

Dear Mr. Wakim:

Here are the additional responses to the inspection performed in October. You noted in your letter that DTR Number 1 and DTR Number 2 needed additional information.

DTR Number 1-Since January 1, 2006 our field workers have read over 300 meters and we have devised a plan for them to follow:

Monday: Read at least two roads in the northern end of the county while reading master meters in the area. (If time permits they may stay as long as possible to read more roads if there is no major problems causing them to come back)

Tuesday: Do all necessary paper work that morning and that afternoon read meters that are located out 461, HWY 70, HWY 150, HWY 39(This is a very BROAD area and will be very time consuming)

Wednesday: While reading master meters that morning again, pick at least two to three small roads in the northern section (a smaller section) of the county and finish any paperwork in that area before lunch. After lunch begin reading meters on HWY 25 S, and all the little roads and subdivisions in that area.

Thursday: Do all necessary paper work that morning and that afternoon read meters that are located out 461, HWY 70, HWY 150, HWY 39(This is a very BROAD area and will be very time consuming)

Friday: Read all master meters and pick out small side roads and subdivisions around the local area to read and after lunch do any necessary paperwork that needs attention before the weekend.

DTR Number 2- You will notice that I have enclosed a copy of the Preliminary Engineering report so you can see the exact cost and construction to be done.



# WESTERN ROCKCASTLE WATER ASSOCIATION ROCKCASTLE, LINCOLN, & PULASKI COUNTIES, KENTUCKY

### I. <u>GENERAL</u>

This Preliminary Engineering Report is intended to analyze the proposed water system extension and improvements that are being planned by the Western Rockcastle Water Association to serve six first time customers with potable drinking water and to upgrade or replace 28,500 LF of 6-inch, 4-inch, and 3-inch water lines throughout Rockcastle, Pulaski and Lincoln counties. The new customers to be served are all residential.

The Western Rockcastle Water Association provides potable water service to nearly 3,800 customers in Rockcastle, Pulaski and Lincoln counties. The Association purchases all water for resale from the City of Mount Vernon.

Included in this report are maps of the proposed service area showing the intended routes of the water lines, and the location of major appurtenances. In addition, project cost estimates are included which outline the entire project costs along with the proposed financing scheme.

### II. PROJECT PLANNING AREA

The area to be served with potable water for the first time is located on Stevens Road in Rockcastle County. There are two areas to be served with an upgrade to the water lines that are located on Kentucky Highway 1617 (Scaffold Cane Road) and Rainbow Subdivision in Rockcastle County. Another area to be served with a water line replacement is located on Kentucky Highway 461 in Pulaski County. In addition, two tank replacements will be constructed in the areas known as Scaffold Cane and Brindle Ridge which are both located in Rockcastle County. These areas are delineated on the attached maps. The topography in these areas consists primarily of gently rolling hills throughout the valley areas and along the numerous creeks in this area with steep ridges encountered in the Daniel Boone National Forest. The land use in the valley areas is mainly agricultural with some light timber harvesting. Within the proposed area, there are no major industrial or commercial businesses.

The residents located on the Stevens Road have never been served by a public water system and most rely on community springs, family wells, or depend on water trucks to provide them with their potable water. Most individuals pay to have their water delivered and those who cannot afford to pay local water haulers, transport their water by means of barrels, bucket, or other containers. They often make daily trips to the nearest water source, none of which are monitored by an approved health agency. It is not anticipated that a significant growth pattern will emerge as a result of the implementation of a domestic water supply but rather that the standard of living for those residents will be greatly improved.

### III. EXISTING FACILITIES

The Western Rockcastle Water Association executed a contract in 1994 with the City of Mount Vernon to purchase 10 million gallons of water per month for 45 years. The City has recently completed the constructing a new water treatment plant and the water purchase agreement has been amended to reflect a longer term and a larger allotment. The Association operates a distribution system that serves nearly 3,800 residential and nonresidential customers that reside throughout Rockcastle, Lincoln and Pulaski Counties.

