COMMENTS OF KENTUCKY UTILITIES COMPANY

Kentucky Utilities Company ("KU"), by counsel, hereby submits the following comments to the Kentucky Public Service Commission ("Commission") concerning the Joint Application for an order approving a new Home Energy Assistance ("HEA") Program in KU's service territory.

KU, along with the other Joint Applicants,¹ has applied for a new five-year HEA program to help pay the utility costs of those with the greatest financial need. As shown by the HEA Program Final Evaluation Report KU filed with the Commission concerning KU's current three-year HEA program, this kind of program works to better the lives of those served.² In its first two years of operation, the HEA program helped approximately 1300 low-income residential customers with their KU bills,³ and will have paid out over \$1.2 million in subsidy

benefits over the course of the three-year program.⁴ Those assisted are among the neediest, who to be eligible must have incomes at or below 110% of the federal poverty level.⁵ It is a program of which the Commission and the Joint Applicants can rightly be proud.

The proposed HEA program will continue providing this needed assistance in much the same way for the next five years. The proposed program is essentially identical to the current HEA program, with two notable modifications. First, the administrating agencies will be able to use up to 5% of total program funds to provide emergency energy assistance and to assist in reducing arrearages of program participants, which should help those participants to become, and to stay, current on their utility bills. Second, the new program's income eligibility requirement will track the federal LIHEAP eligibility requirement, which is approved by the Commonwealth of Kentucky and is currently 130% of the federal poverty level. This change will increase program eligibility, given that the current HEA program requires applicants to have incomes at or below 110% of the federal poverty level. KU believes these changes will improve the proposed HEA program, enabling it to reach out to more customers and offering greater flexibility in assisting them.

Although there has been some suggestion that KU should unify its HEA program with that of Louisville Gas and Electric Company, both Companies believe that the cost of unifying the program, which would likely be significant, would not result in commensurate benefits.⁸

Indeed, given the excellent results that the Companies' current HEA programs are producing separately, there appears to be no reason to unify them. To ensure that the HEA programs are operating efficiently, though, and to evaluate if or when unifying the programs would provide benefits outweighing the costs, the Companies will continue to monitor closely the programs and the agencies administering them. Furthermore, the Companies have committed to report to the Commission annually concerning their HEA programs, and will provide a comprehensive report thereon no later than six months before the end of their proposed programs' five-year term. 10

Finally, KU urges the Commission to act quickly to approve the Joint Application in this proceeding. Unless the Commission does so, the HEA assistance that over 1500 low-income KU customers currently depend upon will come to an end, and soon - collection of funds for the existing HEA will end September 30, 2007.¹¹ In order to continue providing this much-needed assistance without interruption, KU respectfully renews its request that the Commission approve by September 14, 2007, the Joint Application for a new five-year HEA program to become effective at the conclusion of the existing program.
