		confusion here, I think we ought to give out
12		some maps.
13		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
14		Let's mark this map as Plaintiff's
15		Exhibit Number 11.
16		COURT REPORTER:
17		Do you want to make it Plaintiff's
18		Exhibit or Barnette?
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		No, he is going to be using it. Well,
21		what did we do?
22		COURT REPORTER:
23		We went through ten on Barnette.
24		

1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		Okay, Barnette 11, mark it as Barnette
3		11.
4		(EXHIBIT SO MARKED: Barnette Exhibit No. 11)
5	Q	Now, I'll show you this map, I'mprimarily want
6		Mr. Shapiro to see it butjust so we all can be
7		on the same page here, this is the proposed Phase
8		5 expansion of South Anderson Water?
9	Α	I would say yes.
10	Q	Now, tell me, Mr. Kincer, how South Anderson Water
11		District went about determining the feasibility of
12		that Phase 5 expansion project?
13	Α	Okay. South Anderson was formed in 1976. At
14		the beginning of that district the Phases
15		One, Two, Three and Four and now we are into
16		Five, all came about by the request of
17		households at the end or at the beginning of
18		a road where the water line would have ended
19		on the previous expansion. And then we take
20		those roads and we determine through the
21		engineer how many houses and how many miles
22		that we are really talking about. We are
23		talking about, probably, 43 miles and 350
24		households. There is times when we have to

1		cut off on a road because of the number of
2		people per mile is not a feasible pay back of
3		our obligation in the loan money that we get.
4		So, somewhere along the way, in this Phase 5
5		project, it was at the request of the people
6		that did not have water to be included and
7		when we put it all down on paper the
8		engineering has to help determine if it is
9		feasible for those roads to be included. For
10		the Commission to understand that Mr.
11		Barnette's road is not the only road in this
12		project that we had to cut back on, there is
13		probably eight to ten others, and Mr. Taylor
14		may have that in his testimony thatwhat
15		these roads are.
16	Q	Well, I'm going to get to Mr. Taylor's
17		testimony but for purposes of the Commission
18		making a ruling here. You are saying that
19		feasibilitytell me if I'm correctthat
20		feasibility, in your opinion as Chairman of
21		the South Anderson Water District, is
22		determined primarily by number of households
23		to be served per mile. That's what you are
24		focusing on primarily?

	l}		
	1	A	Yes.
	2	Q	Okay. And that whether people wanted water is not
	3		nearly as important as looking at your ability to
	4		reach the most households you can per mile; is
	5		that correct Mr. Kincer?
	6	A	Well, the South Anderson Water Commissioners
	7		are responsible to the 1,500 customers that
	8		we now serve in addition to the 350 that we
	9		plan to put on this project, is that their
	10		rates will be reasonable and them using
	11		water. You cannot jeopardize rates to the
	12		point that they become unreasonable for all
	13		of your existing customers. And when you
	14		talk about a mile of line and you talk about
	15		two or three potential households there is no
	16		way that you can justify pay back even when
	17		you are talking about 50% grant money and 50%
$\ $	18		loan money. And our engineering determines
	19		that from his report.
1	20	Q	<u>-</u>
		Ž.	I agree that that makes sense but, again,
	21		when you are looking at expanding and you
	22		talk about feasibility, I just want to be
	23		clear, Mr. Kincer, you are talking about
	24		trying to serve the most households per mile
11			

1		that you possibly can. That is going to
2		reducethat is going to make the rates
3		fairly stable for one thing, correct?
4	A	Okay.
5	Q	Am I right on that?
6	A	Well, yes. We do try to serve as many houses
7		as we can.
8	Q	So, when you came up with these lines right
9		here you determined that these lines would
10		reach the most households per mile that made
11		this project feasible; is that your
12		testimony?
13	A	The overall number of people per mile, yes,
14		would make thewould make it feasible.
15	Q	Well, Mr. Kincer, it is my understanding that
16		each roadway would use a different project;
17		is that correct? There areyou propose 14
8.1		different projects. Well, let me clarify
L9		something first. Is Fox Creek Road in or out
20		of the project? Is Fox Creek Road a part of
21		the Phase 5 expansion?
22	A	I'm not sure, that will have to come from the
23		engineer.
24	0	So, you don't know the answer to that

	1		question?
	2	A	Not exactly, no.
	3	Q	Okay. But I am correct that each project,
	4		each roadway, is viewed as a separate
	5		project? In other words, Gilberts Creek will
	6		be seen as one project, Athens Road will be
	7		seen as one project; am I correct on that?
	8	A	Well, not an individual project. Each road
	9		is reviewed for its own credibility of being
	10		feasible or not, because you cannot put a
	11		road in that has got one house on it for four
	12		miles and then expect the other roads to pay
	13		higher rates for that purpose.
	14	Q	So, again, feasibility then for this entire
	15		project would be to maximize the most
-	16		households you could per mile?
	L7	A	I would say yes.
	L8	Q	And, of course, to be reasonable, Mr. Kincer,
1	.9		you are also going to look at cost per mile
2	0.0		too, wouldn't you? In other words, you might
2	1		have ten households per mile but if it is
2	2		going to cost you an exorbitant amount of
2	3		money because of the terrain or the rock or
2	4		the limestone, then that would be a

	1		consideration by South Anderson Water
	2		District as well, cost per mile would be a
	3		consideration as well; correct?
	4	A	I would say yes.
	5	Q	Any other significant consideration by the
	6		South Anderson Water district other than the
	7		density, which would be the customers per
	8		mile and the cost, which would be the cost of
	9		constructing the water line per mile, are
I	10		there any other feasible considerations?
	11	Α	I probably did not understand your question.
	12	Q	Okay. We have established here, for the
	13		Commission's purposes, that there are two
	14		items that you consider when you talk about
:	15		feasibility. One, reaching the most
-	16		households you can per mile and, secondly,
.	17		taking into consideration what it is going to
:	18		cost to build those water lines per mile, and
1	19		I'm asking you are there any other
2	20		feasibility considerationsare there any
2	21		other considerations other than those two?
2	22	A	Not that I know of, no.
2	23	Q	Okay. Well, looking at your testimony and,
2	24		again, I'm not trying to trick you but I want

1		the Commission to be clear. Certainly when
2		you apply for grant money you want to look at
3		whether those households would be grant money
4		eligible; correct?
5	Α	Yes.
6	Q	So, that would be a consideration too, whether you
7		are serving enough low income households to make
8		your abilitya grant money attractive, right?
9	Α	Yes.
10	Q	Because the more grant money you obtain the
11		cheaper the project costs, overall project
12		cost is to you; is that correct
13	A	The more grant money you get the more you can
14		expand out in those thinly populated areas.
15	Q	So, there have really been three
16		considerations, and I think your testimony
17		bears this out. One, you want to look at the
18		density, that is the customers per mile;
19		secondly, you want to look at what it is
20		going to cost to build that road per mile and
21		then; thirdly, you want to look at am I able
22		to reach enough low income households to make
23		this feasible, those are the three
24		considerations; correct Mr. Kincer?

A	Yes.
Q	Now, just a point of information, Mr. Kincer,
	because I want to be clear on where the
	project stands. Everything that I've read
	indicates that your current cost estimate for
	the project is \$2,205,830. Let me repeat
	that question for the stenographer. Your
	projected project cost is \$2,205,830. I got
	that from your application, CDBG grants and
	part of your engineering report. Is that
	still the project cost estimate?
A	If you are asking me to confirm that, I'd say
	we have approved that hinged upon our
	engineering with the qualified ability to
	make that dollar amount for the project. We
	have not bid the project yet. We are
	estimating that that is what it will cost.
Q	I don't know if this is an exhibit or not.
	I'm just going to use this information. Now
	let's see, Mr. Kincer, your funding source
	here, your projected funding source, and if
	I'm correct your projected funding source is
	that you are going to receive \$1,088,000 in
	loan money from the United States Department
	Q

I	1		of Agriculture, Rural Development Service.
	2		You are only going to receive \$93,000 in
	3		grant money; is that correct? That says a
	4		million but your actual grant money award was
	5		\$960,000; is that correct?
	6	A	It is less than a million, yes.
	7	Q	But you don't know exactly, you can't testify
	8		that it was 960,000, you just know that it is
	9		less than a million?
1	. 0	A	I can say it is 900 plus thousand, I don't
1	.1		have that number with me though.
1	.2	Q	And then you are going to receive \$61,000
1	.3		from the Fiscal Court and \$56,000 in tap-on
1	.4		fees to finance this project; is that correct
1	.5		Mr. Kincer? Is that your revenue source for
1	.6		this project?
1	.7	A	State that again, I don't think you have got
1	.8		the right numbers.
1	9	Q	Well, that is why I'm asking you the question
2	0		I want to make sure I've got a right number.
2	1		You are gong to receive 900,000 plusthat's
2	2		your testimonyin grant money from Community
2	3		Development block grant funds?
2	4		

1	MR. EDELMAN:
2	Your Honor, if I can interject.
3	A If you are asking me to confirm numbers I
4	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
5	Okay, wait a minute.
6	MR. EDELMAN:
7	Just let me object for a second. He has
8	testified that there is going to be
9	960,000 of grant money on his direct
10	testimony.
11	MR. THOMAS:
12	Well, he said 900,000 plus.
13	MR. EDELMAN:
14	Can I finish?
15	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
16	That's his direct testimony though
17	MR. EDELMAN:
18	His direct testimony is in the record,
19	he has testified to that. Thethis
20	document is a preliminary engineering
21	report that was used to get the grant
22	money. It wasused a million dollars,
23	that's the max. So, I mean, I have no
24	problem with Mr. Thomas going over this,

1		I just, you know, to the point that we
2		are being repetitive, I'd like to move
3		on.
4		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
5		What is the point of the question?
6		MR. THOMAS:
7		The point of the question, Your Honor,
8		is to establish, first of all, the
9		amount of money that is coming into the
10		project. I think I need to do that for
11		basis of showing that there is money
12		available for them to complete the
13		remainder of Willow Creek Road. That's
14		where I'm going but I need to establish
15		first how much money is coming into the
16		project.
17		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
18		Well, he has testified that they are
19		going to get somewhere in excess of
20		\$900,000 for the
21	A	Grant money.
22		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
23		grant money, community block grant, he
24		is going to get a little over a million

1		dollars from the Department of
2		Agriculture, so that is essentially a
3		loan. A portion of it is going to come
4		from the Fiscal Court and a portion of
5		it is going to come from the Water
6		District itself though tap-on fees and I
7		guess other revenues that they had. You
8		need to know the exactyou want to know
9		the exact amounts?
10	Q	No, no, I take it then that they are consistent
11		that they both equal to about \$2.2 million Mr.
12		Kincer?
13	A	That's the estimated project cost.
14		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15		But we be been 1 and 10

23		run into during the project.
24	0	So, the answer is ves?

1	. A	Yes.
2	Q	Thank you. Now, Mr. Kincer, you determined
3		that you are going to build water lines along
4		these roadways, including Willow Creek Road.
5		And at some point pursuant to federal
6	: :.	government and state government regulations
7		you have to give notice of the proposed
8		roadways that you are going to construct
9		water lines; is that not true?
10	Α	Yes, it is true.
11	Q	And you don't deny, do you, Mr. Kincer, that when
12		you promulgated the notice, in fact, there is this
13		affidavit from Mr. White at Anderson News
14		indicating that this is the notification of the
15		South Anderson Water District's informing the
16		public of possible impact to an important land
17		resource. This is a notice that you published;
18		correct?
19		MR. EDELMAN:
20		I'm going to object to the question in
21	•	the sense that if he knows, that we
22		published or the District published it.
23		I think the face of the document
24		indicates that it was published by the

1		federal government.
2		MR. THOMAS:
3		I think the face of the document, Your
4		Honor
5		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
6		Well, wait a minute, wait, wait. Why
7		don't we just ask him who published that
8		notice.
9	Q	Who published this notice Mr. Kincer?
10	A	Well, it is a requirement that the notice be
11		published. Who took it down to the office of
12		the Anderson News, most likely would have
13		been the Manager of the water district, but
14	٠	it was a statedthis is a federal government
15		requirement.
16		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
17		Okay, but the question is did the Water
18		District cause that notice to be
19		published or did somebody else cause it
20		to be published?
21	Α	Well, somebody else would require it to be

24		I know they required it but who actually

1		caused it to be published? By that I
2		mean, who took it to the newspaper and
3		said we want you to publish this in your
4		next edition?
5	A	Okay, I'd say that would be the South
6 .		Anderson Water District.
7		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
8		And who prepared that notification; do
9		you know? Was it prepared by
10	Α	I'd say the engineer.
11		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
12		The engineer prepared it?
13	A	Yes.
14		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15		The engineer for
16	A	For South Anderson.
17		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
18		South Anderson Water District?
19	A	Yes.
20		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
21		So, the engineer prepared it, and the
22		engineer or someone fromnot the
23		engineersomeone from the Water
24		District took it to the newspaper and

	1		they published itto have it published;
	2		is that right?
	3	A	Yes, yes.
	4	Q	Not to belabor the point, Mr. Kincer, if I could
	5		get right to the point. The notice does say that
	6.		the roads that will be affected include Willow
	7		Creek Road, does it not?
	8	A	I see that on there, yes.
	9	Q	And there is no road qualification on there, for
	10		instance, when you talk about Kentucky 44 East you

	16		MR. EDELMAN:
-	17		Objection to the terminology that

2	21		Your Honor, the noticeI have a right
2	22		to ask questions about the notice, it
2	23		speaks for itself and my question is
2	24		simply that there is no qualifications

1		regarding Willow Creek Road.
2		MR. EDELMAN:
3		I have no problem with that.
4		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
5		What's that?
6		MR. EDELMAN:
7		I have no problem with that, but the
8		problem I have he isthen he goes and

2		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
3		I mean, that's what the notice is
4		saying?
5	Α	Yes.

7		Isn't that correct?
8	A	Yes, it is.
9		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
10		And with respect to Willow Creek Road,
11		it doesn't say anything except Willow
12		Creek Road?
13	A	But for the
14		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15		Is that correct?
16	A	Yes.
۱7		MR. EDELMAN:
L 8		He has a right to explain.
L9	A	But for the Commission's understanding that these

1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		I understand. I understand that there
3		are some other procedures that are going
4		to follow. But insofar as that notice
5		is concerned, that notice says that the
6		roads that the project is being
7		considered for are the roads that are
8		listed in that notice?

10		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
11		Does that answer your questions?
12		MR. THOMAS:
13		Thank you Mr. Shapiro.
14	Q	Mr. Kincer, would you agree with me that an
15		average person reading that notice would believe
16		that the South Anderson Water District was going
17		to construct water lines entirely along Willow
18		Creek Road?
19	A	Knowing what I know of roads that we have to
20		evaluate
21		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
22		Well, he is asking you what an average
23		person wouldif youwhat an average
24		person would think about that, what

	1		interpretation an average person would
ı	2		give to that notice, not what you would
	3		give to that notice knowing what you
	4		know about the procedure.
	5	A	Okay. I'd say it would probably stir up the
	6		interest of that person getting back with the
	7		water district to understand if it is going
	8		to beget into his house.

4	What is the objection?
5	MR. EDELMAN:
6	The objection is he is talking about
7	that notice talking about constructing

9	itself. The noticeclearly in the
10	notice it talks about the purpose is the
11	impact on farm land. It is not a notice
12	about the scope of the project. And
13	that's an unfairthat is a question
14	that cannot take a yes or no answer to.
15	He needs an opportunity to explain.
16	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
17	He's asking him thoughessentially,
18	what he is asking the witness is whether
19	or not a person, an ordinary person
20	living in the South Anderson Water
21	District might read that, the person
22	reading that, rather, that person
23	reading it, rather the person I
24	described reading that would come to the

1		conclusion that a project was being
2		considered that will cover the entire
3		Willow Creek Road. Do you have an
4		opinion as to whether or not a person
5		would reach such a conclusion, yes or
6		no? First of all, do you have an
7		opinion on it?
8	A	An average person might assume that
9		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
10		Well, do you have an opinion on it, you
11		have an opinion?
12	A	Yes.
13		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
14		Okay, what is your opinion?
15	A	Well my opinion is that all roads cannot be
16		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
17		No, I want to know what your opinion
18		about what the average person would
19		what an average person would conclude
20		from this?
21	A	An average person probably yes wouldthat's the
22		best way to get out of that.
23	Q	First of all, Mr. Kincer, you did hold the
24		public hearing on March 8 at nine o'clock

1		a.m?
2	Α	Yes.
3	Q	You were there, were you not?
4	A	Most likely I was, yes.
5	Q	And you will agree with me, Mr. Kincer, that
6		that meeting was not very well attended?
7	A	It would have been announced that the meeting
8		was going to be held, the number of people
9		that come is not we cannot control that.
10		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
11		Well, the question was was it well
12		attended or not? Let him answer the
13		question.
14	A	I'd say yes.
15		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
16		You say it was well attended?
17	A	Yes.
18		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
19		Okay.
20	Q	Your minutes reflect that only, if you
21		exclude Mr. Taylor, only six households
22		showed up for that meeting, if you exclude
23		Mr. Taylor and, of course, exclude yourself
24		and Mr. Washford and the other commissioners

1		and, of course, the Judge-Executive, only six
2		households showed up there. That's what your
3		minutes reflect; would you agree with me
4		there?
5	A	Yes.
6	Q	Now there has been some dispute, Mr. Kincer,
7		about how long those people who would not
8		receive water on Aaron-Barnette Road would
9		have to wait if they don't get water this
10		time. But you have testified that you engage
11		in expansion project every four to five years
12		and it takes a few years after that to get it
13		developed; is that correct?
14	A	That would be proper, yes.
15	Q	So, it's fair to say that if they don't get
16		water now in 2000 that they are probably not
17		going tolooking at getting water again
18		until somewhere between 2005 and 2007; is
19		that a fair statement, Mr. Kincer?
20	A	Yes, it would be.
21	Q	Mr. Edelman, in cross-examining my client talked
22		about road captains. Now, there were road
23		captains for each of these different projects; is
24		that correct Mr. Kincer?

1	Α	Restate your question please?
2	Q	Okay. Were there road captains for each of
3		these different 14 projects
4	A	Road tappings?
5	Q	Captains, captains, that is the term that
6		your attorney used?
7	A	Okay.
8	Q	Road captains, were there road captains, he
9		used that term?
10	A	You will have to show me the question and I
11		need more
12		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
13		I don't think it is in your testimony,
14		but during the course of the cross-
15		examination of Mr. Barnette mention was
16		made of road captains for each of these
17		roads that the project was scheduled to
18		be conducted over. Do youare you
19		aware of thoseof these people, who
20		they were?
21	A	No, notI'm not familiar with.
22	Q	Mr. Kincer, did you have someone go along all
23		of Willow Creek Road to contact every
24		resident on Willow Creek Road in 1998 to find

1		out whether all of those residents on Willow
2		Creek Road wanted water?
3	A	People are contacted either by the staff of
4		the water district or by team captains that
5		are located on those roads that we plan to
6		serve.
7	Q	I just want to ask you what you know. Do you
8		know if the person who went along Willow
9		Creek Road was told to gowas told to
10		contact everyone who lived on Willow Creek
11		Road?
12	A	I do not know that to be a fact, no.
13	Q	Now, you have heard Mr. Barnette testify that
14		he was not contacted. You don't have any
15		reason, then, to dispute his testimony since
16		you don't know. He made thein fact, he may
17		indeed be telling the truth that he was not
18		contacted about whether he wanted water?
19	A	What are you asking me?
20	Q	My question is Mr. Barnette may indeed be
21		telling the truth that he was not contacted
22		by any official of South Anderson Water
23		District regarding his interest in water?
24	A	I'm not going to dispute whether he is

1		telling the truth or not. I didn't ask him
2		the question.
3		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
4		The fact is you don't know whether they
5		went up there and talked to everybody do
6		you?
7	Α	No, I do not, no.
8		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
9		So, if he says that he wasn'tthat he
0		was never contacted, you have no reason
.1		to question that?
.2	Α	No.
. 3	Q	Mr. Kincer, you don't deny that some of these
.4		water lines that are going to be constructed
.5		are going to serve non-Anderson Countians?
. 6	A	I'd say there is potential of our water district
.7		with an agreement with adjoining counties that if
.8		one of us go down our county road and the other
.9		side of the road is Mercer County, Washington
20		County, that it is proper for that district upon
21		an agreement with that county to push under the
22		road to serve a house that is in the other county
23		during either a project or after a project is
24		over, if those people request water.

1	Q	And that is indeed what is going to happen
2		here, Mr. Kincer, that some of these water
3		lines are going to serve non-Anderson County
4		residents. That's going to happen here;
5		isn't that correct Mr. Kincer?
6	Α	It has the potential and it is proper to do
7		that.
8	Q	Now, we are here today, Mr. Kincer, but back
9		in June Mr. Barnette did come to you and ask
10		you to modify your construction plan and
11		include his part of the road, did he not?
12	A	He did come to the water district and request
13		that we serve that road, yes.
14	Q	In fact, that was submitted on behalf of Mr.
15		Barnette in June of last year saying let's
16		modify this proposal to include my road, was
17		it not?
18	Α	I'mit probably would be.
19		MR. THOMAS:
20		Mr. Shapiro, I would like to introduce
21		this. I have marked it as Plaintiff's
22		Exhibit 2, but I don't know how you want
23		to designate it.

1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		Well, probably, unless this witness can
3		identify it, I don't know how you can
4		MR. THOMAS:
5		Well, he just said
6		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
7		He said probably, have you ever seen
8		this document?
9	Α	No, I haven't and I asked my attorney to look
10		at it.
11		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
12		Well, I'm asking you whether you have
13		ever seen it?
14	Α	The meeting that Mr. Barnette came to
15		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
16		Let's talk about this document.
17	Α	No, I do not; no, I cannot.
18		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
19		I don't see how this witness can
20		identify this for the record.
21	Q	A meeting did take place, though, in July to
22		discuss Mr. Barnette's proposal to modify
23		your construction plan to include all of
24		Willow Creek Road; correct? You were at that

15		a meetingwhat meeting?
16		MR. EDELMAN:

19	Q	Now, sometime after you initially formulated your
20		proposal, Mr. Kincer, you did modify your list of

24		hearing problem.

1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		You need to stay close to your
3		microphone because that's where the
4		court reporter picks up.
5	Q	Sometimes between June and now, though, Mr.
6		Kincer, you have indeed modified the list of
7		construction that you are going to perform,
8		you being South Anderson Water District, let
9		me be precise, that South Anderson Water
10		District is going to perform on Willow Creek
11		Road?
12	A	I'm not familiar that we modified in that
13		time. We did have a plan to serve water down
14		certain roads and as long as it is feasible I
15		don't know why we would have modified unless
16		it came, you know, through the engineer.
17		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:

19		initial plan was for 1.2 miles down the
20		Willow Creek Road and then it was later
21		changed to 1.8 miles down Willow Creek

11	Q	One other question, Mr. Kincer, well, a couple of
12		them, but one other topic. You know, we have not
13		talked about health issues at this hearing. But I
14		received some documentation regarding my discovery
15		and I'm not clear. In the CDBG grant, if you turn
16		to page 46, on page 46 of the CDBG grant.
17		MR. EDELMAN:
18		Yes, I don't think he prepared that, Mr.
19		Taylor prepared that document, to the
20		extent he knows, Mr. Thomas, you know.
21		MR. THOMAS:
22		Well, let me ask and if he doesn't know

_		REARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		Don't speculate on anything, just tell
3		us what you know and if you don't know-
4		if you don't know we can ask Mr. Taylor

6	Q	The CDBG grant has alphabetical listings for
7		the projects and Willow Creek Road has been
8		designated as I. Now, on page 11 I've been
9		told that indications that there is pneumonia
10		bacteria presentreally meant L, which was
11		Rice Road not I, which is Willow Creek Road.
12		But then you come on page 46 again it
L3		indicates I, including they mean I this time
L 4		because there is an L down there as well.
15		And that also indicates area shows evidence
L 6		of pneumonia bacteria in water supplies for
L7		Willow Creek Road. Is this an accurate
8		statement of your application, Mr. Kincer, or
L9		is this also incorrect? Should this I also
20		have been L?
21	A	I would refer that question to our engineer,
22		Mr. Taylor. So, I'm not familiar of why
23		those are that way, but I'm sure he could
24		probably address that in his questions

Q	Mr. Kincer, one final question. South Anderson
	Water District proposes to serve nine households
	over 1.2 miles in 1998. Since that time there
	have been 12 households, the fact there is going
	to be 12 households that are built or inhabited
	since that initial determination over the
	remaining 1.2 miles. Why did South Anderson Water
	District make a decision to only include half of
	those households and not the other half? If you
	are going to modify the proposal, why just include
	six of the 12 and not the remaining six?
A	The South Anderson would have to justify the
	number of tap-ons per mile or what for the
	dollars that we are going to borrow with the
	ability to pay back. They will not loan
	money on land that haswhether it is sold or
	people saying they will put water meters in
	if the houses are not there. And they was
	not there in 1998 when we put the project
	together. So, what happened after `98 is not
	a part of this project and we elected to not
	delay the people and even take a chance on
	losing the grant money that we had by holding
	evening the grant money ends we had by hording

1	basically, our review is what we did in 1998
2	to be included in the Phase 5 project.
3	Q I'm not trying to be disrespectful, Mr.
4	Kincer, but I don't think you answered my
5	question. Because, clearly, you have already
6	established that you did modify the proposal
7	some because you have gone from 1.2 to 1.8.
8	So, my question again, sir, again is since
9	you have indicatedsince you have already
10	indicated a willingness to modify the
11	proposal and pick up six of the households,
12	why didn't you pick up the other six?
13	A I'd say we did not modify.
14	MR. THOMAS:
15	I have no further questions, Your Honor.
16	MR. PINNY:
17	I have just a few questions probably to the shock
18	and consternation of most people here.
19	
20	CROSS EXAMINATION
21	BY MR. PINNY:
22	Q Good afternoon, Mr. Kincer, it is now afternoon so
23	I can say that correctly. I wanted to remind
24	everybody here that my role here is neutral, I

1		don't take sides, I'm just here to make sure that
2		the record is complete and sufficient as possible
3		so the Commission can make a full and wisely
4		advised decision. So, I just have one or two
5		questions to ask you.
6	A	Okay.
7	Q	The first is in regard to, I guess, the
8		timing of the notices that were published in
9		the paper and the applications that were
10		submitted for grants and loans. Which was
11		completed first, were the applications sent
12		in for the grants and loans before the
13		hearings were posted, the notice for hearings
14		posted andor whether the notices were
15		posted for the possible water extension?
16	A	The notices would have been by schedule.
17	Q	Okay.
18	Α	Which is what we follow.
19	Q	After you had submitted the grants, the
20		applications?
21	A	Uh-huh.
22	Q	Now, do those applications contain plans for
23		the expansion? I suppose they did, didn't
24		they?

24

Α

Yes.

1 Α If you are meaning--2 At least a projected plan for the Phase 5 O 3 expansion when you sent in the applications for the grants and loans? 5 Α I'm really sorry, I don't think I'm getting 6 all of your question. 7 Well, okay, when you apply--this may have Q 8 been in your testimony but I want to 9 elucidate it, because I'm not that bright. If--when you apply for a grant or for a loan 10 11 do you provide the people to whom you are 12 applying with a plan of your expansion or at 13 least a rough plan of what you will be doing, 14 the number of people to whom you will be hooking up and, roughly, where it will be? 15 16 Α That would be probably in the preliminary 17 engineering. 18 Q It would be, like, it would be preliminary 19 and not necessarily something set in stone? 20 Α Yes. 21 And that usually, typically would be included in Q that application and that application would be 22

filed prior to the notices printed in the paper?

1	MR. PINNY:
2	Okay. I have no further questions.
3	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
4	Any redirect?
5	MR. EDELMAN:
6	I've got a few questions. I know its lunch time.
7	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
8	That's okay, let's get through this witness and
9	then we will take a lunch break.
10	
11	REDIRECT EXAMINATION
12	BY MR. EDELMAN:
13	Q Mr. Kincer, lot has been made out of this notice
14	that was put in the paper. But if you know, and
15	you may not and if you don't just say you don't
16	and we will ask Mr. Taylor, because he will,
17	because he put a lot of this together. But other
18	roads that were in this notice that Mr. Thomas
19	talked to such as Tanner, Ashby, Glensboro, Searcy
20	School Road, Hungry Run Road, Dugansville Road,
21	Lick Skillet Road, Cox and Gilberts Creek, were
22	they not also only partially included in this
23	project?
24	A Yes, those roads were in the eight to ten

11		
1		that I said was also like Willow Creek.
2	Q	So, if one was trying to give the impression
3		to this Commission that Willow Creek is the
4		only road on that notice that was only
5		partiallywas only going to be partially
6		included in this project, would that be
7		correct or incorrect
8	A	Restate it please, I don't want to answer
9	Q	If one was trying to give this Commission the
10		impression that that notice where Willow
11		Creek is mentioned and also these other roads
12		are mentioned that are partiallygoing to
13		have partial completion of water lines, would
14		it be unfair towould it be an unfair
15		statement to say that in that notice that
16		Willow Creek is going to be the only road
17		that is going to have partial construction
18		done on it?
19	A	That would be unfair, yes.
20	Q	And why is that?
21	A	Well, because in realistic those other roads
22		were cut off partly because of the lack of
23		funds, as well as Willow Creek was.
24	Q	And what considerations were taken into

	1	account by the District when those roads were
	2	judged?
	3 A	Houses, number of houses per mile or number
	4	of houses in the length of the line whatever
	5	it would take.
	6 Q	Has this District tried to treat Mr. Barnette
	7	any differently than any of the other
	8	individuals that are not included in this
	9	project that actually filed petitions with
1	0	the District to be included?
1:	1 A	No, no, we have not.
12	2	MR. EDELMAN:
13	3	That's all I have.
14	4 HE	ARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15	5	Mr. Thomas, any recross?
16	5 MR.	THOMAS:
17	7	I have one question, Your Honor.
18	HEA	ARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
19)	Okay. Hold it strictly to what was raised the
20)	first time.
21	MR.	THOMAS:
22		All right, that's consistent with the rules of
23		evidence.
24	:	

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1	RECROSS EXAMINATION
2	BY MR. THOMAS:
3	Q Mr. Edelman talked about feasibility and I just
4	want to be clear again when you talk about
5	feasibility. You didn't treat Mr. Barnette any
6	differently, you just looked at three things, you
7	looked at number of households per mile, cost of
8	the construction per mile, and the low income
9	number of low income households?
10	A I think I've already answered that.
11	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
12	Yes, how is this any different than what
13	he has testified to before? Is that it?
14	MR. THOMAS:
15	That's it.
16	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
17	Thank you Mr. Kincer. We will be in recess until
18	1:30.
19	(OFF THE RECORD)
20	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
21	Back on the record. Mr. Edelman, you want to call
22	your next witness?
23	MR. EDELMAN:
24	Thank you, I call Mr. Ken Taylor.

+	HEA	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		Mr. Taylor?
3	MR.	EDELMAN:
4		T-a-y-l-o-r, engineer for the District.
5		(WITNESS DULY SWORN)
6		
7		The witness, KEN TAYLOR, having first been duly
8	swo	cn, testified as follows:
9		DIRECT EXAMINATION
10	BY N	MR. EDELMAN:
11	Q	State your name for the record please?
12	Α	Ken Taylor.
13	Q	And where are you employed Mr. Taylor?
14	A	Engineering firm of Kenvirons, Inc.
15	Q	You have previously given verified testimony
16		in the form of a deposition on February 3,
17		2000; is that correct?
18	A	Yes, it is.
19	Q	Do you adoptyou have had an opportunity to
20		view that?
21	Α	Yes, I have.
22	Q	Do you adopt that testimony as your testimony
23		on direct today?
24	A	I do.

1	MR. EDELMAN:
2	I've provided the reporter with a copy.
3	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
4	You wish to offer that into evidence?
5	MR. EDELMAN:
6	I guess that is offered into evidence as
7	Defendant'sare we on three or four?
8	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
9	Four, Defendant's 4.
10	COURT REPORTER:
11	What was three?
12	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
13	Three was the testimony of Mr. Kincer.
14	Wait a minute, maybe I'm wrong. The
15	Notice was Defendant's Exhibit 1, Mr.
16	Kincer was two, I'm sorry, you are
17	right, this is three.
18	(EXHIBIT SO MARKED: Defendant Exhibit No. 3)
19	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20	Is he tendered for cross-examination?
21	MR. EDELMAN:
22	Yes, sir.
23	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2.4	Mr. Thomas?

1	MR.	THOMAS:
2		Thank you Mr. Shapiro.
3		
4		CROSS EXAMINATION
5	BY I	MR. THOMAS:
6	Q	Mr. Taylor, my first question to you is simply is
7		Fox Creek Road in or out of the project?
8	A	It is in the project, it is being funded
9		solely with Rural Development money with no
10		CDBG money.
11	Q	So, Fox Creek Road then is being funded with
12		loan money?
13	A	Correct.
14	Q	Okay. And as you testified in direct
15		examination, the reason it is in the project
16		is because it fit nicely with the project?
17		Those are your words?
18	A	Yes, I assume that is probably what I said.
19	Q	Now, just to clear up some confusion from Mr.
20		Kincer's testimony, the initial application
21		that was submitted on behalf of South
22		Anderson Water District only had Willow Creek
23		going 1.2 miles; is that correct?
24	A	In the description and in the original cost

1		estimates that were done it was 1.2 miles,
2		correct.
3	Q	That's just
4		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
5		Could I get you to hold that microphone
6		if you are going to walk around?
7		MR. THOMAS:
8		Yes, sir.
9		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
10		The reason is that the court reporter
11		picks up different tracks for different
12		microphones andyou can walk around,
13		you just need to hold the microphone.
14	Q	The initial application had 1.2 miles?
15	Α	That was in the description, yes.
16	Q	And that was in the application for the CDBG
17		money, correct?
18	A	Both the CDBG and the Rural Development.
19	Q	And then sometimes between June of `99 and
20		today, that length has changed now to 1.8
21		miles; is that correct?
22	Α	Correct.
23	Q	Okay.
24	Α	Reasonwould you like me to explain why?

