THE APPLICATION OF BULLOCK PEN)WATER DISTRICT FOR (1) A CERTIFICATE OF)PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY)TO CONSTRUCT THE PROPOSED)WATERWORKS IMPROVEMENT PROJECT;)(2) THE APPROVAL OF THE PROPOSED)PLAN TO FINANCE THE PROJECT; AND)HISTORICAL)(3) THE APPROVAL OF THE PROPOSED INCREASE)IN RATES, NONRECURRING CHARGES AND TARIFF)

PETITION

The Applicant, BULLOCK PEN WATER DISTRICT ("Bullock Pen"), by counsel, pursuant to KRS 278.030, KRS 278.0152 and KRS 278.300, and all other applicable regulations, tenders this Petition and Application and requests, the Public Service Commission ("PSC") to enter an Order: (1) approving the proposed Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity to construct a waterworks project; (2) approval of the proposed plan to finance the improvement project; (3) approval of the proposed adjustment of water rates, nonrecurring charges and the new tariff. In support of this Petition and Application, and in conformity with the rules of the PSC, Bullock Pen states as follows:

<u>OVERVIEW</u>

- 1. Bullock Pen requests the PSC take the following actions:
- 2. To approve the proposed adjustment of water rates and charges to all customers. The percentages for each rate step are shown in the proposed billing analysis.
- 3. To approve the proposed adjustments to Bullock Pen's nonrecurring charges.
- 4. To approve the completely revised, comprehensive tariff which Bullock Pen has proposed.
- 5. KIA in it's Conditional Commitment Letter (F07-09) states that Bullock Pen must enact a water rate increase of 13% prior to July 1, 2008 to go into effect no later than January 1, 2009. Bullock Pen also must enact a water rate increase of 5% prior to July 1, 2008. The increase must be in effect prior to January 1, 2010.
- 6. To review the Application and approve the Convenience and Necessity for the construction of water lines and system improvements.
- 7. To approve the \$25.00 surcharge to be assessed to new customers for the construction of the new water line to serve the customers
- 8. To grant Bullock Pen any deviation that may be allowed.
- 9. For PSC Staff assistance in gathering information in order that this case be completed in a timely manner.

GENERAL INFORMATION

 Bullock Pen is a non-profit water district organized under KRS Chapter 74.070. It has the power to make contracts in furtherance of its lawful and proper purposes. Bullock Pen has no separate articles of incorporation or by-laws. 2. The mailing address of Bullock Pen is as follows:

- 3. Bullock Pen is engaged in the distribution and sale of water. It currently provides water service to approximately 6,566 customers. Of these customers, 6,485 are served through a 5/8-inch connection. The remaining 82 customers are served through one inch, one and one half inch and two inch connections.
- 4. Bullock Pen assesses a surcharge as follows:

Phase 10 \$10.72

Phase 7 12.52

Phase 8 11.46

Phase 5 10.00

In this application, Bullock Pen requests a surcharge of \$25.00 to be charged to the new customers who will be connected as a result of the system expansion. The expansion in this application will be referred to as Phase 6. The calculation of the surcharge is shown in the preliminary engineering report.

Bullock Pen requests that the surcharge period be longer than 5 years, since the surcharge amount will be extremely high if paid over a 5 year period. The extension to new customers will not be feasible if the surcharge is limited to 5 years.

CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY

The projects will consist of the construction of 10.55 miles of six and eight inch water lines in Kenton County to serve 183 new customers, replacement of 2.2 miles of 6 inch water main with a twelve inch water main along Highway 25 in Grant County to improve flow conditions for water purchased from Northern Kentucky Water District, construction of a new pump station in Kenton County to supply water to 3 tanks, and construction of a new master meter with Northern Kentucky Water District.

- 5. The waterworks improvement project is in the public interest and is required to permit continued growth and to provide adequate water supply.
- 6. This project will not compete with any other utility in the area.
- 7. Exhibit 7 shows the preliminary engineering report and conditional commitment letter (FO7-09). As required by KRS 322.340 the final engineering report will be prepared, signed, sealed and dated by an engineer registered in Kentucky, and will be filed when final bids are received.
- 8. The list of documents filed in support of Bullock Pen's application for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity or the explanations for their absence are contained in the Filing Requirements Index for Certificate and Necessity.

