2005 Management Conference Team Rural Water February 15 – 16, 2005 Sloan Convention Center/University Plaza Holiday Inn Hotel Bowling Green, Kentucky

Presented By: Kentucky Rural Water Association

<u>Learning Objective:</u> This two-day management conference will be directed toward the operators, managers, office personnel, and decision-makers of water and wastewater utilities throughout Kentucky. The theme of our 2005 Management Conference is "*Team Rural Water*." The goals and benefits of safe drinking water and properly treated wastewater will be examined and encouraged through partnerships, alliances, work groups, and the existing network of utilities, peers, technical assistance providers, industry professionals, and governmental agencies.

Mr. Kelly, voted National Young Engineer of the Year by the National Society of Engineers, was instrumental in helping to provide engineering services to the Logan/Todd Regional Water Commission. Available sources, well-trained certified operators, advanced technology, and stringent compliance issues, will be addressed in this assessment of available financing strategies from the water and wastewater industry professional engineer perspective.

A court-certified tax expert, Mr. McLennan works with the Government Entities Division of the IRS. From regulations, to "supper money" to cell phones, operators, managers, office personnel and decision makers will benefit from Mr. McLennan's twenty-eight years of service with Federal, State, and Local entities of government.

Session Three

1:15 – 2:00 p.m. Health Insurance for the Home (Utility) *Team* Jim Coulter, Insurors of Kentucky

This first topic of this Session Three will offer .75 hours of classroom training and will address the Water and Wastewater Utility experience with employee health coverage. Operators, managers, and all staff members are in need of adequate health insurance. Mr. Coulter will discuss employer benefits and employee benefits, but will especially focus on how a utility can offer a health insurance package that emphasizes improving the health of employees.

This second topic of Session Three will offer .75 hours of classroom instruction and will focus on all aspects of water and wastewater utility insurance, excluding health. Learn how daily operator practices – neat housekeeping, well maintained facilities, painted structures, and fenced properties – affect underwriting costs for the typical water or wastewater utility while assuring adequate protection for employees, customers, and property.

Projects included spring eye protection; stone masonry storage tanks up to 10,000 gallons; pump and motor sizing; distribution lines including pipe sizing, depth, material and routes, up to 16,000 lineal feet; overflow usage including buffer tanks, laundry facilities, and livestock watering troughs; distribution points of single and multi-tap outlets. Assisted in the retrieval and replacement of a water well pump which had fallen from the riser pipe in a 385' well shaft. Aided in design and construction of hand dug wells and surface mounted hand pumps. Provided assistance to erosion control programs, selecting new rural roadway routes, and designing improvements to existing roads.