1	Q	Mr. Shapiro will tell you that once you answer my
2		question you certainly have a right to explain.
3	A	Okay. In going through, when we started the
4		process where you were requesting changes and
5		so forth, and having to respond to those
6		questions and so forth, in looking at who was
7		interviewed for the CDBG eligibility, it
8		included those people that lived in that
9		other 6/10 of a mile. And those were
10		prepared by the grant writer who is Brian
11		Kirby. That was not anything that I was
12		involved in, but in order to determine the
13		eligibility of that road they had interviewed
14		everybody down through Mr. Wells, who is the
15		last house on that 6/10 of a mile.
16	Q	That's 1402 Willow Creek Road?
17	Α	Could be, I don't know, he is the last one on
18		the right there before you come back over the
19		creek and start the 1.3 miles. So, since
20		they were used in the eligibility, they had
21		to be included in the project.
22	Q	And that modification, if you will, Mr.
23		Taylor, has not upset or deterred the South
24		Anderson Water District from going forward

- with this project, has it?
- 2 A Ate into the contingency money.
- 3 Q By \$28,000?
- 4 A There about, probably, that's the estimate,
- yes. Based--well, that's the estimate based
- on the numbers that were used in the total
- 7 project.
- 8 Q And you will agree with me that that would
- 9 still leave \$140,000 of contingency money
- 10 still available?
- 11 A No.
- 12 Q Why do you disagree with that?
- 13 A The budget numbers that you were looking at
- earlier, that you were displaying, were based
- on the full million dollar CDBG funding
- application which did not get funded to that
- level. So, those monies that are in between
- would have had to come out of the contingency
- money.
- 20 Q Is there a contingency budget in the project
- 21 now Mr. Taylor?
- 22 A There is still some contingency fund, yes.
- 23 Q How much contingency funds are there?
- 24 A Again, we have not redone the budget since

	1		the preliminary budget. Once we take bids
	2		well, actually, I guess even before we do
	3		bids we will have to update the entire
	4		estimate on the entire project and present
	5		that to Rural Development when we ask for
	6		authorization to bid the project.
	7	Q	Okay.
	8	A	But at this point that has not been done.
	9	Q	Okay. But your contingency budget did state
	10		\$167,800?
l	11	Α	Yes, when it started, I think. I will agree
	12		with you without going back and looking at
	13		the exact numbers.
	14	Q	Now, you would agree with Mr. Kincer's
	15		testimony on one respect, that is the
	16		feasibility criteria consists of three
	17		things: One, the density, the number of
	18		households per mile; two, the cost of doing
:	19		the project; and, three, the eligibilityI
	20		mean, a sufficient number of low income
	21		households to maketo become CDBG eligible.
2	22	٠	Those are the only three criteria that you
2	23		were concerned with?
2	24	A	No, not that I would be concerned with. I

	1	would also look at how it fits with what the
	2	project is doing. You know, if you start
	3	and this one is scattered out pretty well
	4	already, but therehow it fits in with the
	5	rest of the district's facilities and that
	6	kind of thing. And often that will get back
╢.	7	into a cost consideration also.
	8 Q	So, then, you are really changing your answer
	9	then, aren't you, Mr. Taylor, from what you
10	O	told Mr. Edelman and Ray, if you want to
1:	1	follow me I'm on page 49, questions 170
12	2	through 172. If you look at your testimony
13	3	there you say, "The selection of the roads in
14	l	the project that we discussed earlier were a
15	5	combination of CDBG qualification per
16)	household income and for household numbers
17	7	along each roadway?" Question. Your answer,
18	}	"And construction costs, yes." Mr. Edelman:
19	•	"And construction costs along the roadway?
20)	Uh-huh, affirmative. Were they the sole
21		considerations? Those three, yes.
22	A	And again
23	Q	Wait a minute, let me finish first. So, are
24		you changing your answer now saying there are

	1		other considerations Mr. Taylor?
	2	A	As I ended up the other part of it, that it
	3		figures out in the cost considerations too,
	4		but I mean it is not just a straight cost
	5		number necessarily.
	6	Q	Well, that's what Mr. Shapiro and I want to
	7		know today, what other considerations are
	8		there besides density, besides cost and
	9		besides low income numbers, what other
	10		considerations are there?
	11	A	Well, again, how it fits with the rest of the
	12		District's facilities and, again, that will
	13		get into theit is not just the cost of that
	14		road but that may cause other cost in the
]	15		rest of the facilities. If you can't serve
	16		along that road because you don't have enough
-	17		pressure to serve along that road, then you
-	L8		have to look at the other parts of the
1	L9		system, too.
2	20	Q	When you say pressure, are you speaking from
2	21		an engineering standpoint?
2	22	A	Yes, uh-huh.
2	23	Q	Okay. Well, let me ask you this, do you have
2	24		any reason to believe that you wouldn't have

Q

1 adequate pressure to complete the remaining 1.3 miles of Willow Creek Road? 3 Α No, now there is adequate pressure on Willow Creek Road. 4 5 So, that would not be a consideration then? 6 Α Correct. 7 Okay. Any other considerations other than 8 the three we have already mentioned, I'm not 9 going to repeat those, and hydraulic pressure 10 considerations? 11 Α No, that's--well, obviously, if the District 12 what other facilities they have in that area, 13 but then again that is cost--a cost figure. 14 Q So, that would be a cost figure? 15 A Yes. No other considerations other than those 16 17 four? 18 Not from my standpoint. Α 19 0 Mr. Taylor, have you ever traveled all of 20 these roadways, have you taken the time to go 21 through all of these roadways, every one of 22 them? 23 Α Yes.

So, you have been down Lick Skillet Road?

- 1 A Yes.
- 2 Q Okay. Would you not agree with me that when
- you travel down Lick Skillet Road today that
- 4 you have got to travel about 1.5 miles before
- 5 you get to the first household?
- 6 A From the Fairview side?
- 7 Q Well, from coming in--I guess you come in off
- 8 of 62, you come in off 62--
- 9 A We are not coming into it from that
- direction, we are coming in to it from
- 11 Fairview.
- 12 Q Okay. You are coming in from Fairview and
- 13 going up?
- 14 A Yes, we are not going all the way across that
- 15 road.
- 16 Q But you are connected to 62, are you not?
- 17 A No. No, it doesn't go all the way across, it
- only goes what, 1.3 miles or so.
- 19 Q And so, you are spending monies on 1.3 miles
- 20 of Lick Skillet Road?
- 21 A I think that is the number, yes.
- 22 Q Now, how many households are you getting on
- Lick Skillet Road? Would eight be correct?
- 24 A Is that--I--

1	Q	You prepared this map, Mr. Taylor,
2	A	I know.
3	Q	you'd be most familiar with it?
4	A	Yes, but that's not going to help because it
5		has the wholethere is 74 in that area of
6		those interconnected roads, there are 74
7		potentially, or users that we are
8		anticipating in that area.
9	Q	My question is, if you know the answer, then
10		answer; if you don't, don't. On Lick Skillet
11		Road, the 1.3 miles you say on Lick Skillet Road,
12		how many households are there on that road?
13	A	In the portion that we are serving my
14		recollection is eight to nine, somewhere in
15		that
16	Q	And would you agree with me that of those
17		eight to nine that eight of them are
18		Washington County households?
19	Α	Of the original ones when the project was put
20		together there was one house in Anderson
21		County and I think the rest of them are in
22		Washington. And since that time there has
23		been another one built in Anderson County.
24	Q	So, of the cost of this project you are going

1 to spend monies for 1.3 miles of roadway but 2 you are only going to serve two Anderson County residents? Correct. 4 5 And you also indicated in the rest of the project 6 that there are three other Washington County 7 facilities that may be served, two residences and 8 one church in that Fairview area? 9 Α In that Fairview area there are, yes. 10 Now, I have another question about Rice Road. 11 You are going to go down Rice Road as well, 12 correct, as part of the project? 13 Correct. 14 Okay. And there are not many households you 15 are going to pick up on Rice Road, are there? There is about six as I recall, five or six. 16 Α 17 In interrogatories provided to me by Mr. 18 Edelman as part of this record, Mr. Shapiro, 19 you say six. 20 I don't remember exactly how many is 21 on each road, but that sounds correct, in 22 that area. 23 Q Now, let me ask you about Cox Road because 24 I'm not clear about that either, Mr. Shapiro.

- 1 A Okay.
- 2 Q You said you are going to pick up nine
- 3 households on Cox Road and you verify in your
- 4 answers to my interrogatories that there are
- nine households. Now, is that--are the six
- in Mercer County included in that nine?
- 7 A Yes.
- 8 Q Okay. So, only three Anderson County
- 9 households in the Cox Road project?
- 10 A Correct, there are three between the end of
- the line where we are at now and the county
- line we intend to go to.
- 13 Q Now, I show you these answers of defendant,
- 14 South Anderson Water District, the
- complainant's first set of interrogatories
- and request for production of documents.
- This was provided to me by Mr. Edelman. Did
- you assist Mr. Edelman in answering these?
- 19 A Yes, I did, yes.
- 20 Q Okay. So, you have seen this document?
- 21 A Yes.
- 22 Q Okay, and I'm particularly going to
- interrogatory number ten where I ask about
- each project information regarding the length

	1		of water lines to be built along each
	2		roadway, the number of customers to be
	3		served, the per capita income of residents
	4		along each roadway, the total cost of
	5		construction. And you provided these
	6		figures
	7	A	Yes.
	8	Q	to Mr. Edelman, is that correct, for each
	9		of the 14 projects, is that correct?
	10	A	Yes.
	11	Q	Now, I took those figures, your figures Mr.
	12		Taylor, your figures, and using your figures,
	13		Mr. Taylor, I prepared a chart of density and
	14		cost per customer, those being two key
	15		considerations that you said that you used to
	16		determine the feasibility of the project.
	17		And what I noted, Mr. Taylor, upon doing that
	18		that if you looked at Willow Creek in its
	19		entirety, and Mr. Edelman has a copy of this
	20		as does theMr. Shapiro. Willow Creek still
	21		has a better density, Mr. Taylor, using your
	22		numbers, than four of the other projects you
	23		propose to do. It has a better density, the
	24		entire Willow Creek Road than US Highway 127
- 11			

1		bypass and Anderson County Drydock State Road
2		44 project, than Rice Road and Fox Creek
3		Road. Using all of Willow Creek, the
4		feasibility criteria that both you and Mr.
5		Kincer say that's what we look at more than
6		anything else
7		MR. EDELMAN:
8		Is there a question here or are we just
9		going to just
10		MR. THOMAS:
11		There is a question.
12		MR. EDELMAN:
13		All right.
14	Q	Would you not agree that based upon your
15		numbers the entire Willow Creek Road has a
16		better density than those four projects?
17	A	With the numbers you used, yes. With the
18		numbers that were used in `98, I'd have to go
19		back and calculate again, because you have
20		used a number for people that are out there
21		now that weren't there in `98 when we put the
22		project together.
23	Q	And in terms of cost per customer that you
24		looked at Willow Creek Road in the entirety,

1		using your numbers that you provided today,
2		that it would be cheaper, be cheaper, for
3		South Anderson Water District to construct
4		water lines along the entire Willow Creek
5		road than three other roads that is proposed
6		to use?
7	Α	Again, based on the numbers that you have
8		shown with the 21, which I assumeand,
9		again, I don't know whoI don't know how you
10		derived the 21 number.
11	Q	Well, I used your numbers, to answer your
12		question, I just used your numbers. You
13		indicated that there were 15 households that
14		you were going to use
15	A	Well, again, not on Willow Creek you didn't
16		because the 21 number is not a number I
17		generated.
18	Q	Okay, but
19	A	I don't dispute the rest of them.
20	Q	But let's look at that. If you look on those
21		answers to interrogatories, if you do a
22		complete loop of Willow Creek,
23	A	Okay.
24	Q	you've got 21 meter settings, okay. That's

1		what you used, 21 meter settings. If you
2		look at
3	A	Oh, okay.
4	Q	If you look at what you are going to do on
5		each project, you have got 15.
6	A	That was based on when I went back out and
7		looked at it again right beforethis is
8		where the 21 came from, not the number that
9		was in `98.
10	Q	Okay, that's the number I used. That's where
11		the 21 came from.
12	A	Okay, I'll go along with that, yes,
13	Q	Those are real numbers.
L4	Α	Like I say, I went out and recounin January
L5		recounted the houses that are there now.
16	Q	So, my question, my second question to you or next
L7		question to you is this. Using your numbers that
8.		you provided to me today, would you not agree that
.9		if you did Willow Creek in its entirety that it
20		would be a better project thanfrom a cost per
21		customer standpoint than Burgin Road, Rice Road,
22		Fox Creek Road?
3	A	Assuming your chart is put together
4		correctly, yes, I'd sayand I agreeI

1		assume you got my numbers correctly off of
2		there, in which case I agree with you.
3	Q	I'll be glad to give you as much time
4	A	I understand.
5	Q	as you want make sure that your numbers on
6		this chart match my numbers here.
7	A	I don't dispute that they do. But, I mean,
8		I've still got to qualify what I say because
9		I didn't put those together.
10	Q	But you put the numbers together, you admit
L1		that.
L2	A	These numbers are my numbers, yes.
13	Q	And you won't dispute that these numbers here
4		are the numbers that I show here?
15	A	I don't dispute that, no.
.6	Q	That's all I'm asking.
.7		MR. THOMAS:
. 8		Your Honor, I'd like to introduce this
.9		as Applicant's Exhibit 6 under my
0.		testimony. This will be Claimant's
1		Exhibit Number 13.
2		MR. EDELMAN:
3		I'm going to object to the introduction
4		of this. I think he had an opportunity

\parallel	1	to supply the exhibits prior to the
	2	hearing date. He hasn't done that, this
	3	is the first time we've ever seen this.
	4	It is my understanding that those should
	5	have been exchanged before hand. I
	6	asked him for this information in
	7	interrogatories and never got it.
	8	MR. THOMAS:
	9	Your Honor, may I respond Mr. Shapiro?
1	0	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
1	1	Yes, wait just a second, go ahead.
1	2	MR. EDELMAN:
1	3	That's it.
1.	4	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
1!	5	Go ahead.
10	6 1	MR. THOMAS:
1	7	Your Honor, these numbers strictly came
18	8	from his, as Mr. Taylor has already
19	9	indicated, from his information. I
20	0	didn't have this information, I just
11		
21	1	basically have taken his information, he
21		basically have taken his information, he had this information. So, I haven't
	2	

1	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2	Well, I'm going to sustain the
3	objection, but I think in all fairness
4	that if it is based on testimony and
5	evidence in the record that it can be
6	reproduced for purposes of argument.
7	MR. EDELMAN:
8	And I'm notone of the problems with
9	this is that Mr. Taylor has not had a
10	chance to go over the calculations and
11	determine if they are correct. That is
12	one of the problems.
13	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
14	I'm going to sustain the objection, but
15	I think that you can useif it is
16	MR. EDELMAN:
17	I don't have any problem arguing the
18	figures.
L9	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20	if it is derived from evidence that is
21	in the record then, obviously, you can
22	use that in making your argument when
23	you prepare your brief. You see the
24	distinction I'm making?

Т		MR. THOMAS:
2		I understand Mr. Shapiro.
3	Q	Mr. Taylor, under your numbers again, you
4		still intendit is still the intent of South
5		Anderson Water District to do projects such
6		as Rice Road and Fox Creek Road even though
7		those have considerably lower densities than
8		doing all of Willow Creek Road and at a
9		higher cost?
10	A	Those were in the approved project and that
11		is what we are supposed to do per the
12		funding.
13	Q	So, theso it is your testimony that South
l 4		Anderson Water District is willing, for
15		instance, Fox Creek Road, to borrow \$77,400
L 6		for a distance of 4.4 miles and at a cost of
۱7		\$9,675 as opposed to spending an additional
18		\$51,000 to finish Willow Creek? That's what
.9		you intend to do?
20	A	Again, that was in what was in the approved
21		funding. I've not compared them back to what
2		youthe rest of Willow Creek because that
:3		wasn't in the funding package. But, yes,
4		that's what we intend to do.

1	Q	Your testimony, Mr. Taylor, is that that is
2		feasible from a distant standpoint to do Fox
3		Creek and Rice Road?
4	Α	Again, taking in the wholethe eligibility
5	Q	That's not my question Mr. Taylor, yes, or
6		no?
7		MR. EDELMAN:
8		Can he answer the question?
9		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
10		Wait a minute. What was the question?
11		Repeat your question.
12	Q	Thank you Mr. Shapiro. Your testimony today is
13		that it is feasible from a distance standpoint to
14		do Rice Road and Fox Creek Road?
15	Α	In with this project, yes.
16	Q	And your testimony is today that it is
L7		feasible from a cost per customer standpoint
L8		to do Rice Road and Fox Creek Road?
L9	A	In with this project.
20	Q	And your testimony is today that it is
21		feasible for the South Anderson Water
22		District to borrow money to do Fox Creek Road
23		and Rice Road?
4	Α	In with this project, yes.

11		
1	Q	And your testimony is today that it is not
2		feasible under the criteria of density per
3		customer, density per mile, excuse me, cost per
4		customer and low income households not to finish
5		Willow Creek Road? That's your testimony?
6	A	It is not feasible to do it on its own and it
7		wasn't included in the original scope of the
8		project.
9	Q	Why isn't it feasible, Mr. Taylor, why isn't
10		it feasible?
11	Α	The funding would have to come from some
12		other entity, they would have to go out and
13		borrow the money from a bank or someone. I
14		mean, we have already tied up the funding
15		from Rural Development and we can't amend the
16		CDBG application to get more grant money.
17	Q	Mr. Taylor, why wouldn't it make more sense
18		if thoseif the only three considerations
19		that you and Mr. Kincer have indicated are
20		density per mile, cost per customer and low
21		income households, why wouldn't it be a
22		better use of the South Anderson Water
23		District dollars to do the Willow Creek Road
24		entirely than Burgin Road, US Highway 127,

1		Anderson County, Rice Road and Fox Creek
2		Road, since the Willow Creek Road in its
3		entirety has better numbers? If those are
4		the only three criteria why
5	A	Had it been put in the original project it
6		would have. You know, with the 21 numbers
7		that is there now versus what was there at
8		the time we put the project together.
9	Q	To move on, Mr. Taylor, there is no dispute
10		that since the initial project you have
11		already modified Willow Creek Road some and
12		gone from 1.2 miles to 1.8 miles.
13	Α	In order to pick up the rest of the
14		residences that were used in the CDBG
15		eligibility. So, those households were
16		actually in the original project in `98
17		because they were counted in the eligibility
18		which was put together, again, by the grant
19		writer and not me.
20	Q	I want to follow up on that point just a
21		minute, Mr. Taylor. Mr. Taylor, there has
22		been some reference made by the attorney for
23		South Anderson Water District about road
24		captains. Are you familiar with that term?

Τ	Α	Yes.

- 2 Q Each of these projects had a road captain; is
- 3 that correct?
- 4 A I'm not sure whether they did or not, I
- 5 wasn't involved in that portion of it.
- 6 Q So, you don't know whether Willow Creek Road
- 7 had a road captain or not?
- 8 A That one, I understand there was a lady that
- 9 was in charge of getting the--the lady that
- 10 turned in the original petition was in charge
- of getting the interviews for CDBG and so
- 12 forth.
- 13 Q Do you know if that, and I'll just use the
- 14 term road captain, do you know if that road
- 15 captain for Willow Creek went up and talked
- 16 to Mr. Barnett?
- 17 A I again was not involved in that portion of
- 18 it, but I don't dispute his word at all that
- 19 she didn't.
- 20 Q Mr. Taylor, you said you have been on Willow
- 21 Creek Road; is that correct?
- 22 A Correct.
- 23 Q And, Mr. Taylor, you would agree that from where
- you are going to stop there is that 1.3 mile

	1		incomplete portion that is not going to be served
	2		presently?
	3	A	Correct.
	4	Q	Would you agree with me, Mr. Taylor, that it
	5		wouldn't take a whole lot of time for someone
	6		to go and visit those households and see
	7		whether they would be interested in water or
	8		not. We are not talking an inordinate use of
	9		time are we?
	10	Α	Depends on how busy the person was but, no,
	11		it wouldn't take that long.
	12	Q	I mean, reasonablyit wouldn't take long to
	13		go over to those six households and ask them
	14		do they want water or not would it, Mr.
:	15		Taylor, would it?
:	16	A	No.
-	17	Q	Mr. Taylor, I want to talk about the health
:	18		concerns for a minute because we really
-	L9		haven't touched on that at all during this
2	20		hearing. And I mentioned that in my
2	21		complaint as one of the key issues here for
2	22 .		Mr. Shapiro and the Commission Staff to
2	23		consider. In the answers to interrogatories
2	24		which you have you sent me some information

1		that says that the CDBG application was
2		incorrect and, in fact, that what looked like
3		an I was an L, and indicated that pneumonia
4		bacteria really meant was for Rice Road.
5	A	That letter is in the response. What we did
6	,	was pass your information on the grant
7		writer, Brian Kirby, and that was his
8		response. Again, I didn't put that
9		application together so I can't answer for
10	Q	So, you couldn't answer whetherwould you
11		turn to page 46 of the application, it again
12		shows for I, area shows evidence of pneumonia
13		bacteria in water supply, I being the Willow
14		Creek Road project. You couldn't answer that
15		question; is that correct?
16	Α	Correct. Again Mr. Kirby is the one that put
17		the CDBG application together for the county
18		and not myself.
19	Q	Mr. Taylor, are you aware, going back to Rice
20		Road again, are you aware that the first two
21		houses on Rice road already have water,
22		access to water from South Anderson Water
23		District?
24	Α	I'm assuming you are talking about off the 62

1		side?
2	Q	That's correct.
3	A	If you will look at the map we are not duplicating
4		that service, that is a two inch line that comes
5		off 62 and we are coming off the four inch line on
6		the other side of Salt River.
7	Q	Just a few more questions, Mr. Taylor. Mr.
8		Taylor, you certainly would agree that by
9		stopping at the 1.8 miles on Willow Creek
10		Road that there is going to be some water run
11		off there? You are going to have to, I
12		think, the term you used was install a blow
13		off valve.
14	Α	Any dead end line has to have a blow off on
15		the end of it to flush it.
16	Q	And what is thatfrom an engineering
17		standpoint, what does that blow off valve do?
18	A	It's just an outlet on the end of the line so
19		that you can open it up and increase the
20		velocities in the line and scour out the line
21		periodically to keep sediments and so forth
22		from building up in it. Or if there is a
23		leak on the line then you need toin
24		repairing it if you need to blow it off at

1		the end to get the bad water out of it.
2	Q	Okay. Now, if you did a complete loop, and I
3		was just looking at the information you
4		provided me, provided for me, if you do a
5		complete loop on Willow Creek Road, would you
6		still need a blow off valve?
7	Α	I probably still would put one down there. I
8		may not put it in that estimate but in a low
9		spot like that where you went back up the
10		hill you would still need one there for leaks
11		and that kind of thing.
12	Q	And, Mr. Taylor, you have indicated that it
13		will cost an additional \$51,725 to complete
14		the loop on Willow Creek?
15		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
16		What did you say it was?
17		MR. THOMAS:
18		\$51,725.03.
19	Α	I assume that is the difference in the two
20		numbers from the estimate with what we are
21		proposing to do versus the estimate for the
22		entire loop, it would appear to be about
23		right, but without setting here calculating
24		it out without a calculator

	1	Q	And if you look at \$167,800 contingency,
	2		there certainly would be moreeven if you
	3		want to add in Rice Road and Fox Creek Road
	4		and Burgin Road, even to do the projects that
	5		you have already stated, there certainly
	6		would be enough money in the contingency to
	7		complete the loop?
	8	A	At this point we don't know. Again, we
	9		didn't get total funding and that estimate
	LO		was prepared in `98 or whatever. Since then
	1		we have experienced some cost increases and
1	.2		so forth and that's what that money is there
1	. 3	٠	to cover. So, again, without redoing the
1	.4		whole budget, I don't know how much
1	. 5		contingency money we have.
1	.6	Q	You could have more since you haven't done
1	.7		the budget, you could have more, correct?
1	.8	A	Could have, I don't anticipate that.
1	.9	Q	You don't know, it could be more or less?
2	0.0	A	Yes.
2	1	Q	But right now the best we can work on is
2	2		\$167,800?
2	3	A	Less what the difference in the funding was.
2	4		We know that that money is not there because

	1		we never got anywe never got funded to the
	2		full million CDBG.
	3	Q	As I understand your testimony, Mr. Taylor, I want
	4		to be clear, there is not going toyou are not
	5		going to make a loop around Lick Skillet Road, you
	6		are not going to attach
	7	A	We are not going all the way through to 62,
	8		correct. In the future we probably will, that
	9		makes a good loop through the southern end of the
	10		system, but at this point, no.
	11	Q	And the future of this project would be about five
	12		to seven years of your next phase, it is going to
	13		be about five to seven years out, right?
	14	A	That has historically been what it has been
	15		over there. My understanding is, though,
	16		that Alton Water and Sewer District at this
	17		point is finishing up what theirthe service
	18		in their district. And if that is the case,
	19		then we wouldn't have to wait until next time
:	20		for eligibility for CDBG, which might speed
	21		the process up again, you know, it might or
:	22		might not.
:	23		MR. THOMAS:
:	24		I have no further questions for Mr.

HEAR	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
	ING OFFICER SHAPIRU:
	Before I turn you over to Mr. Pinny, let me just
	ask you a couple of questions.
Α	Okay.
HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
	Well, maybe a few more than a couple, but there
	has been some mention here about the health
	report, I guess it was, what significance would
	that have in a project of this nature where the
	residents apparently rely upon cisterns for their
	water supply, cisterns and bottled water for their
	in case of cisterns they are actually relying
	upon water, according to the testimony I read,
	that is hauled in there from, I assume, a water
	station. Why would that be a significant factor
	in this kind of a project?
A	In order to qualify on the CDBG and you have
	to not only show a low to moderate income,
	you have to show the need. And abatement of
	health hazards and, also, on Rural
	Development, that is part of their scoring
	process too, for funding. You have toit is
	not just a matter of wanting the water, there
	HEAR

	1		has to be a need for it.
	2	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
	3		I know, but where would there be a problem? I
	4		mean, the water, I assume, that they are buying,
	5		they are buying it from a water station it is
	6		treated water. It may be
	7	A	But most people who use cisterns augment that
	8		by rainwater and their cisterns may or may
	9		not be water tight. There may be actually
	10		seepage into them, in a lot of cases there
	1.1		is, in or out, depending on how
-	12	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
	13		So, that would be where the factor would come into
-	14		play?
	15	A	Yes, uh-huh. And, again, I'm not sure where
	16		that onethat particular one came from, but
	L7		if you go out and take samples from cisterns
	18		in often cases they are contaminated because
1	L9		they
2	20	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2	21		To rely upon water.
2	22	A	roof water and so forth that gets into
2	23		them, too.
2	24		

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1	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		As I understand what your testimony here today,
3		what you are telling the Commission is the reason
4		that thisthere are several reasons why this
5		project didn't include the entire road, but one of
6		the reasons is that when you put the project
7		together in 1998 the section of the road that Mr.
8		Barnett lives on only had three residential
9		structures on it and one of those was vacant; is
10		that right?
11	A	Correct.
12	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
13		So, therefore, the densitythere was not a great
14		deal of density in that particular area. When you
15		added the $6/10$ of a mile, how many houses did that
16		add to the road?
17	A	Four, I think, maybe five.
18	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
19		Five. So, if you added the 6/10
20	A	Well, again, part of what we had there was
21		already being used in the house count that
22		Mr. Wells and what the road captain was
23		coming in and telling him, user-wise, and so
24		forth, he was already included in that. They

1		had already done the interviews for the low
2		to moderate income and actually had
3		interviewed some of the other ones, too.
4	HEAF	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
5		But the reason you went back and looked at it, one
6		of the reasons you went back and looked at the
7		6/10 of a mile was you needed to get more
8		apparently, you needed to getfor them to include
9		these people because of their low income?
10	A	Well, at that pointuntil we went back and
11		looked at it I didn't have a list of the
12		houses that they had interviewed. I didn't
13		get that until January.
14	HEAF	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15		So because it was included in the interviews to
16		qualify for the CDBG that is the reason you went
17		on.
18	Α	Yes.
19	HEAF	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		I understand that.
21	A	The CDBG interviews were portions of that
22		application or the tabulation thereof, not
23		the interviews themselves because they are
2.4		confidential but the tabulation of those

1		interviews are part of the CDBG funding
2	?	application that was advertised in `98.
3	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
4	:	If, in fact, though, the 21I think there are 21
5		houses now along this entire stretch; is that
6		right?
7	Α	Correct.
8	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
9		Whereas, before there were fewer houses?
10	A	Correct.
11	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
12		They added, like, 10 or 11 houses?
13	A	I don't think it was that many, well what we
14		show in the part that we are talking about
15	i	funding right now is 15 and, so, there has
16		beenand, again, now these are notI guess
17	,	maybe that is something I need to back up and
18	}	explain, too. In doing this you don't use
19	1	total house numbers, very rarely will you get
20)	100% participation in a project. There is
21		going to be somebody out there that doesn't
22	}	want the water, you know, that has got a good
23		well or doesn't want another bill for
24		whatever, you know, some people don't like

the taste of city water. So, generally what 1 we use is about 75% to 80% of the house count or the petition count. 3 HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO: 4 Well, how many houses are there along the Willow 5 6 Creek Road expansion area? Well, what I used based on the petitions and 7 Α the interview, CDBG interview, list was 15 on 8 what we are--on the 1.8 we are going to run. 9 HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO: 10 11 All right. And then 15 homes there but you say that--12 No, there is more than 15, there is probably 13 Α --again, I don't know whether all of them 14 signed the petition or not. 15 HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO: 16 17 So, there are 15 homes--That I use from an economic feasibility and a 18 Α construction cost estimating standpoint. 19 20 HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO: 21 That's the number of homes you expect to sign up. 22 Α Right. **HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:** 23 24 Since that time there have been apparently six

1		more homes added?
2	A	Well, again, the 21 number includes the two
3		houses that were occupied, the one that is up
4		there between Mr. Barnett and 62. I don't
5		think anybody is going to move back into that
6		one, so we didn't include it, but that 21
7		number also includes those two that were
8		there back in `98.
9	HEAF	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
10		If you hadif those people had requested service
11		and you were applying the feasibility standards
12		that you have testified about, the three standards
13		that Mr. Thomas has talked about, would that
14		entire road have qualified for the project?
15	A	Probably. You know, again, I don't know
16		about the income surveys, I don't know how
17		close they were because that is not
18		something
19	HEAF	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		But if the income survey wasn't sufficient then
21		would you make up the difference with borrowed
22		money?
23	A	It might have been included as Fox Creek was,
24		as a Rural Development only for the rest of

1		the road, yeah.
2	HEAR	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
3		And Fox Creek is just a rural development, you
4		call that rural development?
5	Α	Right. Therein order to qualify for CDBG
6		you have to have 50over 50% low to moderate
7		income houses on that road and it didn't
8		qualify.
9	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
10		I think there is some testimony in the record,
11		too, I suspect already, but do you know how many
12		of the six additional houses on the expansion
13		areabeyond the current expansion area, or the
14		area that is in issue today, how many of those six
15		additional houses are new construction?
16	A	Well, again, at the point when we looked at
17		it there were only three houses, so
18	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
19		I mean, since then?
20	A	I mean, we included six more off of that and
21		two of them, or that one of the three we did
22		not anticipate using, so four of them would
23		be new construction.
24		

1	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2	Four would be new construction?
3	A Uh-huh.
4	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
5	Mr. Pinny?
6	MR. PINNY:
7	I have no questions at this time.
8	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
9	Any redirect?
10	MR. EDELMAN:
11	Yes, just a few questions.
12	
13	REDIRECT EXAMINATION
14	BY MR. EDELMAN:
15	Q Just so I'm clear, in 1998, Mr. Taylor, this
16	project waswhat actually happened, was there
17	notification given, what happened in 1998 to
18	trigger the CDBG application?
19	A Okay. We started looking at the project
20	actually in `95 or whatever, but Altononly
21	one entity in the county or onlya county
22	can only have one application or one CDBG
23	project going at a time. Cities within the
24	county can also apply, so, I mean, they are

24

Q

1		ineligible. But the county itself can only,
2		Fiscal Court can only have one. So, at that
3		point Alton Water and Sewer District had a
4		project going on so we had to wait until it
5		was getting cleared out before South Anderson
6		was eligible to put in another application or
7		actually the county to put in an application
8		for South Anderson. So, at that point the
9		county contracted with the grant writer to
10		prepare the application. We put together the
11		petitions and so forth that had been
12		submitted to the district. The CDBG
13		application was prepared by Mr. Kirby. As
14		part of that application process, you have to
15		have public meetings and that is what
16		occurred in `98 was the public meeting to
17		discuss the scope of the project as proposed
18		in `98.
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		Is that the public meeting that you said
21		you had in `98, was that the meeting
22		that the notice that has been
23	A	Not the big picture notice, no.

I'm going to hand you a document I showed Mr.

1		Thomas and we discussed earlier with Mr.
2		Barnett which wasone of the documents is
3		the Certification of Don White as Editor of
4		the Anderson News that was published in the
5		August 5, 1998, Anderson News; is that
6		correct?
7	A	Correct.
8	Q	And the other is a copy of the notification
9		that went to all interested citizens of
10		Anderson County regarding CDBG application;
11		is that correct?
12	A	Repeat please.
13	Q	The second is the notice that was published
14		in the newspaper that went to all interested
15		Anderson County citizens advising them of
16		this CDBG application process; is that
17		correct?
18	A	Correct.
19	Q	And what else did that applicationwhat else
20		did that notification advise all interested
21		citizens of Anderson County of at the bottom?
22	A	A copy of the CDBG application will be on
23		file at the County Judge-Executive's Office
24		for citizen review and comment during regular

1		business hours from August 18 through August
2		25, 1998. Comments on the proposed
3		application may be submitted to the attention
4		of the County Judge-Executive until August
5		28, 1998.
6	Q	Did it contemplate a public hearing being
7		held?
8	A	Yes.
9	Q	And did it indicate a public hearing being
10		held within the context of the notice?
11	Α	The notice indicates the county will hold a
12		public hearing prior to submission of any
13		application. A public hearing will be held
14		on August 18, 1998, at sixor five p.m., I
15		can't tell for sure which, at the Anderson
16		County Courthouse.
17		MR. EDELMAN:
18		If there is no objection I'd like to
19		introduce that as Defendant's Exhibit
20		next numerical, four maybe; is that
21		right?
22		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
23		Is this the same notice that was
24		attached to the answer?

1		would do in this hearing earlier, especially
2		regarding the questions of Mr. Kincer that
3		you have an opinion. If a person was
4		interested in waterin a water project, do
5		you have an opinion on as to whether a
6		reasonable person if they would read that
7		whether they would attend such a meeting?
8	A	If they had not had contact before, I would
9		think that they would contact someone to
10		insure that they were involved. That was the
11		reason for the people that showed up at the
12		other public meeting.
13	Q	How many water projects have you been
14		involved in?
15	A	Several different this is the second major
16		expansion with South Anderson, but I also
17		deal with several other water districts and
18		cities.
19	Q	Does talk about water spread pretty rapidly
20		in your experience?
21	A	Usually, we don't have to do a whole lot of
22		public notices or a whole lot of
23		notifications, that is pretty well taken care
24		of by the individuals wanting water.

1	Q	Does it surprise you that Mr. Barnett, and he
2		testified today the first he heard that his
3		portion of the road was not involved in the
4		project was June of 1999, does that surprise
5		you?
6	Α	It would surprise me. I would have thought
7		that by talking with his neighbors and so
8		forth, he would have realized that they were
9		involved in the water project and he wasn't.
10		Again, that is
11	Q	Let's talk about some other roads. Are there
12		other roads that were in a similar state as
13		Aaron-Barnett Road; that is, a judgement had
14		to be made pursuant to these factors that
15		only a portion of the road be included in the
16		project?
17	A	Yes, several of the roads that are in the
18		project we're not doing the entire road.
19	Q	Are there roads that are in from a density
20		standpoint and a construction cost
21		standpoint, are there roads that if there
22		were contingency funds available that would
23		be taken before Aaron-Barnett Road?
24	Α	Yes.