FINANCING

- 9. Bullock Pen proposes to finance its waterworks improvement project with a loan from KIA in the amount of \$2,320,700, The proposed KIA loan will have a 20-year term and an approximate interest rate of 3 percent per annum.
- 10. Bullock Pen requests a deviation, pursuant to 807 KAR 5:001 Section 14, from the requirements of 807 KAR 5:001, Section 6, requiring the financial data filed with the Application be for a 12 month period ending within 90 days of the filing of the Application. Bullock Pen states that there has been no change that is material in nature in the financial condition of the utility since December 31, 2007, which is also the test period used to support the requested increase in rates and charges. This is also the most recent published financial data available for Bullock Pen.
- 11. The lists of documents filed in support of Bullock Pen's application for the approval of the proposed plan to finance the public improvement projects or the explanations for their absence is contained in the Filing Requirement Index for Financing.

RATE INCREASE

- 12. The proposed increase in rates and charges is necessary for Bullock Ben to meet all expenses. Bullock Pen is issuing debt to improve and enlarge its facilities and to add lines to reinforce and extend its distribution system. An increase in rates is essential for Bullock Pen to maintain a reasonable level of service, to meet the expanding needs of the service area and to cover its debt service.
- 13. As authorized by KRS 278.192(1), and for the purpose of justifying the reasonableness of the proposed general increase in rates, Bullock Pen has utilized an historical test period consisting of the twelve-(12) consecutive calendar months ending December 31, 2007.
- 14. Bullock Pen has complied with 807 KAR 5:011, Section 9, (2) and 807 KAR 5:001, Section 10, (3) and (4), by preparing to be delivered to newspapers of general circulation in its service area a copy of the Notice identified as Exhibit No 13 in the filing requirements for publishing once a week for 3 consecutive weeks in a prominent manner, the first of said publications to be made within 7 days from the date of filing the Application with the PSC.
- 15. Bullock Pen has filed with the Executive Director of the PSC a written notice of its intention to file this rate application. The notice stated that Bullock Pen would be filing an application based on a historical test year. The notice was also mailed to the Office of the Attorney General, Rate Intervention Division. A copy of the notice is identified as Exhibit 1.

- 16. As required by 807 KAR 5:001, Section 10, (4), (f), Bullock Pen will post a copy of its customer notice at its place of business on the date the application is filed with the PSC. The notice will remain posted until the PSC has determined Bullock Pen's rates.
- 17. Bullock Pen's annual reports are on file with the PSC. A copy of the 2007 annual report is included in this application for the convenience of PSC Staff. Exhibit 11.
- 18. The estimated amount of increase per customer class is:

- 19. A rate adjustment to the water service rates is necessary:
 - A. To meet the increased costs of operations;
 - B. To enable Bullock Pen to pay its annual principal and interest payments on its existing and proposed long term debts from water revenues.
 - C. To enable Bullock Pen to meet the coverage requirements(1.20) set forth in its existing and proposed debt instruments;
 - D. To enable Bullock Pen to enhance its financial capacity so it can continue to operate its system in compliance with the

federal Safe Drinking Water Act, as amended and KRS Chapter 151; and

E. To enable Bullock Pen to continue to provide adequate service.

The Applicant, Bullock Pen requests the PSC grant to the Applicant the following:

- A. A certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity, permitting Applicant to construct the waterworks project as described in the Preliminary Report shown as Exhibit 7.
- B. Approval of Applicant's KIA loan in the amount of \$2,320,700, with a term of 20 years, at an interest rate of 3 percent.
- C. Approval of Applicants proposal to increase its rates and charges and its entire tariff as set forth in this Petition
- 20. Bullock Pen does not plan to support the application with prepared testimony. It respectfully requests the PSC staff to perform a field review, if necessary, of Bullock Pen's financial records and issue a staff report just as the staff routinely does in general rate cases filed by water districts.
- 21. Bullock Pen moves for a deviation from or a waiver of, the requirement that it file its most recent capital construction budget as required by 807 KAR 5:001, Section 10(7)(b). No such capital improvement construction budget exists. Bullock Pen like smaller water districts and associations does not normally provide for or maintain a capital improvement construction budget. Any new construction occurs on a case-by-case

filed pursuant to 807 KAR 5:001, Section 14.

NON-RECURRING CHARGES

- 22. Bullock Pen proposes to adjust its special non-recurring charges so that each charge reflects the actual cost of providing service. Exhibit 4, provides a list of the current and proposed charge for each non-recurring charge.
- 23. The proposed amount of each non-recurring charge is set forth on Sheet 4 of the proposed Tariffs and Exhibit 4, Customer Notice.
- 24. Specific cost justification worksheets for the proposed non-recurring charges are appended as Exhibit 10.
- 25. The proposed charges are equal to the expenses incurred by Bullock Pen in providing the associated service. Hence, implementation of the proposed non-recurring charge will be revenue neutral.
- 26. Bullock Pen is currently losing money each time it performs any of these services.
- 27. The only customers that will be impacted by these non-recurring charges will be the customers who request the services or whose actions require the District to incur the associated expense.
- 28. Bullock Pen proposes to implement the charges at the same time the increased rates become effective.

