THIS IS THE RESPONSE OF ROBERT L. MADISON TO ORCHARD GRASS UTILITIES (OGU) AND THE OLDHAM COUNTY SEWER DISTRICT (OCSD) (JOINT APPLICANTS) LETTER DATED 18 FEB 2004 CONCERNING MY MONTHLY WATER USAGE AND THE IMPACT ON THE PROPOSED SEWAGE INCREASE.

ON PAGE 3 OF THE JOINT APPLICANTS LETTER DATED 18 FEB 2004 THEY MAKE CERTAIN STATEMENTS CONCERNING MY WATER USAGE AND THE PERCENTAGE AND DOLLAR COST INCREASES UNDER THE NEW RATES APPROVED BY THE OLDHAM COUNTY SEWER DISTRICT. ACCORDING TO MY MOST RECENT BILL (ENCLOSURE 1) I AM USING 5,000 GALLONS OF WATER PER MONTH. MY SEWAGE CHARGE UNDER THE NEW OCSD RATE OF A FIXED MONTHLY COST OF \$ 7.67 PER MONTH PLUS A RATE OF \$ 3.20 PER 1,000 GALLONS PER MONTH EQUALS A MONTHLY CHARGE OF \$ 23.67 A PERCENTAGE INCREASE OF 28.29 %, A MONTHLY INCREASE OF \$ 5.22 AND A YEARLY INCREASE OF \$ 62.64. THE CALCULATION IS AS FOLLOWS:

\$7.67 + (\$3.20 * 5) = \$23.67

\$ 23.67 / \$ 18.45 = 28.29 %

\$ 23.67 - \$ 18.45 = \$ 5.22

\$ 5.22 * 12 = \$ 62.44

BASED ON FIGURES IN A 13 FEB 2004 OLDHAM ERA (AN OLDHAM COUNTY NEWSPAPER) LETTER TO THE EDITOR FROM OLDHAM COUNTY MAGISTRATE RICK RASH (MADISON ENCLOSURE 2), AN AVERAGE MONTHLY WATER USAGE FOR AN OLDHAM COUNTY RESIDENTIAL CUSTOMER CAN BE DETERMINED TO BE 6.5275 THOUSAND GALLONS PER MONTH. THEREFORE, A WILLOW CREEK CUSTOMER USING AN AVERAGE AMOUNT OF WATER WILL HAVE SEWAGE COSTS GO FROM THE CURRENT \$18.45 A MONTH TO \$ 28.55 PER MONTH, A 54.78 % INCREASE, A MONTHLY INCREASE OF \$ 10.40, A YEARLY INCREASE OF \$ 124.80. THE CALCULATIONS ARE AS FOLLOWS:

\$7.67 + (\$3.20 * 6.5275) = \$28.55

\$ 28.55 / \$ 18.45 = 54.78 %

\$ 28.85 - \$ 18.45 = \$ 10.40



To the editor:

The letter from Sonja Lowery concerning the rates for the Oldham County Sewer District is wrong in its premise and in its conclusion. The sewer district came to fiscal court with three rates — not one.

One rate was a fixed rate of \$28.91 a month regardless of consumption.

The second was \$23.20 a month and 86 cents per thousand gailons of water consumed.

The third rate was \$7.67 a month and \$3.20 per thousand. All three rates generated \$1.4 million.

Under the second rate, a senior citizen using 2,000 gallons would pay about \$24.92 a month versus \$14.07 under the rate adopted. A home in Oldham County using 6,000 gallons, which is about average, would be \$28.36 under the second rate and \$28.87 under the rate adopted. A home using 10,000 gallons would be \$31.80 under the second rate and \$39.67 under the rate adopted. Anyone who does not like their bill has the ability to lower it through less usage. The district is getting 300 new customers a year generating another \$104,000 in revenue. It has also received \$300,000 year-to-date in tap-on fees.

The rate approved will pay all expenses with an additional \$250,000 for repairs and maintenance each year. Add to that the revenue for new customers and tap-on fees, and I think most people would agree that the sewer district is in great financial condition. Later this spring, it will finalize its acquisition of the Orchard Grass and

Willow Creek plants. The district chairman tells me that district's CPA firm recommended a rate of \$7 a month and \$3 per thousand when that occurs. This is a rate I heartily endorse.

Large plants have lower variable costs than small plants. The Metropolitan Sewer District treats over 140 million gallons a day. Oldham County Sewer District treats 1 million gallons with 11 plants. According to its Web site, MSD had a fixed cost of \$6.59 a month and \$1.81 per thousand in variable costs.

Oldham County Fiscal Court approved the third rate 9-0. It was endorsed by The Oldham Era. It was the best we could do at the time. We will continue to support the OCSD and the environment.