1	Q	Well, could you give the Commission an idea
2		of which roads they might be?
3	A	If you will look on the public notice that
4		was run in the paper there are
5	Q	Let me get you a copy.
6	A	In order to speed the process, if there are
7		any contingency funds left at the end of the
8		initial scope of the project, Rural
9		Development likes for you to include in this
10		notice, which is for environmental purposes,
11		additional roads that would be run with
12		contingency monies so that the environmental
13		portion of their work can be done on those at
14		the same time and won't have to go back
15		through the process again when you get to the
16		end of the original scope of the project.
17		So, they ask you to add additional roads and
18		in this case we added the six roads listed in
19		the notice, Dawson Ferry Road, Bear Creek
20		Road, Dennis Road, Ashby Road, Burke Road and
21		Mays Branch Leathers Road. Under the normal
22		scenario those would be the ones that would
23		be added next.
24	Q	Now, so there is not any misunderstanding,

1		those were based upon 1998 criteria; is that
2		correct?
3	A	Correct.
4	Q	Not 1999-2000 criteria which we have heard a
5		lot of talk about today?
6	A	Those were roads that the district had been
7		approached by people on those roads about
8		getting water.
9	Q	If the Commission were to order the district
.0		to include Mr. Barnett and his portion of the
.1		1.3 portion or the western part of Aaron-
.2		Barnett Road, where would the funding come
.3		from?
.4	A	I guess depending on how the order was
.5		worded, I mean, if it were intended to come
.6		out of the contingency funds, if there were
.7		contingency monies left, then I guess that is
.8		where it would come from. But, again, if it
.9		were to be included as part of the initial
0		project I think you would have to go out and
1		borrow additional money to do it, some other
2		source.
3	Q	Could that affect the rate structure?
4	A	It would some, I mean, it would be additional

1		loan that would have to be paid back. The
2		way it is set up, I mean, it would be spread
3		over everybody.
4	Q	Would it be equitable, in your opinion as an
5		engineer who has been involved in these
6		projects, for the Commission to order that
7		Mr. Barnett be takenthe Aaron-Barnett Road
8		be included to the exclusion of these other
9		eight or nine roads?
10	Α	I don't think so.
11	Q	Are they pretty much on a similar setting as
12		he is?
13	A	Yes, I think so. I mean, I haven't gone back
L4		out and checked those again, a couple of them
15		we went straight off the petitions and I
16		didn't go look at them because they weren't
L7		in the original funding package.
18	Q	Were there roads you actually got petitions
19		on that you had to turn down?
20	Α	Yes.
21	Q	Some of those roads werewhich ones were
22		they?
23	A	Again, part of Ashby Road, we went out so far
24		and stopped where it got sparsely populated

1		again. Sea Road that goes from Fairview Road
2		overunder Bluegrass Parkwaywell, I guess
3		it actually goes over Bluegrass Parkway. We
4		didn't include it because of the cost of
5		going across the Parkway.
6	Q	These contingency funds that we talked about,
7		how does that work when you make your
8		application with Rural Development? Is it a
9		requirement that so much of the money be held
10		in contingency? Maybe you could explain to
11		the Commission exactly how that works?
12	A	Well, you go through and figure out what the
13		construction cost estimate is, then a lot of
14		the other numbers are based on percentages of
15		that, engineering fee, inspection fee, legal
16		fees and so forth. There ismost of the
17		contracts that have involved Rural
18		Development have a percentage you get paid on
L9		of the construction. I guess in the legal
20		fees it is percentage of the entire project.
21		Then after you develop that cost estimate,
22		depending on who the engineer is, they will
23		either put the contingency in the
24		construction funds or they will put it as a

][
1		line item. Some funding agencies don't like
2		to really add percentages on to it, they add
3		it at the end, depends on who is doing it.
4		But you never go to construction at the same
5		time that you put the things together so
6		there is always some change from that
7		standpoint. And then, again, it is, you
8		know, when you put the application together
9		it is preliminary.
10	Q	You're not going to argue that in your preliminary
11		engineering report, that was prepared some time in
12		1998
13	Α	Correct.
14	Q	that you preliminarily put in the number
15		\$167,816 of contingency fund?
16	Α	Without thumbing back and finding the
17		application, if that came off the preliminary
18		engineer's report, that's the correct number.
19	Q	You also testified that was based upon a 100%
20		CDBG grant of funding of \$1,000,000?
21	Α	Correct.
22	Q	And there was only how much funding that
23		occurred?
24	Α	Nine hundred forty-three thousand or nine

	1		hundred sixty-three thousand, somewhere in
	2		that area.
	3	Q	Nine hundred sixty I think is pretty close to
	4		being accurate, so there isthat would reduce
	5		that contingency fund about \$40,000 wouldn't it?
	6	A	Yes.
	7	Q	Since 1998, what has your experience been
	8		with bidding projects relative to the cost of

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submitted today--prior to commencing this hearing, the complainant has not introduced any evidence, not one scintilla of evidence that indicates that the water district in any fashion has unreasonably excluded him from this particular project. fact, the only expert that has testified in this action is the water district's engineer, Kent Taylor, who indicates that as in all water district projects a three prong test was used to determine which parts of which roads, and which roads would, in fact, be selected. And that is number of households along each roadway, a combination of the community development block grant qualification, that is low to moderate income versus number of households, and the construction costs. At the time this project was scooped out Willow Creek Road, which is now Aaron-Barnette Road, had a petition which we have filed in the record for users for the first 1.8 They had a road captain. These are the individuals, or nine or ten that signed up, Mr. Barnette was not one of them. On his portion of the road, which crosses the creek, which is an additional 1.3 miles, there were two households

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and one that was vacant for 1.3 miles which, according to Mr. Taylor's testimony, \$51,000 in additional construction cost would require--would entail that additional construction, it would be unreasonable to construct that -- to add that to the My point is this, we can chase rabbits all day but the real issue here is has Mr. Barnette been unreasonably excluded from the project? He has introduced no evidence to that effect. He is not an engineer, I asked him interrogatories -- and I'll be brief and I'll end I asked him for: "Any documents relating to supporting his position that he should be included in the project." "None at present but will supplement." Nothing came forth. number six: "All documents in your possession which will support your position from an engineering standpoint that is practical and efficient to complete a loop along Aaron-Barnette Road." "None at present, will supplement." engineering evidence. Final request was: "All documents in your possession which support your assertion before the PSC that a reasonable estimate to construct this line will be \$40,000."

1	There is no estimates. So, to go forward at this
2	time, for the record, based upon the testimony

24		For the purpose they live on Willow

1		Creek Road and Mrwe will later on
2		support it with testimony, Lynn Hughes
3		testimony supports that those people
4		signed up for the project.
5		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
6		Okay.
7		MR. EDELMAN:
8		And that Mr. Barnette's name is not on
9		the list.
10		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
11		At this point all you are offering it
12		for is to show that these people live on
13		Willow Creek Road?
14		MR. EDELMAN:
15		Yes. Once we introduce the engineer's
16		testimony it will be incorporated.
17		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
18		Let it be introduced for that purpose at
19		this time.
20		(EXHIBIT SO MARKED: Defendant Exhibit No. 1)
21	Q	Mr. Barnette, are you aware that there was another
22		hearing held inregarding the community
23		development block grant money that was advertised
24		in the Anderson News on August 5, 1998?

1	A	No, I don't understand that one.
2	Q	If I may approach the witness and let him
3		looks like Mr. Thomas had an affidavit of
4		newspaper gentlemen and this is part of our
5		previously filed proof, Your Honor. Let me
6		let your read that notice of public hearing
7		and ask you if youyou said you haven't read
8		it before so let me give you a second just to
9		review it before I ask you some questions on
10		it.
11		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
12		Can you read it Mr. Thomas?
13	A	This is not the first one that came out that you
14		read a while ago?
15	Q	No, sir.
16	Α	When did this one come out then?
17		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
18		Well, right now, Mr. Thomas, you just
19		answer the questions. Do you havehave
20		you read that before?
21		MR. THOMAS:
22		Ray, can you tell me where this is in
23		your exhibit? This is Exhibit 2
24		under Kincer?

-		MR. EDELMAN:
2		This is afterthis is attached to our
3		answer.
4		MR. THOMAS:
5		This is attached to your answer?
6	Q	Reuben, let me help you with that if I can
7		Mr. Barnette. For the record, this is an
8		advertisement that appeared in the Anderson
9		News, certified by Don White August 5, 1998,
10		styled Public Hearing Notice South Anderson
11		Water District Expansion Project. "All
L2		interested citizens from Anderson County,
L3		Kentucky, the Kentucky Department of Local
L4		Government is accepting applications under
L5		the 1998 Community Development Block Grant
L6		(CDBG) Program. The following information
L 7		concerning the CDBG Program is available for
18		public inspection. A. Amount of funds
L9		available and range of activities that may be
20		undertaken. B. Estimated amount of funds
21		proposed to be used for activities benefiting
22		persons of low to moderate income. C. Plans
23		for minimizing displacement persons as a
24		result of activities assisted with CDBG funds

1		and plans for providing assistance to those
2		persons to be actually displaced with all the
3		CDBG funded activities." And it goes on to
4		say in the end that the county will hold a
5		public hearing prior to the submission of any
6		application. The Public Hearing will be held
7		August 18, 1998, 6:00 in the Anderson County
8		District Courtroom. The purpose of the
9		hearing is to obtain views on housing,
10		economic development, community development
11		needs, review of the proposed activities,
12		review any proposed applications, solicit
13		public comment and inform citizens of
14		technical assistance available to help groups
15		representing low, moderate income persons in
16		developing proposals. And they say that a
17		copy is on file with the County Judge-
18		Executive's office from August 18 through
19		August 25, 1998. So, your testimony is that
20		you didn't read that in the paper?
21	A	That is different, no, I didn't.
22	Q	Okay, let me ask you.
23		MR. EDELMAN:
24		If may, Your Honor, I'd like to make

2		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
3		He can't identify it. How are you going
4		to identify it?
5		MR. EDELMAN:
6		I'll do it through the engineer.
7	Q	Do youdid you go to the meeting?
8	Α	No.
9	Q	So, that meeting held on August 18 that
10		talked about the community development block
11		grant funds, you didn't attend that meeting
12		either?
13	A	If I didn't read it, I didn't know they had a
14		meeting, no.
15	Q	So that's a yes, you didn't attend the
16		meeting. Did youwere you aware of any
17		other meetings that were held?
18	A	No.
19	Q	That were advertised in the paper?
20	A	Not unless it is on this ad here, and I can't
21		hardly see this ad the way it is read here.
22		That's the only one I've seen in the paper
23		until one come outthe last one come out in
24		2000, I reckon.

- 1 Q Did you ever call the Water District prior to June
- of 1999 as you testified to, do you remember ever
- 3 calling them before June of 1999 inquiring about
- 4 the project?
- 5 A No.
- 6 Q Mr. Barnette, you testified in your
- deposition, given which is now part of your
- 8 testimony, that you have developed property
- 9 in Anderson County; is that correct?
- 10 A Yes.
- 11 Q And you developed property on Rice Road; is
- 12 that not correct?
- 13 A Yes.
- 14 Q And you have had a prior dispute with South
- Anderson Water District; is that not correct?
- 16 A Yes.
- 17 Q Okay. And that occurred some four or five
- 18 years ago?
- 19 A Yes.
- 20 Q And you filed a complaint with the Public
- 21 Service Commission?
- 22 A Yes.
- 23 Q And how was that complaint disposed of?
- 24 A I was refused to give a hearing in front of

1		
2	Q	the Public Service Commission. And your complaint was really about you were
3		attempting to get some monies back from the
4		district. You thought they owed you some
5		monies for water lines that you had put in
6		for developing the Rice Road property; is
. 7		that not correct?
8	A	I didn't think, they did. That was it, yes.
9	Q	However, the complaint you filed was
10		dismissed by the Public Service Commission?
11 "	A	Not exactly, no.
12	Q	What happened?
13	A	Well, South Anderson Water District, when I
14		went in front of them to hire them to run the
15		water down to the bottoms where I was making
16		eight lots, they told me of two ways it could
17		be set up where I could draw my money back.
18		And I accepted one of them and when people
19		started hooking on, Allison Walker, Manager
20		of South Anderson Water District, told me one
21		day that a house or two in the bottoms had
22		hooked on, he needed to get with me and pay
23		me for 50 foot of each one of them, and I
24		told him no that wasn't the way it was agreed

1		on. It was agreed on the people outside of
2		the bottoms paying me back so much, not the
3		people in the bottoms where I sold lots. And
4		he disagreed. But I had a contract at home
5		where he signed it, where he got the water
6		commissioners to approve it and he signed it
7		and mailed it to me. And that is the reason
8		I filed a complaint.
9	Q	And what was the disposition of that
10		complaint by the Public Service Commission?
11	Α	They come back and said they didn't know it
12		was going to be a subdivision, that all South
13		Anderson had to pay me for was 50 foot for
14		each hookup, and I've now got 50 of them.
15	Q	Now, in your testimony on page 16, Mr.
16		Barnette, Mr. Thomas asked you the question
17		"Do you think that this agreement " that's
18		talking about the PSC dispute "had any
19		influence or effect on the decision by South
20		Anderson Water District not to run water
21		lines throughout the entire Willow Creek
22		Road?" And you answered, "I think that's the
23		only reason." Do you still stand by that
24		testimony?

1	A	I still stand by that answer.
2	Q	How many households in June of `98 or early
3		`98, prior to the time you sold to Mr. and
4		Mrs. Rucker, how many users were there on
5		Willow Creek?
6	A	On Willow Creek?
7	Q	Well, on your portion, on the 1.3 that we are
8		talking about today, on your portion?
9		Obviously there was you?
10		MR. THOMAS:
11		Mr. Shapiro, I'm going to allow him to
12		ask the question, but he says users, and
13		I'm not sure that is an appropriate
14		term, households, maybe.
15		MR. EDELMAN:
16		We can say households.
17		MR. THOMAS:
18		Households may be more appropriate.
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		The witness doesn't understand the
21		question.
22	Q	How many households or potential users, how
23		many potential households, including
24		yourself, were on the 1.3 portion of Willow

- 13 A Yes.
- 14 Q Now, they testified, Mr. Barnette, that they
- bought in June of `98. Does that sound about
- 16 right?
- 17 A Well, no, it don't. No.
- 18 Q Okay. Now, you are developing out there on
- 19 Willow Creek, are you not?
- 20 A I was.
- 21 Q Well, you sold how many tracts of land out
- 22 there?
- 23 A Eight, I think.
- 24 Q So, you have sold eight tracks of land on Willow

1		Creek?
2	A	Seven or eight, I think it is eight.
3	Q	Did you hirehave you hired an engineer to
4		take a look at the 1.381.3 miles of roadway
5		that we are discussing today to determine the
6		feasibility of running a water linewhether
7		it is feasible to run an extension of water
8		lines in this project?
9	A	No.
10	Q	Have you sought out any other expert
11		testimony to come before this Commission to
12		tell this Commission that in fact it is
13		feasible, given the numbers that exist in
14		'98, that this 1.3 miles should be included in
15		this extension?
16	A	No.
17	Q	Have you supplied the Commission any
18		information that would verify that your
19		number of \$40,000 would be the number it
20		would take to construct this additional 1.3
21		miles of water line
22	Α	I estimated what I thought it would take, I
23		didn't say what it would take. I don't know
24		what it would take, you know, I estimated

1	what I thought it would take.
2	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
3	But you haven't hired an engineer to
4	tell you?
5	A No, I haven't hired nobody.
6	MR. EDELMAN:
7	I think that's all I have right now Your
8	Honor.
9	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
10	Any questions?
11	MR. PINNY:
12	I have no questions.
13	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
14	Any redirect?
15	MR. THOMAS:
16	Yes, Mr. Shapiro.
17	
18	REDIRECT EXAMINATION
19	BY MR. THOMAS:
20	Q Mr. Barnette, Mr. Edelman on cross-examination
21	indicated that there were road captains along
22	various projects proposed by the South Anderson
23	Water District. Did a road captain ever come by
24	your house?

- 1 A No.
- 2 Q Were you ever told by anyone affiliated with
- 3 South Anderson Water District that a road
- 4 captain would be getting in contact with you?
- 5 A No.
- 6 Q So, you don't have any knowledge of any road
- 7 captain going along, coming along Willow
- 8 Creek Road?
- 9 A Yes, I do now.
- 10 Q You do now, but you didn't back in June of
- 11 `98?
- 12 A No.
- 13 Q Or, for that matter, the entire calendar year
- 14 of 1999?
- 15 A There was some time--after I found out they
- 16 wasn't going all the way through the road,
- then I went to talking to people up and down
- through there and I found out that they had
- 19 been down on the other end of Willow Creek
- 20 Road but not up around home.
- 21 Q Not to your house?
- 22 A No.
- 23 Q Now, for the Commission's own information,
- 24 what was your understanding in terms of how

1		far they were going to go on Willow Creek
2		Road when you found out that the notice
3		wasn't exactly as indicated, they were only
4		going through part of Willow Creek Road. How
5		far did you find out they were going to go?
6	A	One mile and two tenths.
7	Q	A mile and two tenths?
8	Α	Yes.
9	Q	By the way, Mr. Shapiro, before I forget,
10		since I already have that exhibit in the
11		record, I'd like to have that blown up copy
12		made a part, formal part of the record,
13		because I think it is really
14		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15		Is it part of his testimony
16		MR. THOMAS:
17		It is part of his testimony, it is
18		already in the record.
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		Part of the prefiled testimony?
21		MR. THOMAS:
22		Yes, sir, it was.
23		MR. EDELMAN:
2.4		I don't have any objection

1	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2	Well, what would be the purpose?
3	MR. THOMAS:
4	Well, I mean, I think it just highlights
5	what the wording of the language was in
6	terms of the roads, desire to be part of
7	this project by the South Anderson Water
8	District, I think a clear copy of the
9	actual notice submitted by South
10	Anderson Water District.
11	MR. EDELMAN:
12	I'm going to object, Your Honor, I mean
13	desireit speaks for itself, it says
14	what it says.
15	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
16	Well
17	MR. THOMAS:
18	It's your call Mr. Shapiro.
19	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20	If you have no objection to it
21	MR. EDELMAN:
22	I don't have any objection, it is the
23	same thing that is attached to his
24	testimony.

1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		I would just introduce it, I will just
3		let it be a part of the record as a copy
4		of what is already in the record. I
5		mean, there is no sense in having two
6		exhibits that say exactly the same thing
7		and giving it separate numbers. But if
8		you want to leave that as a copy of what
9		is in the record, that will be fine.
10		MR. THOMAS:
11		Okay, thank you Mr. Shapiro.
12	Q	So, when you found out, Reuben, that they
13		weren't going to come entirely along Willow
14		Creek Road, you found out they were only
15		going to go 1.2 miles.
16	A	Yes.
17	Q	Okay. Is it true that you have now been
18		informed that that distance has changed?
19	A	Yes.
20	Q	And now how far is the South Anderson Water
21		District going to go along Willow Creek road?
22	A	I've been told a mile and eight tenths.
23	Q	So, there has been a change then from what
24		was initially proposed to what they are going

1		to do now?
2	Α	Yes.
3	Q	Now, on his cross-examination Mr. Edelman
4		provided you with a copy of an August 1998
5		notice promulgated by the South Anderson
6		Water District. Ray, did youI didn't get a
7		copy of that, do you still have that?
8		MR. EDELMAN:
9		I haven't introduced it yet.
10		MR. THOMAS:
11		Okay, but you made reference to it, may
12		I see it for a minute?
13		MR. EDELMAN:
14		You can look at it, you've got a copy of
15		it, but you are welcome to look at it.
L6		MR. THOMAS:
L7		Do you have any problems if I show it to
18		Reuben?
19		MR. EDELMAN:
20		No, sir, go ahead.
21	Q	Now, I show you that same August 1998 notice that
22		Mr. Edelman showed you and I'll ask you does that
23		notice indicate in any way or any mention of
24		Willow Creek Road or for that matter any roads?

1	Α	No, I don't see no roads on it.
2	Q	Okay. It's just a general notice to the
3		public of the possibility, I'm going to be
4		precise here, of the South Anderson Water
5		District expansion project, but it doesn't
6		indicate any roads on here?
7	A	I don't see it, I hadn't noticed it until you
8		said that just now.
9	Q	So, since it didn't mention Willow Creek Road
10		specifically, you didn't know whether that notice
11		applied to you or to anyone else? It didn't
12		personally indicate that it was going to affect
13		your property?
14		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15		I think the witness has testified that
16		he had never seen that notice; is that
17		right?
18	A	Yes, I testified that I didn't see it, so I
19		wouldn't
20		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
21		Is that correct, you haven't seen that
22		notice before?
23	A	No, I said I don't remember seeing that one.
24	0	Now, I want to go back to another guestion Mr.

24

Α

Edelman asked, because I think it is very 1 2 pertinent to this hearing. After you get past the 1.2 miles in June of 1998, how many houses were 3 4 there remaining on Willow Creek Road after that 1.2 miles? Mr.--I'm gong to establish that there 5 were at least nine in the 1.2 mile corridor and 6 7 all the documents submitted by the South Anderson Water District substantiate that. After that 1.2 8 miles in 1998, how many houses were there? 9 From the mile and two tenths on through? 10 Α Right. 11 0 12 Eleven, not counting the one abandoned. 13 Eleven? 0 14 Α Yes. Okay. And your testimony is that included in 15 116 that 11 would have been your house, the 17 Redmon's house, the Elliott's house and the 18 trailer where your mother-in-law lived? 19 Α Yes. 20 Okay. So, there were 11 houses in that additional -- in that 1.9 miles? 21 1.8 miles I think. 22 Α 23 1.8, 1.9 miles, okay.

There was one more started along about

1		that time but I don't know whether it had
2		started, but there wasn't nobody living there
3		for sure.
4	Q	And today how many houses are there after
5		that, goinghow many other houses have been
6		added after that 1.2 miles?
7	A	It is one more living there and it is one
8		more getting ready to move into in the next
9		two weeks.
10	Q	The one more living there would be Tom
11		Redmon's house; is that correct?
12	Α	Yes.
13	Q	And the one more that is getting ready to
14		move there would be the Riddles house; is
15		that right?
16	Α	Yes.
17	Q	That's correct. So, that would make then, if
18		you add those two to eleven, it would make
19		13.
20		MR. EDELMAN
21		I don't have anyI want to object for a
22		second. I don't have any problem with
23		Mr. Thomas leading him a little bit, but
2.4		I'd like for him to ask him questions

1		about who these individuals are if he
2		knows. I'm not trying towell, in
3		terms of his asking him one would be the
4		Riddles and one would be the Redmons,
5		and I'd like to know if Mr. Barnette
6		knows who these people are. He didn't
7		seem to know who they were when I was
8		asking questions on the front end of the
9		road. I'm just objecting to the leading
10		a little bit is where I'm coming from.
11		MR. THOMAS:
12		I'll be glad to rephrase my question.
13		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
14		Have you asked himwhere are weare
15		you objecting to the last question that
16		was asked? Okay, rephrase the question.
17		MR. THOMAS:
18		I'll be glad to rephrase the question.
19	Q	You said there are two additional houses, do
20		you know who those two additional houses are
21		Mr. Barnette?
22	A	Tom Redmon and Gaines Riddle or how you announce
23		it.
24	Q	And that would make a total of 13 as of

- today, after that 1.2 mile termination by the
- 2 South Anderson Water District?
- 3 A Yes.
- 4 Q Now, finally, Mr. Edelman asked you a
- 5 question about you being a land developer.
- 6 And you acknowledged on answering the
- 7 question that in the past you have sold land
- 8 on Willow Creek Road?
- 9 A Yes.
- 10 Q Are you still selling land on Willow Creek
- 11 Road Mr. Barnette?
- 12 A Yes.
- 13 Q How many lots do you have to be developed?
- 14 A Two.
- 15 O And where are those two located?
- 16 A Well, I guess the best way I can put it is
- one is located between a mile--the last mile
- 18 and two tenths, and then one of them between
- 19 the six tenths that they added on later.
- 20 Q So, only one of the lots then is going to be
- 21 excluded from this project?
- 22 A Yeah.
- 23 Q And you have some other lots for sale but
- they are located on US 62?

2	Q	And they already have access to city water?
3	A	Yes.
4	Q	So, as of today, there is only one lot that
5		you have undeveloped for sale that would
6		benefit from this roadway, from going all the
7		way through Willow Creek Road?
8	A	Yes.
9	Q	Only one lot?
10	A	Yeah, six acres.
11	Q	And the remaining property is your homestead
12		property; is that correct? The only other
13		property that is on Willow Creek Road would
14		be your homestead property, right?
15	A	Yes.
16	Q	Where you personally live?
17	A	Yes.
18	Q	That is not for sale; is that correct?
19	A	Not for sale.
20	Q	And where your children live?
21	A	Yes.
22		MR. THOMAS:
23		I have no further questions, Mr.
24		Shapiro.

1		RECROSS EXAMINATION
2	BY N	MR. EDELMAN:
3	Q	Sounds like you have been pretty successful
4		selling lots out there on Willow Creek or Aaron-
5		Barnette Road?
6	A	I didn't understand you.
7	Q	I said it sounds like you have been pretty
8		successful selling lots on Aaron-Barnette
9		Road?
10	A	Well, I call it more tracts, not lots.
11	Q	Well, what sizewould you agree with me that
12		you have been pretty successful selling these
13		tracts?
14	Α	Yes.
15	Q	When did you start selling these tracts?
16	Α	Probably four years ago, I don't know the
17		exact day, but approximately.
18	Q	And just for the record, how many tracts have
19		you sold?
20	Α	Seven, I reckon.
21		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
22		Are you talking about Willow Creek Road?
23		MR. EDELMAN:
24		Yes, sir.

1	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2	Seven on Willow Creek Road?
3	A Yeah.
4	Q And there is one remaining
5	A One remaining. Well, one
6	Q Actually, there is two remaining, one is on the
7	portion where you are requesting to be included in
8	the project and one is already included in what
9	would be in the current project?
0	A Yes.
1	MR. EDELMAN
.2	That's all I have right now Your Honor.
.3	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
4	Staff, any questions?
15	MR. PINNY:
.6	No questions.
7	
.8	REDIRECT EXAMINATION
.9	BY MR. THOMAS:
20	Q In keeping with the rules of evidence, just to
21	follow up on Mr. Edelman's statement. These lots
22	that you sold, Mr. Barnette, you have sold,
23	obviously, without there being city water
24	available to the buyers of these lots; correct?

1	A	Right.
2	Q	And you have been successful doing that?
3	A	Yes.
4	Q	So, why do you want water now, Mr. Barnette,
5		why do you want city water now?
6	A	Well, anybody wants city water. That is one
7		thing
8		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
9		I don't know that this is like follow up
10		from what he covered.
11		MR. THOMAS:
12		Well, let me tell you where I'm going
13		Mr. Shapiro. If he has been successful
14		doing it without city water and he only
15		has one lot for sale, then it stands to
16		reason that the reason that he wants
17		water has to do with something other
18		than his desire to sell lots.
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		But he has already testified on his
21		direct testimony that he wants water
22		becausehe wants city water because
23		city water is better to use than cistern
24		water. It is cleaner and it tastes

10	Q	Now, tell me, Mr. Kincer, how South Anderson Water
11		District went about determining the feasibility of
12		that Phase 5 expansion project?
13	Α	Okay. South Anderson was formed in 1976. At
14		the beginning of that district the Phases
15		One, Two, Three and Four and now we are into
16		Five, all came about by the request of
17		households at the end or at the beginning of
18		a road where the water line would have ended
19		on the previous expansion. And then we take
20		those roads and we determine through the
21		engineer how many houses and how many miles
22		that we are really talking about. We are
23		talking about, probably, 43 miles and 350
24		households. There is times when we have to

1		cut off on a road because of the number of
2		people per mile is not a feasible pay back of
3		our obligation in the loan money that we get.
4		So, somewhere along the way, in this Phase 5
5		project, it was at the request of the people
6		that did not have water to be included and
7		when we put it all down on paper the
8		engineering has to help determine if it is
9		feasible for those roads to be included. For
10		the Commission to understand that Mr.
11		Barnette's road is not the only road in this
12		project that we had to cut back on, there is
13		probably eight to ten others, and Mr. Taylor
14		may have that in his testimony thatwhat
15		these roads are.
16	Q	Well, I'm going to get to Mr. Taylor's
17		testimony but for purposes of the Commission
18		making a ruling here. You are saying that
19		feasibilitytell me if I'm correctthat
20		feasibility, in your opinion as Chairman of
21		the South Anderson Water District, is
22		determined primarily by number of households
23		to be served per mile. That's what you are
24		focusing on primarily?

1	Α	Yes.
2	Q	Okay. And that whether people wanted water is not
3		nearly as important as looking at your ability to
4		reach the most households you can per mile; is
5		that correct Mr. Kincer?
6	A	Well, the South Anderson Water Commissioners
7		are responsible to the 1,500 customers that
8		we now serve in addition to the 350 that we
9		plan to put on this project, is that their
10		rates will be reasonable and them using
11		water. You cannot jeopardize rates to the
12		point that they become unreasonable for all
13		of your existing customers. And when you
14		talk about a mile of line and you talk about
15		two or three potential households there is no
16		way that you can justify pay back even when
17		you are talking about 50% grant money and 50%
18		loan money. And our engineering determines
19		that from his report.
20	Q	I agree that that makes sense but, again,
21		when you are looking at expanding and you
22		talk about feasibility, I just want to be
23		clear, Mr. Kincer, you are talking about
24		trying to serve the most households per mile

Q

1 that you possibly can. That is going to reduce--that is going to make the rates fairly stable for one thing, correct? 3 4 Α Okay. 5 0 Am I right on that? 6 Α Well, yes. We do try to serve as many houses 7 as we can. 8 0 So, when you came up with these lines right 9 here you determined that these lines would 10 reach the most households per mile that made 11 this project feasible; is that your 12 testimony? 13 The overall number of people per mile, yes, Α would make the -- would make it feasible. 14 15 Well, Mr. Kincer, it is my understanding that Q 16 each roadway would use a different project; is that correct? There are--you propose 14 17 18 different projects. Well, let me clarify 19 something first. Is Fox Creek Road in or out 20 of the project? Is Fox Creek Road a part of 21 the Phase 5 expansion? I'm not sure, that will have to come from the 22 Α 23 engineer.

So, you don't know the answer to that

1		question?
2	A	Not exactly, no.
3	Q	Okay. But I am correct that each project,
4		each roadway, is viewed as a separate
5		project? In other words, Gilberts Creek will
6		be seen as one project, Athens Road will be
7		seen as one project; am I correct on that?
8	A	Well, not an individual project. Each road
9		is reviewed for its own credibility of being
10		feasible or not, because you cannot put a
11		road in that has got one house on it for four
12		miles and then expect the other roads to pay
13		higher rates for that purpose.
14	Q	So, again, feasibility then for this entire
15		project would be to maximize the most
16		households you could per mile?
17	A	I would say yes.
18	Q	And, of course, to be reasonable, Mr. Kincer,
19		you are also going to look at cost per mile
20		too, wouldn't you? In other words, you might
21		have ten households per mile but if it is
22		going to cost you an exorbitant amount of
23		money because of the terrain or the rock or
24		the limestone, then that would be a

1		consideration by South Anderson Water
2		District as well, cost per mile would be a
3		consideration as well; correct?
4	Α	I would say yes.
5	Q	Any other significant consideration by the
6		South Anderson Water district other than the
7		density, which would be the customers per
8		mile and the cost, which would be the cost of
9		constructing the water line per mile, are
10		there any other feasible considerations?
11	A	I probably did not understand your question.
12	Q	Okay. We have established here, for the
13		Commission's purposes, that there are two
14		items that you consider when you talk about
15		feasibility. One, reaching the most
16		households you can per mile and, secondly,
17		taking into consideration what it is going to
18		cost to build those water lines per mile, and
19		I'm asking you are there any other
20		feasibility considerationsare there any
21		other considerations other than those two?
22	Α	Not that I know of, no.
23	Q	Okay. Well, looking at your testimony and,
24		again, I'm not trying to trick you but I want

1		the Commission to be clear. Certainly when
2		you apply for grant money you want to look at
3		whether those households would be grant money
4		eligible; correct?
5	Α	Yes.
6	Q	So, that would be a consideration too, whether you
7		are serving enough low income households to make
8		your ability a grant money attractive, right?
9	Α	Yes.
10	Q	Because the more grant money you obtain the
11		cheaper the project costs, overall project
12		cost is to you; is that correct
13	A	The more grant money you get the more you can
14		expand out in those thinly populated areas.
15	Q	So, there have really been three
16		considerations, and I think your testimony
17		bears this out. One, you want to look at the
18		density, that is the customers per mile;
19		secondly, you want to look at what it is
20		going to cost to build that road per mile and
21		then; thirdly, you want to look at am I able
22		to reach enough low income households to make
23		this feasible, those are the three
24		considerations; correct Mr. Kincer?

1	Α	Yes.
2	Q	Now, just a point of information, Mr. Kincer,
3		because I want to be clear on where the
4		project stands. Everything that I've read
5		indicates that your current cost estimate for
6		the project is \$2,205,830. Let me repeat
7		that question for the stenographer. Your
8		projected project cost is \$2,205,830. I got
9		that from your application, CDBG grants and
10		part of your engineering report. Is that
11		still the project cost estimate?
12	A	If you are asking me to confirm that, I'd say
13		we have approved that hinged upon our
14		engineering with the qualified ability to
15		make that dollar amount for the project. We
16		have not bid the project yet. We are
17		estimating that that is what it will cost.
18	Q	I don't know if this is an exhibit or not.
19		I'm just going to use this information. Now
20		let's see, Mr. Kincer, your funding source
21		here, your projected funding source, and if
22		I'm correct your projected funding source is
23		that you are going to receive \$1,088,000 in
24		loan money from the United States Department

1		of Agriculture, Rural Development Service.
2		You are only going to receive \$93,000 in
3		grant money; is that correct? That says a
4		million but your actual grant money award was
5		\$960,000; is that correct?
6	A	It is less than a million, yes.
7	Q	But you don't know exactly, you can't testify
8		that it was 960,000, you just know that it is
9		less than a million?
10	Α	I can say it is 900 plus thousand, I don't
11		have that number with me though.
12	Q	And then you are going to receive \$61,000
13		from the Fiscal Court and \$56,000 in tap-on
14		fees to finance this project; is that correct
15		Mr. Kincer? Is that your revenue source for
16		this project?
17	A	State that again, I don't think you have got
18		the right numbers.
19	Q	Well, that is why I'm asking you the question
20		I want to make sure I've got a right number.
21		You are gong to receive 900,000 plusthat's
22		your testimonyin grant money from Community
23		Development block grant funds?

2	Your Honor, if I can interject.
3	A If you are asking me to confirm numbers I
4	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
5	Okay, wait a minute.
6	MR. EDELMAN:
7	Just let me object for a second. He has
.8	testified that there is going to be
9	960,000 of grant money on his direct
10	testimony.
11	MR. THOMAS:
12	Well, he said 900,000 plus.

14		where I'm going but I need to establish
15		first how much money is coming into the

17		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
18		Well, he has testified that they are
19		going to get somewhere in excess of
20		\$900,000 for the
21	Α	Grant money.
22		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
23		grant money, community block grant, he
24		is going to get a little over a million

1		dollars from the Department of
2		Agriculture, so that is essentially a
3		loan. A portion of it is going to come
4		from the Fiscal Court and a portion of
5		it is going to come from the Water
6		District itself though tap-on fees and I
7		guess other revenues that they had. You
8		need to know the exactyou want to know
9		the exact amounts?
10	Q	No, no, I take it then that they are consistent
11		that they both equal to about \$2.2 million Mr.
12		Kincer?
13	A	That's the estimated project cost.
14		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15		But now he has also testified that that
16		is the estimated project cost and that
17		the actual project cost will depend upon
18		how much the contractors bid and who is
19		awarded the successful bid; is that
20		correct?
21	A	Yes.
22	Q	I'm ready to move on. Now, Mr. Kincer, in your
23		projected cost estimate you have established a
24		contingency of \$167,816.25. Is that still true

9		water lines; is that not true?
10	A	Yes, it is true.
11	Q	And you don't deny, do you, Mr. Kincer, that when
12		you promulgated the notice, in fact, there is this
13		affidavit from Mr. White at Anderson News
L 4		indicating that this is the notification of the
L5		South Anderson Water District's informing the
L6		public of possible impact to an important land
L7 -		resource. This is a notice that you published;
L8		correct?
L9		MR. EDELMAN:
20		I'm going to object to the question in
21		the sense that if he knows, that we
22		published or the District published it.
23		I think the face of the document
24		indicates that it was published by the

1		federal government.
2		MR. THOMAS:
3		I think the face of the document, Your
4		Honor
5		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
6		Well, wait a minute, wait, wait. Why
7		don't we just ask him who published that
8		notice.
9	Q	Who published this notice Mr. Kincer?
10	A	Well, it is a requirement that the notice be
11		published. Who took it down to the office of
12		the Anderson News, most likely would have
13		been the Manager of the water district, but
14		it was a statedthis is a federal government
15		requirement.
16		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
17		Okay, but the question is did the Water
18		District cause that notice to be
19		published or did somebody else cause it
20		to be published?
21	A	Well, somebody else would require it to be
22		published.
23		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
24		I know they required it but who actually

1		caused it to be published? By that I
2		mean, who took it to the newspaper and
3		said we want you to publish this in your
4		next edition?

6		Anderson Water District.
7		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
8		And who prepared that notification; do
9		you know? Was it prepared by
10	A	I'd say the engineer.
l1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
12		The engineer prepared it?
L3	A	Yes.
L 4		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
L5		The engineer for
L6	A	For South Anderson.
L7		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
18		South Anderson Water District?
L 9	Α	Yes.
0.0		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
21		So, the engineer prepared it, and the
22		engineer or someone fromnot the
23		engineersomeone from the Water
24		District took it to the newspaper and

1		they published itto have it published;
2		is that right?
3	Α	Yes, yes.
4	Q	Not to belabor the point, Mr. Kincer, if I could
5		get right to the point. The notice does say that
6		the roads that will be affected include Willow
7		Creek Road, does it not?
8	A	I see that on there, yes.
9	Q	And there is no road qualification on there, for
10		instance, when you talk about Kentucky 44 East you
11		mentionKentucky 44 you mention East of
12		Glensboro, you qualify where you are going to
13		construct off of Kentucky 44 East. On US 62 you
14		indicate you are going to do it West of
15		Johnsville.
16		MR. EDELMAN:
17		Objection to the terminology that
18		anything is being constructed. That is
19		not what he said.
20		MR. THOMAS:
21		Your Honor, the noticeI have a right
22		to ask questions about the notice, it
23		speaks for itself and my question is
24		simply that there is no qualifications

1		regarding Willow Creek Road.
2		MR. EDELMAN:
. 3		I have no problem with that.
4		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
5		What's that?
6		MR. EDELMAN:
7		I have no problem with that, but the
8		problem I have he isthen he goes and
9		says that it says that it will be
10		constructed on Willow Creek Road. And I
11		don't think that is what that notice
12		says nor was it the purpose of that
13		notice to talk about construction.
14		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15		Well, I think he hadthe notice will

24	A	Well, most likely its our water line was

1		already down that road.
2		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
3		I mean, that's what the notice is
4		saying?
5	A	Yes.
6		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
7		Isn't that correct?
8	A	Yes, it is.
9		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
L 0		And with respect to Willow Creek Road,
.1		it doesn't say anything except Willow
.2		Creek Road?
.3	A	But for the
.4		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
.5		Is that correct?
.6	A	Yes.
.7		MR. EDELMAN:
.8		He has a right to explain.
.9	A	But for the Commission's understanding that these
20		are preliminary studies. The actual number per
1		mile and if we don't kick them out, if we have a
2		road in there that has got two miles and two
23		people on it, if we don't kick it out our lending
4		people will do it for us.