- 29. A copy of this Petition and Application, together with all exhibits, has been delivered to the Office of Rate Intervention of the Office of the Attorney General as required by 807 KAR 5:011, Section 10(1)(b).
- 30. A Filing Requirement Index, which shows the location of all documents required by the applicable administrative regulations, or explains the reason for the absence of any documents, is included with the Application.

WHEREFORE, Bullock Pen respectfully requests that the PSC take the

following actions:

- A. Approve the proposed adjustment of water rates and charges to all customers;
- B. Approve the proposed adjustment to Bullock Pen's non-recurring charges;
- C. Approve Bullock Pen's revised tariff sheets
- D. Grant Bullock Pen a deviation or waiver from the requirement that it file a capital improvement budget as required by 807 KAR 5:001, Section 10(7)(b).
- E. Approve Bullock Pen's proposed construction, financed by KIA.
- F. Grant Bullock Pen any and all other proper relief.

B. DEPOSITS

The utility may require a minimum cash deposit or other guarantee to secure payment. Service may be refused or discontinued if payment of requested deposit is not made. Deposits will be returned returned after one year if the customer if the customer's bill is paid by the due date each month.

An equal deposit amount for each class of customers will be established based on the average annual bill of customers in that class. Deposit amounts will not exceed two twelfths (2/12) of the average annual bills of customers in each class where bills are rendered monthly. Deposits will be adjusted each time the utility receives a rate increase approved by the Public Service Commission.

Deposit may be waived for a customer showing satisfactory credit or payment history. In determining whether a deposit will be required or waived, the following criteria will be considered; a) Previous history with the utility. If the customer has no previous history with the utility, statements from other utilities, banks, etc., may be presented by the customer as evidence of good credit; b) Whether the customer has an established income or line of credit; c) length of time the customer has resided or been located in the area; d) Whether the customer owns the property to be served; e) whether another customer with a good payment history is willing to sign as a guarantor for an amount equal to the required deposit.

Interest will accrue on all deposits at the rate prescribed by law beginning on the date of the deposit. Interest accrued will be refunded or credited to the customer's bill on an annual basis. In situations where a customer leaves the system with less than one years service, since beginning service or since the customer's last interest payment date, interest will be refunded or credited to the customer on a prorated basis.

The following are the rules and regulations of the <u>Bullock Pen Water District</u>. The schedule of rates prescribed herein will be uniformly charged to all customers of the utility. No one will receive or be entitled to free service by the utility. No employee or individual commissioner of the utility is permitted to make an exception to these rates, rules, or regulations. These rules and regulations are subject to change by the utility at any time, subject to the approval of the Public Service Commission.

Any customer applying for residential or commercial water service with the District agrees to comply with all rules and regulations of the District. The customer agrees to notify the District of any leaks when the same are observed, insure no one else taps into the water supply line or meter servicing such customer. The customer also agrees to comply with all rules and regulation of the District. Any customer who does not abide by said conditions for service shall be subject to having their service terminated.

A. <u>Service Information</u>.

- 1. Upon request the utility will give its customers or prospective customers such information as is reasonably possible in order that they may secure safe, efficient, and continuous service. The utility will inform its customers of any change made or proposed in the character of its service that might affect the efficiency, safety, or continuity of operation.
- 2. The utility will obtain the approval of the Public Service Commission prior to making any substantial change in the character of the service furnished that would affect the efficiency, adjustment, speed, or operation of the equipment or appliances of any customer. The application will show the nature of the change to be made, the number of customers affected, and the manner in which they will be affected.

- B. <u>Special Rules or Requirements</u>.
 - 1. The utility cannot establish any special rule or requirement without first obtaining the approval of the Public Service Commission.
 - 2. A customer that has complied with Public Service Commission rules and regulations cannot be denied service for failure to comply with the utility's rules that have not been approved by the Public Service Commission.
 - 3. No customer is allowed to resell water except under the terms of a special contract executed by the utility and approved by the Public Service Commission.

C. Billing.

- 1. Bill format. A copy of the utility's billing form is included in the utility's tariff.
- 2. Frequency of meter reading. Unless prevented by reasons beyond the utility's control, meter readings will be taken every month. Records will be kept by the utility to insure that this information is available to Public Service Commission staff and any customer requesting this information. If, due to reasons beyond its control, the utility is unable to read a meter in accordance with this subsection, the utility will record the date and time the attempt was made, if applicable, and the reason the utility was unable to read the meter.
- 3. Related Information.
 - a) Bills and notices related to the utility's business will be mailed to the customer at the address listed at the time of connection unless a change of address has been filed with the utility in writing. The utility will not otherwise be responsible for delivery of any bill or notice nor will the customer be excused from the payment of any bill or any performance required in the notice.