The Western Rockcastle Water Association operates the water system through a Board of Directors, Office Manager, office personnel and field personnel.

Information regarding the current rate structure, annual operating and maintenance data and a tabulation of the users for an annual period by monthly usage categories and revenue, will be analyzed in the Summary Addendum which will be included in the Kentucky Guide 7A.

### IV. <u>NEED FOR THE PROJECT</u>

This project is intended to eliminate a serious health hazard in the communities in which it will serve, to improve service to areas that are served by undersized water lines, and to address a low water supply problem that exists in the areas of the Scaffold Cane tank and Brindle Ridge tank. The proposed service area, Stevens Road, has long been faced with inadequate and unsafe sources of water. For many years, the residents have petitioned county officials in an attempt to secure a public water system. This need has been well documented by the Cumberland Valley District Health Department. The vast majority of samples taken (95%) were contaminated with high levels of fecal coliform. The personal health and safety of the residents are threatened by the use of these contaminated supplies and the financial burden of having to haul water for personal and farming needs is substantial.

It is anticipated that six homes will be immediately affected by the project. The proposed service area is shown on the attached maps, and is located in a geographic area where rock conditions are prevalent. The terrain is over laden with visible rock outcroppings and numerous creek crossings with limited access along the public roadway.

### V. <u>ALTERNATIVES CONSIDERED</u>

Based on the fact that there are no other major potable water suppliers that exist in this area, the only practical potable water supplier that would consider serving these areas is the Western Rockcastle Water Association. There are no other practical alternatives that could be considered. The Western Rockcastle Water Association is supplied water by the City of Mount Vernon. Both of these entities are regulated by the Kentucky Division of Water and have a history of compliance with the Division's regulations and policies. Therefore, it was determined that these areas would be best served by a water system built, owned, operated and served by the Western Rockcastle Water Association.

### VI. PROPOSED PROJECT

The project entails the construction of a 6-inch water transmission main to replace an existing 4-inch water main on Kentucky Highway 1617, also known as Scaffold Cane Road. This transmission upgrade will provide a better service to the northern area of the system and provide a water supply to a new 100,000 gallon water storage tank that will replace an existing 20,000 gallon tank at Scaffold Cane. The transmission and tank upgrade will also alleviate a water supply problem the Association has experienced recently due to continuous growth in the northern area.

This project also includes a new 4-inch transmission main on Kentucky Highway 461 to replace an existing 4-inch line in the southern area of the system known as Level Green. This upgrade will eliminate a short section of deteriorating water main that has caused the Association a continuous maintenance problem over the years. A 3-inch waterline will be installed on the Rainbow Subdivision Road to replace an existing 2-inch water line, which currently serves approximately 20 customers. A new 150,000 gallon tank will be constructed to replace an existing 50,000 gallon tank that is known as Brindle Ridge Tank near Brodhead, Kentucky. The Brindle Ridge tank upgrade will improve the water supply to an area that is known as the Copper Creek area, which has experienced tremendous growth and is continuing to grow. New telemetry controls will be installed on all existing pump stations in the Western Rockcastle system.

The project also proposes to construct a small water line extension of approximately 3,000 LF of 3-inch waterline that will serve six new customers in Rockcastle County. Please refer to the attached map for the location of this extension. The project will provide all necessary appurtenances and meter settings to the customer's property line.

The analysis of the Association's ability to finance and in turn own and operate the extension is itemized in the Summary Addendum, which will be submitted at a later date. This data will evaluate and compare the current and expected revenues as a result of the sale of water, operation and maintenance costs, other miscellaneous income and costs, and a summary of the long-term debts including their annual principle and interest payments.

An analysis of the customer monthly water usage and associated revenue generation will be included and will be based on actual water sales for a one-year period. The Western Rockcastle Water Association will supply this information.

The project cost has been estimated to be \$940,000 and it is to be financed by a \$470,000 loan from Rural Development and a \$470,000 grant from Rural Development.

