KSU continues softball success

Downs guides Thorobrettes into conference play after yet another stellar season on the diamond

When it comes to softball in the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association, the Kentucky State Thorobrettes have consistently been near the top of the league for the past couple of years.

This year was no different as Kentucky State dominated conference play, going 18-2 in the regular season. "We've done pretty good," said coach Oscar Downs. "We've had our ups and downs. Overall I'm proud of our kids."

Kentucky State's two conference losses came at the hands of Clark Atlanta (5-2) and Mike Cr. Through 28 games, the Thorobrettes hold a 30-8 record and are ranked in the top spot in the SIAC West Division as Kentucky State hasn't played even one in the conference.

"I haven't seen a lot of the teams on the east side," said Downs. "We all put up a battle every year. It's going to be a battle for the conference championship. Hopefully we'll come out on top."

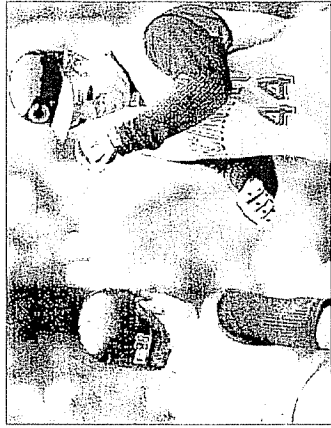
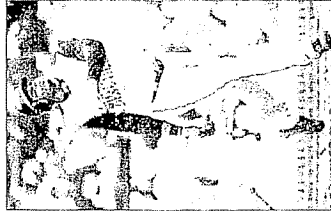

CHICAGO (AP) — Bronson Arroyo had no home runs in his first six major league seasons. Now the long-legged Cincinnati pitcher has hit one in one week.

On a windy day at Wrigley Field, Arroyo and his Reds teammates used just a few of long balls to beat the Chicago Cubs.

Arroyo pitched seven shutout innings, and hit one of Cincinnati's six homers. Edwin Encarnacion connected for a grand slam and the Reds routed the Cubs 9-2.

Acquired in a March 20 trade from the Red Sox, Arroyo (2-0) also pitched well, an outing made easier by all the run support. He shut down the Cubs, and ended their three-patner winning streak, allowing six hits.

With the wind blowing out at 17 mph, Griffey connected on a long solo shot off Rusch in the first, his second of the season and fell for a single in short left, Rich Aurilia singled and Dunn walked. Encarnacion followed with his grand slam and Kearns hit the Reds' fifth solo shot of the day as the boys cruised down.

Notes: RHP Mark Prior, working his way back from a strained shoulder muscle that flamed him on the DL, threw

about 30 pitches from the bullpen mound before the game. Pitching coach Larry Rothschild said Prior has progressed to a point where he doesn't feel any pain. He will throw again Friday in Arizona. ... Before his homer last week in Cincinnati, Arroyo was 4-for-55 career with 33 strikeouts. He finished 1-for-5 Tuesday. ... It was the most homers allowed by a Cubs pitching staff since giving up seven to the Astros on Sept. 9, 2000, in a 14-4 loss at Wrigley ... Chicago RF Jaques Jones left in the sixth with a strained right hamstring.

Eligibility issue still unsettled

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — The Kentucky Board of Education remains undecided with a proposal that would tighten eligibility rules for high school athletes.

After nearly two hours of discussion Tuesday, the board decided it can't approve the plan by a Kentucky High School Athletic Association last force before the member schools take a vote.

Even if the schools ultimately vote to approve it, several board members signaled they would not

student athletes. That is already against the rules but still done, he argued.

"We in the public schools are not asking for an advantage," he said. "We're asking, to the extent possible, for the removal of our disadvantages."

But Ken Walker, a Lexington attorney who has agreed to bring a pro bono case against the plan on behalf of disgruntled parents, said the proposal goes too far. She advocated a compromise, proposed by the private schools, that would set geographic boundaries for eligibility rather than a feeder system.

"They would implicate an entire leg rather than simply remove an infected toe," she said.

This debate has been brewing since October when public schools, the vast majority of KHSAA's membership, voted to force private schools into their own tournaments to level the playing field.

KHSAA's executive body rejected that plan, and the board of education has twice told the schools to work out the issue on their own.

However, several board members were vocal Tuesday that the current compromise would be deemed unacceptable — jeopardizing any sort of resolution outside of mediation or a lawsuit.

"Taking two years out of a kid's high school athletic career is a life sentence for an adolescent," Combs said.