- b) Water service will be billed monthly.
- c) A late payment penalty will be assessed on the delinquent amount of the bill, less taxes and any prior penalty amounts. Pursuant to 807 KAR 5:006 Section 8 (3)(h), a penalty may be assessed only once on any bill for rendered services.

When a bill has been delinquent for more than 20 days, the District will serve a customer a written final notice of said delinquency, and of the intent to discontinue service ten (10) days after the date of such notice unless such bill is paid prior to the expiration of such ten (10) days.

If a delinquent bill is not paid within ten (10) days after the date of such final notice (thirty days after the past due date), the water supply to the customer may be disconnected without further notice.

- d) With the exception of existing connections, the existence of a special contract, or unusual circumstances requiring approval of the utility, a single meter can serve no more than one residential or commercial unit.
- D. Special Non-recurring Charges.
 - 1. The utility will collect for special nonrecurring charges to recover customer-specific costs incurred which would otherwise result in monetary loss to the utility or increased rates to other customers to whom no benefits accrue from the service provided or action taken. The utility may establish or change any special nonrecurring charge by applying for Public Service Commission approval of such charge in accordance with the provisions of 807 KAR 5:011, Section 10.
 - 2. Special nonrecurring charges will be applied uniformly throughout the area served by the utility. Such charges will relate directly to the service performed or action taken and only yield enough revenue to pay the expenses incurred in rendering the service.

- 3. The utility will assess a charge for the following non-recurring services:
 - a) <u>Service Call/Investigation Charge</u>: Will be assessed when a customer requests the onsite presence of utility personnel to investigate a service problem and the problem is a result of the customer's own plumbing facilities, beyond the utility's delivery point, or not caused by failure of utility facilities. Any maintenance and repair of facilities beyond the utility's delivery point is the responsibility of the customer.
 - b) <u>Late Payment Penalty</u>: Will be assessed on the delinquent amount of the bill, less taxes. The late payment penalty is 10 percent.
 - c) <u>Meter Relocation Charge</u>: Will be assessed when a customer or other authorized person requests that a meter be relocated, changed, or modified. Those requesting a change must reimburse the utility for the actual costs incurred, including but not limited to appropriate legal, administrative, engineering, overhead, or other related costs.
 - d) <u>Reconnection Charge</u>: Will be assessed to reconnect service that has been terminated for non-payment of service or for violation of Utility or Public Service Commission rules and regulations, and will include the cost of the service trip for both the disconnection and the reconnection.
 - e) <u>Returned Check Charge</u>: Will be assessed when a customer's check is returned, either due to insufficient funds or other reason due to customer fault.
 - f) <u>Meter Reread</u>: A charge will be made if the customer requests a meter to be reread, and the original reading was correct.

E. COLLECTION OF DELINQUENT ACCOUNTS.

All customers are and shall be required to pay the amount of their respective water bills in full and without discount on the day following the rendering of the bill for water service. If payment on the account is not received in a timely manner, then the District shall issue a notice regarding the delinquent account along with a notice of intent to discontinue services for nonpayment. The water service shall not be restored until the account is paid in full, plus a service charge for discontinuing service and restoring service plus any deposit required.

F. <u>Credit/Debit Cards</u>. Customers may pay their bill by credit or debit card, once the utility has access to this payment method. This method of payment may be made in person at the utility office or by telephone.

If on the bill due date, an attempt to pay the credit or debit card is made and the card is declined for any reason, payment is still due in full on that date and will be considered late after the due date. All late charges and penalties will be applied. If a customer is paying on our disconnect day and the card is denied, the same rules and above apply, in addition to service being disconnected.

If a customer makes a payment by credit card, the utility will assess a fee equal to that charged to the utility by credit or debit card processing company to process the transaction. Prior to processing the transaction, the customer will be informed of the fee amount. The fee will be calculated as follows:

1.7% of the bill plus 20 cents per transaction for Visa, Master Card and Discover.

ACH/Bank Drafts: All customers may pay their bill by ACH or Bank Draft. The charge for using this method is 15 cents per transaction.

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G. <u>Customer Complaints to the Utility</u>. Upon complaint to the utility by a customer at the utility's office, by telephone, or in writing, the utility will make a prompt and complete investigation and advise the complainant of its findings. The utility's operator/manager will make a decision within ten (10) days, which the complainant will then have ten (10) days to appeal to the utility's board of commissioners. The customer will receive a final decision from the utility no later than thirty (30) days following the date that the complaint was made. If the complainant is not satisfied with the utility's decision, the utility will provide written notice to the complainant of his/her right to appeal the utility's decision by filing a complaint with the Public Service Commission. The utility will also provide the customer with the address and telephone number of the Public Service Commission. The utility will keep a record of all written complaints. This record will show the name and address of the complainant, the date and nature of the complaint, and the adjustment or disposition of the complaint. Records will be maintained for two (2) years from the date of resolution of the complaint.