1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		I understand. I understand that there
3		are some other procedures that are going
4		to follow. But insofar as that notice
5		is concerned, that notice says that the
6		roads that the project is being
7		considered for are the roads that are
8		listed in that notice?
9	A	Yes.
10		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
11		Does that answer your questions?
12		MR. THOMAS:
13		Thank you Mr. Shapiro.
14	Q	Mr. Kincer, would you agree with me that an
15		average person reading that notice would believe
16		that the South Anderson Water District was going
17		to construct water lines entirely along Willow
18		Creek Road?
19	A	Knowing what I know of roads that we have to
20		evaluate
21		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
22		Well, he is asking you what an average
23		person wouldif youwhat an average
24		person would think about that, what

1		interpretation an average person would
2		give to that notice, not what you would
3		give to that notice knowing what you
4		know about the procedure.
5	Α	Okay. I'd say it would probably stir up the
6		interest of that person getting back with the
7		water district to understand if it is going
8		to beget into his house.
9	Q	I don't know that that answers my question, so let
10		me ask my question again. Would you not agree,
11		Mr. Kincer, that the average person reading that
12		would believe that the South Anderson Water
13		District was going to construct water lines
14		entirely along Willow Creek Road, not part of the
15		road, all of the road? That's a yes or no
16		question, Mr. Kincer.
17		MR. EDELMAN:
18		He has a right to explain his answer.
19		MR. THOMAS:
20		He can answer yes and explain.
21		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
22		Just a second, is there an objection, do
23		you have an objection to the question?
24		

1	MR. EDELMAN:
2	I have an objection to the question.
3	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
4	What is the objection?
5	MR. EDELMAN:
6	The objection is he is talking about
7	that notice talking about constructing
8	water lines and the notice speaks for
9	itself. The noticeclearly in the
10	notice it talks about the purpose is the
11	impact on farm land. It is not a notice
12	about the scope of the project. And
13	that's an unfairthat is a question
14	that cannot take a yes or no answer to.
15	He needs an opportunity to explain.
16	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
17	He's asking him thoughessentially,
18	what he is asking the witness is whether
19	or not a person, an ordinary person
20	living in the South Anderson Water
21	District might read that, the person
22	reading that, rather, that person
23	reading it, rather the person I
24	described reading that would come to the

1		conclusion that a project was being
2		considered that will cover the entire
3		Willow Creek Road. Do you have an
4		opinion as to whether or not a person
5		would reach such a conclusion, yes or
6		no? First of all, do you have an
7		opinion on it?
8	A	An average person might assume that
9		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
10		Well, do you have an opinion on it, you
11		have an opinion?
12	A	Yes.
13		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
14		Okay, what is your opinion?
15	A	Well my opinion is that all roads cannot be
16		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
17		No, I want to know what your opinion
18		about what the average person would
19		what an average person would conclude
20		from this?
21	Α	An average person probably yes wouldthat's the
22		best way to get out of that.
23	Q	First of all, Mr. Kincer, you did hold the
24		public hearing on March 8 at nine o'clock

1		a.m?
2	: A	Yes.
3	Q	You were there, were you not?
4	A	Most likely I was, yes.
5	Q	And you will agree with me, Mr. Kincer, that
6		that meeting was not very well attended?
7	A	It would have been announced that the meeting
8		was going to be held, the number of people
9		that come is notwe cannot control that.
10		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
11		Well, the question was was it well
12		attended or not? Let him answer the
13		question.
14	A	I'd say yes.
15		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
16		You say it was well attended?
17	A	Yes.
18		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
19		Okay.
20	Q	Your minutes reflect that only, if you
21		exclude Mr. Taylor, only six households
22		showed up for that meeting, if you exclude
23		Mr. Taylor and, of course, exclude yourself
24		and Mr. Washford and the other commissioners

1		and, of course, the Judge-Executive, only six
2		households showed up there. That's what your
3		minutes reflect; would you agree with me
4		there?
5	A	Yes.
6	Q	Now there has been some dispute, Mr. Kincer,
7		about how long those people who would not
8		receive water on Aaron-Barnette Road would
9		have to wait if they don't get water this
10		time. But you have testified that you engage
11		in expansion project every four to five years

3	Α	People are contacted either by the staff of
4		the water district or by team captains that
5		are located on those roads that we plan to
6		serve.
7	Q	I just want to ask you what you know. Do you
8		know if the person who went along Willow
9		Creek Road was told to gowas told to
10		contact everyone who lived on Willow Creek
11		Road?
12	A	I do not know that to be a fact, no.
13	Q	Now, you have heard Mr. Barnette testify that
14		he was not contacted. You don't have any
15		reason, then, to dispute his testimony since
16		you don't know. He made thein fact, he may
17		indeed be telling the truth that he was not
18		contacted about whether he wanted water?
19	A	What are you asking me?
20	Q	My question is Mr. Barnette may indeed be
21		telling the truth that he was not contacted
22		by any official of South Anderson Water
23		District regarding his interest in water?
2.4	Α	I'm not going to dispute whether he is

1		telling the truth or not. I didn't ask him
2		the question.
3		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
4		The fact is you don't know whether they
5		went up there and talked to everybody do
6		you?
7	A	No, I do not, no.
8		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
9		So, if he says that he wasn'tthat he
10		was never contacted, you have no reason
11		to question that?
L2	A	No.
L3	Q	Mr. Kincer, you don't deny that some of these
L4		water lines that are going to be constructed
L 5		are going to serve non-Anderson Countians?
L6	A	I'd say there is potential of our water district
L7		with an agreement with adjoining counties that if
L8		one of us go down our county road and the other
L9		side of the road is Mercer County, Washington
20		County, that it is proper for that district upon
21		an agreement with that county to push under the
22		road to serve a house that is in the other county
23		during either a project or after a project is
24		over, if those people request water.

1	Q	And that is indeed what is going to happen
2		here, Mr. Kincer, that some of these water
3		lines are going to serve non-Anderson County
4		residents. That's going to happen here;
5		isn't that correct Mr. Kincer?
6	A	It has the potential and it is proper to do
7		that.
8	Q	Now, we are here today, Mr. Kincer, but back
9		in June Mr. Barnette did come to you and ask
10		you to modify your construction plan and
11		include his part of the road, did he not?
12	A	He did come to the water district and request
13		that we serve that road, yes.
14	Q	In fact, that was submitted on behalf of Mr.
15		Barnette in June of last year saying let's
16		modify this proposal to include my road, was
17		it not?
18	A	I'mit probably would be.
19		MR. THOMAS:
20		Mr. Shapiro, I would like to introduce

22		Exhibit 2, but I don't know how you want

16		to page 46, on page 46 of the CDBG grant.
17		MR. EDELMAN:

6	Q	The CDBG grant has alphabetical listings for
7		the projects and Willow Creek Road has been
8		designated as I. Now, on page 11 I've been
9		told that indications that there is pneumonia
10		bacteria presentreally meant L, which was
11		Rice Road not I, which is Willow Creek Road.
12		But then you come on page 46 again it
13		indicates I, including they mean I this time
14		because there is an L down there as well.
15		And that also indicates area shows evidence
16		of pneumonia bacteria in water supplies for
17		Willow Creek Road. Is this an accurate
18		statement of your application, Mr. Kincer, or
19		is this also incorrect? Should this I also
20		have been L?
21	A	I would refer that question to our engineer,
22		Mr. Taylor. So, I'm not familiar of why
23		those are that way, but I'm sure he could
24		probably address that in his questions.

1	Q	Mr. Kincer, one final question. South Anderson
2		Water District proposes to serve nine households
3		over 1.2 miles in 1998. Since that time there
4		have been 12 households, the fact there is going
5		to be 12 households that are built or inhabited
6		since that initial determination over the
7		remaining 1.2 miles. Why did South Anderson Water
8		District make a decision to only include half of
9		those households and not the other half? If you
10		are going to modify the proposal, why just include
11		six of the 12 and not the remaining six?
12	Α	The South Anderson would have to justify the
13		number of tap-ons per mile or what for the
14		dollars that we are going to borrow with the
15		ability to pay back. They will not loan
16		money on land that haswhether it is sold or
17		people saying they will put water meters in
18		if the houses are not there. And they was
19		not there in 1998 when we put the project
20		together. So, what happened after `98 is not
21		a part of this project and we elected to not
22		delay the people and even take a chance on
23		losing the grant money that we had by holding
24		this up for another six months. So,

1	basically, our review is what we did in 1998
2	to be included in the Phase 5 project.
3	Q I'm not trying to be disrespectful, Mr.
4	Kincer, but I don't think you answered my
5	question. Because, clearly, you have already
6	established that you did modify the proposal
7	some because you have gone from 1.2 to 1.8.
8	So, my question again, sir, again is since
9	you have indicatedsince you have already
10	indicated a willingness to modify the
11	proposal and pick up six of the households,
12	why didn't you pick up the other six?
13	A I'd say we did not modify.
14	MR. THOMAS:
15	I have no further questions, Your Honor.
16	MR. PINNY:
17	I have just a few questions probably to the shock
18	and consternation of most people here.
19	
20	CROSS EXAMINATION
21	BY MR. PINNY:
22	Q Good afternoon, Mr. Kincer, it is now afternoon so
23	I can say that correctly. I wanted to remind
24	everybody here that my role here is neutral, I

24	A Yes, those roads were in the eight to ten

2	Q	So, if one was trying to give the impression
3		to this Commission that Willow Creek is the
4		only road on that notice that was only
5		partiallywas only going to be partially
6		included in this project, would that be
7		correct or incorrect
8	A	Restate it please, I don't want to answer
9	Q	If one was trying to give this Commission the
10		impression that that notice where Willow
11		Creek is mentioned and also these other roads
12		are mentioned that are partiallygoing to
13		have partial completion of water lines, would
14		it be unfair towould it be an unfair
15		statement to say that in that notice that
16		Willow Creek is going to be the only road
17		that is going to have partial construction
18		done on it?
19	A	That would be unfair, yes.
20	Q	And why is that?
21	A	Well, because in realistic those other roads
22		were cut off partly because of the lack of
23		funds, as well as Willow Creek was.
24	Q	And what considerations were taken into

1		account by the District when those roads were
2		judged?
3	Α	Houses, number of houses per mile or number
4		of houses in the length of the line whatever
5		it would take.
6	Q	Has this District tried to treat Mr. Barnette
7		any differently than any of the other
8		individuals that are not included in this
9		project that actually filed petitions with
10		the District to be included?
11	A	No, no, we have not.
12		MR. EDELMAN:
13		That's all I have.
14	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15		Mr. Thomas, any recross?

11	Q	So, Fox Creek Road then is being funded with
12		loan money?

14	Q	Okay. And as you testified in direct
15		examination, the reason it is in the project
16		is because it fit nicely with the project?
17		Those are your words?
18	Α	Yes, I assume that is probably what I said.
19	Q	Now, just to clear up some confusion from Mr.
20		Kincer's testimony, the initial application
21		that was submitted on behalf of South
22		Anderson Water District only had Willow Creek
23		going 1.2 miles; is that correct?
24	A	In the description and in the original cost

1	Q	Mr. Shapiro will tell you that once you answer my
2		question you certainly have a right to explain.
3	Α	Okay. In going through, when we started the
4		process where you were requesting changes and
5		so forth, and having to respond to those
6		questions and so forth, in looking at who was
7		interviewed for the CDBG eligibility, it
8		included those people that lived in that
9		other 6/10 of a mile. And those were
10		prepared by the grant writer who is Brian
11		Kirby. That was not anything that I was
12		involved in, but in order to determine the
13		eligibility of that road they had interviewed
14		everybody down through Mr. Wells, who is the
15		last house on that 6/10 of a mile.
16	Q	That's 1402 Willow Creek Road?
17	A	Could be, I don't know, he is the last one on
18		the right there before you come back over the
19		creek and start the 1.3 miles. So, since
20		they were used in the eligibility, they had
21		to be included in the project.
22	Q	And that modification, if you will, Mr.
23		Taylor, has not upset or deterred the South
24		Anderson Water District from going forward

- with this project, has it?
- 2 A Ate into the contingency money.
- 3 Q By \$28,000?
- 4 A There about, probably, that's the estimate,
- 5 yes. Based--well, that's the estimate based
- on the numbers that were used in the total
- 7 project.
- 8 Q And you will agree with me that that would
- 9 still leave \$140,000 of contingency money
- 10 still available?
- 11 A No.
- 12 Q Why do you disagree with that?
- 13 A The budget numbers that you were looking at
- earlier, that you were displaying, were based
- on the full million dollar CDBG funding
- 16 application which did not get funded to that
- level. So, those monies that are in between
- would have had to come out of the contingency
- money.
- 20 Q Is there a contingency budget in the project
- 21 now Mr. Taylor?
- 22 A There is still some contingency fund, yes.
- 23 Q How much contingency funds are there?
- 24 A Again, we have not redone the budget since

1		the preliminary budget. Once we take bids
2		well, actually, I guess even before we do
3		bids we will have to update the entire
4		estimate on the entire project and present
5		that to Rural Development when we ask for
6		authorization to bid the project.
7	Q	Okay.
8	A	But at this point that has not been done.
9	Q	Okay. But your contingency budget did state
10		\$167,800?
11	Α	Yes, when it started, I think. I will agree
12		with you without going back and looking at
13		the exact numbers.
14	Q	Now, you would agree with Mr. Kincer's
15		testimony on one respect, that is the
16		feasibility criteria consists of three
17		things: One, the density, the number of
18		households per mile; two, the cost of doing
19		the project; and, three, the eligibilityI
20		mean, a sufficient number of low income
21		households to make to become CDBG eligible.
22		Those are the only three criteria that you
23		were concerned with?
24	A	No, not that I would be concerned with. I

1		would also look at how it fits with what the
2		project is doing. You know, if you start
3		and this one is scattered out pretty well
4		already, but therehow it fits in with the
5		rest of the district's facilities and that
6		kind of thing. And often that will get back
7		into a cost consideration also.
8	Q	So, then, you are really changing your answer
9		then, aren't you, Mr. Taylor, from what you
10		told Mr. Edelman and Ray, if you want to
11		follow me I'm on page 49, questions 170
12		through 172. If you look at your testimony
13		there you say, "The selection of the roads in
14		the project that we discussed earlier were a
15		combination of CDBG qualification per
16		household income and for household numbers
17		along each roadway?" Question. Your answer,
18		"And construction costs, yes." Mr. Edelman:
19		"And construction costs along the roadway?
20		Uh-huh, affirmative. Were they the sole
21		considerations? Those three, yes.
22	A	And again
23	Q	Wait a minute, let me finish first. So, are
24		you changing your answer now saying there are

1		other considerations Mr. Taylor?
2	A	As I ended up the other part of it, that it
3		figures out in the cost considerations too,
4		but I mean it is not just a straight cost
5		number necessarily.
6	Q	Well, that's what Mr. Shapiro and I want to
7		know today, what other considerations are
8		there besides density, besides cost and
9		besides low income numbers, what other
10		considerations are there?
11	A	Well, again, how it fits with the rest of the
12		District's facilities and, again, that will
13		get into theit is not just the cost of that
14		road but that may cause other cost in the
15		rest of the facilities. If you can't serve
16		along that road because you don't have enough
17		pressure to serve along that road, then you
18		have to look at the other parts of the
19		system, too.
20	Q	When you say pressure, are you speaking from
21		an engineering standpoint?
22	A	Yes, uh-huh.
23	Q	Okay. Well, let me ask you this, do you have
24		any reason to believe that you wouldn't have

- 1 adequate pressure to complete the remaining
 2 1.3 miles of Willow Creek Road?
- 3 A No, now there is adequate pressure on Willow
- 4 Creek Road.
- 5 Q So, that would not be a consideration then?
- 6 A Correct.
- 7 Q Okay. Any other considerations other than
- 8 the three we have already mentioned, I'm not
- 9 going to repeat those, and hydraulic pressure
- 10 considerations?
- 11 A No, that's--well, obviously, if the District
- what other facilities they have in that area,
- but then again that is cost--a cost figure.
- 14 Q So, that would be a cost figure?
- 15 A Yes.
- 16 Q No other considerations other than those
- four?
- 18 A Not from my standpoint.
- 19 Q Mr. Taylor, have you ever traveled all of
- these roadways, have you taken the time to go
- through all of these roadways, every one of
- 22 them?
- 23 A Yes.
- 24 Q So, you have been down Lick Skillet Road?

- 1 A Yes.
- 2 Q Okay. Would you not agree with me that when
- 3 you travel down Lick Skillet Road today that
- 4 you have got to travel about 1.5 miles before
- 5 you get to the first household?
- 6 A From the Fairview side?
- 7 Q Well, from coming in--I guess you come in off
- 8 of 62, you come in off 62--
- 9 A We are not coming into it from that
- 10 direction, we are coming in to it from
- 11 Fairview.
- 12 Q Okay. You are coming in from Fairview and
- going up?
- 14 A Yes, we are not going all the way across that
- 15 road.
- 16 Q But you are connected to 62, are you not?
- 17 A No. No, it doesn't go all the way across, it
- only goes what, 1.3 miles or so.
- 19 Q And so, you are spending monies on 1.3 miles
- 20 of Lick Skillet Road?
- 21 A I think that is the number, yes.
- 22 Q Now, how many households are you getting on
- 23 Lick Skillet Road? Would eight be correct?
- 24 A Is that--I--

1	Q	You prepared this map, Mr. Taylor,
2	A	I know.
3	Q .	you'd be most familiar with it?
4	Α	Yes, but that's not going to help because it
5		has the wholethere is 74 in that area of
6		those interconnected roads, there are 74
7		potentially, or users that we are
8		anticipating in that area.
9	Q	My question is, if you know the answer, then
10		answer; if you don't, don't. On Lick Skillet
11		Road, the 1.3 miles you say on Lick Skillet Road,
12		how many households are there on that road?
13	A	In the portion that we are serving my
14		recollection is eight to nine, somewhere in
15		that
16	Q	And would you agree with me that of those
17		eight to nine that eight of them are
18		Washington County households?
19	A	Of the original ones when the project was put
20		together there was one house in Anderson
21		County and I think the rest of them are in
22		Washington. And since that time there has
23		been another one built in Anderson County.
24	Q	So, of the cost of this project you are going

24

1 to spend monies for 1.3 miles of roadway but 2 you are only going to serve two Anderson 3 County residents? 4 Α Correct. 5 And you also indicated in the rest of the project 6 that there are three other Washington County 7 facilities that may be served, two residences and one church in that Fairview area? 8 9 Α In that Fairview area there are, yes. 10 0 Now, I have another question about Rice Road. 11 You are going to go down Rice Road as well, 12 correct, as part of the project? 13 Α Correct. 14 Q Okay. And there are not many households you 15 are going to pick up on Rice Road, are there? 16 Α There is about six as I recall, five or six. 17 0 In interrogatories provided to me by Mr. Edelman as part of this record, Mr. Shapiro, 18 you say six. 19 20 Okay. I don't remember exactly how many is 21 on each road, but that sounds correct, in 22 that area. 23 0 Now, let me ask you about Cox Road because

I'm not clear about that either, Mr. Shapiro.

- 1 A Okay.
- 2 Q You said you are going to pick up nine
- 3 households on Cox Road and you verify in your
- 4 answers to my interrogatories that there are
- 5 nine households. Now, is that--are the six
- in Mercer County included in that nine?
- 7 A Yes.
- 8 Q Okay. So, only three Anderson County
- 9 households in the Cox Road project?
- 10 A Correct, there are three between the end of
- the line where we are at now and the county
- 12 line we intend to go to.
- 13 Q Now, I show you these answers of defendant,
- 14 South Anderson Water District, the
- 15 complainant's first set of interrogatories
- 16 and request for production of documents.
- This was provided to me by Mr. Edelman. Did
- 18 you assist Mr. Edelman in answering these?
- 19 A Yes, I did, yes.
- 20 Q Okay. So, you have seen this document?
- 21 A Yes.
- 22 Q Okay, and I'm particularly going to
- interrogatory number ten where I ask about
- each project information regarding the length

II		
1		of water lines to be built along each
2		roadway, the number of customers to be
3		served, the per capita income of residents
4		along each roadway, the total cost of
5		construction. And you provided these
6		figures
7	A	Yes.
8	Q	to Mr. Edelman, is that correct, for each
9		of the 14 projects, is that correct?
10	A	Yes.
11	Q	Now, I took those figures, your figures Mr.
12		Taylor, your figures, and using your figures,
13		Mr. Taylor, I prepared a chart of density and
14		cost per customer, those being two key
15		considerations that you said that you used to
16		determine the feasibility of the project.
17		And what I noted, Mr. Taylor, upon doing that
18		that if you looked at Willow Creek in its
19		entirety, and Mr. Edelman has a copy of this
20		as does theMr. Shapiro. Willow Creek still
21		has a better density, Mr. Taylor, using your
22		numbers, than four of the other projects you
23		propose to do. It has a better density, the
24		entire Willow Creek Road than US Highway 127

1		bypass and Anderson County Drydock State Road
2		44 project, than Rice Road and Fox Creek
3		Road. Using all of Willow Creek, the
4		feasibility criteria that both you and Mr.
5		Kincer say that's what we look at more than
6		anything else
7		MR. EDELMAN:
8		Is there a question here or are we just
9		going to just
10		MR. THOMAS:
11		There is a question.
12		MR. EDELMAN:
13		All right.
14	Q	Would you not agree that based upon your
15		numbers the entire Willow Creek Road has a
16		better density than those four projects?
17	A	With the numbers you used, yes. With the
18		numbers that were used in `98, I'd have to go
19		back and calculate again, because you have
20		used a number for people that are out there
21		now that weren't there in `98 when we put the
22		project together.
23	Q	And in terms of cost per customer that you
24		looked at Willow Creek Road in the entirety,

1		using your numbers that you provided today,
2		that it would be cheaper, be cheaper, for
3		South Anderson Water District to construct
4		water lines along the entire Willow Creek
5		road than three other roads that is proposed
6		to use?
7	A	Again, based on the numbers that you have
8		shown with the 21, which I assumeand,
9		again, I don't know whoI don't know how you
10		derived the 21 number.
11	Q	Well, I used your numbers, to answer your
12		question, I just used your numbers. You
13		indicated that there were 15 households that
14		you were going to use
15	A	Well, again, not on Willow Creek you didn't
16		because the 21 number is not a number I
17		generated.
18	Q	Okay, but
19	A	I don't dispute the rest of them.
20	Q	But let's look at that. If you look on those
21		answers to interrogatories, if you do a
22		complete loop of Willow Creek,
23	A	Okay.
24	Q	you've got 21 meter settings, okay. That's

1 what you used, 21 meter settings. 2 look at --3 Α Oh, okay. 4 0 If you look at what you are going to do on 5 each project, you have got 15. 6 That was based on when I went back out and 7 looked at it again right before--this is where the 21 came from, not the number that 8 9 was in `98. 10 Q Okay, that's the number I used. That's where 11 the 21 came from. 12 Α Okay, I'll go along with that, yes, 13 Those are real numbers. Like I say, I went out and recoun--in January 14 Α 15 recounted the houses that are there now. 16 0 So, my question, my second question to you or next 17 question to you is this. Using your numbers that 18 you provided to me today, would you not agree that 19 if you did Willow Creek in its entirety that it 20 would be a better project than -- from a cost per 21 customer standpoint -- than Burgin Road, Rice Road, 22 Fox Creek Road? 23 Α Assuming your chart is put together 24

correctly, yes, I'd say--and I agree--I

1		
2		assume you got my numbers correctly off of there, in which case I agree with you.
3	Q	I'll be glad to give you as much time
4	A	I understand.
5	Q	as you want make sure that your numbers on
6		this chart match my numbers here.
7	A	I don't dispute that they do. But, I mean,
8		I've still got to qualify what I say because
9		I didn't put those together.
10	Q	But you put the numbers together, you admit
11		that.
12	A	These numbers are my numbers, yes.
13	Q	And you won't dispute that these numbers here
14		are the numbers that I show here?
15	A	I don't dispute that, no.
16	Q	That's all I'm asking.
17		MR. THOMAS:
18		Your Honor, I'd like to introduce this
19		as Applicant's Exhibit 6 under my
20		testimony. This will be Claimant's
21		Exhibit Number 13.
22		MR. EDELMAN:
23		I'm going to object to the introduction
24		of this. I think he had an opportunity

1	to supply the exhibits prior to the
2	hearing date. He hasn't done that, this
3	is the first time we've ever seen this.
4	It is my understanding that those should
5	have been exchanged before hand. I
6	asked him for this information in
7	interrogatories and never got it.
8	MR. THOMAS:
9	Your Honor, may I respond Mr. Shapiro?
10	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
11	Yes, wait just a second, go ahead.
12	MR. EDELMAN:
13	That's it.
14	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15	Go ahead.
16	MR. THOMAS:
17	Your Honor, these numbers strictly came
18	from his, as Mr. Taylor has already
19	indicated, from his information. I
20	didn't have this information, I just
21	basically have taken his information, he
22	had this information. So, I haven't
23	done anything that he hadn't already had
24	knowledge of.

1	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2	Well, I'm going to sustain the
3	objection, but I think in all fairness
4	that if it is based on testimony and
5	evidence in the record that it can be
6	reproduced for purposes of argument.
7	MR. EDELMAN:
8	And I'm notone of the problems with
9	this is that Mr. Taylor has not had a
10	chance to go over the calculations and
11	determine if they are correct. That is
12	one of the problems.
13	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
14	I'm going to sustain the objection, but
15	I think that you can useif it is
16	MR. EDELMAN:
17	I don't have any problem arguing the
18	figures.
19	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20	if it is derived from evidence that is
21	in the record then, obviously, you can
22	use that in making your argument when
23	you prepare your brief. You see the
24	distinction I'm making?

1		MR. THOMAS:
2		I understand Mr. Shapiro.
3	Q	Mr. Taylor, under your numbers again, you
4		still intendit is still the intent of South
5		Anderson Water District to do projects such
6		as Rice Road and Fox Creek Road even though
7		those have considerably lower densities than
8		doing all of Willow Creek Road and at a
9		higher cost?
10	A	Those were in the approved project and that
11		is what we are supposed to do per the
12		funding.
13	Q	So, theso it is your testimony that South
14		Anderson Water District is willing, for
15		instance, Fox Creek Road, to borrow \$77,400
16		for a distance of 4.4 miles and at a cost of
17		\$9,675 as opposed to spending an additional
18		\$51,000 to finish Willow Creek? That's what
19		you intend to do?
20	A	Again, that was in what was in the approved
21		funding. I've not compared them back to what
22		youthe rest of Willow Creek because that
23		wasn't in the funding package. But, yes,
24		that's what we intend to do.

П		
1	Q	Your testimony, Mr. Taylor, is that that is
2		feasible from a distant standpoint to do Fox
3		Creek and Rice Road?
4	A	Again, taking in the wholethe eligibility
5	Q	That's not my question Mr. Taylor, yes, or
6		no?
7		MR. EDELMAN:
8		Can he answer the question?
9		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
10		Wait a minute. What was the question?
11		Repeat your question.
12	Q	Thank you Mr. Shapiro. Your testimony today is
13		that it is feasible from a distance standpoint to
14		do Rice Road and Fox Creek Road?
15	A	In with this project, yes.
16	Q	And your testimony is today that it is
17		feasible from a cost per customer standpoint
18		to do Rice Road and Fox Creek Road?
19	A	In with this project.
20	Q	And your testimony is today that it is
21		feasible for the South Anderson Water
22		District to borrow money to do Fox Creek Road
23		and Rice Road?
24	A	In with this project, yes.

1	Q	And your testimony is today that it is not
2		feasible under the criteria of density per
3		customer, density per mile, excuse me, cost per
4		customer and low income households not to finish
5		Willow Creek Road? That's your testimony?
6	A	It is not feasible to do it on its own and it
7		wasn't included in the original scope of the
8		project.
9	Q	Why isn't it feasible, Mr. Taylor, why isn't
10		it feasible?
11	Α	The funding would have to come from some
12		other entity, they would have to go out and
13		borrow the money from a bank or someone. I
14		mean, we have already tied up the funding
15		from Rural Development and we can't amend the
16		CDBG application to get more grant money.
17	Q	Mr. Taylor, why wouldn't it make more sense
18		if thoseif the only three considerations
19		that you and Mr. Kincer have indicated are
20		density per mile, cost per customer and low
21		income households, why wouldn't it be a
22		better use of the South Anderson Water
23		District dollars to do the Willow Creek Road
24		entirely than Burgin Road. US Highway 127.

1		Anderson County, Rice Road and Fox Creek
2		Road, since the Willow Creek Road in its
3		entirety has better numbers? If those are
4		the only three criteria why
5	A	Had it been put in the original project it
6		would have. You know, with the 21 numbers
7		that is there now versus what was there at
8		the time we put the project together.
9	Q	To move on, Mr. Taylor, there is no dispute
10		that since the initial project you have
11		already modified Willow Creek Road some and
12		gone from 1.2 miles to 1.8 miles.
13	Α	In order to pick up the rest of the
14		residences that were used in the CDBG
15		eligibility. So, those households were
16		actually in the original project in `98
17		because they were counted in the eligibility
18		which was put together, again, by the grant
19		writer and not me.
20	Q	I want to follow up on that point just a
21		minute, Mr. Taylor. Mr. Taylor, there has
22		been some reference made by the attorney for
23		South Anderson Water District about road
24		captains. Are you familiar with that term?

1	Α	Yes.
-		100.

- 2 Q Each of these projects had a road captain; is
- 3 that correct?
- 4 A I'm not sure whether they did or not, I
- 5 wasn't involved in that portion of it.
- 6 Q So, you don't know whether Willow Creek Road
- 7 had a road captain or not?
- 8 A That one, I understand there was a lady that
- 9 was in charge of getting the--the lady that
- 10 turned in the original petition was in charge
- of getting the interviews for CDBG and so
- 12 forth.
- 13 Q Do you know if that, and I'll just use the
- 14 term road captain, do you know if that road
- 15 captain for Willow Creek went up and talked
- 16 to Mr. Barnett?
- 17 A I again was not involved in that portion of
- it, but I don't dispute his word at all that
- 19 she didn't.
- 20 Q Mr. Taylor, you said you have been on Willow
- 21 Creek Road; is that correct?
- 22 A Correct.
- 23 Q And, Mr. Taylor, you would agree that from where
- you are going to stop there is that 1.3 mile

1		incomplete portion that is not going to be served
2		presently?
3	A	Correct.
4	Q	Would you agree with me, Mr. Taylor, that it
5		wouldn't take a whole lot of time for someone
6		to go and visit those households and see
7		whether they would be interested in water or
8		not. We are not talking an inordinate use of
9		time are we?
10	A	Depends on how busy the person was but, no,
11		it wouldn't take that long.
12	Q	I mean, reasonablyit wouldn't take long to
13		go over to those six households and ask them
14		do they want water or not would it, Mr.
15		Taylor, would it?
16	A	No.
L7	Q	Mr. Taylor, I want to talk about the health
18		concerns for a minute because we really
19		haven't touched on that at all during this
20		hearing. And I mentioned that in my
21		complaint as one of the key issues here for
22		Mr. Shapiro and the Commission Staff to
23		consider. In the answers to interrogatories
24		which you have you sent me some information

1		that says that the CDBG application was
2		incorrect and, in fact, that what looked like
3		an I was an L, and indicated that pneumonia
4		bacteria really meant was for Rice Road.
5	Α	That letter is in the response. What we did
6		was pass your information on the grant
7		writer, Brian Kirby, and that was his
8		response. Again, I didn't put that
9		application together so I can't answer for
10	Q	So, you couldn't answer whetherwould you
11		turn to page 46 of the application, it again
12		shows for I, area shows evidence of pneumonia
13		bacteria in water supply, I being the Willow
14		Creek Road project. You couldn't answer that
15		question; is that correct?
16	A	Correct. Again Mr. Kirby is the one that put
17		the CDBG application together for the county
18		and not myself.
19	Q	Mr. Taylor, are you aware, going back to Rice
20		Road again, are you aware that the first two
21		houses on Rice road already have water,
22		access to water from South Anderson Water
23		District?
24	A	I'm assuming you are talking about off the 62

1		side?
2	Q	That's correct.
3	A	If you will look at the map we are not duplicating
4		that service, that is a two inch line that comes
5		off 62 and we are coming off the four inch line on
6		the other side of Salt River.
7	Q	Just a few more questions, Mr. Taylor. Mr.
8		Taylor, you certainly would agree that by
9		stopping at the 1.8 miles on Willow Creek
10		Road that there is going to be some water run
11		off there? You are going to have to, I
12		think, the term you used was install a blow
13		off valve.
L 4	Α	Any dead end line has to have a blow off on
15		the end of it to flush it.
16	Q	And what is thatfrom an engineering
17		standpoint, what does that blow off valve do?
18	A	It's just an outlet on the end of the line so
19		that you can open it up and increase the
20		velocities in the line and scour out the line
21		periodically to keep sediments and so forth
22		from building up in it. Or if there is a
23		leak on the line then you need toin
24		repairing it if you need to blow it off at

1		the end to get the bad water out of it.
2	Q	Okay. Now, if you did a complete loop, and I
3		was just looking at the information you
4		provided me, provided for me, if you do a
5		complete loop on Willow Creek Road, would you
6		still need a blow off valve?
7	A	I probably still would put one down there. I
8		may not put it in that estimate but in a low
9		spot like that where you went back up the
10		hill you would still need one there for leaks
11		and that kind of thing.
12	Q	And, Mr. Taylor, you have indicated that it
13		will cost an additional \$51,725 to complete
14		the loop on Willow Creek?
15		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
16		What did you say it was?
17		MR. THOMAS:
18		\$51,725.03.
19	A	I assume that is the difference in the two
20		numbers from the estimate with what we are
21		proposing to do versus the estimate for the
22		entire loop, it would appear to be about
23		right, but without setting here calculating
24		it out without a calculator

1	Q	And if you look at \$167,800 contingency,
2		there certainly would be moreeven if you
3		want to add in Rice Road and Fox Creek Road
4		and Burgin Road, even to do the projects that
5		you have already stated, there certainly
6		would be enough money in the contingency to
7		complete the loop?
8	A	At this point we don't know. Again, we
9		didn't get total funding and that estimate
10		was prepared in `98 or whatever. Since then
11		we have experienced some cost increases and
12		so forth and that's what that money is there
13		to cover. So, again, without redoing the
14		whole budget, I don't know how much
15		contingency money we have.
16	Q	You could have more since you haven't done
17		the budget, you could have more, correct?
18	A	Could have, I don't anticipate that.
19	Q	You don't know, it could be more or less?
20	A	Yes.
21	Q	But right now the best we can work on is
22		\$167,800?
23	A	Less what the difference in the funding was.
24		We know that that money is not there because

1		we never got anywe never got funded to the
2		full million CDBG.
3	Q	As I understand your testimony, Mr. Taylor, I want
4		to be clear, there is not going toyou are not
5		going to make a loop around Lick Skillet Road, you
6		are not going to attach
7	A	We are not going all the way through to 62,
8		correct. In the future we probably will, that
9		makes a good loop through the southern end of the
10		system, but at this point, no.
11	Q	And the future of this project would be about five
12		to seven years of your next phase, it is going to
13		be about five to seven years out, right?
14	A	That has historically been what it has been
15		over there. My understanding is, though,
16		that Alton Water and Sewer District at this
17		point is finishing up what theirthe service
18		in their district. And if that is the case,
19		then we wouldn't have to wait until next time
20		for eligibility for CDBG, which might speed
21		the process up again, you know, it might or
22		might not.
23		MR. THOMAS:
24		I have no further questions for Mr.