### VII. CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Based on the desperate need for the residents in the Stevens Road area to have a potable water supply and to improve adequate water supply in areas served in communities described herein it is recommended that the Western Rockcastle Water Association pursue that financial assistance as outlined above so that this unhealthy situation can be corrected. The Western Rockcastle Water Association is the only major supplier of potable water near these areas and their system is situated such that the extension and improvements as proposed can be made without adversely affecting service to their existing customers.

### PROGRAM NARRATIVE

The Western Rockcastle Water Association is in need for improvements throughout the water system which serves the western, northern, and southern areas of Rockcastle County, eastern portions of Lincoln County, and northern portions of Pulaski County. These improvements include the construction of a 6-inch water transmission main to replace an existing 4-inch water main on Kentucky Highway 1617, also known as Scaffold Cane Road. This transmission upgrade will provide a better service to the northern area of the system and provide a water supply to a new 100,000 gallon water storage tank that will replace an existing 20,000 gallon tank at Scaffold Cane. The Association is requesting a \$470,000 Rural Development Grant and a \$470,000 Rural Development Loan for a total project cost of \$940,000 based upon the engineer's estimate.

Solid waste in Rockcastle County is collected by private haulers and taken to E.R. Hopper & Sons landfill in Lily, Kentucky (Permit No. 063-00003).

Here are the additional responses to the inspection performed in October. You noted in your letter that DTR Number 1 and DTR Number 2 needed additional information.

DTR Number 1-Since January 1, 2006 our field workers have read over 300 meters and we have devised a plan for them to follow:

Monday: Read at least two roads in the northern end of the county while reading master meters in the area. (If time permits they may stay as long as possible to read more roads if there is no major problems causing them to come back)

Tuesday: Do all necessary paper work that morning and that afternoon read meters that are located out 461, HWY 70, HWY 150, HWY 39(This is a very BROAD area and will be very time consuming)

Wednesday: While reading master meters that morning again, pick at least two to three small roads in the northern section (a smaller section) of the county and finish any paperwork in that area before lunch. After lunch begin reading meters on HWY 25 S, and all the little roads and subdivisions in that area.

Thursday: Do all necessary paper work that morning and that afternoon read meters that are located out 461, HWY 70, HWY 150, HWY 39(This is a very BROAD area and will be very time consuming)

Friday: Read all master meters and pick out small side roads and subdivisions around the local area to read and after lunch do any necessary paperwork that needs attention before the weekend.

DTR Number 2- You will notice that I have enclosed a copy of the Preliminary Engineering report so you can see the exact cost and construction to be done.



# WESTERN ROCKCASTLE WATER ASSOCIATION ROCKCASTLE, LINCOLN, & PULASKI COUNTIES, KENTUCKY

### I. <u>GENERAL</u>

This Preliminary Engineering Report is intended to analyze the proposed water system extension and improvements that are being planned by the Western Rockcastle Water Association to serve six first time customers with potable drinking water and to upgrade or replace 28,500 LF of 6-inch, 4-inch, and 3-inch water lines throughout Rockcastle. Pulaski and Lincoln counties. The new customers to be served are all residential.

The Western Rockcastle Water Association provides potable water service to nearly 3,800 customers in Rockcastle, Pulaski and Lincoln counties. The Association purchases all water for resale from the City of Mount Vernon.

Included in this report are maps of the proposed service area showing the intended routes of the water lines, and the location of major appurtenances. In addition, project cost estimates are included which outline the entire project costs along with the proposed financing scheme.

### II. PROJECT PLANNING AREA

The area to be served with potable water for the first time is located on Stevens Road in Rockcastle County. There are two areas to be served with an upgrade to the water lines that are located on Kentucky Highway 1617 (Scaffold Cane Road) and Rainbow Subdivision in Rockcastle County. Another area to be served with a water line replacement is located on Kentucky Highway 461 in Pulaski County. In addition, two tank replacements will be constructed in the areas known as Scaffold Cane and Brindle Ridge which are both located in Rockcastle County. These areas are delineated on the attached maps. The topography in these areas consists primarily of gently rolling hills throughout the valley areas and along the numerous creeks in this area with steep ridges encountered in the Daniel Boone National Forest. The land use in the valley areas is mainly agricultural with some light timber harvesting. Within the proposed area, there are no major industrial or commercial businesses.