H. Bill Adjustments:

- 1. Fast or slow reading meters:
 - a) If upon periodic test, requested test, or complaint test, a meter in service is found to be more than two (2) percent fast, additional tests will be made to determine the average error of the meter. The tests will be made in accordance with Public Service Commission rules and regulations applicable to the type of meter involved.
 - b) If test results on a customer's meter show an average error greater than two (2) percent fast or slow, or if a customer has been incorrectly billed for any other reason, except in an instance where a utility has filed a verified complaint with

the appropriate law enforcement agency alleging fraud or theft by a customer, the utility will immediately determine the period during which the error has existed, and will recompute and adjust the customer's bill to either provide a refund to the customer or collect an additional amount of revenue from the underbilled customer. Any adjustment to the customer's account will be in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Public Service Commission pursuant to 807 KAR 5:066 Section 9(c).

- c) The utility will readjust the account based upon the period during which the error is known to have existed. If the period during which the error existed cannot be determined with reasonable precision, the time period will be estimated using such data as elapsed time since the last meter test, if applicable, and historical usage data for the customer. If that data is not available, the average usage of similar customer loads will be used for comparison purposes in calculating the time period. If the customer and the utility are unable to agree on an estimate of the time period during which the error existed, the Public Service Commission will determine the issue. In all instances of customer overbilling, the customer's account will be credited or the overbilled amount refunded at the discretion of the customer within thirty (30) days after final meter test results. A utility will not require customer repayment of any underbilling to be made over a period shorter than a period coextensive with the underbilling.
- Meter read failure. When a meter has ceased to register, or a meter reading cannot be obtained, the quantity of water to be billed will be based upon an average of <u>twelve-months</u>' consumption. If said meter readings are not available for an entire <u>twelve-month</u> period, the

water bill will be estimated by the utility, subject to an upward or downward adjustment once a <u>twelve-month</u> average of actual meter readings can be calculated.

- 3. Monitoring usage. The utility will monitor a customer's usage at least annually in such a way to draw the utility's attention to unusual deviations in a customer's usage. If a customer's usage is unduly high (25% above average) and the deviation is not otherwise explained, the utility will test the customer's meter to determine whether the meter shows an average error greater than two (2) percent fast or slow.
- 4. Usage investigation. If the utility's procedure for monitoring usage indicates that an investigation of a customer's usage is necessary, the utility will notify the customer in writing either during or immediately after the investigation of the reasons for the investigation, and of the findings of the investigation. If knowledge of a serious situation requires more expeditious notice, the utility will notify the customer by the most expedient means available.
- 5. Customer notification. If a meter is tested and it is found necessary to make a refund or back bill a customer, the customer will be notified in substantially the following form:

On ______, 20___, the meter bearing identification No. _____ installed in your building located at ______ (Street and Number) in ______ (city) was tested at ______ (on premises or elsewhere) and found to register ______ (percent fast or slow). The meter was tested on ______ (Periodic, Request, Complaint) test.

I. <u>Status of Customer Accounts during Billing Disputes</u>. With respect to any billing dispute, customer accounts shall be considered to be current while the dispute is pending as long as the customer continues to make undisputed payments and stays current on subsequent bills.

J. Customer's Request for Termination of Service.

- 1. Any customer desiring service terminated or changed from one address to another shall give the utility three (3) working days' notice in person, in writing, or by telephone, provided such notice does not violate contractual obligations. The customer will not be responsible for charges for service beyond the three (3) day notice period if the customer provides proper notification and reasonable access to the meter during the notice period. If the customer notifies the utility of his/her request for termination by telephone, the burden of proof is on the customer to prove that service termination was requested if a dispute arises.
- 2. Upon request that service be reconnected at any premises subsequent to the initial installation or connection to its service lines, the utility will charge the applicant a reconnect fee as set out in this tariff and approved by the Public Service Commission.

K. Customer Relations.

- 1. Display of customer rights. The utility will prominently display in the office in which payment is received a copy of Customer's Rights. If a customer indicates to any utility personnel that he is experiencing difficulty in paying a current utility bill, that employee will refer the customer to the designated representative for explanation of the customer's rights.
- 2. Partial payment plans. The utility shall negotiate and accept reasonable partial payment plans at the request of residential customers who have received a termination notice for failure to pay, except that a utility is not required to negotiate a partial payment plan with a customer

who is delinquent under a previous partial payment plan. Partial payment plans must be mutually agreed upon. Plans which extend for a period longer than thirty (30) days will be in writing and will advise customers that service may be terminated without additional notice if the customer fails to meet the obligations of the plan.