1		Taylor.
2	HEAI	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
3		Before I turn you over to Mr. Pinny, let me just
4		ask you a couple of questions.
5	A	Okay.
6	HEAF	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
7		Well, maybe a few more than a couple, but there
8		has been some mention here about the health
9		report, I guess it was, what significance would
10		that have in a project of this nature where the
11		residents apparently rely upon cisterns for their
12		water supply, cisterns and bottled water for their
13		in case of cisterns they are actually relying
14		upon water, according to the testimony I read,
15		that is hauled in there from, I assume, a water
16		station. Why would that be a significant factor
17		in this kind of a project?
18	Α	In order to qualify on the CDBG and you have
19		to not only show a low to moderate income,
20		you have to show the need. And abatement of
21		health hazards and, also, on Rural
22		Development, that is part of their scoring
23		process too, for funding. You have toit is
24		not just a matter of wanting the water, there

1		has to be a need for it.
2	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
3		I know, but where would there be a problem? I
4		mean, the water, I assume, that they are buying,
5		they are buying it from a water station it is
6		treated water. It may be
7	A	But most people who use cisterns augment that
8		by rainwater and their cisterns may or may
9		not be water tight. There may be actually
10		seepage into them, in a lot of cases there
11		is, in or out, depending on how
12	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
13		So, that would be where the factor would come into
14		play?
15	A	Yes, uh-huh. And, again, I'm not sure where
16		that onethat particular one came from, but
17		if you go out and take samples from cisterns
18		in often cases they are contaminated because
19		they
20	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
21		To rely upon water.
22	A	roof water and so forth that gets into
23		them, too.
24		

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1	HEAI	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		As I understand what your testimony here today,
3		what you are telling the Commission is the reason
4		that thisthere are several reasons why this
5		project didn't include the entire road, but one of
6		the reasons is that when you put the project
7		together in 1998 the section of the road that Mr.
8		Barnett lives on only had three residential
9		structures on it and one of those was vacant; is
10		that right?
11	A	Correct.
12	HEAF	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
13		So, therefore, the densitythere was not a great
14		deal of density in that particular area. When you
15		added the $6/10$ of a mile, how many houses did that
16		add to the road?
L7	A	Four, I think, maybe five.
18	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
L9		Five. So, if you added the 6/10
20	A	Well, again, part of what we had there was
21		already being used in the house count that
22		Mr. Wells and what the road captain was
23		coming in and telling him, user-wise, and so
24		forth, he was already included in that. They

1		had already done the interviews for the low
2		to moderate income and actually had
3		interviewed some of the other ones, too.
4	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
5		But the reason you went back and looked at it, one
6		of the reasons you went back and looked at the
7		6/10 of a mile was you needed to get more
8		apparently, you needed to getfor them to include
9		these people because of their low income?
10	A	Well, at that pointuntil we went back and
11		looked at it I didn't have a list of the
12		houses that they had interviewed. I didn't
13		get that until January.
14	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15		So because it was included in the interviews to
16		qualify for the CDBG that is the reason you went
17		on.
18	A	Yes.
19	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		I understand that.
21	A	The CDBG interviews were portions of that
22		application or the tabulation thereof, not
23		the interviews themselves because they are
24		confidential, but the tabulation of those

1		interviews are part of the CDBG funding
2		application that was advertised in `98.
3	HEAF	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
4		If, in fact, though, the 21I think there are 21
5		houses now along this entire stretch; is that
6		right?
7	A	Correct.
8	HEAF	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
9		Whereas, before there were fewer houses?
10	A	Correct.
11	HEAF	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
12		They added, like, 10 or 11 houses?
13	A	I don't think it was that many, well what we
14		show in the part that we are talking about
15		funding right now is 15 and, so, there has
16		beenand, again, now these are notI guess
17		maybe that is something I need to back up and
18		explain, too. In doing this you don't use
19		total house numbers, very rarely will you get
20		100% participation in a project. There is
21		going to be somebody out there that doesn't
22		want the water, you know, that has got a good
23		well or doesn't want another bill for
24		whatever, you know, some people don't like

24

the taste of city water. So, generally what 1 we use is about 75% to 80% of the house count 2 3 or the petition count. 4 HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO: 5 Well, how many houses are there along the Willow 6 Creek Road expansion area? 7 Well, what I used based on the petitions and the interview, CDBG interview, list was 15 on 8 9 what we are--on the 1.8 we are going to run. HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO: 10 11 All right. And then 15 homes there but you say that--12 13 No, there is more than 15, there is probably 14 --again, I don't know whether all of them 15 signed the petition or not. HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO: 16 17 So, there are 15 homes --18 Α That I use from an economic feasibility and a 19 construction cost estimating standpoint. 20 HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO: 21 That's the number of homes you expect to sign up. 22 Α Right. 23 HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:

Since that time there have been apparently six

1		more homes added?
2	A	Well, again, the 21 number includes the two
3		houses that were occupied, the one that is up
4		there between Mr. Barnett and 62. I don't
5		think anybody is going to move back into that
6		one, so we didn't include it, but that 21
7		number also includes those two that were
8		there back in `98.
9	HEAF	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
LO		If you hadif those people had requested service
L1		and you were applying the feasibility standards
L2		that you have testified about, the three standards
13		that Mr. Thomas has talked about, would that
L 4		entire road have qualified for the project?
L5	Α	Probably. You know, again, I don't know
16		about the income surveys, I don't know how
L7		close they were because that is not
L8		something
19	HEAF	RING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		But if the income survey wasn't sufficient then
21		would you make up the difference with borrowed
22		money?
23	A	It might have been included as Fox Creek was,
24		as a Rural Development only for the rest of

1		the road, yeah.
2	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
3		And Fox Creek is just a rural development, you
4		call that rural development?
5	A	Right. Therein order to qualify for CDBG
6		you have to have 50over 50% low to moderate
7		income houses on that road and it didn't
8		qualify.
9	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
10		I think there is some testimony in the record,
11		too, I suspect already, but do you know how many
12		of the six additional houses on the expansion
13		areabeyond the current expansion area, or the
14		area that is in issue today, how many of those six
15		additional houses are new construction?
16	A	Well, again, at the point when we looked at
17		it there were only three houses, so
18	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
19		I mean, since then?
20	A	I mean, we included six more off of that and
21		two of them, or that one of the three we did
22		not anticipate using, so four of them would
23		be new construction.
24		

1	HEARI	NG OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2	F	Four would be new construction?
3	A (Jh-huh.
4	HEARIN	NG OFFICER SHAPIRO:
5	N	Mr. Pinny?
6	MR. PI	INNY:
7	I	have no questions at this time.
8	HEARIN	IG OFFICER SHAPIRO:
9	P	any redirect?

3		REDIRECT EXAMINATION
4	BY MR.	EDELMAN:
5	Q J	fust so I'm clear, in 1998, Mr. Taylor, this
6	р	roject waswhat actually happened, was there
7	n	otification given, what happened in 1998 to
8	t	rigger the CDBG application?
9	A O	kay. We started looking at the project
0	a	ctually in `95 or whatever, but Altononly
1	0	ne entity in the county or onlya county
2	c	an only have one application or one CDBG
3	р	roject going at a time. Cities within the
4	С	ounty can also apply, so, I mean, they are

1		ineligible. But the county itself can only,
2		Fiscal Court can only have one. So, at that
3		point Alton Water and Sewer District had a
4		project going on so we had to wait until it
5		was getting cleared out before South Anderson
6		was eligible to put in another application or
7		actually the county to put in an application
8		for South Anderson. So, at that point the
9		county contracted with the grant writer to
10		prepare the application. We put together the
11		petitions and so forth that had been
12		submitted to the district. The CDBG
13		application was prepared by Mr. Kirby. As
14		part of that application process, you have to
15		have public meetings and that is what
16		occurred in `98 was the public meeting to
17		discuss the scope of the project as proposed
18		in `98.
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		Is that the public meeting that you said
21		you had in `98, was that the meeting
22		that the notice that has been
23	A	Not the big picture notice, no.
24	0	Tim doing to hand you a document I showed Mr

11		
1		Thomas and we discussed earlier with Mr.
2		Barnett which wasone of the documents is
3		the Certification of Don White as Editor of
4		the Anderson News that was published in the
5		August 5, 1998, Anderson News; is that
6		correct?
7	A	Correct.
8	Q	And the other is a copy of the notification
9		that went to all interested citizens of
10		Anderson County regarding CDBG application;
11		is that correct?
12	A	Repeat please.
13	Q	The second is the notice that was published
14		in the newspaper that went to all interested
15		Anderson County citizens advising them of
16		this CDBG application process; is that
17		correct?
18	A	Correct.
19	Q	And what else did that application what else
20		did that notification advise all interested
21		citizens of Anderson County of at the bottom?
22	Α	A copy of the CDBG application will be on
23		file at the County Judge-Executive's Office
24		for citizen review and comment during regular

1		American I and a second
2		business hours from August 18 through August 25, 1998. Comments on the proposed
3		application may be submitted to the attention
4		of the County Judge-Executive until August
5		28, 1998.
6	Q	Did it contemplate a public hearing being
7		held?
8	A	Yes.
9	Q	And did it indicate a public hearing being
10		held within the context of the notice?
I 1 ····	A	The notice indicates the county will hold a
12		public hearing prior to submission of any
13		application. A public hearing will be held
14		on August 18, 1998, at sixor five p.m., I
15		can't tell for sure which, at the Anderson
L6		County Courthouse.
L 7		MR. EDELMAN:
L8		If there is no objection I'd like to
L9		introduce that as Defendant's Exhibit
20		next numerical, four maybe; is that
21		right?
22		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
23		Is this the same notice that was
24		attached to the answer?

1		MR. EDELMAN:
2		Yes, sir.
3		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
4		Any objection?
5		MR. THOMAS:
6		No objection.
7		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
8		So ordered.
9		(EXHIBIT SO MARKED: Defendant Exhibit No 4)
10	Q	Now, when that notice ran in the paper, Mr.
11		Taylor, what had preceded it in terms of
12		applications being filed, interviews having taken
13		place, just what actually had occurred prior to
14		that notification?
15	A	Prior to that on the CDBG application there
16		would have been a pre-application submitted
17		to the Department of Local Government that
18		would briefly outline the project's
19		intentions and so forth. Then the interviews
20		would have been conducted to determine
21		eligibility on the different roads and then
22		the writer would put together the
23		application.
24	Q	A lot of talk about what a reasonable person

1		would do in this hearing earlier, especially
2		regarding the questions of Mr. Kincer that
3		you have an opinion. If a person was
4		interested in waterin a water project, do
5		you have an opinion on as to whether a
6		reasonable person if they would read that
7		whether they would attend such a meeting?
8	Α	If they had not had contact before, I would
9		think that they would contact someone to
10		insure that they were involved. That was the
11		reason for the people that showed up at the
12		other public meeting.
13	Q	How many water projects have you been
14		involved in?
15	A	Several differentthis is the second major
16		expansion with South Anderson, but I also
17		deal with several other water districts and
18		cities.
19	Q	Does talk about water spread pretty rapidly
20		in your experience?
21	A	Usually, we don't have to do a whole lot of
22		public notices or a whole lot of
23		notifications, that is pretty well taken care
24		of by the individuals wanting water.

1	Q	Does it surprise you that Mr. Barnett, and he
2		testified today the first he heard that his
3		portion of the road was not involved in the
4		project was June of 1999, does that surprise
5		you?
6	A	It would surprise me. I would have thought
7		that by talking with his neighbors and so
8		forth, he would have realized that they were
9		involved in the water project and he wasn't.
10		Again, that is
11	Q	Let's talk about some other roads. Are there
12		other roads that were in a similar state as
13		Aaron-Barnett Road; that is, a judgement had
14		to be made pursuant to these factors that
15		only a portion of the road be included in the
16		project?
17	Α	Yes, several of the roads that are in the
18		project we're not doing the entire road.
19	Q	Are there roads that are in from a density
20		standpoint and a construction cost
21		standpoint, are there roads that if there
22		were contingency funds available that would
23		be taken before Aaron-Barnett Road?
24	A	Yes.

1	Q	Well, could you give the Commission an idea
2		of which roads they might be?
3	Α	If you will look on the public notice that
4		was run in the paper there are
5	Q	Let me get you a copy.
6	Α	In order to speed the process, if there are
7		any contingency funds left at the end of the
8		initial scope of the project, Rural
9		Development likes for you to include in this
10		notice, which is for environmental purposes,
11		additional roads that would be run with
12		contingency monies so that the environmental
13		portion of their work can be done on those at
14		the same time and won't have to go back
15		through the process again when you get to the
16		end of the original scope of the project.
17		So, they ask you to add additional roads and
18		in this case we added the six roads listed in
19		the notice, Dawson Ferry Road, Bear Creek
20		Road, Dennis Road, Ashby Road, Burke Road and
21		Mays Branch Leathers Road. Under the normal
22		scenario those would be the ones that would
23		be added next.
24	Q	Now, so there is not any misunderstanding,

1		those were based upon 1998 criteria; is that
2		correct?
3	A	Correct.
4	Q	Not 1999-2000 criteria which we have heard a
5		lot of talk about today?
6	A	Those were roads that the district had been
7		approached by people on those roads about
8		getting water.
9	Q	If the Commission were to order the district
10		to include Mr. Barnett and his portion of the
11		1.3 portion or the western part of Aaron-
12		Barnett Road, where would the funding come
13		from?
14	A	I guess depending on how the order was
15		worded, I mean, if it were intended to come
16		out of the contingency funds, if there were
17		contingency monies left, then I guess that is
18		where it would come from. But, again, if it
19		were to be included as part of the initial
20		project I think you would have to go out and
21		borrow additional money to do it, some other
22		source.
23	Q	Could that affect the rate structure?
24	A	It would some, I mean, it would be additional

1		loan that would have to be paid back. The
2		way it is set up, I mean, it would be spread
3		over everybody.
4	Q	Would it be equitable, in your opinion as an
5		engineer who has been involved in these
6		projects, for the Commission to order that
7		Mr. Barnett be takenthe Aaron-Barnett Road
8		be included to the exclusion of these other
9		eight or nine roads?
10	A	I don't think so.
11	Q	Are they pretty much on a similar setting as
12		he is?
13	A	Yes, I think so. I mean, I haven't gone back
14		out and checked those again, a couple of them
15		we went straight off the petitions and I
16		didn't go look at them because they weren't
17		in the original funding package.
18	Q	Were there roads you actually got petitions
19		on that you had to turn down?
20	Α	Yes.
21	Q	Some of those roads werewhich ones were
22		they?
23	A	Again, part of Ashby Road, we went out so far
24		and stopped where it got sparsely populated

1		again. Sea Road that goes from Fairview Road
2		overunder Bluegrass Parkwaywell, I guess
3		it actually goes over Bluegrass Parkway. We
4		didn't include it because of the cost of
5		going across the Parkway.
6	Q	These contingency funds that we talked about,
7		how does that work when you make your
8		application with Rural Development? Is it a
9		requirement that so much of the money be held
10		in contingency? Maybe you could explain to
11		the Commission exactly how that works?
12	A	Well, you go through and figure out what the
13		construction cost estimate is, then a lot of
14		the other numbers are based on percentages of
15		that, engineering fee, inspection fee, legal
16		fees and so forth. There ismost of the
17		contracts that have involved Rural
18		Development have a percentage you get paid on
19		of the construction. I guess in the legal
20		fees it is percentage of the entire project.
21		Then after you develop that cost estimate,
22		depending on who the engineer is, they will
23		either put the contingency in the
24		construction funds or they will put it as a

1		line item. Some funding agencies don't like
2		to really add percentages on to it, they add
3		it at the end, depends on who is doing it.
4		But you never go to construction at the same
5		time that you put the things together so
6		there is always some change from that
7		standpoint. And then, again, it is, you
8		know, when you put the application together
9		it is preliminary.
10	Q	You're not going to argue that in your preliminary
11		engineering report, that was prepared some time in
12		1998
13	A	Correct.
14	Q	that you preliminarily put in the number
15		\$167,816 of contingency fund?
16	Α	Without thumbing back and finding the
17		application, if that came off the preliminary
18		engineer's report, that's the correct number.
19	Q	You also testified that was based upon a 100%
20		CDBG grant of funding of \$1,000,000?
21	Α	Correct.
22	Q	And there was only how much funding that
23		occurred?
24	Α	Nine hundred forty-three thousand or nine

1		hundred sixty-three thousand, somewhere in
2		that area.
3	Q	Nine hundred sixty I think is pretty close to
4		being accurate, so there isthat would reduce
5		that contingency fund about \$40,000 wouldn't it?
6	A	Yes.
7	Q	Since 1998, what has your experience been
8		with bidding projects relative to the cost of
9		pipe and cost of construction over the last
10		six months to one year?
11	A	If you have noticed the, and I'm sure you all
12		have, the cost of gasoline in the last little
13		bit, that has kind of a dual effect on water
14		line construction in that PVC pipe prices
15		having the same base material will kind of
16		mirror the cost of gasoline. It fluctuates
17		about as quickly as the gasoline will. Also,
18		thatthen, again, the contractors equipment
19		and so forth, fuel cost for that has gone up
20		as well as everything else. So
21	Q	Could those costs very easily eat into a 120
22		of \$125,000 contingency fund?
23	A	Very quickly.
24	Q	To the extent of what?

1		
1 2	A	In that size project it could get well into half of it, at least, I would think. And
3		then again, you know, that is also there to
4		cover any other things like the extension of
5		the other 6/10. So, until we put the whole
6		project together there is a number of other
7		items that could eat into it.
8	Q	So, to sit here and say to the Commission
9		that there is going to be a contingency fund
10		available would just be pie in the sky at
11		this point in time; is that correct?
12	A	Correct.
13	Q	You couldn't do it with any certainty?
14	A	Not to nearly that dollar figure, no. I
15		think there is probably some contingency
16		money left but not nearly that figure.
17	Q	In 19and I just have a couple of last questions
18		here. When the project was scooped out and put
19		together and the advertisements were put in the
20		paper, who was predominantly, after all of the
21		information was gathered, who predominantly was in
22		charge of putting the project together and making
23		it work?
24	A	Well, I would have been the one that did the

1		economic feasibility as far as pay back on
2		the loans and that kind of thing.
3	Q	Was there any consideration, other than pure
4		what is going to make this project go
5		consideration, given to exclude Mr. Barnett's
6		portion of Aaron-Barnett Road on your behalf,
7		or any other road?
8	A	Not that I'm aware of. Certainly, I had no
9		other influences and, to my knowledge, no one
10		else did either.
11	Q	Would it have been prudent from an
12		engineering standpoint or from the district's
13		standpoint to have included Mr. Barnett's
14		road as the facts stood in 1998 when these
15		surveys and the project was scooped out,
16		would it have been prudent to have included
17		his portion of the road in the project?
18	A	No.
19	Q	Under any scenario, Mr. Taylor, as you know
20		the facts would be in 1998
21	A	Not as I know the facts to be, no.
22		MR. EDELMAN:
23		That's all I have.
24		

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1	HEAR	ING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		Anything else?
3	MR.	THOMAS:
4		Yes, I have several questions, Mr. Shapiro.
5		
6		RECROSS EXAMINATION
7	BY M	R. THOMAS:
8	Q	Mr. Taylor, there is still one nagging question
9		that I have and I can't seem to get an answer from
10		Mr. Kincer nor you, so let me ask this question
11		one more time. Why wasn't Mr. Barnett contacted
12		by either the road captain or by Mr. Kirby or by
13		someone? Why wasn't he conif you are going down
14		Willow Creek Road why wasn't he at least
15		contacted?
16	A	I would assume that, again, I wasn't in
17		charge of making any of the contacts but
18		whoever theyou know, Mr. Kirby wouldn't
19		havehe didn't go out there and go door to
20		door. Whoever was doing the CDBG interviews
21		got to that point andwell, even at that
22		point we would have preliminarily scooped the
23		thing out to where that last part of the road
24		wouldn't have been included because of the

1		house count. The house count would have been
2		done beforehand.
3	Q	Well, did you scope it out, using your term,
4		did you scope it out, Mr. Taylor, to include
5		1.2 miles or to include 1.8 miles?
6	A	What we did was went out and counted the
7		houses along the entire length of the road
8		and took intervals of, you know, however many
9		were in this section and the next section and
10		so forth, compared that back to the petition
11		that we had on file from that road and it
12		said 1.2 miles, the petition did. So, that
13		is where the 1.2 came from.
14	Q	But, apparently, according to your testimony
15		today, your testimony today, apparently, at
16		some point even though you scooped it out to
17		1.2 miles somebody, someone working for Mr.
18		Kirby, I gather, went farther than that and
19		did 1.8 miles. And my question is if they
20		went further than 1.2 miles and did 1.8
21		miles, then why not go the rest of the way
22		and do everybody else on Willow Creek Road?
23	A	Because they weren't included in the eligibility.
24	Q	If Mr. Barnett did not know, Mr. Taylor,

1		about water being built because he wasn't
2		contacted, then why would he have attended
3		the August meeting? He didn't know anything
4		about it, if you don't know anything about it
5		why would he have attended it?
6	A	It would have been hard to do, wouldn't it?
7	Q	Right. Your answer is that if he had not
8		been contacted before then he should have
9		appeared, but if he doesn't know anything
10		about it how can he appear?
11	A	That's the reason we ran the notice in the
12		paper.
13	Q	You know, Mr. Taylor, I somewhat anticipated
14		Mr. Edelman's question about your contingency
15		plan and so, therefore, I asked the question
16		in my interrogatory to give me information on
17		these contingency roads. I asked about
18		Dawson Ferry Road, Bear Creek Road, Dennis
19		Road, Ashby Road, off of state road 248,
20		Burke Road and Mays Branch Leather Road, I
21		had problems with these roads. And your
22		response to me was, well, we haven't done a
23		feasibility study on those roads; is that not
24		correct?

1	A	Correct.
2	Q	Okay. But you are going to testify before
3		the Commission today that if you had
4		contingency monies left over you would do
5		those roads not knowing their feasibility, as
6		we have already determined what that is, as
7		opposed to Willow Creek Road who, using your
8		own numbers, we have indicated will be in the
9		top ten, will be in the top ten of the
10		project if they were done today.
11	Α	I don't know about the top ten, I'd have to
12		look at that. But anybut againfrom an
13		economic feasibility standpoint, you would
14		not be lookingif you were using contingency
15		funds there would be no more borrowed money.
16		So, from the economic standpoint there is not
17		that is the reason we haven't done an
18		economic feasibility on it at this point
19		because there is not one to be done.
20	Q	But wouldn't the Commission be more prudent
21		in saying that if there are contingency funds
22		left over, taking what is known, and they
23		know what the feasibility of the entire
24		section of Willow Creek Road is, wouldn't the

- 1	l		
	1		Commission be prudent in saying that road
	2		ought to be done first as opposed to doing
	3		Dawson Ferry Road or Bear Creek Road where we
	4		don't know what the feasibility is? Wouldn't
	5		that be a more prudent approach to take Mr.
	6		Taylor?
	7	A	I hesitate to answer for the Commission but,
	8		again, those roads were only put in there
	9		because of being approached by the people on
	10		those roads for water prior to that point.
	11		And if we had monies left over at the end
	12		those would be the ones we would look at.
	13	Q	I'm not going to belabor the point, the point
	14		is
	15	A	And it may be that, you know, that is listed
	16		one through six or whatever, it may be six
	17		would be done before one, I don't know.
	18	Q	The point is that as we speak here today at this
	19		hearing we don't know what the feasibility is of
	20		those contingency roads?
	21	A	Correct.
	22	Q	Okay. Now, Mr. Edelman asked you a fair
	23		question. He asked you would it be prudent,
	24		was his term, to stop construction of Burgin

1		Road, US Highway 27, these other roads that
2		have worse numbers than Willow Creek Road in
3		its entirety. And your response to him was I
4		don't think that would be prudent to stop
5		construction of these other project roads.
6		And my question to you, Mr. Taylor, is that
7		ifafter you have testified today the
8		Commission's only concern is getting the most
9		bang for its buck, why wouldn't it be more
10		prudent to do Willow Creek Road in its
11		entirety than those other roads, using your
12		numbers?
13	A	One reason would be that we would have to go back
14		and redo the applications and so forth, which
15		would slow the process down substantially. The
16		other thing is, you know, that was based on what
17		was there in `98 when the application was put
18		together. If you went back, you know, each time
19		in the interim between the time you submit an
20		application and the point where you get to
21		construction, you would never get anything done.
22		You would be continually going back and changing
23		what you did.
24	Q	Mr. Taylor, I thought you might say that.

1		testimony back on February 3 and today, it would
2		be that it wouldn't hurt the Rural Development
3		application at all? You still would get the
4		money.
5	Α	Other than slowing it down.
6	Q	Okay.
7	A	Now, again, if you went somewhere else for the
8		funding and the funding was available.
9		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
١0		Well, that was my question. I didn't
11		fully understand that when I read it.
12		I'm glad that Mr. Thomas has brought it
13		up. If, for example, it was decided at
L 4		this point toor that you wanted to
15		change the project for whatever reason,
16		whether it has something to do with Mr.
17		Barnett or not. Let's say you were
18		awarded a grant, you were awarded the
19		and you were given the money or you are
20		told the money is there, is available
21		for the loan, as the matter now stands I
22		guess the application defines what the
23		project is going to be; is that right?

Correct.

24

A

1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		So, when that grant is awarded, when
3		that loan is authorized without anything
4		further you have to go by whatever the
5		you have to build the project according
6		to the application?
7	A	Correct.
8		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
9		Now, if you decide you don't want to
10		build the project according to the
11		application but you want to modify the
12		project, what is the process then?
13	A	Pardon?
14		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15		You got the money, you can't use it,
16		right? You have got the money but you
17		can't use it because you are modifying
18		your plans?
19	A	That money is allocated for specific
20		construction and if you change it then you
21		have to go back in and modify the
22		application. And the CDBG stand, from their
23		money, you would have to go back and start
24		the eligibility process again and interview

1		those people. I don't know that you
2		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
3		Well, let's say you have the information
4		you couldyou have all that information
5		you resubmit your application then?
6	A	You would submit an amendment to it.
7		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
8		An amendment?
9	A	If that'swell, even if you were going to a
10		different funding source you would still have
11		to amend your application to those agencies
12		to reflect the amended
13		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
14		Now, what do you mean by a different
15		funding source?
16	Α	The CDBG money comes from the well, actually
17		it comes from federal HUD but it is channeled
18		through the Kentucky Department of Local
19		Government.
20		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
21		So, you go tofor this project you are
22		going through the Department of Local
23		Government?
24	Δ	Right

1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		The Kentucky Department of Local
3		Government, number one.
4	A	Right.
5		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
6		Half the money or approximately half,
7		and you go into
8	A	Well, in this case, they have already told us
9		that is the most that they are going to give
10		us so
11		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
12		But that's who you are going to for that
13		money?
14	A	Uh-huh.
15		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
16		And you are going to Farmers Home?
17	A	Right. Well, it is Rural Development now, it
18		used to be the old Farmers Home.
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		Old Farmers Home, Rural Development, for
21		the loan?
22	A	Right.
23		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
24		Okay. Now, when you say go to other

1		sources, what are you talking about, I
2		don't follow you?
3	A	Well, you could go to the local bank or you
4		could go to private bond issues or whatever.
5		There are otherbut you would still have to
6		go back as long as those other agencies were
7		tied into the project you would still have to
8		meet their criteria for anything that you
9		added to it.
10		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
11		So, if you were going to look at the
12		local bank for funding rather than to
13		Rural Development
14	A	Uh-huh.
15		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
16		you would still have to go back to
17		CDBG, right?
18	A	Yes, and show what you
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		To show that you are still meeting their
21		criteria in conjunction with
22	A	Uh-huh.
23		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
24		In essence, you are getting two separate

1		authorizations?
2	A	Correct.
3		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
4		One from CDBG and you are getting one
5		from Rural Development.
6	A	Rural Development.
7		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
8		And then you would be just substituting
9		Rural Development for the Anderson
LO		County Bank, I guess.
11	Α	Yes, or juston the funding lines you would
12		add an extra line there and indicate where it
13		is coming from. Then you would have to go
14		back and reflect that back through the
15		economic feasibility and that kind of thing.
16		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
17		Now, are theis itso the CDBG money,
18		that applies to the entire project even
19		though it is only going to be funding a
20		portion of it, right?
21	A	Well, CDBG is a little bit different. The
22		roads like Fox Creek we have to show how that
23		is reflected in the project but it doesn't
24		have to meet the same standards as the CDBG.

1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		Well, let's assume, then, that instead
3		of going backwell, let's assume, then,
4		that you are going to use theyou want
5		to use the CDBG money that you already
6		have but you have some other projects
7		out there or other portions of this
8		overall project which you are not going
9		to be using CDBG money and you decide to
10		modify those alone, I think one of the
11		roads like Fox Creek is not using any
12		CDBG money?
13	A	Right.
14		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
15		So, you decide to eliminate Fox Creek
16		and you will substitute Willow Creek?
17	A	CDBG really doesn't care what you do with Fox
18		Creek because it wasn't eligible for their
19		funding to begin with nor was it figured into
20		their eligibility criteria.
21		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
22		So, if you decide that, for example, you
23		are not goingyou are going to
24		eliminate Fox Creek, you would not have

1		to go back to CDBG?
2	Α	Correct.
3		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
4		You would just have to go back to
5		Farmers Home and say, look, we don't
6		want to do Fox Creek we want to do some
7		other road, what is that one you have?
8		MR. EDELMAN:
9		Lick Skillet Road.
10		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
11		Lick Skillet Road from top to bottom.
12		And we decided to do Lick Skillet Road
13		in its entirety and that we are going to
14		do away with Fox Creek, you would have
15		to get approval from Farmers Home,
16		right?
17	Α	Correct.
18		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
19		So, you would have to resubmit your
20		application to Farmers Home but you
21		would not have to do anything to CDBG
22		with theas far as the application of
23		CDBG?
24	Δ	Correct.

1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		Right now if you were going to one of
3		the roads where you were going to
4		eliminate one of the roads where you had
5		both CDBG money and Rural Development
6		money like Willow Creek, then you have
7		to go back to both agencies?
8	Α	Correct.
9		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
10		Okay. Now, what wouldat this point so
11		what you are sayingis it what you are
12		saying in your testimony that if you
13		decide to go back, if you decide to
14		modify your application so that your
15		ownyou have to go back to Rural
16		Development, you don't know whether or
17		not youfunds would be available at
18		this time?
19	A	Well, backing up to the CDBG project
20		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
21		Well, let's talk about Rural
22		Development?
23	A	Well, but it's going to affect where you go
24		with the rest of it. The CDBG grant

1		agreement that the county has with Local
2		Government stipulates a time frame that it is
3		supposed to be spent in. Okay? That is for
4		the whole project, it's notwell, the whole
5		project excluding Fox Creek. So, if we added
6		something that was going to affect the Rural
7		Development part that would push it back
8		then, in effect, we would be pushing back the
9		CDBG portion because we could not do one
10		without the other.
11		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
12		So, you would have to get an extension
13		from then as well?
14	Α	Yes.
15		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
16		And when you go to get the extension you
17		are notare youyou are not guaranteed
18		that the money will be there?
19	A	Correct.
20		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
21		So, that's why you talk about
22		jeopardying the money,
23	A	Correct.
24		

1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		because if you go to ask for anything
3		that is going to change the current
4		conditions, there is a chance that you
5		might not get the money?
6	Α	Correct.
7		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
8		Now, let me ask you about the entire
9		project. As I understand from what you
10		told us today, you have been the
11		engineer on several of these projects
12		for South Anderson; is that right?
13	Α	This is the second major expansion for them.
14		I was engineer on Phase 4 as well as this
15		one.
16		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
17		Okay, just Phase 4 and Phase 5, and I
18		assume that they are probably looking at
19		a Phase 6 somewhere down the road?
20	A	Correct.
21		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
22		Becauseand when they start thinking
23		about a project, according to your
24		testimony and Mr. Kincer's testimony,

1		they look at their records and they look
2		to see who has filed, I think you said,
3		petitions for water
4	A	Correct.
5		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
6		and just try to determine where the
7		need is I assume; is that right?
8	A	Yes.
9		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
10		Okay. Nothing is filed at that point,
11		you just simply lookdo they consult
12		with you at that point?
13	Α	Generally we startthey will consult with us
14		and we go out and, like I say, drive the
15		roads and confirm that the petitions are
16		correct as far as generally the number of
17		users. Generally, you will find that there
18		are more mileage
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		Well, the question is are they
21		consulting with you?
22	A	Yes.
23		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
24		And then you and they in some sort of

1		collaborative effort put together a
2		preliminary plan of some sort. It is
3		nothing official but you get some idea
4		of where you want to go with your next
5		phase?
6	Α	Correct.
7		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
8		And then you go out as the engineer and
9		you do some more detail work and then
10		is that right?
11	A	Correct.
12		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
13		And then you come back and what do you
14		do at that point?
15	Α	Generally, they will have a list of roads
16		with petitions and then I will come back in
17		and I'll say, Sea Road goes under Bluegrass
18		Parkway, we would have to bore the Parkway,
19		that is, you know, that's a significant cost
20		item.
21		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
22		So you sit down and you try to put a
23		package together?
24	a	Yes.

1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		Just a rough manner, I assume?
3	A	Yes.
4		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
5		Nothing detailed at that point; is that
6		right?
7	A	Correct.
8	:	HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
9		After you do that, what do you do? Is
10		that when you put together the
11		application?
12	A	Then you would start the application process
13		because you would have to determine which of
14		those roads, then, were eligible for CDBG and
15		which weren't if you are going for CDBG
16		funding.
17		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
18		So, then you put an application
19		together. When do you give notice of
20		what you are doing to the public, the
21		first notice?
22	A	The notice generally isn't given until the
23		used to be there was two public hearings
24		required by CDBG but now there is only the

1		one. Usually, that is at the point where the
2		application has been put together, pretty
3		much.
4		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
5		It's put together but not filed?
6	A	But not filed.
7		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
8		Do you have any hearings with reference
9		to the loan application?
10	A	You have a public meeting in there somewhere,
11		again, but I think it was at the endbut not
12		prior to submission of the application
13		necessarily. There is no requirement that
14		you do.
15		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
16		Rural Development doesn't require that?
17	A	Not prior to the submission of the
18		application.
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		So, the notice that you were talking
21		about in your testimony today, this
22		afternoon, the last notice that has been
23		introduced as Exhibitthat's
24		Defendant's Exhibit 4, is that the

1		notice that is given when the
2		application has been prepared but has
3		not been filed?
4	Α	Correct.
5		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
6		And that is notice of a hearing of some
7		sort to, I guess, get information?
8	A	Well, to getsolicit public input into the
9		application, is it what the people of
10		Anderson County wants to submit on or do they
11		want to submit on another section of road or
12		do they want to submit on the park?
13		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
14		Okay. So, is it at that meeting that
15		you deciderather is it at that meeting
16		that you discuss for the first time with
17		the public what the Water District is
18		contemplating?
19	Α	Generally that is the first meeting that is
20		discussed.
21		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
22		And you solicit comments from the public
23		and I assume that there are times when
24		you take those comments and maybe change

1		t1	ne application to reflect some changes
2		i	n attitudes as a result of the meeting,
3		· Wo	ould that be a fair statement?
4	Α	Yes.	
5		HEARIN	G OFFICER SHAPIRO:
6		S	o its notit is after that meeting
7		t:	hat the final decision is made on what
8		t	he application is going to be for, the
9		s	cope of the project?
10	Α	Yes.	
11		HEARIN	G OFFICER SHAPIRO:
12		A	nd it's then that the application is
13		s	ubmitted?
14	Α	Yes.	
15		HEARIN	G OFFICER SHAPIRO:
16		0	kay. Now, after the application is
17		s	ubmitted you wait for its approval by
18		b	oth agencies?
19	A	Yes.	
20		HEARIN	G OFFICER SHAPIRO:
21		I	n this case, of course, the Fiscal
22		C	ourt has to submit the one to CDBG?
23	A	Yes.	
24			

1		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
2		The Water District is not getting the
3		money, the Fiscal Court is getting the
4		money and they are giving it to the
5		Water District?
6	A	Correct.
7		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
8		Now, after those applications are
9		approved and you are advised how much
10		money you can receive, is that when you
11		publish notice of the second meeting?
12	A	The one that is in the other exhibit?
13		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
14		Yes.
15	Α	That meeting comes out of the Rural Development
16		requirements on their application process which
17		yes, it is not normally done until after they have

20		Now, whowhen is thatis that meeting
21		held before or after the application is
22		approved?
23	A	It can be held either time in that it's tied
24		to the environmental aspects which have to be

2		ofwell, which I guess really is their
3		approval of it, is the letter of conditions.
4		But it could be done before the application

9		Is that something that you as an

16		About \$60,000?
17	A	Yes. And again I may beuntil we put a pencil to
18		it, that's just
19		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
20		Speculation?
21	A	Uh-huh. And even at that point until we bid
22		it, it is still only speculation.
23		HEARING OFFICER SHAPIRO:
24		What else have you got?