The residents located on the Stevens Road have never been served by a public water system and most rely on community springs, family wells, or depend on water trucks to provide them with their potable water. Most individuals pay to have their water delivered and those who cannot afford to pay local water haulers, transport their water by means of barrels, bucket, or other containers. They often make daily trips to the nearest water source, none of which are monitored by an approved health agency. It is not anticipated that a significant growth pattern will emerge as a result of the implementation of a domestic water supply but rather that the standard of living for those residents will be greatly improved.

### III. EXISTING FACILITIES

The Western Rockcastle Water Association executed a contract in 1994 with the City of Mount Vernon to purchase 10 million gallons of water per month for 45 years. The City has recently completed the constructing a new water treatment plant and the water purchase agreement has been amended to reflect a longer term and a larger allotment The Association operates a distribution system that serves nearly 3,800 residential and nonresidential customers that reside throughout Rockcastle, Lincoln and Pulaski Counties.

The Western Rockcastle Water Association operates the water system through a Board of Directors, Office Manager, office personnel and field personnel.

Information regarding the current rate structure, annual operating and maintenance data and a tabulation of the users for an annual period by monthly usage categories and revenue, will be analyzed in the Summary Addendum which will be included in the Kentucky Guide 7A.

### IV. <u>NEED FOR THE PROJECT</u>

This project is intended to eliminate a serious health hazard in the communities in which it will serve, to improve service to areas that are served by undersized water lines, and to address a low water supply problem that exists in the areas of the Scaffold Cane tank and Brindle Ridge tank. The proposed service area, Stevens Road, has long been faced with inadequate and unsafe sources of water. For many years, the residents have petitioned county officials in an attempt to secure a public water system. This need has been well documented by the Cumberland Valley District Health Department. The vast majority of samples taken (95%) were contaminated with high levels of fecal coliform. The personal health and safety of the residents are threatened by the use of these contaminated supplies and the financial burden of having to haul water for personal and farming needs is substantial.

It is anticipated that six homes will be immediately affected by the project. The proposed service area is shown on the attached maps, and is located in a geographic area where rock conditions are prevalent. The terrain is over laden with visible rock outcroppings and numerous creek crossings with limited access along the public roadway.

### V. <u>ALTERNATIVES CONSIDERED</u>

Based on the fact that there are no other major potable water suppliers that exist in this area, the only practical potable water supplier that would consider serving these areas is the Western Rockcastle Water Association. There are no other practical alternatives that could be considered. The Western Rockcastle Water Association is supplied water by the City of Mount Vernon. Both of these entities are regulated by the Kentucky Division of Water and have a history of compliance with the Division's regulations and policies. Therefore, it was determined that these areas would be best served by a water system built, owned, operated and served by the Western Rockcastle Water Association.

### VI. <u>PROPOSED PROJECT</u>

The project entails the construction of a 6-inch water transmission main to replace an existing 4-inch water main on Kentucky Highway 1617, also known as Scaffold Cane Road. This transmission upgrade will provide a better service to the northern area of the system and provide a water supply to a new 100,000 gallon water storage tank that will replace an existing 20,000 gallon tank at Scaffold Cane. The transmission and tank upgrade will also alleviate a water supply problem the Association has experienced recently due to continuous growth in the northern area.