- 3. Utility inspections of service conditions prior to providing service. The utility will inspect the condition of the meter and service connections before providing service to a new customer so that prior or fraudulent use of the facilities will not be attributed to the new customer. The new customer will be afforded the opportunity to be present at such inspections. The utility will not be required to render service to any customer until any defects in the customer-owned portion of the service facilities have been corrected.
- 4. Advance termination notice. When advance termination notice is required, the termination notice will be mailed or otherwise delivered to the last known address of the customer. The termination notice will be in writing, distinguishable and separate from any bill. The termination notice will plainly state the reason for termination, that the termination date will not be affected by receipt of any subsequent bill, and that the customer has the right to dispute the reasons for termination.
- L. <u>Refusal or Termination of Service</u>.
 - 1. The utility may refuse service to a customer under the following conditions:
 - a) For noncompliance with utility or Public Service Commission rules and regulations. The utility cannot refuse service to any customer for noncompliance without first having made a reasonable effort to obtain customer compliance. After such effort by the utility, service may be refused only after the customer has been given a written notice of refusal stating the reasons for refusal of service.

- b) For dangerous conditions. If a dangerous condition exists which could subject any person to imminent harm or result in substantial damage to the property of the utility or others is found to exist on the customer's premises, then service will be refused. The utility will notify the customer in writing and, if possible, orally for the reasons for refusal of service. Such notice will be recorded by the utility and will include the corrective action to be taken by the customer before service can be provided.
- c) For refusal of access. When a customer refuses or neglects to provide reasonable access to the premises for installation, operation, meter reading, maintenance or removal of utility property, the utility may refuse service. The utility will notify the customer in writing and, if possible, orally for the reasons for refusal of service. Such notice will be recorded by the utility and will include the corrective action to be taken by the customer before service can be provided.
- d) For outstanding indebtedness. The utility will not furnish new service to any customer who is indebted to the utility until that customer has repaid the indebtedness.
- e) For noncompliance with state, local, or other codes. The utility may refuse service to a customer if the customer does not comply with state, municipal or other codes, rules, and/or administrative regulations applying to such service. The utility will notify the customer in writing and, if possible, orally for the reasons for refusal of service. Such notice will be recorded by the utility and will include the corrective action to be taken by the customer before service can be provided.
- 2. Utility Initiated Termination of Service.
 - a) The termination notice requirements stated herein will not apply if termination notice requirements to a particular customer or customers are otherwise dictated by the terms of a special contract between the utility and customer which has been approved by the Public Service Commission.

- b) When advance termination notice is required, the termination notice shall be mailed or otherwise delivered to the last known address of the customer. The termination notice shall be in writing, distinguishable and separate from any bill. The termination notice shall plainly state the reason for termination, that the termination date will not be affected by receipt of any subsequent bill, and that the customer has the right to dispute the reasons for termination.
- c) The utility may terminate service to a customer under the following conditions with an advance termination notice:
 - 1) For noncompliance with utility or Public Service Commission rules and regulations. The utility cannot terminate service to any customer for noncompliance without first having made a reasonable effort to obtain customer compliance. After such effort by the utility, service may be terminated only after the customer has been given at least ten (10) days written termination notice.
 - 2) For refusal of access. When a customer refuses or neglects to provide reasonable access to the premises for installation, operation, meter reading, maintenance, or removal of utility property, the utility may terminate service. - For nonpayment of bills. The utility may terminate service for nonpayment of charges incurred for utility services. The utility may terminate service only after five (5) days' written notice of termination is provided, and after twenty (20) days have elapsed since the mailing date of the original unpaid bill.
- d) The utility may terminate service to a customer if the following conditions exist without an advance termination notice. Within twenty-four (24) hours after such termination, the utility shall send written notification to the customer of the reason(s) for termination upon which the utility relies, and of the customer's right to challenge the termination by filing a formal complaint with the Public Service Commission. The utility will not restore service until the customer agrees to comply with all rules and regulations of the utility and Public Service Commission.
 - For illegal use or theft of service. The utility may terminate service to a customer without advance notice if it has evidence that a customer has obtained unauthorized service by illegal use or theft. - 3) Unapproved Extensions and/or Additions. Any extension or additions to an existing service connection that have not been approved by the utility will be considered theft of service, and will constitute grounds for termination of service. This right of termination is separate from and in addition to any other legal remedies that the utility may pursue for illegal use or theft of service.
- 4) Misrepresentation. Any misrepresentation in the application or contract as to the property or fixtures to be supplied or additional use to be made of water will constitute grounds for termination of service, and the customer shall be liable for any damage to any of the utility's facilities or equipment.
- 5) Failure to Report Changes. Failure to notify the utility of additions to the property or fixtures to be supplied or additional use to be made of water will constitute grounds for termination of service.
- 6) Resale of Water. Under no circumstances will a customer be allowed to resell or give away water except under the terms of a special contract executed by the utility and approved by the Public Service Commission. Failure to comply with this rule will constitute grounds for termination of service.
- Waste or Misuse. Waste or misuse of water due to improper or imperfect service pipes and/or failure to keep said pipes in suitable state of repair will constitute grounds for termination of service.
- 8) Tampering with meter, meter seal, service, valves, or other system facilities, or permitting such tampering by others will constitute grounds for termination of service.
- Connections, cross-connections, or permitting the same, of any separate water supply to premises that receive water from the utility will constitute grounds for termination of service.