4			EXAMINATION
5		By Mr	. <u>Edelman</u> :
6	1	Q	Would you state your name for the record,
7			please?
8		A	Kenneth Dale Taylor.
9	2	Q	Do you mind if I call you Ken?
10		A	That would be preferred.
11	3	Q	Ken, what is your occupation?
12		А	I'm a civil engineer.
13	4	Q	And who are you employed by?
14		А	The firm's name is Kenvirons,
15			K-E-N-V-I-R-O-N-S, Inc.
16	5	Q	And that's in Frankfort, Kentucky?
17		А	Frankfort.
18	6	Q	And you live in Woodford County, though?
19		A	Yes.
20	7	Q	Okay. And you've been doing engineering
21			work, or your firm has been doing
22			engineering work, of which you've been
23			the principal, I guess, resident engineer
24			doing the work since when, how long?
25		A	For South Anderson?

1	8	Q	Yes, sir.
2		A	Since 1990.
3	9	Q	And in the course of that you've been
4			through how many projects? Two?

3			take it the engineer really does a lot of
4			the grunt and leg work in terms of
5			putting a project together, along with
6			others?

9			that type of thing, initial feasibility.
10	14	Q	Let's talk about phase five, and talk
11			about how it came to be basically. Can
12			you give the Commission some background
13			on the evolution of what phase five was
14			to begin with, and what it has evolved

19			instructed us to start looking at the

14			Willow Creek Road, 1/9/98 rewritten, and
15			there are nine names on there. Is that
16			the type of document you're talking
17			about?
18		A	Yes, it is.
19	17	Q	And are those generally people listed on
20			there with their address? And that's
21			rewritten from a list where it looks like
22			people have written their own names.

8	90	Q	So there are others within the water
9			district boundaries that are in a very
10			similar situation
11		А	Uh-huh (affirmative).
12	91	Q	to the complainant here?
13		A	Yeah. Might want to clarify on Cox Road.
14			We are going to go actually to the county
15			line on Cox Road, to the Mercer County
16			line. There are some residents over in
17			Mercer County that are between the county
18			line and the Bluegrass Parkway that may
19			come to that point and pick that line up
20			and take it on to their property you
21			know, serve them, but the district is
22			only going to the county line on that.
23	92	Q	As part of your engineering services,
24			Ken, you performed, I guess, for the
25			grant application and for other purposes

1			what's known as a preliminary engineering
2			report
3		A	Correct.
4	93	Q	did you not?
5		A	Yes.
6	94	Q	I'm going to hand you a copy of the
7			document dated September 1998, that I
8			believe bears your signature on the
9			inside cover page.
10		А	Yes, that's my signature and stamp.
11	95	Q	Okay. Without getting into all the
12			details, and I'll let you briefly
13			summarize what is contained within a
14			preliminary engineering report, but you
15			wouldn't have any objection to making
16			that Exhibit 2 to your deposition, would
17			you?
18		А	Certainly not.
19			(REPORTER MARKS EXHIBIT NO. 2,
20			PRELIMINARY ENGINEERING REPORT DATED
21			SEPTEMBER 1998, FOR PURPOSES OF
22			IDENTIFICATION AND THE SAME IS ATTACHED
23			HERETO)
24	96	Q	What does a preliminary engineering
25			report, and what does this preliminary

1			engineering report basically discuss?
2] [A	Okay. The preliminary engineering report
3			is one of the items on the Rural
4			Development application checklist, and
5			you go through a brief history of the
6			or a brief discussion of the existing
7			facilities of the water district. Then
8			you go through a description of the
9			proposed project, looking at the
10			different cost elements of it, generate a
11			project estimate, cost estimate for the
12			project, look into the need for the
13			project, and then also go into looking at
14			the rates and that type thing to come up
15			with a funding scenario which the project
16			will support.
17	97	Q	Just for the Commission's benefit they
18			may not read through this entire
19			document, but just some of the numbers on
20			construction. What was involved, total
21			amount of the project?
22		A	The total funding that was applied for or
23			committed to by the district was
24			\$2,205,830.
25	98	Q	And how was that generally broken down,

1			Ken?
2		А	Okay. Construction cost estimate was
3			1,678,000. Contingency I'm rounding
4			them off rather than nickels and dimes.
5			Contingency of 168,000; engineering,
6			basic engineering services, 145;
7			construction inspection of 85,000. Other
8			engineering, which would include
9			archaeological surveying and preliminary
10			engineering report preparations, 15,000.
11			Again, these are all just estimates.
12			Legal fees of 35,000. Land and rights,
13			acquisition of right of ways, that kind
14			of thing, 10,000. Interest of 30,000,
15			and administrative/planning, which is
16			primarily the grant writer's fees,
17			40,000.
18	99	Q	Okay. So that's how the over two million
19			dollars is projected to be spent?
20		А	Yes.
21	100	Q	In regard to the moneys, a million some
22			from Rural Development and almost a
23			million, or 900 and some thousand,
24			960,000 from CDBG, are there any
25			conditions or timetables attached to

1		those funds that could be jeopardized by
2		a stoppage or an adjoining of this
3		project?
4	А	Yes. The grant agreement that the county
5		had to sign with the Department of Local
6		Government has a deadline of when it's
7		supposed to be bid. I don't recall the
8		exact date, but it's this spring that the
9		project is supposed to be
10	101 Q	I had written it down somewhere here, but
11		if my memory serves me it might be April
12		20.
13	А	Somewhere in that
14	102 Q	In that time frame?
15	A	Yes.
16	103 Q	Okay. Are there any other CDBG pitfalls
17		other than bidding? I don't know if
18		there are. I'm just asking.
19	A	Well, again, that would be the time frame
20		that they would be looking for to have
21		the project bid. Rural Development
22	104 Q	Now, they issue a letter of conditions
23	A	Conditions.
24	105 Q	do they not?
25	A	And it has a time frame in it. I didn't

1		bring my copy of the letter of
2		conditions, but it's well past. Since.we
3		didn't get the letter of conditions from
4		Rural Development when their funding was
5		in place until December, it's well
6		their deadline was well past what the
7		CDBG one was.
8	106 Q	Okay. In your experience, if the
9		Commission would order, or if Mr. Barnett
10		would get his way, and the district were
11		required to reapply let's just take
12		the CDBG money. What would occur, in
13		your opinion, if at this point in time it
14		was said, stop, you need to go back, you
15		need to re-evaluate these particular
16		roads for current users, as opposed to
17		what your users were at the time, and
18		amend your application to amend your
19		application accordingly?
20	A	The first thing that would have to be
21		done to secure CDBG funding well,
22		again, we applied for the maximum of a
23		million, and they cut us back to the
24		930 960,000. So we did apply for the
25		maximum amount of that. Funding was not

1		available for the entire thing. But in
2		order for it to be included with the CDBG
3		portion, interviews would have to be
4		conducted with each of the residents on
5		the road to determine whether it's even
6		eligible. I don't know what the income
7		of Mr. Barnett and the other residents
8		that are there now I don't know what
9		their income is, but it may or may not
10		qualify from that standpoint for
11		inclusion in that.
12	107 Q	So there's a basic question as to whether
13		or not those incomes would be included,
14		would be able to be included to be used
15		or developed by CDBG money?
16	А	Correct. Then there's also the question
17		of doing if we amend the Rural
18		Development application, we'd have to go
19		back through public notice and the
20		hearings, or the public meetings and that
21		type of thing to include the scope
22		change.
23	108 Q	In your opinion, given your history with
2 4		these type things, what type of delay at
25		a minimum let me just ask it two ways.

1		What type of delay at a minimum would we
2		be looking at, and what type of delay at
3		a maximum?
4	A	I don't I don't see any way that it
5		could be included in the CDBG portion at
6		this time. Again, we applied for the
7		maximum amount of grant that we could.
8		That money for that year is already
9		obligated. So I don't see how we could
10		go back and amend the application to do
11		that. The scope of that project is
12		already set.
13	109 Q	So the CDBG money is pretty set?
14	A	Right.
15	110 Q	The only other way realistically that we
16		could get to include other roads would be
17		to go back and amend the rural
18		development?
19	A	Yes.
20	111 Q	Now, what does that entail?
21	А	Well, that, again, would I would have
22		to go back and revise the preliminary
23		engineering report. We'd have to redo
24		the environmental report and so forth to
25		include it, which would take us well into

1		the summer, I think, at the earliest.
2		And, again, that's not you know, the
3		Rural Development funding, there's a
4		whole lot more applications over there
5		than got funded also. I mean
6	112 Q	Well, and let's talk about that for a
7		second. If we were required if the
8		district were required at this point in
9		time to seek to amend its application for
10		Rural Development money, what are the
11		chances of the money that is currently
12		committed to the district going somewhere
13		else due to the fact that the district
14		would be in a position not to meet its
15		letter of conditions?
16	A	I don't think they would pull the money.
17		I think they'd give you opportunity to
18		look for other funding sources, or
19		whatever, but, again, you'd have to go
20		back and
21	113 Q	So you don't necessarily think the money
22		would be gone, but where would the other
23		money come from?
24	A	That's a good question. I mean, you'd
25		have to go the district would have to

1		go borrow it, or the county ask the
2		county for more of a contribution, or
3		somebody.
4	114 Q	But you don't
5	А	Which means you know, if they borrow
6		more money, I'd have to go back and look
7		at the rates again, too.
8	115 Q	That might affect the rates. It's
9		realistically not feasible to think that
10		you're going to get more Rural
11		Development money?
12	A	Not at that time, no.
13	116 Q	Not at this time?
14	A	Not under this scenario, I wouldn't
15		think.
16	117 Q	Clearly, you're not going to get any more
17		CDBG money?
18	A	Correct.
19	118 Q	Grant money? Okay. So the money would
20		have to come from some other place?
21	A	That's my feeling, yes.
22		(OFF THE RECORD)
23	119 Q	Ken, as part of the Answers to
24		Interrogatories that we prepared and
25		served upon the PSC and Mr. Thomas on

1		Mr. Barnett's behalf this past week, you
2		prepared, pursuant to a question, an
3		updated cost estimate, which will be
4		Exhibit 3, which includes the Aaron
5		Barnett Road as it currently exists in
6		the project, and that figure is \$71,550
7		for construction of the line as it
8		currently exists.
9	A	Yes, for the construction the \$59,586
10		of that is for the construction
11		activities themselves, and then the other
12		items that would need to be that would
13		have to be covered under the you know,
14		legal and design and inspection fee.
15		(REPORTER MARKS EXHIBIT NO. 3, UPDATED
16		COST ESTIMATE, FOR PURPOSES OF
17		IDENTIFICATION AND THE SAME IS ATTACHED
18		HERETO)
19	120 Q	Design and inspection, legal,
20		administration?
21	A	Brings it to 71,550.
22	121 Q	That's for the front, or the first 1.8
23		miles of the
24	A	Correct.
25	122 Q	of the road?

1	A	That's the northern end of it.
2	123 Q	That does get pretty close to .
3		Mr. Barnett's property, doesn't it?
4	A	I think it does, in that there is a piece
5		of property that I understand that he at
6		least owned at one time that's down on
7		the creek toward the end of that 1.8
8		miles. Whether he's sold that or not
9		one of the realtors indicated maybe they
10	:	had sold that at one of our previous
11		meetings with Mr. Barnett's
12		representatives.
13	124 Q	You also answered the question as to what
14		would be the cost estimate to complete
15		the entire loop of Willow Creek/Aaron
16	·	Barnett that would tie into 62 on the
17		back end.
18	A	Yes, that would take it on up in front of
19		where Mr. Barnett's residence now is.
20	MR. E	EDELMAN: And that's going to be
21		Exhibit 4.
22		(REPORTER MARKS EXHIBIT NO. 4, COST
23		ESTIMATE OF COMPLETE LOOP OF WILLOW CREEK
24		ROAD, FOR PURPOSES OF IDENTIFICATION AND
25		THE SAME IS ATTACHED HERETO)

1	125 Q	And would you tell the Commission what
2		those figures indicate?
3	A	Yeah. My construction estimate for
4		completing the loop is \$102,886.25, and
5		the total cost for doing that would be
6		\$123,275. Again, being an estimate.
7	126 Q	So in excess of \$51,000 51,000
8		additional dollars it would take to
9		complete that loop?
10	A	Correct.
11	127 Q	Okay. You've also prepared, which we'll
12		label Exhibit 5, a map that represents
13		the phase five expansion project; is that
14		correct?
15	A	Correct.
16	128 Q	And for the Commission's benefit, what
17		does this reflect?
18	А	It has the different roads where we
19		propose to run water lines indicated,
20		along with an approximate number of
21		customers that we anticipate getting
22		along each road.
23	129 Q	The number of customers would be in the
24		circle
25	А	Yes.

1	130	Q	possibly?
2		A	That's what the numbers in the circles
3			are. It, again, gives the different
4			roads, gives the county boundary, and
5			also the water district boundary.
6	131	Q	And as you can see, Willow Creek is in
7			the left-hand side of the map, and it
8			indicates at the time the survey was done
9			there were seven users on the front 1.8
10			portion?
11		A	Yeah. Well, no, that only ran through
12			1.2 miles at that point when we prepared
13			it back in the early stage of the
14			application. And this was prepared back
15			early on. I guess September of '98 was
16			when the map was prepared. The petition
17			that we'd gotten in had ten I think
18			had ten names on it.
19	132	Q	Nine at least. Nine on
20		A	Nine names, and one of them indicated
21			they wanted two meters, I think.
22	133	Q	Ten users.
23		A	However, we generally don't use those
24			total numbers. Particularly when you're
25			going by house count, or whatever, there

1		-	will be one or two that when you get
2			there and they have to start thinking
3			about paying water bills and that kind of
4			thing, that back off of actually taking
5			the water. So in order to do the
6			financial feasibility, we drop back from
7			those total numbers in order to make sure
8			that when we get through with the project
9			and get it installed, we can pay for it.
10		MR.	EDELMAN: Let's make that Exhibit 5.
11			(REPORTER MARKS EXHIBIT NO. 5, MAP OF
12			PHASE FIVE PROJECT, FOR PURPOSES OF
13			IDENTIFICATION AND THE SAME IS ATTACHED
14			HERETO)
15	134	Q	You also prepared, or had prepared under
16			your direction other maps with the
17			application, didn't you?
18		А	Correct.
19	135	Q	And what were they?
20		A	I guess with both applications, the USGS
21			topographic maps, we took those as base,
22			and then, again, outlined or indicated
23			the lengths of road that we would lay
24			water lines on, propose to. We also, in
25			order for the environmental application

1		that Rural Development requires, included
2		copies of the FEMA floodplain maps and
3		the soil conservation, soil maps. But
4		those really don't give a whole lot of
5		information, the latter two don't, other
6		than the environmental stuff.
7	136 Q	And in August of 1998, you prepared
8		certain spreadsheets and cost estimates
9		for the construction cost of each
10		particular roadway within the project;
11		did you not?
12	A	Yes.
13	137 Q	One was a preliminary estimate for a
14		combined CDBG and Rural Development
15		project?
16	A	Yes.
17	138 Q	And another was a preliminary estimate of
18		probable cost just for the CDBG budget?
19	А	Yes.
20	139 Q	Okay. The combined I'm going to hand
21		you a document that purports to be the
22		combined projects, CDBG and Rural
23		Development, cost estimate.
24	A	That's what it is.
25	140 Q	Do you recognize that document?
	i	

1		A	Yes.
2	141	Q	And on there, without going into it, does
3			it include the cost per road?
4		Α	Yes, it's breakout per road, and then at
5			the end is a cost summary.
6		MR.	EDELMAN: Okay. Maybe we can make that
7			Exhibit 6.
8			(REPORTER MARKS EXHIBIT NO. 6, COMBINED
9			COSTS ESTIMATE FOR CDBG AND RURAL
10			DEVELOPMENT, FOR PURPOSES OF
11			IDENTIFICATION AND THE SAME IS ATTACHED
12			HERETO)
13	142	Q	And, likewise, Exhibit 7 will be the
14			breakdown on the CDBG application.
15		A	Yes, that's what you've handed me.
16			(REPORTER MARKS EXHIBIT NO. 7, COST
17			ESTIMATE FOR CDBG BUDGET, FOR PURPOSES OF
18			IDENTIFICATION AND THE SAME IS ATTACHED
19			HERETO)
20	143	Q	Not to go too much further, Ken, but I
21			just want to try to discuss from your
22			point of view some of the points
23			Mr. Barnett has raised in his complaint.
24			In addition to any notice that may have
25			been given in the paper in August of '98,

1		were there other notices prior to that?
2	A	Yes. There were notices that were given
3		in conjunction with the CDBG application,
4		and also earlier notice that we were
5		preparing an application to Rural
6		Development.
7	144 Q	Okay. Additionally, he says in argument
8		two that there's no reasonable or logical
9		basis to cease water line construction at
10		this point along Aaron Barnett Road
11		rather than completing construction along
12		the remaining 1.3 miles. He's basically
13		saying it's unfair at this point in time,
14		given the fact that there are new users,
15		or potential new users. Do you have any
16		comments about that or thoughts about
17		that?
18	A	Well, the reason that the rest of the
19		road was not included was that the
20		customer count at the time we put the
21		application together was not there to
22		support the line.
23	145 Q	And that customer count was how many?
24	A	At that time, as I recall, there were
25		three houses on the road, one of which

1			was vacant.
2	146	Q	So two users, one vacant house
3	l	A	Uh-huh (affirmative).
4	147	Q	would not support in your engineering
5			opinion construction of the additional
6			\$51,000 of line over 1.3 miles?
7		A	Correct.
8	148	Q	Okay. That would not be a responsible
9			thing for the district to do, nor for the
10			PSC to approve?
11		А	Correct.
12	149	Q	In these projects there has to be some
13			deadline on when you have to cut things
14			off, for instance?
15		A	Yeah, particularly the Rural
16			Development folks will take an
17			application year round, but there are
18			specific times each year that the CDBG
19			applications have to be in. That date
20			varies from year to year, but they take
21			applications once a year.
22	150	Q .	There is a lot of background work that
23			goes into that; is there not?
24		A	Yes.
25	151	Q	The income studies, the petitions, the

1			environmental studies, that all has to be
2			submitted with that application?
3		A	Yes.
4	152	Q	Would it be unreasonable, in your
5			opinion, to accept Mr. Barnett's
6			contention that it's all right to have
7			this moving target? May have been only
8			two at the time, but it's seven now,
9			hence I should be in.
10		A	I think that's unreasonable, yes.
11	153	Q	Okay. He also states that it would be
12			practical and efficient from an
13			engineering standpoint to complete the
14			loop on the road from 62 to 62. That's
15			probably an accurate statement, isn't it?
16		А	Hydraulically, it's correct. It is
17			better to loop your lines where it's
18			economically feasible to lay them.
19	154	Q	If you had an extra 50 or \$60,000 laying
20			around, you could do a lot of practical
21			and efficient engineering things,
22			couldn't you?
23		A	Yes.
24	155	Q	Yes, you could. You could create quite a
25			few loops, I take it. Let's talk about

1		he apparently also has a problem with
2		the fact that he's been excluded. I
3		don't even want to say the word excluded.
4		I think I ought to say that he didn't
5		qualify, given the numbers of households,
6		okay?
7	A	Correct.
8	156 Q	But, however, there may be some non-
9		Anderson Countians who may benefit from
10		this project.
11	A	Correct. There will be if it's completed
12		as scoped current scope.
13	157 Q	The main line never leaves Anderson
14		County, does it?
15	A	Correct. All of the transmission mains
16		will be laid in Anderson County.
17	158 Q	So to the extent there may be a few
18		individuals or households in Washington
19		County or Mercer County, then they're
20		only going to have service?
21	A	Service lines.
22	159 Q	Service lines?
23	A	Uh-huh (affirmative).
24	160 Q	Okay. Mr. Barnett also indicates that
25		he's the sole provider and caretaker of

1		his two young children and he needs to
2		sell real estate. Now, you've been
3		involved, I take it, in the engineering
4		field with individuals or entities that
5		develop property?
6	A	Yes.
7	161 Q	And I assume that well, I know for a
8		fact that Mr. Barnett's developing this
9		property, because at a meeting in this
10		office he, or his realtor indicated that
11		he was selling lots now off of Willow
12		Creek or Aaron Barnett Road. You recall
13		that conversation, don't you?
14	A	Yeah, and having trouble doing so because
15		he didn't
16	162 Q	Now, generally speaking, if water if
17		this project goes and water can get close
18		to Mr. Barnett's property, what would a
19		developer normally do with water that
20		close?
21	A	Well, in a number of other instances in
22		Anderson County, South Anderson, the
23		developer has paid for extensions of
24		those lines to where they want to develop
25		property. We've probably done at least

1		half a dozen of those here.
2	163 Q	So it's not unusual for a developer to
3		take the line at his cost, or to be
4		responsible for the costs, whatever they
5		are, and then subdivide in some fashion
6		his land, and I presumably add some sort
7		of premium to the cost of the land to get
8		back the cost of the water lines?
9	A	Yes.
10		(OFF THE RECORD)
11	164 Q	Now, these developers, Ken, they may pay
12		the initial outlay, but doesn't the
13		Public Service Commission provide for
14		some provision to reimburse them for a
15		portion of these moneys?
16	A	Yes, there are specific provisions in the
17		Public Service Regulations that speak to
18		reimbursement of privately developed
19		property and ways that that can be
20		accomplished within the tariffs, approved
21		tariffs of water districts, specifically
22		provided for that.
23	165 Q	This project is going to serve how many
24		potential new customers?
25	A	We use the number of 342, I think, actual

1		customers that we anticipate.
2	166 Q	340?
3	А	340 or 342. As indicated in the
4		preliminary engineering report, we are
5		estimating that there are approximately
6		400 potential users on the lines that are
7		proposed under this project, and we are
8		anticipating approximately 342 of those
9		will use the water when its available to
10		them.
11	167 Q	Now, did you
12	A	That number is probably the 342 is
13		probably a little low based on past
14		experience over here, but I'm generally
15		conservative when I go into making sure
16		that we can repay loans. I don't want to
17		have to come back to a project right
18		after its completed and ask for a rate
19		increase because we didn't get the
20		customers that we thought we'd get.
21	168 Q	Attached to the answer we filed were
22		certain responses to the Petitioner's
23		Statement of Fact, which without having
24		you go over them, they are responses that
25		you prepared at my direction; were they

	,		
1			not?
2		A	Yes, they are.
3	169	Q	And I think, to the extent that anyone
4			reading this deposition, or the
5			Commission will be interested, they are
6			in the record attached to the answer, but
7			you wouldn't have any objection to making
8			this Exhibit A a portion of your
9			testimony today?
10		A	No. That would be permissible.
11			(REPORTER MARKS EXHIBIT NO. 8, EXHIBIT A
12			TO RESPONSES TO PETITIONER'S STATEMENT OF
13			FACT, FOR PURPOSES OF IDENTIFICATION AND
14			THE SAME IS ATTACHED HERETO)
15	170	Q	The selection of roads in the project
16			that we discussed earlier were a
17			combination of CDBG qualification per
18			household income and per household
19			numbers along each roadway?
20		А	And construction cost, yes.
21	171	Q	And construction cost along the roadway?
22		A	Uh-huh (affirmative).
23	172	Q	Were they the sole considerations?
24		A	Those three, yes.
25	173	Q	Weren't any other elements in terms of

1			personalities or who the individuals
2			were?
3		A	Not to my knowledge.
4	174	Q	Not as far as you
5		A	As far as I was concerned, certainly not.
6	175	Q	Right. Mr. Barnett was treated just as
7			fairly as any individual that might have
8			been on Tanner Road that wasn't included,
9			or any of those other six or seven or
10			eight roads that we listed; isn't that
11			true?
12		A	That is a fact.
13	176	Q	And the fact is that this project goes
14			through and it's not delayed, water will
15			be a whole lot closer to him now than
16			water will be a whole lot closer to him
17			then than it is to him now?
18		A	Yes, on the backside it certainly would.
19	177	Q	Do you have anything else you want to add
20			as far as your direct testimony?
21		A	I think that pretty well covers. Again,
22			just what we just said, Mr. Barnett was
23			not treated any differently as far as I'm
2 4			concerned. Certainly, I didn't treat him
25			any different, and I don't think the

1		district did. There were other people
2		that had signed petitions and submitted
3		them, that had expressed all the way
4		through that they wanted water, that we
5		didn't serve because it wasn't feasible
6		to run the lines that far.
7	178 Q	And the number of users, potential users
8		at the time the applications had to be
9		filed on that last 1.3 miles of Willow
10		Creek/Aaron Barnett Road were two,
11		possibly three?
12	A	I can't say that it was at the exact time
13		that the application had to be filed, but
14		when we scoped out the project in
15		preparation of getting it filed, because
16		at that time he you know, there are a
17		couple, three other houses out there now,
18		and exactly when those were constructed,
19		I don't know. But when we
20	179 Q	When the leg work was done
21	A	done for the project
22	180 Q	for the project, there were two users
23		and a vacant house?
24	A	Yes.
25	181 Q	Okay. Without regard to what's said

1			today, those are the
2		A	Yeah.
3	182	Q	those are the facts?
4		A	That's the way I recall it, yes.
5	183	Q	And there were nine, or however many
6			what were the number of users on the
7			front 1.8 miles?
8		A	Well, we had a petition for ten, which
9			did not include a couple of them that
10			were on the very end of what those ten
11			went through a mile and a half, and so
12			there was two more in the three-tenths
13			that
14	184	Q	Why was it decided to extend it from a
15			mile and a half or to the mile, eight?
16		A	Well, during the CDGB interview process,
17			those people made their desire for water
18			known, participated in the interview
19			process. That last three-tenths
20			actually, I think it's a little bit less
21			than three-tenths there are no
22			obstacles, no creek crossings, no
23			significant it would be just water
24			line construction with no that made it
25			feasible.

1	185 Q That made it feasible and the costs
2	weren't extraordinary?
3	A Correct.
4	MR. EDELMAN: Okay. I think that's all I
5	have. Thanks.

I am in receipt of an interrogatory inquiry on the aforementioned Project and shall respond as follows:

Request: Did the Water District find the presence of pneumonia bacteria at Willow Creek?

Response: Page 11 of the CDBG application indicates the presence of pneumonia bacteria in Area L, Rice Road, not Willow Creek. Section IV-A-4 shows a lower case "L" that looks like a lower case "I", so I can understand the confusion.

Request: Provide per capita income of residents along each roadway.

Response: The CDBG application I have already provided you has a summary of income characteristics for each road/area to be served (pages 56-68), with characteristics for Willow Creek (Area I) on page 64. Once you review these pages, you will notice that the income characteristics are for only the road/area, not individual residents. The income surveys collected for the Project ask for the gross household income, not per capita income, therefore, this information is not available. Even if it was available, I am not at liberty to disclose any of this confidential information as per Open Record laws. Individual road/areas were selected by their collective eligibility for the CDBG Program, not from individual eligibility. I cannot fathom what use this information would be to your inquiry and I stand firm in my resolve to keep it confidential.

I. INTRODUCTION

The South Anderson Water District (SAWD) was originally formed to provide a safe, dependable supply of potable water to the citizens of southern Anderson County. Since its inception in 1967, the SAWD has grown until it serves approximately 1450 customers over a large portion of the County including some in the northern portion of the County. SAWD intends to eventually make treated water available to every citizen with in its boundary. This project will go along way toward accomplishing this as it extends service to 14 separate areas of the county and provides an additional source of treated water. SAWD anticipates serving approximately 342 new users on the extensions. The proposed facilities are modest in design, size and cost and will be constructed and operated in an environmentally responsible manner.

II. PROJECT PLANNING AREA

Included as Exhibit 1 is a map of Anderson County with SAWD's boundary, existing facilities and proposed facilities indicated. The planning area for the proposed project includes all of the area within SAWD's boundary as the entire distribution system must be designed to ultimately provide treated water to the entire area. Toward this goal the facilities previously constructed and planned by SAWD have been designed to provide the necessary volume and pressures for the completed system. The proposed facilities are shown on Exhibits II -IV which are portions of the USGS 7.5 minute topographic maps of the areas. The transmission line from the Frankfort Plant Board system will provide an alternate source of water to the system and can be extended to tie into the rest of the system at a later date if need arises. The specific areas to be served by the project include the following roads/communities: Ballard, Dugansville Rd., Hoophole, Puncheon Ck. Rd., and Searcy Sch. Rd.; Fairview, Lick Skillet Rd., and Ky Hwy 1291; Drydock, Anderson City, Buntain Sch. Rd., and Ky 44 east of Glensboro; US 62 west of Johnsonville, Ky Hwy 248 and Ky Hwy 3358 (Tanner Rd.); Burgin Rd.; US 127 Bypass from Sidney to US 127; Cox Rd.; Willow Ck. Rd.; Ky Hwy 44 west of Glensboro; Ashby Rd.; Gilberts Ck. Rd.; Woolridge Rd.; Rice Rd.; and Fox Ck. Rd..

The project will address a serious problem faced by the residents of these areas, that being the lack of a safe, dependable water supply. The personal health and safety of the residents are threatened by contaminated water sources. A portion of the families are also forced to haul water, creating a financial burden. The District has sampled a cross-section of the water supplies in the area and determined that the majority were contaminated by coliform or other bacteria. Tests conducted by the County Health Department and a

private water testing lab indicated that 67% of all cisterns and springs had coliform contamination and that 25% were contaminated with the deadly E. Coli bacterium. Exposure to E. Coli can lead to a range of maladies, from stomach cramps to total kidney failure. The Project Area's homes are either clustered together along creek bottoms where outhouses (approximately 2) and straight pipes prevail, or on farmland where runoff from cattle, hog or horse operations enters the creeks, permeating the water table. Seven households reported that they had contracted intestinal infections from their water supplies.

Fear of drinking the water was prevalent; household surveys revealed that one in two (50%) households purchased their drinking water, spending from \$15 to \$20 monthly for bottled water. Mothers are advised by local physicians to not use well, cistern or spring water for mixing infant formula, frail or ill persons were afraid to consume well, cistern or spring water due to the high mineral content and the possibility of contracting a life-threatening bacteriological infection.

Reports on Anderson County from the Epidemiology section of the Cabinet for Human Resources indicate that, since 1993, there have been 5 cases of Camphybactor, 1 case of E. Coli related illness, 9 cases of Salmonella, and 2 cases of Giardia, all water borne illnesses. The Anderson County Health Department supports these records, citing reported cases of Hepatitis (non-A and non-B) and "many" cases of Campylobactor. According to the Control of Communicable Diseases Manual, "fecal contamination of nonchlorinated public water supplies has caused some extensive outbreaks of Salmonellosis". The Project Area has the largest concentration of households in the County still unserved by potable water (342 consumers of an estimated 500 unserved households), it may be surmised that a number of these cases have been in the Project Area. Severe contamination of water supplies such as those tested, in addition to the aforementioned report, indicates an imminent health threat to the households in this Project Area.

There are no known or anticipated unusual construction conditions. Due to shallow soil depths in much of the area, the unit cost per foot of water line will be slightly higher than in some other areas of the state. The District is not aware of any environmentally significant features, historic sites or important land resources which will be adversely impacted by the project.

III. EXISTING FACILITIES

The District's distribution facilities now consist of approximately 37,000 feet of 8", 273,500 feet of 6", 180,500 feet of 4" and 19,500 feet of 3" distribution line; 3-100,000 gallon and 1-131,000 gallon storage tanks; 3-100 gpm booster pump stations; and assorted accessories such as gate valves, and blow-off hydrants/valves. All of the system is less than 25 years old and a major portion is less than 10 years old. All existing facilities are in good to excellent working condition. The District is currently planning to construct a booster pump station and standpipe in the US 62/US 127 bypass area. These facilities

will provide service to the higher elevations in this area and increase the quantity of water that can be taken out US 62 west.

The District currently purchases all water. It has a contract with the City of Lawrenceburg for up to 10 million gallons per month through 2037.

Given in the attached Summary/Addendum are the District's current rate schedules, tabulation of users by monthly usage categories, status of existing long-term indebtedness and amounts on deposit in the required reserve accounts. The District is physically and economically sound.

IV. PROPOSED FACILITIES AND SERVICES

General Description. The proposed project consists of approximately 24,500 feet of eight inch, 239,325 feet of four inch, and 10,800 feet of three inch water line; 1-300 gpm booster pump station; and distribution system appurtenances such as gate valves, air release valves, blow-off valves, meters, etc. The distribution lines will be primarily of PVC. Some small sections of ductile iron pipe may be used in special areas, i.e., stream crossings, past gas tanks, etc. The facilities will be designed to provide the customers with a minimum pressure of 30 psi at the meter at peak flow conditions. Where static pressures exceed 90 psi, individual pressure regulators will be provided to protect fixtures from high pressures. The booster pump station will pump to the existing standpipe at Ninevah.

The booster pumping station will be designed to maintain a minimum operating level in the standpipe about 10 to 12 feet lower than the overflow elevation of the tank. This will require pumping to begin when the water level in the tank drops to the minimum operating level; pumping will continue until the tank is refilled to just below the overflow level. This procedure will provide adequate pressure stabilization of the system. The hydraulic model of the system is currently being updated to include the proposed project and significant results of the model will be appended to this report when completed.

The locations of the major elements of the project are shown on the attached county road map and portions of the U.S.G.S. topographic maps. An itemized cost estimate is given in Attachment I. The extension of the District's distribution facilities is the only viable alternative for providing water service to these areas of the County.

<u>Land.</u> It will be necessary to acquire land on which to construct the booster pump station. A tract approximately 30' x 30' will be needed for the booster pump station. The approximate location of this facility is shown on the attached maps, however, the location may vary depending on the final design of the system and the ability to acquire the land.

<u>Rights.</u> Easements will be required for the water distribution lines, many of which will be given by the individual customers. By necessity, some easements for the distribution lines will be on State and County road right-of-way.

No permits or easements have been obtained at this time for the proposed work. It is anticipated that in addition to the land requirements previously mentioned, permits and/or approvals will be required from the following agencies:

VI. FEASIBILITY STUDY

It is anticipated that this project will be funded with tap fees; local, district and county contributions, a loan and a grant. This section contains an economic feasibility analysis to determine the affect of additional borrowing on the District's financial integrity and the need for a rate adjustment. The District supplied computer generated billing data for calendar year July 1, 1997 through June 30, 1998 from which the billing analysis was perpared. The annual operating budget was developed adjusting the 1997 Annual PSC Report and Audit for the additional customers, inflation, employee pay raises, etc.

<u>Capital Improvements</u>. In order to serve planned development at the higher elevations in the KY 44 - US 62 - US 127 Bypass area, the District is currently planning to build a new standpipe and booster pump station in this area. The land for the standpipe has been obtained and construction is scheduled to start in January 1999 with completion by May 1, 1999. The District will pay for the improvements by borrowing approximately \$200,000.00 and taking the remainder (\$160,000.00) from their existing funds. It is anticipated that the necessary funding can be obtained locally at a rate of 7% or less for a period of 20 years. The existing rates can support this loan without compromising the integrity of the District.

IX. CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Conclusions

- A. A majority of the residents in the proposed project area do not have an acceptable domestic water source. Also a health hazard exists due to the contamination of many of the sources currently being used.
- B. The extension of the South Anderson Water District water distribution system into the area is the only viable means of providing them with an acceptable water source.
- C. Significant grant funds will be required for construction in order to keep the rate schedule at a tolerable level.
- D. The financial feasibility indicates that the South Anderson Water District cannot serve the proposed project area on the existing rates without seriously jeopardizing the financial integrity of the operations even with the requested \$1,000,000.00 CDBG grant. The rates proposed herein are sufficient to cover operating expenses, debt service, debt service coverage, bond resolution depreciation reserve funding and provide some net unobligated monies. The revenues are not sufficient to cover the full amount of depreciation allowed in the rate base. The grant is necessary to allow the District to operate comfortably.