This project also includes a new 4-inch transmission main on Kentucky Highway 461 to replace an existing 4-inch line in the southern area of the system known as Level Green. This upgrade will eliminate a short section of deteriorating water main that has caused the Association a continuous maintenance problem over the years. A 3-inch waterline will be installed on the Rainbow Subdivision Road to replace an existing 2-inch water line, which currently serves approximately 20 customers. A new 150,000 gallon tank will be constructed to replace an existing 50,000 gallon tank that is known as Brindle Ridge Tank near Brodhead, Kentucky. The Brindle Ridge tank upgrade will improve the water supply to an area that is known as the Copper Creek area, which has experienced tremendous growth and is continuing to grow. New telemetry controls will be installed on all existing pump stations in the Western Rockcastle system.

The project also proposes to construct a small water line extension of approximately 3,000 LF of 3-inch waterline that will serve six new customers in Rockcastle County. Please refer to the attached map for the location of this extension. The project will provide all necessary appurtenances and meter settings to the customer's property line.

The analysis of the Association's ability to finance and in turn own and operate the extension is itemized in the Summary Addendum, which will be submitted at a later date. This data will evaluate and compare the current and expected revenues as a result of the sale of water, operation and maintenance costs, other miscellaneous income and costs, and a summary of the long-term debts including their annual principle and interest payments.

An analysis of the customer monthly water usage and associated revenue generation will be included and will be based on actual water sales for a one-year period. The Western Rockcastle Water Association will supply this information.

The project cost has been estimated to be \$940,000 and it is to be financed by a \$470,000 loan from Rural Development and a \$470,000 grant from Rural Development.

### VII. CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Based on the desperate need for the residents in the Stevens Road area to have a potable water supply and to improve adequate water supply in areas served in communities described herein it is recommended that the Western Rockcastle Water Association pursue that financial assistance as outlined above so that this unhealthy situation can be corrected. The Western Rockcastle Water Association is the only major supplier of potable water near these areas and their system is situated such that the extension and improvements as proposed can be made without adversely affecting service to their existing customers.

#### PROGRAM NARRATIVE

The Western Rockcastle Water Association is in need for improvements throughout the water system which serves the western, northern, and southern areas of Rockcastle County, eastern portions of Lincoln County, and northern portions of Pulaski County. These improvements include the construction of a 6-inch water transmission main to replace an existing 4-inch water main on Kentucky Highway 1617, also known as Scaffold Cane Road. This transmission upgrade will provide a better service to the northern area of the system and provide a water supply to a new 100,000 gallon water storage tank that will replace an existing 20,000 gallon tank at Scaffold Cane. The transmission and tank upgrade will also alleviate a water supply problem the Association has experienced recently due to continuous growth in the northern area.

This project also includes a new 4-inch transmission main on Kentucky Highway 461 to replace an existing 4-inch line in the southern area of the system known as Level Green. This upgrade will eliminate a short section of deteriorating water main that has caused the Association a continuous maintenance problem over the years. A 3-inch waterline will be installed on the Rainbow Subdivision Road to replace a 2-inch water line, which currently serves approximately 20 customers. A new 150,000 gallon tank will be constructed to replace an existing 50,000 gallon tank that is known as Brindle Ridge Tank near Brodhead, Kentucky. The Brindle Ridge tank upgrade will improve the water supply to an area that is known as the Copper Creek area, which has experienced tremendous growth and is continuing to grow. New telemetry controls will be installed on all existing pump stations in the Western Rockcastle system.

The project also proposes to construct a small water line extension of approximately 3,000 LF of 3-inch waterline that will serve 6 new customers in Rockcastle County. Please refer to the attached map for the location of this extension. The project will provide all necessary appurtenances and meter settings to the customer's property line.

The Western Rockcastle Water Association will own and operate the proposed water system extension and upgrades. The additional water will be provided by the City of Mount Vernon, which has more than adequate capacity to serve the extension and upgrades.

The Association is requesting a \$470,000 Rural Development Grant and a \$470,000 Rural Development Loan for a total project cost of \$940,000 based upon the engineer's estimate.

Solid waste in Rockcastle County is collected by private haulers and taken to E.R. Hopper & Sons landfill in Lily, Kentucky (Permit No. 063-00003).