- e) The utility will not terminate service to a customer if the following conditions exist:
 - 1) If payment for services is made. Service will not be terminated to a customer that was sent a termination notice if the customer delivers full payment to the utility prior to the actual termination of service.
 - 2) If a partial payment agreement is in effect. Service will not be terminated for nonpayment if the customer and the utility have entered into a partial payment plan and the customer is meeting the requirements of the plan.
 - 3) If a medical certificate is presented. Service will not be terminated for thirty (30) days beyond the termination date if a physician, registered nurse or public health officer certifies in writing that termination of service will aggravate a debilitating illness or infirmity on the affected premises. The utility may refuse to grant consecutive extensions for medical certificates past the original thirty (30) days unless the certificate is accompanied by an agreed partial payment plan. The utility will not require a new deposit from a customer to avoid termination of service for a thirty (30) day period who presents to the utility a medical certificate certified in writing by a physician, registered nurse or public health officer.

M. Meter Testing.

- 1. Water meters will be tested before being installed for use by any customer. The water meter will be in good working order and adjusted as close to the optimum operating tolerance as possible, in accordance with 807 KAR 5:022, Section 8(3)(a), 807 KAR 5:041, Section 17(1)(a)-(c) and 807 KAR 5:066, Section 15(2)(a)-(b).
- 2. The utility may have all or part of its meter testing performed by another utility or agency approved by the Public Service Commission. The utility will notify the Public Service Commission of the make, type, and serial number of standards used for testing.

- 3. The utility cannot place in service any basic measurement standard unless the Public Service Commission has approved the calibration. The Public Service Commission will be notified promptly of the adoption or deletion of any basic standards requiring approval of the calibration.
- 4. Meter testers must be certified by the Public Service Commission. Certified meter testers will perform tests as necessary to determine the accuracy of the utility's meters and to adjust the utility's meters to the degree of accuracy required by the rules and regulations of the Public Service Commission.
- N. Meter Test Records.
 - A complete record of all meter tests and adjustments and data sufficient to allow checking of test calculations will be recorded by the meter tester. Such record will include: information to identify the unit and its location; date of tests; reason for such tests; readings before and after test; statement of "as found" and "as left" accuracy sufficiently complete to permit checking of calculations employed; notations showing that all required checks have been made; statement of repairs made, if any; identifying number of the meter; type and capacity of the meter; and the meter constant. The complete record of tests of each meter will be continuous for at least two (2) periodic test periods and will in no case be less than two (2) years.
 - 2. The utility will keep numerically arranged and properly classified records for each meter owned, used and inventoried by the utility. The identification number, date of purchase, name of manufacturer, serial number, type, rating, and name and address of each customer on whose premises the meter has been in service with date of installation and removal will be included in the records. These records will also contain condensed information concerning all tests and adjustments including dates and general results of such adjustments. The records

will reflect the date of the last test and indicate the proper date for the next periodic test required by the applicable Public Service Commission rule and/or regulation.

3. Upon completion of adjustment and test of any meter pursuant to Public Service Commission rules and regulations, the utility will affix to the meter a suitable seal in such a manner that adjustments or registration of the meter cannot be altered without breaking the seal.

O. <u>Customer Requested Meter Tests</u>.

- 1. The utility will make a test of any meter upon written request of any customer if the request is not made more frequently than once every twelve- (12) months. The customer shall be given the opportunity to be present at the requested test. If the test shows that the meter was not more than two (2) percent fast, the utility will make a reasonable charge for the test, the amount being approved by the Public Service Commission and set out in the utility's tariff.
- 2. After having first obtained a test from the utility, any customer of the utility may request a meter test by the Public Service Commission upon written application. Such request shall not be made more frequently on one (1) meter than once every twelve- (12) months.
- P. Access to Property.
 - 1. The utility shall at all reasonable hours have access to meters, service connections, and other property owned by it and located on customer's premises for purposes of installation, maintenance, meter reading, operation, replacement or removal of its property at the time service is terminated. Any employee of the utility whose duties require him/her to enter the customer's premises will wear a distinguishing uniform or other insignia identifying him/her as an employee of the utility, or show a badge or other identification which will identify him/her as an employee.