Recommendations

The project, as presented herein, is feasible with the assumed level of grant and the proposed rates. This will enable the District to accumulate a reasonable amount of monies which could be used to facilitate additional extensions and/or defray unforeseen expenses. An application should be made to Rural Development for loan funds to construct the water system improvements proposed herein.



RESPONSES TO PETITIONER'S STATEMENTS OF FACT

Response to Paragraph 1. - No dispute or correction.

Response to Paragraph 2. - The foundation for this project was laid with the District's last major expansion project, which was started in 1990. Many of the potential customers in this project requested service through that project but the District was unable to secure sufficient funding to reach them. Some had even requested service in the District's earlier expansion projects.

A rural water district is not eligible to receive Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding directly from the state; this funding must come through either the County Fiscal Court or a City. On August 5, 1998, the Anderson County Fiscal Court placed a public notice in The Anderson News with the heading PUBLIC HEARING NOTICE SOUTH ANDERSON WATER DISTRICT EXPANSION PROJECT. The notice went on to give information on the CDBG Program; state that information on the program would be available at the office of the County Judge Executive from August 4 through August 17th, 1998; inform the public that the County would hold a Public Hearing on August 18th, 1998, prior to the submission of any application; and that a copy of the CDBG Application would be on file at the County Judge Executive's Office for citizen review and comment from August 18th through August 25th, 1998. The notice indicated the purpose of the hearing was to "...review proposed activities, review any proposed applications, solicit public comments...". This

application clearly showed the areas of the county including the portion of Willow Creek Road, which was to be served and a large map was used at the public hearing to inform those in attendance. Mr. Barnett did not make his desire for water service known to the County or water district during any of this. (Attached copy of Publisher's Affidavit, Published Notice and minutes of public hearing.)

Response to Paragraph 3. While the District did receive some contact from citizens in response to the October 7, 1998 Notice, none was received from Mr. Barnett. The District is not required to obtain Fiscal Court approval for construction projects.

Response to Paragraph 4. When this notice was published in the newspaper, both the Community Development Block Grant and Rural Development-Rural Utility Service loan applications had already been completed and submitted to the appropriate government agencies. The primary purpose of the notice was to provide "Public Notification for Informing the Public of Possible Impact to an Important Land Resource." It was not intended as a forum to increase the size of the proposed project. Basically, the scope of the project had been set months earlier with the appropriate input of the citizens. It should also be noted that Willow Creek Road is only one of seven roads listed in the notice, which are not proposed for total service and using Mr. Barnett's reasoning several miles would have to be added to the project if only six (6) additional people, one from each of the other roads, contacted the Public Service Commission.

Response to Paragraph 5. SAWD disputes the claim that Mr. Barnett is being treated inequitably in the project. Mr. Barnett is actually being treated the same as everyone else by the District. The waterline as currently proposed serves the customers on Willow Creek Road who had a spokesperson contact the District prior to submittal of the applications requesting service. At that time, the section of Willow Creek Road Mr. Barnett lives on was driven by representatives of the District and found to be unfeasible for inclusion because there were only two (2) residences within the mile. Other entire roads and portions of roads were also omitted from the project because of the low number of customers per mile or per customer construction cost.

Response to Paragraph 6. It should be noted that Mr. Barnett's representatives at this meeting included two (2) real estate agents who were there to complain that they were having trouble selling Mr. Barnett's lots because of a lack of public water.

Response to Paragraph 7. No dispute or correction.

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RESPONSES TO PETITIONER'S ARGUMENTS

Response to Argument 1. The public notice Mr. Barnett refers to was not intended to give the opportunity to add to the project. The scope of the proposed project was set prior to the submission of the funding application months earlier after the appropriate opportunities for public input. The February, 1999 Notice gave the roads which "will be affected by this project"

and the fact that the project "may impact important farm land and designated flood plain". As stated in the notice, it was "to inform the public of this possible result and to request comments concerning (1) the impacts of the proposed location of farmland and flood plain, (2) alternative sites or actions that would avoid these impacts, and (3) methods that could be used to reduce these impacts".

Response to Argument 2. Aaron Barnett Road is actually less than 3.5 miles long and the District is proposing to run less than two (2) miles of waterline along the more densely populated end of the road. The number of potential customers (2) living along the remaining portion of the road at the time the scope of the project was set precluded its inclusion. The District cannot repay loans with potential future customers that will only exist if Mr. Barnett sells his lots.

Response to Argument 3. The Community Development Block Grant application requested the maximum amount of grant funds allowable under the program. Therefore, the additional funding would have to be almost 100% loan money. This in effect would be requiring the other SAWD customers to take out and repay a loan to develop Mr. Barnett's property. This is not something the District would or should do.

Response to Argument 4. The hydraulic benefits of looping Willow Creek Road do not justify the cost of completing the loop.

Response to Argument 5. Kentucky 1291 runs from KY 53 at the Blue Grass Parkway to US 62 near Western Anderson School and the residents along this road are all within Anderson County. A portion of KY 1291 is also named Fairview Road and Fairview Road turns off KY 1291 to the community of Fairview. All but three or four of the potential customers along this road are in Anderson County. Fairview Road is the county line for approximately 0.25 mile just before it reaches and crosses over the Blue Grass Parkway. Any users along the west side of the 0.25 miles would be in Washington County. Mr. Barnett may have actually meant to refer to Lick Skillet Road in this argument. Lick Skillet Road runs from Fairview Road at Fairview to US 62 near Sparrow and is the county line from Fairview to where it crosses Beaver Creek. The proposed project will run a water line along this road a distance of approximately 1.3 miles. Land on the northeast side of the road is in Anderson County, while land on the southwest side is in Washington County. Most of the existing residences along this road are in Washington County.

Response to Argument 6. The goal of the Commissioners of the South Anderson Water District is to make public water available at a reasonable rate to everyone within the District's service area as soon as possible. Once funding for the currently proposed project is in place, the District will start working on the preliminary phases of the next expansion project as it has in the past. The Commissioners of the South Anderson Water District have never indicated to anyone it would be another ten years before the District pursues any further expansion plans.

20			water becomes probably the next step from
21			that.
22	23	Q	And following what you had referred to
23			earlier, the phase one or the initial
24			project into South Anderson County, how
25			was that project funded?

1		A	It was really funded through the Farm and
2			Home Administration, which is a little
3			different from the organization now that
4			loans money. But it came out of the
5			Department of Agriculture out of
6			Washington to where they would fund
7			projects. Most of the time this is a low
8			interest loan. Sometimes to help
9			districts, where it's not feasible to do
10			it in all loan money, there is grant
11			money available, and that comes from
12			different agencies to help fund a project
13			to make it feasible.
14	24	Q	Just so I understand, loan money that the
15			district would obtain would have to be
16			paid back at some low interest rate,
17			generally three, four, five, six percent?
18		A	Yes.
19	25	Q	I suppose over the years that interest
20			rate has varied within those numbers?
21		Α .	Uh-huh (affirmative).
22	26	Q	Grant money is money that is pretty much
23			given to the district that doesn't have
24			to be paid back; is that correct?
25		A	That is correct.

1	27	Q	How many projects has South Anderson been
2			involved with over the past 20, 25 years?
3		A	Yes. The initial project that I said
4			that was completed in 1976 was our
5			beginning. We probably served about 200
6			people in 30 miles of line at that time.
7			Then from that point up to today, we're
8			into our fifth expansion right now and we
9			call it phase five. Probably about every
10			four to five years we would relook at the
11			service area where we stopped off and
12			start putting a project together. And I
13			really would almost say that every
14			district is not that aggressive, but we
15			feel like that our purpose is to serve
16			all of the people in our boundary, and
17			that is the southern part of Anderson
18			County. And we're not there yet, but the
19			feasibility of projects determine how far
20			you can go with the money that you're
21			able to get.
22	28	Q	Now, on each project I take it there's a
23			determination of, number one, how much
24			money is available and whether it's loan
25			money or grant money?

1		A	Uh-huh (affirmative).
2	29	Q	And then how far will that money take you
3			in service of potential customers within
4			your boundary; is that correct?
5		A	Yes, that would be.
6	3 0	Q	Okay. As a general rule, how does the
7			district go about determining the scope
8			and breadth of any particular project?
9		A	Of course, I think the district would
10			love to take all of our boundaries that's
11			left that's unserved and get enough money
12			to do the whole thing. That's our main
13			objective, is to complete that as soon as
14			possible. But realistic, you have to
15			take sections, and normally we look at
16			the end of the line where we ended the
17			last project, and then we see how far we
18			can go from that that road being
19			feasible. And, again, the feasibility of
20			it is hinged upon how much grant money
21			you can get versus the loan money,
22			because the loan money being paid back,
23			we have to generate enough revenue out of
24			that to pay back the loan, and that's
25			this district is always looking to make

1			sure that the project is feasible. In
2			fact, that's the only way you can get
3			loan money. If you can't pay it back,
4			they're not going to loan it to you.
5	31 (Q	Feasibility has to do with numbers of
6			household per road; is that not right?
7	1	A	Yes, it is.
8	32	Q	And that's really what we're talking
9			about. When you look at a project, are
10			you not looking at and, obviously,
11			you'd like to serve every individual and
12	<u>.</u>		every road within your boundary, and
13			that's the goal. But in terms of
14	:		maximizing your loan and grant money, is
15			it not true that you try to look at each
16			road and try to determine numbers of
17			households or numbers of users per mile
18			or per road and the feasibility of where
19			one stops?
20	Ī	A	Well, yes, and you have to do that. You
21			have to look at it two different ways.
22			The loan money is one part of it. The
23			grant money has really two backings on
2 4			it, I guess you would say, because the
25			loan money is or grant money is tied

1			to low income homes, and if you don't
2			have them in an area, you can't even
3			include it to get the grant money.
4	3 3	Q	So when you get this grant money, what
5			you're telling the Commission is that
6			even to qualify for grant money from,
7			say, an entity like Community Development
8			Block Grant, CDBG, for instance
9		A	Yes.
10	3 4	Q	you have to have an area within your
11			boundary, or have to include an area
12			within your boundary that would have
13			levels of income that would qualify for
14			grant money?
15		A	Yes.
16	35	Q	Now, this last project, phase five, that
17			we're currently involved with, and which
18			we have the complaint from Mr. Barnett,
19			is why we're here today, how has that
20			project been financed? Just in laymen's
21			terms. Mr. Taylor can testify later as
22			to, you know, the specifics.
23		А	Yeah. Restate the question.
24	3 6	Q	How has this recent project been
25			financed? What have we applied for? How

1			is the financing set up?
2		A	Okay. When we looked at the project, we
3			determined what funding is really going
4			to be needed and we're talking about
5			total dollars. And we also have to look
6			at how much of that needs to be grant
7			money and how much needs to be loan
8			money, and then we have to determine will
9			that pay back to cover the loan money.
10			And in this last project I would say it's
11			close to 50. It's a little more loan
12			money than grant money.
13	37	Q	But it's very close to 50/50?
14		A	Yes.
15	38	Q	It's about a million dollars a piece?
16		A	Right.
17	3 9	Q	Maybe just a couple percentage points
18			loan money over grant money?
19		A	Yes, that is correct.
20	40	Q	And without the grant money, a majority
21			of this project wouldn't even exist,
22			would it?
23		A	It would not, no.
24	41	Q	So the grant money is very important,
25			that \$960,000, or whatever it is?

1		A	Yes.
2	42	·Q	Close to a million.
3		A	Uh-huh (affirmative).
4	43	Q	That the district doesn't have to pay
5			back at all?
6		A	That's true.
7	44	Q	Okay. In between the first and the
8			fifth, this project that's coming up, how
9	:		many other projects were there? Just
10			briefly, so the Commission can understand
11			where we've been in terms of aggressive
12			development of the South Anderson
13			territory.
14		A	There would have been four other
15			expansions in that span of time from '76
16			up through today, when we're starting
17			into the fifth.
18	45	Q	And safely saying, about every four or
19			five years a project gets developed, and
20			it takes a few years for it to be
21			completed?
22		A	Yes.
23	46	Q	And then you're back at the same stage of
2 4			attempting to reorganize and attempt to
25			apply for new loan money and new grant

1			money?
2		A	Yes.
3	47	Q	Now, there's another water district in
4			town that's Alton Water and Sewer. Have
5			they been as aggressive in terms of
6			attempting to get loan and grant money in
7			your opinion?
8		A	For their service area, they have been
9			fairly aggressive. Probably that ties
10			the hands, where you got more than one
11			district in a county, because grant money
12			can only be requested through the fiscal
13			court or the city, whichever of
14			course, we come under the fiscal court.
15			And if there's another district in the
16			county, then they get their request in.
17	48	Q	So that can even complicate matters to
18			the extent that if Alton is attempting to
19			get grant money in a given year, it might
20			knock South Anderson out because of a
21			similar request?
22		A	Yes.
23	49	Q	And put you back a year or so?
24		A	Right. And that just happened. They did
25			a project a couple years ago, and we had

1			to sit out. And now this is our turn to
2			do our expansion, and we're trying to do
3			as much as we can with the money we got.
4	50	Q	You've aware of the complaint that's been
5			filed in this case; are you not, sir?
6		А	Yes, I am.
7	51	Q	What is your understanding of that
8			complaint?
9		A	Well, we
10	52	Q	Just in laymen's terms.
11		A	Okay. We feel that, you know, a
12			complaint we feel that a concern of
13			people that's not receiving water is
14			justified. Everybody has to wait in
15			turn, if you live out in the county, of
16			services getting to you, and sometimes
17			this takes a while. And Mr. Barnett has
18			requested service to property along a
19			road that was reviewed, but when we're
20			looking at over a mile of water line, and
21			I believe that road only had two houses
22			on it at the time
23	53	Q	Are we talking about back in what time
24			period, Mr. Kincer?
25		A	Well, probably two years ago.

1	54	Q	So sometime in '98, maybe the middle or
2			fall of '98?
3		A	Yes, when
4	55	Q	These roads are actually ridden by
5			individuals?
6		A	Yes.
7	56	Q	And houses are actually counted?
8		A	Very much so, yes.
9	57	Q	And that's because you're trying to
10			figure out potential number of users per
11			mile and the feasibility of how much
12			water use the district would get so they
13			would know what revenues they would
14			receive, so they would know how much
15			money they would be able to pay back on
16			loans, simply?
17		A	That's true, and that's the only way we
18			can get loan money is that they we
19			tell them that there is adequate revenue
20			coming in to pay back the loan.
21	58	Q	I'm going to give you an exhibit, which
22			is go off the record for a second.
23			(OFF THE RECORD)
24			(REPORTER MARKS EXHIBIT NO. 1, PETITION
25			FOR WILLOW CREEK ROAD, FOR PURPOSES OF

1		IDENTIFICATION AND THE SAME IS ATTACHED
2		HERETO)
3	59 Q	Mr. Kincer, I have and I believe
4		either Mr. Warford or Mr. Taylor supplied
5		me with this, but I have a copy of the
6		petition which deals with Willow Creek,
7		and on the petition it lists Dwight
8		Conway, 1121 Willow Creek; Rudy Jewell,
9		1210 Willow Creek; Ronnie Jewell, 1212
10		Willow Creek; Allen Chambers, 1282 Willow
11		Creek; Danny Armstrong and Shelia Barnes,
12		1316 Willow Creek; Mark Clark, 1181
13		Willow Creek; Kathy Drury I think it's
14		Kathy Bush now 1081 Willow Creek;
15		Steve Drury, 1320 Willow Creek, and Mike
16		Tipton, 1202 Willow Creek. I'd like for
17		you to take a look at that and see if
18		that's not if you don't recall, that
19		may be a petition that was submitted to
20		the district requesting water service on
21		Willow Creek, which is now the Aaron
22		Barnett Road, which is the subject of
23		this controversy.
24	A	Yes. I think the beginning of a project,
25		this is very typical of our expansion out

1			into the county, is that we do take roads
2			and we do drive it; we do get people that
3			are interested in water to give us a
4			listing of names and where they are. And
5			then if that road shows that it is
6			feasible, then we would complete that
7			road. There is in this project, as well
8			as in past projects, many roads, eight or
9			ten in this project alone, that we've
10			been able to serve part of the road.
11			And, again, if the water line is going
12			down the road, when it becomes unfeasible
13			to run another mile of water line because
14			there's only two or three houses in that
15			length of time or on that length of
16			road, then we have to stop, and we do all
17			roads that way.
18	60	Q	Now, on this particular case, I believe,
19			and I don't think I'm misstating, all of
20			these individuals are on the first mile,
21			seven or mile, eight?
22		A	First part of that road, yes.
23	61	Q	Now, Mr. Barnett's name is not on that
24			petition, is it?
25		A	No, it's not.

1	62	Q	Mr. Barnett does not live on the first
2			his property is not located, nor does he
3			live on the first 1.8 miles of this
4			particular road?
5		А	That's right. He would be located on the
6			last portion of the road where there's
7			really not adequate housing to cause our
8			water line. And, again, this review was
9			made in '88 or '98, I'm sorry, at the
10			time we were taking the survey.
11	63	Q	Right. And at the time the survey was
12			taken for the grant application, there
13			were, am I right, two, Mr. Barnett and
14			one other?
15		A	On the remaining part
16	64	Q	As far as users on that road?
17		A	Yes.
18	65	Q	In your experience in these projects, is
19			that a sufficient number of users to
20			extend the water line an additional 1.3
21			miles to tie into 62?
22		A	No. Not even with 50 percent grant
23	į		money, you cannot make the balance of
24			that road feasible.
25	66	Q	Now, was this judgment about where to
	1		

1			stop the road made on anything other than
2			pure economic feasibility grounds?
3		A	No, it was not.
4	67	Q	Was there any thought that we're just not
5			going to take it down there because
6			Mr. Barnett is developing his property?
7			First of all, are you aware that he may
8			be developing his property?
9		A	Well, I would say there's probably a lot
10			of interest in getting water to property
11			because it does increase the value of it.
12	68	Q	And this, in fact, gets the water very
13			close to Mr. Barnett's property, right?
14		A	Yes. Yes, it does.
15	69	Q	Do you have experience in dealing with
16			developers through the water district at
17			all?
18		A	Restate that.
19	70	Q	Do you have any experience in dealing
20			with developers as they relate to the
21			water district?
22		A	Yes. Yes.
23	71	Q	Okay. Now, generally speaking, when
24			water is close to a piece of property
25			that is going to be developed, who pays

1			for the cost of running water lines?
2		A	Well, developers are normally responsible
3			to take our water line under our
4			supervision and put it in, and then at
5			their expense. Now, there is some
6			payback, but that's under a guideline
7			from the PSC of how we're to reimburse
8			that as houses are developed.
9	72	Q	But, generally speaking, if you get water
10			to a piece of property that is being
11			developed, developers take the line
12			through their property and extend the
13			water line?
14		A	Yes, that's very true.
15	73	Q	How do they get their money back?
16		A	Well, of course, they get their money
17			back from selling of the property,
18			because they're able to sell it for more
19			with
20	74	Q	Theoretically, the property is worth more
21			with the water than it was without?
22		A	Yes, very true.
23	75	Q	You mentioned earlier we'll digress
24			back that there were other roads other
25			than Willow Creek/Aaron Barnett Road,

1		that were only put in the project in
2		portions due to number of households per
3		mile. For the record, could you share
4		with the Commission what those other
5		roads might be?
6	A	Well, I'd say there were probably eight
7		or ten that we were not able to go
8		completely through that road to join our
9		water line at the other end. Some of
10		those roads are Tanner Road, Ashby Road,
11		Burgin Road, Glensboro, Searcy School
12		Road, Dugansville Road, Hungry Road, Lick
13		Skillet Road, Cox Road, Gilbert's Creek
14		Road. All of those would have not been
15		completed in this project. And this is
16		probably very typical of any phase that
17		we've gone through, that roads have to be
18		dropped off when the houses start getting
19		down into the four, five per mile, unless
20		you've got an awful high percentage of
21		grant money available.
22	76 Q	So what you're telling the Commission is
23		Mr. Barnett is not in a position solely
24		by himself. There are many others within
25		the boundary of the district that are in

1		a similar state. How do you think these
2		others would feel if the Commission or
3		some court were to say, well, Mr.
4		Barnett, since you've raised a stink here
5		and you filed a complaint, you ought to
6		be entitled to get service, and we're
7		going to order the district to spend 40
8		or \$50,000 and extend it down that mile
9		of road? Given your experience in
10		dealing with utility customers and the
11		fairness that the Public Service
12		Commission has attempted to demonstrate
13		and put on various utilities, do you have
14		an opinion on that?
15	A	Well, I really believe the district has
16		been fair with everybody that's close to
17		our project and not receiving water. Mr.
18		Barnett happens to be one. And I'm sure
19		there is individuals on all of these two,
20		four, probably eight roads besides
21		Mr. Barnett's road that would love to get
22		water, too. So if he is picked out and
23		is receiving water, then we're going to
24		have eight more cases to deal with under
25		a like situation. And, I guess, my best

1			comment would be, and we say this to all
2			the people that don't receive water in a
3			project, that the water is closer to you
4			for the next project. And that's our
5			purpose in trying to look at phase six,
6			as soon as this one's completed.
7			Whenever that grant money could become
8			available, then those people are going to
9			have an opportunity to get water at that
10			time.
11	77	Q	In your opinion, it wouldn't be fair to
12			let Mr. Barnett have what he wants in
13			this case at the expense of all these
14			other individuals that are in a similar
15			circumstance, would it?
16		A	No, I would not.
17	78	Q	And you wouldn't encourage Public Service
18			Commission to set that precedent, would
19			you?
20		A	I would hope that they would
21	79	Q	You would think they had better sense
22			than that, wouldn't you?
23		A	I would hope, yes.
24	Ė		(OFF THE RECORD)
25	80	Q	Just a few more questions, Mr. Kincer,

and thank you. One of the complaints 1 that Mr. Barnett has communicated to the 2 Commission and to the district is, but, 3 whoa, I've been selling lots out here, 4 and there are now -- we've gone from two 5 to possibly seven potential users. And I think in his own complaint he says that as late as early June of '99 he learned 8 for the first time that the proposed 9 water expansion project of the district 10 did not include his residence or his 11 land. So if one can believe Mr. Barnett, 12 13 he went from August or July of '98, all the way to June of '99, and never knew he 14 15 was not included. But assuming we can 16 believe him, and assuming that he has 17 sold some property out there, and assuming there are seven users, or five 18 19 new users, why don't we just stop the 20 project, like he wants us to, reapply, 21 get the application and get the fiscal 22 court to reapply for the CDBG money, and 23 tell FHA to just hold on for a while? 24 Rural Development now, instead of FHA. 25 What's your thoughts on that?

1		A	Well, in working a project, requesting
2			funding, and especially when we're
3			talking about 2.2 million dollars, I
4			believe is the project right now, with
5			almost one million dollars of that being
6			grant money, that takes a whole lot of
7			time to review and to request and get
8			that approved. When we started the
9			project in '98 and the roads that were
10			feasible were put into the project, this
11			was all done through meetings and
12			hearings and all of that over the course
13			of six months to a year. Now we're in
14			the final stages of this project. A lot
15			of the approval has already been made.
16			The grant money has been tied down and
17			ready to go. The loan money is being
18			approved, and we're
19	81	Q	In fact, you've received your letter of
20			conditions from Rural Development, which
21			pretty much says you're on the track
22		A	Yes.
23	82	Q	to get the loan money, all you have to
24			do are meet the conditions in a normal
25			letter of conditions; is that not

1			correct?
2		A	Yes, that's very true.
3	83	Q	Okay. I didn't mean to interrupt you.
4		A	And then we take we take 340 homes
5			that we're going to reach by this
6			project, and those people have been
7			working with us for two years, and now
8			we're being asked to delay in order to
9			include one individual property, and
10			there is just no way you can go back and
11			undo something. You take a chance of
12			losing this grant money that's been laid
13			aside for us, and the whole project would
14			fall through if the grant money is pulled
15			away from us. And we just believe that
16			those 340 people, they have been waiting
17			in prior projects to receive water, and
18			now they're included in this project, and
19			I just think there is no way to delay and
20			go back and redo without a good chance of
21			losing what we've put together for the
22			last two years.
23			(OFF THE RECORD)
24	8 4	Q	We're going to conclude here soon,
25			Mr. Kincer. We sure appreciate your

giving this testimony. There's been some 1 mention of the fact that in this project, 2 given the design of it and the numbers of 3 it, that there will be individuals like 4 Mr. Barnett, the complainant, and 5 possibly others on his stretch of the 6 road who will not be included in the 7 project, yet there may be some Washington 8 County and/or Mercer County residents 9 who, by virtue of being in close 10 proximity to the line running through 11 Anderson County, might be able to be 12 serviced from that line. Can you give 13 1.4 the Commission any history on how the district and how other districts have 15 16 dealt with this in the past and why it's not inappropriate? 17 18 Α Yes. South Anderson is serving Anderson County customers. The few exceptions 19 20 that come about is for feasibility of 21 people maybe on the edge of another 22 county getting water. Mercer County you 23 mentioned, that we have swapped out some 24 roads with Mercer County, where they come 25 down the road on the Mercer side and

1			serve houses houses in Anderson County
2			on the opposite side, we've allowed them
3			to pick up. And there is some Mercer
4			County customers that we probably do the
5			same thing with in roads that we come
6			down on the Anderson County side, but do
7			cross the road to feed that. That's all
8			in approval with the adjoining county.
9			Washington County is probably again,
10			that we're coming down the road on the
11			Anderson County side and Washington
12			County across the road probably water
13			being available to us is the only way
14			those houses are going to get water. So
15			with Washington County's approval, we
16	ŀ		would allow those Washington County
17			customers to sign up on ours, and that's
18			just an agreement between the counties.
19			And we're not running our major water
20			line in two counties taking over some
21			boundaries. It's only done upon
22			agreement.
23	85	Q	So the district's line is basically
24			within the district itself?
25		A	Yes.

1	86	Q	And there may be tangential customers in
2			another county who are fortuitously able
3			to tap onto the line due to their
4			location, and it also helps the
5			district's road count, because it gives
6			more number of users makes the project
7			more feasible; is that not correct?
8		A	Yes. Yes.
9	8 7	Q	And, finally, I want you to look at a
10			document that I'm going to hand you and
11			collectively call it the application.
12			The top document, we can call that, I
13			guess, Collectively Exhibit 2.
14			(REPORTER MARKS EXHIBIT NO. 2,
15	;		APPLICATION FOR FUNDING WITH ATTACHMENTS,
16			FOR PURPOSES OF IDENTIFICATION AND THE
17			SAME IS ATTACHED HERETO)
18	88	Q	Well, on the top there, Mr. Kincer, is a
19			letter from you to Louis F. Elliott dated
20			October 2, 1998. Mr. Elliott is the
21			Regional District Manager for the United
22			States Department of Agriculture, Rural
23			Development. His office is in
24			Shelbyville, Kentucky. Did you not sign
25			this letter and send Mr. Elliott what

1			Exhibit 2 purports to be, an application
2			and attachments for funding?
3		A	Yes. In October of 1998 this was done,
4			yes.
5	89	Q	Okay. And is that your signature on the
6			application for federal assistance under
7			date of October 9, 1998?
8		А	Yes, it is. And this was requesting
9			approximately 1.2 million dollars in loan
10			money to be followed by one million
11			dollars in grant money.
12	90	Q	Okay. That application was filed,
13			obviously, in October of '98. We
14			recently just had our meeting with
15			Mr. Loper. Was it last month?
16		A	Yes.
17	91	Q	That would have been December some
18			time in December of '99, I believe?
19		A	Yes.
20	92	Q	And at that meeting, some 14 months
21			later, we were finally getting our
22			letters of conditions
23		A	Yes.
24	93	Q	based upon that application?
25		A	Uh-huh (affirmative).

1	94	Q	Okay. Now, that application went in, did
2			it not, after Exhibit 1, which indicates
3			the petition for service on Willow Creek
4			was delivered to the district?
5		A	Yes, it would have.
6	95	Q	Mr. Barnett's signature is not on this
7			petition, is it?
8		A	No, it's not.
9	96	Q	In fact, in his answer, which he filed
10			with the Commission, he indicated he
11			never did learn that he wasn't involved
12			in the project until June of '99, so he
13			says. How many months later well,
14			June of '99 would be, what, about
15			eight
16		А	Would be almost ten months.
17	97	Q	Eight or ten months later than the
18			application being filed?
19		A	Yes.
20	98	Q	Okay. One last thing. Mr. Barnett
21			indicates in his complaint that also it
22			would be approximately ten more years
23			before the district would pursue any
24			additional expansion plans. Is that
25			consistent with what you've testified

1		today, and consistent with the actions of
2		the district over the past 25 years? .
3	A	Well, we would like to believe that in a
4		five-year rotation that we're either in
5		another project or we've got one pretty
6		well completed, like this one is, and
7		ready to go. That's not saying that it
8		will happen. Might happen sooner, might
9		happen later. But our interest from the
10		water district is to complete the non-
11		receivers of city water in our district
12		as soon as possible and as soon as funds
13		are made available. And, you know, we're
14		not trying to discriminate against any
15		individual, not on that road that
16		Mr. Barnett lives on, or these other
17		eight that I mentioned that we had to
18		stop. But there is a feasibility that
19		you got to go by. Even the Commission
20		understands that you can't take water
21		lines out where it's not close to being
22		feasible and expect your other customers
23		to pay for it.
24	99 Q	That wouldn't be prudent, would it,
25		Chairman Kincer?

1	A	No, it wouldn't. There's just no way you
2		can do that. In fact, I don't know that
3		South Anderson has ever had a general
4		rate increase. We have always had to
5	!	increase the water rates for all
6		customers somewhat after a project, and
7		these are normally approved because it
8		will the larger you get, the easier it
9		is to absorb some increases in the
10		future. So we don't fuss about having to
11		increase them a little bit at the end of
12		a project, because we pick up 3 or 400
13		new customers that's going to help us be
14		more feasible in the future.
15	100 Q	And over time, hasn't it become easier
16		with the Commission to get those sort of
17		what are called pass-through rate
18		increases?
19	A	Yes.
20	101 Q	Used to be when we first started, in
21		phase one and phase two, you had to go
22		through a formal rate application
23		increase and had a hearing on it, right?
24	A	Uh-huh (affirmative). Right.
25	102 Q	Now, as a part of the construction

1	process, and the approval, the Commission
2	generally, unless there's something out
3	of line, acknowledges that these rates
4	need to be passed through?
5	A I think as long as they look at it and
6	see that the project is making the
7	district stronger for the future, that
8	they'll normally go ahead and allow an
9	increase to be tacked on.
10	MR. EDELMAN: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Kincer.
11	If we need anything more,
12	we'll contact you, but we

PROJECT NARRATIVE

The project will address a serious problem faced by many of the residents of rural Anderson County, that being the lack of a safe, dependable, and affordable domestic water supply. Most of the residents of this area who do not live along roads currently served by the water district, obtain their domestic water from either wells or cisterns. The health and safety of many of these residents are threatened by contaminated water. The hauling of water necessary to augment the cisterns and lower yielding wells is also a financial burden for many of the families.

The proposed project consists of approximately 239,325 feet of 4" and 10,800 feet of 3" distribution line, 24,500 ft. of 8" transmission line, and one 300 gpm booster pump station. Also included are 342 individual services plus the normal water distribution accessories such as gate valves, air release valves and blow-off assemblies. All customers will be supplied water between 30 psig and 90 psig at their meter connection. There are no known or anticipated unusual construction conditions.

This proposal is requesting \$1,088,330 in loan money from the U.S.D.A. - Rural Development and a \$1,000,000 grant from the Community Development Block Grant program. These funds will be combined with a \$117,500 local contribution to accomplish the proposed project. Upon approval of funding, engineering design will be completed, approvals obtained and construction will begin in a timely fashion.

Tests conducted by the County Health Department and a private water testing lab indicated that 67% of all cisterns and springs had coliform contamination and that 25% were contaminated with the deadly E. Coli bacterium. Exposure to E. Coli can lead to a range of maladies, from stomach cramps to total kidney failure. The Project Area's homes are either clustered together creek bottoms where outhouses (approximately 2) and straight pipes prevail, or on farmland where runoff from cattle, hog or horse operations enters the creeks, permeating the water table. Seven households reported that they had contracted intestinal infections from their water supplies.

Fear of drinking the water was prevalent; household surveys revealed that one in two (50%) households purchased their drinking water, spending from \$15 to \$20 monthly for bottled water. Mothers are advised by local physicians to not use well, cistern or spring water for mixing infant formula, frail or ill persons were afraid to consume well, cistern or spring water due to the high mineral content and the possibility of contracting a life-threatening bacteriological infection.

Reports on Anderson County from the Epidemiology section of the Cabinet for Human Resources indicate that, since 1993, there have been 5 cases of Camphybactor, 1 case of E. Coli related illness, 9 cases of Salmonella, and 2 cases of Giardia, all water borne illnesses. The Anderson County Health Department supports these records, citing reported cases of Hepatitis (non-A and non-B) and "many" cases of Campylobactor. According to the Control of Communicable Diseases Manual, "fecal contamination of nonchlorinated public water supplies has caused some extensive outbreaks of Salmonellosis". The Project Area has the largest concentration of households in the County still unserved by potable water (325 consumers of an estimated 500 unserved households), it may be surmised that a number of these cases have been in the Project Area. Severe contamination of water supplies such as those tested, in addition to the aforementioned report, indicates an imminent health threat to the households in this Project Area.

Description of Need:

For years, households within a 13 road area of Anderson County have requested that public water supplies be extended to them. Current water supplies consist of cisterns (96%), drilled wells (3%), or springs or creeks (1%). Household surveys revealed that one in two households (50%) were too afraid of their water source to drink it and had to purchase their drinking water at an average cost of \$15 to \$20 per month. There were 178 households in the Project Area that hauled their own water(which requires a truck, a 300 gallon plastic storage tank and \$4.00 per load), making an average of 12 trips per month, or had their water hauled, at a cost of \$67 per month.

The majority of the residences in the Project Area are grouped in clusters along ridgetops, on or adjacent to small farms on which cattle, hogs and/or horses are raised. In these areas, outhouses and concentrations of "straight pipes" are the norm and leach right into the water table. Livestock from the small farms have access to the creeks and/or any run-off from grazing areas allows animal wastes and Nitrates to enter the creek and contaminate the water table. A recent study of the Center for Disease Control and Prevention confirmed that Nitrate runoff from fertilizer, animal or human feces has linked instances of miscarriages in humans to the consumption of water sources contaminated in this fashion. Seven households reported that they had contracted intestinal infections from their water supplies. Five households in the Project Area were advised ny local doctors to boil water for infant formula, lest they endanger the health and safety of their infants. Soil types throughout the Project Area are clayey soils of the Lowell-Faywood-Eden; these soil types are susceptible to our absorption rates and are generally located in or near creek bottoms and along ridgetops. These soils are classified as "severe" in terms of permeability and percolation of any septic fields or outhouses in the Project Area, thereby allowing human wastes to infiltrate the groundwater.

The South Anderson Water District is currently purchasing the maximum amount of water allowed in their Water Purchase Agreement with the City of Lawrenceburg, with no hope of increasing the amount of water that can be purchased. The City Water Treatment Plant is treating the maximum allowable gallonage and will unable to provide more finished water without an upgrade in their pumping and treatment capabilities. A bulk water station near the Project Area used by residents to fill plastic storage tanks for cisterns, was shut down this July and August because the drought-like conditions increased the demand for water. The Water District was exceeding their Purchase limits and feared having their water limited by the City, denying all District customers ample water supplies. The District proposes to construct 24,500 LF of 8" water distribution line to interconnect their system with the Frankfort Water system; a purchase agreement is in draft form and shall be finalized upon confirmation of funding. Provision of this distribution line will enable the Water District to utilize the new Frankfort interconnection solely for water service for the northeastern sector of the District and for an emergency back-up supply. The gallonage formerly purchased for this sector (approximately 80,000 gallons per day) will, in effect, reduce the amount of water purchased from the City, however, the District shall still purchase additional water from the City in order to satisfy the demands (approximately 55,000 gallons per day) of the new Project Area customers. . As a result, the District will be able to remain within their Purchase Agreement limits with the City and still serve these new customers, while utilizing a regional source of water for their northeastern sector.

which may be paid for in part with financial assistance from the United States of America acting through Rural Development of the United States Department of Agriculture, pursuant to the consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act, (7 U.S.C. 1921 et seq.) and for which the ENGINEER agrees to perform the various professional engineering services for the design and construction of said system.							
WITNESSETH:							

SECTION A - ENGINEERING SERVICES

The ENGINEER shall furnish engineering services as follows:

- 1. The ENGINEER will conduct preliminary investigations, prepare preliminary drawings, provide a preliminary itemized list of probable construction costs effective as of the date of the preliminary report, and submit a preliminary engineering report following Rural Development instructions and guides.
 - The ENGINEER will furnish 10 copies of the preliminary engineering report, and layout maps to the OWNER.

That for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises between the parties hereto, it is hereby agreed:

- 3. The ENGINEER will attend conferences with the OWNER, representatives of Rural Development, or other interested parties as may be reasonably necessary.
- 4. After the preliminary engineering report has been reviewed and approved by the OWNER and by Rural Development and the OWNER directs the ENGINEER to proceed, the ENGINEER will perform the necessary design surveys, accomplish the detailed design of the project, prepare construction drawings, specifications and contract documents, and prepare a final cost estimate based on the final design for the entire system. It is also understood that if subsurface explorations (such as borings, soil tests, rock soundings and the like) are required, the ENGINEER will furnish coordination of said explorations without additional charge, but the costs incident to such explorations shall be paid for by the OWNER as set out in Section D hereof.
- 5. The contract documents furnished by the ENGINEER under Section A-4 shall utilize Rural Development-endorsed construction contract documents, including Rural Development General Conditions. Contract Change Orders, and partial payment estimates. All of these documents shall be subject to Rural Development approval. Copies of guide contract documents may be obtained from Rural Development.
- 6. Prior to the advertisement for bids, the ENGINEER will provide for each construction contract, not to exceed 10 copies of detailed drawings, specifications, and contract documents for use by the OWNER, appropriate Federal, State, and local agencies from whom approval of the project must be obtained. The cost of such drawings, specifications, and contract documents shall be included in the basic compensation paid to the ENGINEER.
- 7. The ENGINEER will furnish additional copies of the drawings, specifications and contract documents as required by prospective bidders, material suppliers, and other interested parties, but may charge them for the reasonable cost of such copies. Upon award of each contract, the ENGINEER will furnish to the OWNER five sets of the drawings, specifications and contract documents for execution. The cost of these sets shall be included in the basic compensation paid to the ENGINEER. Original documents, survey notes, tracings, and the like, except those furnished to the ENGINEER by the OWNER, are and shall remain the property of the ENGINEER.

- 8. The drawings prepared by the ENGINEER under the provisions of Section A-4 above shall be in sufficient detail to permit the actual location of the proposed improvements on the ground. The ENGINEER shall prepare and furnish to the OWNER without any additional compensation, three copies of a map(s) showing the general location of needed construction easements and permanent easements and the land to be acquired. Property surveys, property plats, property descriptions, abstracting and negotiations for land rights shall be accomplished by the OWNER, unless the OWNER requests, and the ENGINEER agrees to provide those services. In the event the ENGINEER is requested to provide such services, the ENGINEER shall be additionally compensated as set out in Section D hereof.
- 9. The ENGINEER will attend the bid opening and tabulate the bid proposals, make an analysis of the bids, and make recommendations for awarding contracts for construction.
- 10. The ENGINEER will review and approve, for conformance with the design concept, any necessary shop and working drawings furnished by contractors.
- 11. The ENGINEER will interpret the intent of the drawings and specifications to protect the OWNER against defects and deficiencies in construction on the part of the contractors. The ENGINEER will not, however, guarantee the performance by any contractor.
- 12. The ENGINEER will establish baselines for locating the work together with a suitable number of bench marks adjacent to the work as shown in the contract documents.
- 13. The ENGINEER will provide general engineering review of the work of the contractors as construction progresses to ascertain that the contractor is conforming with the design concept.
- 14. Unless notified by the OWNER in writing that the OWNER will provide for resident inspection, the ENGINEER will provide resident construction inspection. The ENGINEER'S undertaking hereunder shall not relieve the contractor of contractor's obligation to perform the work in conformity with the drawings and specifications and in a workmanlike manner; shall not make the ENGINEER an insurer of the contractor's performance; and shall not impose upon the ENGINEER any obligation to see that the work is performed in a safe manner.
- 15. The ENGINEER will cooperate and work closely with Rural Development representatives.
- 16. The ENGINEER will review the contractor's applications for progress and final payment and, when approved, submit same to the OWNER for payment.
- 17. The ENGINEER will prepare necessary contract change orders for approval of the OWNER, Rural Development, and others on a timely basis.
- 18. The ENGINEER will make a final review prior to the issuance of the statement of substantial completion of all construction and submit a written report to the OWNER and Rural Development. Prior to submitting the final pay estimate, the ENGINEER shall submit a statement of completion to and obtain the written acceptance of the facility from the OWNER and Rural Development.
- 19. The ENGINEER will provide the OWNER with one set of reproducible record (as-built) drawings, and two sets of prints at no additional cost to the OWNER. Such drawings will be based upon construction records provided by the contractor during construction and reviewed by the resident inspector and from the resident inspector's construction data.
- 20. If State statutes require notices and advertisements of final payment, the ENGINEER shall assist in their preparation.
- 21. The ENGINEER will be available to furnish engineering services and consultations necessary to correct unforeseen project operation difficulties for a period of one year after the date of statement of substantial completion of the facility. This service will include instruction of the OWNER in initial project operation and maintenance but will not include supervision of normal operation of the system. Such consultation and advice shall be furnished without additional charge except for travel and subsistence costs. The ENGINEER will assist the OWNER in performing a review of the project during the 11th month after the date of the certificate of substantial completion.
 - 2. The ENGINEER further agrees to obtain and maintain, at the ENGINEER'S expense, such insurance as will protect the ENGINEER from claims under the Workman's Compensation Act and such comprehensive general liability insurance as will protect the OWNER and the ENGINEER from all claims for bodily injury, death, or property damage which may arise from the performance by the ENGINEER or by the ENGINEER'S employees of the ENGINEER'S functions and services required under this Agreement.

FEES FOR PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERING SERVICES AS A PERCENTAGE OF NET CONSTRUCTION COST

This attachment will be executed and made a part of the "Agreement for Engineering Services." It will be used as a guide for determining maximum compensation for basic engineering and resident inspection services.

TABLE I - BASIC DESIGN

These fees snall pertain to projects requiring complex or detailed engineering design. This will include sewage treatment plants, sewage collection, sewage lift stations, water treatment plants, water distribution mains and appurtenances less than 12 inches in diameter, water pump stations, water storage facilities, and renovations of water and sewer facilities.

Fees for less complex projects such as light industrial buildings, roads, streets, storm drains 24 inches and larger, water distribution mains 12 inches and larger, and appurtenances related thereto shall be 85% of the above Table I percentages.

Surveys for design such as topography, profiles, cross sections and the like, soundings—not to exceed six feet in depth— to estimate the amount of rock excavation, are included in the basic service instead of being classified as additional or special services.

GENERAL INFORMATION FOR BASIC AND RESIDENT INSPECTION FEES

The resident inspector will maintain a daily diary meeting FmHA requirements.

Compensation for construction costs between the values listed in the schedule should be determined by interpolation.

If a project is divided into units and all units are authorized for design at the same time, the compensation will be determined by adding together the costs of the construction of the various units and applying the table to the sum of these costs. The initial construction award amount will set the fee percent for project (change orders will not adjust fee percent). For construction inspection, the initial percent times the revised construction cost will create an up-set figure not to be exceeded. If remaining funds are used and additional construction is rebid, the project shall be treated as a new project with new fee percentages.

PHASE 5 EXPANSION PROJECT SOUTH ANDERSON WATER DISTRICT

I. INTRODUCTION

The South Anderson Water District (SAWD) was originally formed to provide a safe, dependable supply of potable water to the citizens of southern Anderson County. Since its inception in 1967, the SAWD has grown until it serves approximately 1450 customers over a large portion of the County including some in the northern portion of the County. SAWD intends to eventually make treated water available to every citizen with in its boundary. This project will go along way toward accomplishing this as it extends service to 14 separate areas of the county and provides an additional source of treated water. SAWD anticipates serving approximately 342 new users on the extensions. The proposed facilities are modest in design, size and cost and will be constructed and operated in an environmentally responsible manner.

II. PROJECT PLANNING AREA

Included as Exhibit 1 is a map of Anderson County with SAWD's boundary, existing facilities and proposed facilities indicated. The planning area for the proposed project includes all of the area within SAWD's boundary as the entire distribution system must be designed to ultimately provide treated water to the entire area. Toward this goal the facilities previously constructed and planned by SAWD have been designed to provide the necessary volume and pressures for the completed system. The proposed facilities are shown on Exhibits II -IV which are portions of the USGS 7.5 minute topographic maps of the areas. The transmission line from the Frankfort Plant Board system will provide an alternate source of water to the system and can be extended to tie into the rest of the system at a later date if need arises. The specific areas to be served by the project include the following roads/communities: Ballard, Dugansville Rd., Hoophole, Puncheon Ck. Rd., and Searcy Sch. Rd.; Fairview, Lick Skillet Rd., and Ky Hwy 1291; Drydock, Anderson City, Buntain Sch. Rd., and Ky 44 east of Glensboro; US 62 west of Johnsonville, Ky Hwy 248 and Ky Hwy 3358 (Tanner Rd.); Burgin Rd.; US 127 Bypass from Sidney to US 127; Cox Rd.; Willow Ck. Rd.; Ky Hwy 44 west of Glensboro; Ashby Rd.; Gilberts Ck. Rd.; Woolridge Rd.; Rice Rd.; and Fox Ck. Rd..

The project will address a serious problem faced by the residents of these areas, that being the lack of a safe, dependable water supply. The personal health and safety of the residents are threatened by contaminated water sources. A portion of the families are also forced to haul water, creating a financial burden. The District has sampled a cross-section of the water supplies in the area and determined that the majority were contaminated by coliform or other bacteria. Tests conducted by the County Health Department and a

private water testing lab indicated that 67% of all cisterns and springs had coliform contamination and that 25% were contaminated with the deadly E. Coli bacterium. Exposure to E. Coli can lead to a range of maladies, from stomach cramps to total kidney failure. The Project Area's homes are either clustered together along creek bottoms where outhouses (approximately 2) and straight pipes prevail, or on farmland where runoff from cattle, hog or horse operations enters the creeks, permeating the water table. Seven households reported that they had contracted intestinal infections from their water supplies.

Fear of drinking the water was prevalent; household surveys revealed that one in two (50%) households purchased their drinking water, spending from \$15 to \$20 monthly for bottled water. Mothers are advised by local physicians to not use well, cistern or spring water for mixing infant formula, frail or ill persons were afraid to consume well, cistern or spring water due to the high mineral content and the possibility of contracting a life-threatening bacteriological infection.

Reports on Anderson County from the Epidemiology section of the Cabinet for Human Resources indicate that, since 1993, there have been 5 cases of Camphybactor, 1 case of E. Coli related illness, 9 cases of Salmonella, and 2 cases of Giardia, all water borne illnesses. The Anderson County Health Department supports these records, citing reported cases of Hepatitis (non-A and non-B) and "many" cases of Campylobactor. According to the Control of Communicable Diseases Manual, "fecal contamination of nonchlorinated public water supplies has caused some extensive outbreaks of Salmonellosis". The Project Area has the largest concentration of households in the County still unserved by potable water (342 consumers of an estimated 500 unserved households), it may be surmised that a number of these cases have been in the Project Area. Severe contamination of water supplies such as those tested, in addition to the aforementioned report, indicates an imminent health threat to the households in this Project Area.

There are no known or anticipated unusual construction conditions. Due to shallow soil depths in much of the area, the unit cost per foot of water line will be slightly higher than in some other areas of the state. The District is not aware of any environmentally significant features, historic sites or important land resources which will be adversely impacted by the project.

III. EXISTING FACILITIES

The District's distribution facilities now consist of approximately 37,000 feet of 8", 273,500 feet of 6", 180,500 feet of 4" and 19,500 feet of 3" distribution line; 3-100,000 gallon and 1-131,000 gallon storage tanks; 3-100 gpm booster pump stations; and assorted accessories such as gate valves, and blow-off hydrants/valves. All of the system is less than 25 years old and a major portion is less than 10 years old. All existing facilities are in good to excellent working condition. The District is currently planning to construct a booster pump station and standpipe in the US 62/US 127 bypass area. These facilities

will provide service to the higher elevations in this area and increase the quantity of water that can be taken out US 62 west.

The District currently purchases all water. It has a contract with the City of Lawrenceburg for up to 10 million gallons per month through 2037.

Given in the attached Summary/Addendum are the District's current rate schedules, tabulation of users by monthly usage categories, status of existing long-term indebtedness and amounts on deposit in the required reserve accounts. The District is physically and economically sound.

IV. PROPOSED FACILITIES AND SERVICES

General Description. The proposed project consists of approximately 24,500 feet of eight inch, 239,325 feet of four inch, and 10,800 feet of three inch water line; 1-300 gpm booster pump station; and distribution system appurtenances such as gate valves, air release valves, blow-off valves, meters, etc. The distribution lines will be primarily of PVC. Some small sections of ductile iron pipe may be used in special areas, i.e., stream crossings, past gas tanks, etc. The facilities will be designed to provide the customers with a minimum pressure of 30 psi at the meter at peak flow conditions. Where static pressures exceed 90 psi, individual pressure regulators will be provided to protect fixtures from high pressures. The booster pump station will pump to the existing standpipe at Ninevah.

The booster pumping station will be designed to maintain a minimum operating level in the standpipe about 10 to 12 feet lower than the overflow elevation of the tank. This will require pumping to begin when the water level in the tank drops to the minimum operating level; pumping will continue until the tank is refilled to just below the overflow level. This procedure will provide adequate pressure stabilization of the system. The hydraulic model of the system is currently being updated to include the proposed project and significant results of the model will be appended to this report when completed.

The locations of the major elements of the project are shown on the attached county road map and portions of the U.S.G.S. topographic maps. An itemized cost estimate is given in Attachment I. The extension of the District's distribution facilities is the only viable alternative for providing water service to these areas of the County.

<u>Land.</u> It will be necessary to acquire land on which to construct the booster pump station. A tract approximately 30' x 30' will be needed for the booster pump station. The approximate location of this facility is shown on the attached maps, however, the location may vary depending on the final design of the system and the ability to acquire the land.

<u>Rights.</u> Easements will be required for the water distribution lines, many of which will be given by the individual customers. By necessity, some easements for the distribution lines will be on State and County road right-of-way.

No permits or easements have been obtained at this time for the proposed work. It is anticipated that in addition to the land requirements previously mentioned, permits and/or approvals will be required from the following agencies:

VI. FEASIBILITY STUDY

It is anticipated that this project will be funded with tap fees; local, district and county contributions, a loan and a grant. This section contains an economic feasibility analysis to determine the affect of additional borrowing on the District's financial integrity and the need for a rate adjustment. The District supplied computer generated billing data for calendar year July 1, 1997 through June 30, 1998 from which the billing analysis was perpared. The annual operating budget was developed adjusting the 1997 Annual PSC Report and Audit for the additional customers, inflation, employee pay raises, etc.

VII. EXPENSES

<u>Capital Improvements</u>. In order to serve planned development at the higher elevations in the KY 44 - US 62 - US 127 Bypass area, the District is currently planning to build a new standpipe and booster pump station in this area. The land for the standpipe has been obtained and construction is scheduled to start in January 1999 with completion by May 1, 1999. The District will pay for the improvements by borrowing approximately \$200,000.00 and taking the remainder (\$160,000.00) from their existing funds. It is anticipated that the necessary funding can be obtained locally at a rate of 7% or less for a period of 20 years. The existing rates can support this loan without compromising the integrity of the District.

IX. CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Conclusions

- A. A majority of the residents in the proposed project area do not have an acceptable domestic water source. Also a health hazard exists due to the contamination of many of the sources currently being used.
- B. The extension of the South Anderson Water District water distribution system into the area is the only viable means of providing them with an acceptable water source.
- C. Significant grant funds will be required for construction in order to keep the rate schedule at a tolerable level.
- D. The financial feasibility indicates that the South Anderson Water District cannot serve the proposed project area on the existing rates without seriously jeopardizing the financial integrity of the operations even with the requested \$1,000,000.00 CDBG grant. The rates proposed herein are sufficient to cover operating expenses, debt service, debt service coverage, bond resolution depreciation reserve funding and provide some net unobligated monies. The revenues are not sufficient to cover the full amount of depreciation allowed in the rate base. The grant is necessary to allow the District to operate comfortably.

Recommendations

The project, as presented herein, is feasible with the assumed level of grant and the proposed rates. This will enable the District to accumulate a reasonable amount of monies which could be used to facilitate additional extensions and/or defray unforeseen expenses. An application should be made to Rural Development for loan funds to construct the water system improvements proposed herein.

1. Primary Beneficiaries

This project is being implemented to make potable water service available to approximately 400 households in rural Anderson County which presently do not have a public treated water source available to them. It is anticipated that approximately 342 of these will become initial users. While a reliable water service could possibly enhance the potential for industrial growth in the area, it is not anticipated that major developments will directly benefit from this project. One rural general store is expected to become a user.

2. <u>Area Description</u>

A. Anderson County is located in the central Bluegrass region of Kentucky. The county seat is Lawrenceburg which is located in the eastern part of the county. The South Anderson Water District's service area covers the portion of the county south and west of Lawrenceburg and a small section of the county north and east of Lawrenceburg.

This project proposes to extend service into 14 areas of the County which are not currently being served. It will also include a connection to the Frankfort Plant Board distribution system providing an additional source of treated water to the District. The proposed project consists of approximately 239,325 feet of 6" and 10,800 feet of 3" distribution line, 24,500 feet of 8" transmission line, and one 300 gpm booster pump station. Also included are 342 individual services plus the normal water distribution accessories such as gate valves, air release valves and blow-off assemblies. The area to be affected by the booster pump station will be quite small (less than 1/10 acre). The proposed location of this facility is shown on the attached map.

B. (2) Commercial - Any existing commercial establishments can be provided with a source of domestic water which was not previously available. The construction activities may have a minimal adverse effect which will not last past the completion of construction in the immediate area of the commercial facility.

- (3) Residential All residences along the water distribution lines will have a public water system available as their source of domestic water.
- (4) Agricultural There maybe minimal adverse affects such as fence removal during construction.
- (5) Grazing The same as (4) Agricultural above.
- (7) Forests There may be some minimal adverse affect on the small forests along the water line. There are no significant forests in the area. The water line will be routed away from established trees.
- (9) Transportation The water lines will basically be laid parallel to the roads and highways in the area and must by necessity cross underneath roads on occasion. There will be no significant impacts to the roads.
- C. Attached in Exhibit II are 1) portions of the following USGS 7 1/2 minute topographic quadrangles with the project delineated: Chaplin, Glensboro, Ashbrook, Lawrenceburg, McBrayer, Tyrone, Frankfort-East, Frankfort-West and Salvisa. 2) The USDA-Soil Conservation Service Soil Survey maps with the lines indicated and 3) FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps. The only facilities located in areas of potential flooding will be the typical creek crossings.
- 3. Air Quality Not applicable to this type of project.

4. Water Quality

- A. The project will have very little, if any, impact on the existing surface and ground water quality in the area. Accordingly, no data is attached.
- B. The water for this project will be purchased treated water from the cities of Lawrenceburg and Frankfort. The estimated daily water usage of the new users is 57,000 gallons.
- C. No new discharge or effluents will be associated with the project.
- D. Not applicable.
- E. Not applicable.
- F. No additional surface runoff is expected from the proposed project.
- 5. <u>Solid Waste Management</u> Not applicable to this type of project.

6. <u>Transportation</u>

No new transportation patterns will be generated. The capacities of the existing facilities will not be exceeded. During construction, the increase in traffic will be minimal. After construction is completed, there will be no noticeable increase in traffic.

7. Noise

No noticeable noise will be associated with the project function.

8. Historic/Archaeological Properties

There are no known historical properties located within the project area.

9. Wildlife and Endangered Species

- A. The wildlife resources of the area are quite limited in that the project will be located primarily along the public roads near houses. No impact to wildlife is expected.
- B. No known endangered or threatened species or critical habitat exists in the project area.

10. Energy

The only energy needed to operate the proposed facilities is electrical power which will be supplied by the appropriate utility.

11. Construction

Standard construction techniques will be utilized in the construction of this project and these methods have been shown to provide little or no impact on such elements as soil erosion and sedimentation. All disturbed areas will be reseeded in a timely manner. There should be no significant adverse impact due to noise during construction.

12. <u>Toxic Substances</u> - Not applicable to this type project.

13. Public Reaction

- A. No objections have been made to the project.
- B. A public hearing has been held in conjunction with the CDBG application on this specific project. A copy of the minutes is given in Exhibit IV.
- C. A public meeting will be held by the District in the near future.

14. Alternatives to the Project

There are no alternatives to the proposed project which would provide the same benefits to the beneficiaries.

15. Mitigation Measures

Measures to be taken to mitigate environmental damage include, but will not be limited to minimum disturbance at any time, seeding as soon as possible, and avoiding undisturbed areas where possible.

16. Permits

- A. A permit for the activity will be required from the Kentucky Division of Water (sanitary features, stream crossings). The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet must approve all road bores under state highways. The project must also be approved by the Kentucky Public Service Commission. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will have to permit the major stream crossings.
- B. No permits have been obtained at this time.

ANDERSON COUNTY CDBG PUBLIC HEARING SOUTH ANDERSON WATER EXPANSION PROJECT AUGUST 18, 1998, 6:00 p.m.

The Public Hearing was opened by Bryan Kirby of Community & Economic Development Associates, the Project Consultant. Mr. Kirby welcomed those in attendance and distributed an agenda for the hearing. After discussing all items on the agenda which related to the KYCDBG Program, he distributed a large map which indicated the location of the water lines the County and District were proposing to construct. Several residents of these areas asked about the size of lines, positioning, etc. which was addressed in full by Mr. Alton Warford, the Water District Manager. Mr. Wayne Todd asked about the source of water for the proposed areas since the City had publicly stated that the District would not be able to purchase more water from the City due to the capacities of the Water Treatment Plant. Mr. Warford and Mr. Kirby explained the bulk water purchase agreement and the provision of a 8" distribution line which would connect the District to the Frankfort Plant Board's system near the County line. There being no further questions or comments, the Public Hearing was adjourned by Mr. Kirby.

And after he come down there 3 times, he went back to the South Anderson Water District and asked them when was water coming through. And they told him water was coming through part of Willow Creek Road, but coming through Ruben Barnett property wasn't in no future.

1. I will get a copy of that so we can attach to the transcription.

Q Ruben, once you found this out that there was no plans to build water along your portion of Aaron-Barnett Road, what did you do then?

A Well, I went to talking to different ones, the rest of the people that lived on that road. And I talked with different ones of them.

And I think Stevie Drury is about one of the first ones I talked to. And where the water was coming, he wasn't going to get city water. Then, he told me he talked with the magistrate and then he talked to Allison Walker and they changed their minds and said it would come on down another six-tenths of a mile and get the 5

1		or 6 houses there water.
2		But they wouldn't come no further.
3		Q Did you talk to some others besides Mr. Drury who
4		were not going receive water?
5		A I talked to everybody up and down that road that

A Yeah, I measured ever way that I heard anything about where they said they--you told me they had it on paper they were going to run it a mile and two-tenths. Then it was--said they was going to stop at a mile and seven-tenths. And I measured both of them ways and I measured it all the way through.

Q If they run it a mile and seven-tenths or a mile and eight-tenths and there is a portion that's incomplete, what I am trying to ask you and get an answer, if you know it, if you know it, is what is the length of the road that's going to remain unfinished?

24	bottom, and if anybody hooked up outside of the bottoms,

like the 9th person hooked on, they would pay me 1/9 of

what it cost me. And that a way on the 10th person would pay me eight parts, say the ninth person for one part, that a way for 5 years. Or I could take it and let everybody, including the 8 lots at the bottom, let everybody pay to me for 50 foot of what it cost me for 10 years.

And I told Allison Walker then that I would take it for the 5 year deal. And he said all right. He sent it to Frankfort to where he was supposed to send it to and get it approved and sent it to me. And he did. He sent it and got it approved and signed it and sent it to me.

And then later on when a couple of the houses in the bottom hooked up, he seen me in town one day and he told me he needed to get with me and pay me for--there had been a couple of them houses hooked up out there and he needed get with me to pay me for 50 foot of each one of them.

And I told him that he didn't owe me 50 foot at each one of the bottoms. That all he owed me any time a person hooked up on outside of the bottom. And he got mad and said, no, it wasn't approved that way and we won't pay you that way.

Q And so you ended up taking this matter to the Public Service Commission?

1	A Yeah.
2	Q And what was the result?
3	A They wouldn't give us no hearing.
4	Q So you didn't get a hearing then?
5	A No. Huh, uh. They wouldn't even give us a
6	hearing. They just come back and said they didn't know
7	it was going to be a subdivision and all South Anderson
8	had to pay was the 50 foot of each hookup. And I never
9	received a payment one on none of them yet.
10	Q So there is still some outstanding monies owed to
11	you by the South Anderson Water District, is that your
12	opinion?
13	A Yeah.
14	Q Do you think that this agreement had any
15	influence or effect on the decision by the South
16	Anderson Water District not to run water lines
17	throughout the entire Willow Creek Road?
18	A I think that's the only reason.
19	Q I want to go back to the notice again that's
20	Exhibit 1 to your testimony.
21	Did you ever, Ruben, attend any of the public
22	hearings sponsored by the South Anderson Water District
23	to discuss their proposed expansion project?
24	A I attended one after I hired an attorney, with
25	him.

1	Q But other than that, back in August of 1998 or
2	February of 1999, you didn't go to any of the public
3	hearings mentioned in the notice?
4	A No.
5	Q And why not?
6	A Well, I didn't have no reason to go until I found
7	out later on about the middle of '99 that it
8	wasn'tthat water wasn't going all the way through.
9	And that's when I got together and hired an attorney. I
10	knew it wasn't any use in me talking to them.
11	Q I cut you off?
12	A I knew I couldn't talk with them. So I just went
13	and hired an attorney and got it over with.
14	Q So is it correct to say, Ruben, that you assumed
15	from reading the notice that all of Willow Creek Road
16	was going to be served by the water expansion project?
17	A Yeah. That's what I thought. Who wouldn't think
18	it? That's what it had in there, Willow Creek Road is
19	going to be run.
20	Q Ruben, were you ever told by your attorney or by
21	the commissioners for the water district themselves that
22	after this water expansion project was finished, it
23	would be about 10 years before another expansion project
24	would be approved by South Anderson Water District.

Did you ever hear that?

1	A Yes.
2	Q And you were told that by whom?
3	A By you.
4	Q Okay.
5	And your attorney relayed that to you?
6	A Yeah.
7	Q Based upon a meeting that he had with the Board
8	of Commissioners?
9	A Yes.
10	Q Ruben, why are you pursuing this matter before
11	the Public Service Commission? Why do you feel that you
12	have been wronged in some way here?
13	A Well, to start with, when Iwhen I first
14	started, I had about 6 lots or tracts of land for sale
15	up and down the road. And I knew city water would make
16	it sell better. And I knew it wasn't right to put it in
17	the paper they was going to run the road and then just
18	run part of it.
19	And I felt like they was doing it to spite me.
20	But now then, I have sold 4 tracts of the ground. But I
21	still would like to have city water. But I think they
22	are wrong putting the ad in the paper they are going to
23	run the road and not run all of it.
24	If they wasn't going to run all it, they ought to

have put in there we are going to run a mile and

two-tenths of the road and run a mile and two-tenths, you know. And I wouldn't have no reason to hire a lawyer and brought suit against them.

Any other reasons, Ruben, why you are upset and feel like you are being harmed by the South Anderson Water District because of their refusal to extend water lines along your property?

A Yes.

Not right now, but in the near future when my kids gets ready to go college or something, then I will need to sell more of the land to get money to send them to college with.

But if they wait 10 years before they run the line, then my kids will already be in college or if they can get to college. And, in my opinion, they won't be able to get there.

And another thing, once they run city water to all of the roads they got down there and just run city water on part of Willow Creek, if they do that, my land is done selling unless I want to take half-price for it because people is going to buy where there is city water.

And it's just not right to run water down part of the way of Willow Creek and run every road up and down the road before you get to Willow Creek. And then run a

mile and two-tenths, a mile and eight-tenths or whatever they are going to run down Willow Creek and then skip a mile and two-tenths. And then go on down the road a half a mile and start running another road and run all the roads on down through there for a long ways, it just is not right.

Q There are no plans to--oh, you say skip a mile and two-tenths. You mean skip-A On Aaron-Barnett Road.

On Aaron-Barnett Road? Okay.

Ruben, you have a pretty firm knowledge of how much it is going to cost the entire scope of the proposed water project, is that correct? You know about how much money the water district is going to obtain to build these water lines, correct?

- A I have been told \$2.2 million.
- Q And you were told that by whom?
- A My attorney.
- Q Ruben, I realize you are not an engineer. But you said you did build some lines down in Rice Road about 5 years ago, you had some water lines built?
- A Yeah.

Q To the best of your knowledge, based upon what you had to pay to build water lines 5 years ago, about how much would it cost to complete the water line

1 construction along Aaron-Barnett Road. 2 What do you think? 3 Well, it's hard to say. Anybody knows that city water is better to drink and everything than water you haul. Your cistern, when you catch water off the house and have water hauled to the house, you know you get dirt in it and leaves in it and grit in it. And it don't taste right.

That's the reason my boy won't drink water at all. And the girl, she don't say much about it. She don't care much about water and I don't either to drink, you know, like he does.

But he goes to his mother's or he goes up to his grandmother's and all he comes back and talks about how good the water is.

Q Ruben, there has been some testimony by some of your neighbors that they have had busted water tanks as a result of the constant hauling of water back and forth.

Have you ever busted a water tank trying to haul water?

A No. I have never.

I bought a water truck that had a big tank on it and hauled water for about 2 years until I had my right knee replaced. Then I come home and fallen on that when I went to get water one day. And I promised myself if I

1	made it back home without hurting my knee that I
2	wouldn't haul no more and I didn't. I sold my truck and
3	went to hiring it all.
4	Q So now you pay to have water hauled to you, is
5	that right?
6	A Yeah, yeah.
7	Q But you injured your knee by having to have to
8	haul water one time?
9	A No. I said I come almost falling. And if I had
10	of, I would have injured it. And I decided to quit



And the purpose of this transcription today is to provide testimony before the Public Service Commission as to the witnesses that we will present on behalf of Ruben Barnett at his hearing scheduled before the Public Service Commission on March 9 of 2,000.

- Q And when you mentioned the grant, is that because of a notice that you read in the paper published by the South Anderson Water District which said that they had received a grant to construct water lines along Aaron-Barnett Road? Or I guess the notice said Willow Creek Road, is that correct?

- Q And Willow Creek Road and Aaron-Barnett Road are the same road?
- A Correct.
- Q When you read that notice, is that what gave the indication that there was going to be water lines built along that road?
- A I don't really recall how I heard it. I know that Ruben mentioned to me that there was a grant, but they were going to stop it part of the way down Aaron-Barnett Road.
- Q So Ruben actually told you that the water line was going to stop short of his property, is that correct?
- A Correct.

1	Q And, therefore, you decided at that point that
2	you were going to have to use a cistern?
3	A No. I knew that before. I was informed that a
4	cistern was the only available water at the time. And
5	then I had heard through other people in the area that
6	the county had received a grant and I was only told that
7	Aaron-Barnett Road was going to receive water which I
8	thought would be the entire length of Aaron-Barnett
9	Road.
10	Q And only then did Ruben tell you then that it was
11	going to be a part of Aaron-Barnett Road?
12	A Correct. He told me it was going to stop quite a
13	ways short of where all of us were.
14	Q If the water lines were to be extended through

16	you be a customer of the water district?

He had mentioned that he was going to provide water I guess for his own convenience as well as to 9 other property he had down the road. 10 And how long ago was that? Are we talking about 0 11 a year ago, two years ago? 12 That he mentioned this to me? 13 Right? 14 Oh, gosh. Over a year ago I would say. 15 Q Okay. 16 And did Ruben Barnett subsequently change his 17 mind about that, about building water lines? 18 From what he told me, he did. Α 19 What did he share with you? 20 He said that there had been a problem that he 21 thought it was too expensive for one thing and he had 22 some difficulties with some other people and he just 23 decided not to do it at the time. So there hasn't been an intention by him to build 24

water lines that would attach onto that portion of

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Aaron-Barnett Road that's presently not going to be supplied with water and build water lines throughout the remainder of Aaron-Barnett Road?

A From what I understand from speaking with Mr. Barnett was he had abandoned the complete project.

When you have taken your 2 sons and a daughter to the doctor for their health problems, has a doctor ever suggested to you that the health problems may be attributed to the water they drink or the water that's used to cook?

Has the doctor every told you that?

- A No. Then I have never told them that we have moved and we live on cistern water either as far as, you know, they don't know the difference. I haven't made that clear to them.
- Q Missy, is there anything else that you would like to say regarding your interest or desire to obtain water from the South Anderson Water District?

1	A Just that I would really like to have water. And
2	personally, I don't understand the point of running half
3	the road and not the whole road. If you are going to
4	start it, why not finish it? That's the way I look at

- 4. That it requires from one to three hours for him to haul water depending upon the amount of time he must wait in line to obtain water and the weather conditions in which he must travel.

- 5. That therefore on occasion he and his wife must use up to six (6) hours a week simply to purchase water for their family.
- 6. That his cost for hauling water is approximately Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) weekly.
- 7. That he and his family refuse to use the water they place in their cistern for drinking and that they acquire bottled water for drinking purposes.
- 8. That he was aware of notices placed in the <u>Anderson News</u> newspaper about the intent of the South Anderson Water District to construct water lines along Willow Creek Road (now Aaron-Barnett Road), but that he did not attend any of the scheduled meetings by the South Anderson Water District because he assumed from the language of the notice that the District intended to build water lines along the full length of Aaron-Barnett Road.
- 9. That he did not realize until the beginning of calendar year 2000 that his residence was not to be included in the proposed construction of water lines by the South Anderson Water District.
- 10. That he would definitely become a customer of the South Anderson Water District if the District would provide water lines to his residence. He believes that obtaining water from the South Anderson Water District would be cheaper, safer, and healthier for his family.

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

Are there any other land interests that I haven't mentioned to you along Willow Creek Road that you know of that would be relevant to this present case of Mr.

Barnett's desire to get water along Aaron-Barnett Road?

A No, other than the 5 pieces of property that's been sold plus his home place, which makes 6, that's the only ones I know of because from what I understand, the water was going to go to the creek. So the rest of the properties going back to the east on Willow Creek would benefit from that. They would have their city water.

And I don't think it's as many houses going back the other way as it is coming this way to where they want to discontinue. Because I sold Mrs. Tipton's property there on Willow Creek. And then she has a son still there. And then the neighbors next to her. And then Aaron Barnett's property which I sold—which I have sold it twice. That's the only houses there.

Q Are there--so to your knowledge, there are a number of residences along that stretch of Aaron-Barnett Road that's not scheduled to get water that are affected by this decision not to get water?

SOUTH ANDERSON WATER DISTRICT MINUTES FROM AUGUST 19, 1999

THE AUGUST METING OF THE SOUTH ANDERSON WATER DISTRICT WAS CALL TO ORDER BY CHAIRMAN BOB KINCER. MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING WERE READ AND A MOTION BY JANET TO APPROVE THE MINUTES AS READ.

THE BOARD REVIEWED WARRANT #282. BOB KINCER MADE A MOTION TO PAY ALL BILL LISTED IN WARRANT #282, SECOND BY GEORGE KINNE, MOTION CARRIED.

BOB WELCOMED OUR GUESTS, MR. JOHN CUNNINGHAM (REALTOR), MR. REUBIN BARNETT (PROPERTY OWNER), & MR. REGINALD L. THOMAS, ATTORNEY FOR MR. BARNETT.

MR. THOMAS REQUESTED THAT THE WATER BOARD HOLD UP ITS WATER PROJECT AND ADD MR. BARNETT'S PROPERTY ON WILLOW CREEK ROAD. MR. BARNETT WANTS WATER RAN SO HE CAN SELL HIS LOTS. THE BOARD EXPLAINED THAT MR. THE BOARD VOTED TO ADOPT A RESOLUTION TO ENTER IN THE KENTUCKY PUBLIC EMPLOYEES DEFERRED COMPENSATION PLAN FOR ITS EMPLOYEES (COPY ATTACHED).