- 2. Obtaining easements and right-of-ways necessary to extend service will be the responsibility of the utility.
- 3. All customers must grant, convey, or cause to be granted or conveyed to the utility a perpetual easement and right-of-way across any property owned or controlled by the customer wherever necessary for the utility's facilities in order to provide service.
- 4. The utility cannot require a prospective customer to obtain easements or rights-of-way on property not owned by the prospective customer as a condition for providing service. However, the cost of obtaining easements or rights-of-way will be included in the total per foot cost of an extension, and will be apportioned among the utility and customer in accordance with the applicable extension administrative regulation.

Q. System Inspections.

- 1. The utility will adopt inspection procedures to assure safe and adequate operation of its facilities and compliance with Public Service Commission rules and regulations. These procedures will be filed with the Public Service Commission for review.
- 2. Upon receipt of a report of a potentially hazardous condition at any utility facility made by a qualified employee, public official, or customer, the utility will inspect all portions of the system which are the subjects of the report.
- 3. Appropriate records will be kept by the utility to identify the inspection made, deficiencies found and action taken to correct the deficiencies.
- 4. Inspections. The utility will make systematic inspections of its system in the manner set out below to insure that the Public Service Commission's safety requirements are being met. These inspections will be made as often as necessary but not less frequently than is set forth below for various classes of facilities and types of inspection.

- a) The utility will annually inspect all structures pertaining to source of supply for their safety and physical and structural integrity, including dams, intakes, and traveling screens. The utility will semiannually inspect supply wells, their motors and structures, including electric power wiring and controls for proper and safe operation.
- b) The utility will annually inspect all structures pertaining to purification for their safety, physical and structural integrity and for leaks, including sedimentation basins, filters, and clear wells; chemical feed equipment; pumping equipment and water storage facilities, including electric power wiring and controls; hydrants, mains, and valves.
- c) The utility will monthly inspect construction equipment and vehicles for defects, wear, operational hazards, lubrication, and safety features.

R. Reporting of Accidents, Property Damage, or Loss of Service.

- 1. Within two (2) hours following discovery the utility will notify the Public Service Commission by telephone or electronic mail of any utility related accident which results in:
 - a) Death; or shock or burn requiring medical treatment at a hospital or similar medical facility, or any accident requiring inpatient overnight hospitalization;
 - b) Actual or potential property damage of \$25,000 or more; or
 - c) Loss of service for four (4) or more hours to ten (10) percent or 500 or more of the utility's customers, whichever is less.
- 2. A summary written report will be submitted by the utility to the Public Service Commission within seven (7) calendar days of the utility related accident.

RULE	S AND REGULATIONS

- S. Continuity of Service.
 - 1. Emergency interruptions. The utility will make all reasonable efforts to prevent interruptions of service and when such interruptions occur will endeavor to reestablish service with the shortest possible delay consistent with the safety of its consumers and the general public. If an emergency interruption of service affects service to any public fire protection device, the utility will immediately notify the fire chief or other public official responsible for fire protection.
 - 2. Scheduled interruptions. If the utility finds it necessary to schedule an interruption of its service, it will notify all customers to be affected by the interruption, stating the time and anticipated duration of the interruption. Whenever possible, scheduled interruptions will be made at hours of least inconvenience to customers. If public fire protection is provided by mains affected by the interruptions, the utility will notify the fire chief or other officials responsible for fire protection of the interruption, stating the time and anticipated duration. The fire chief or other official responsible for fire protection will be notified immediately upon restoration of service.
 - 3. Record of interruptions. The utility will keep a complete record of all interruptions on its entire system. This record will show the cause of interruption, date, time, duration, remedy and steps taken to prevent recurrence.
- T. <u>Pressures</u>.
 - Standard pressure. The utility will maintain a standard pressure in its distribution system at locations to be designated as the point or points of "standard pressure." The selection of such points will be confined to locations fairly representative of average conditions. In selecting points for fixed standard pressure, the utility may divide its distribution system into Districts if division is necessary due to differences of elevation or loss of pressure because of friction,

or both, and may either adopt a standard pressure for each division or establish a single standard pressure for its distribution system as a whole. The utility may, in extenuating circumstances, furnish service that does not comply with the foregoing specifications if the customer is fully advised of the conditions under which average service may be expected. The Public Service Commission, upon investigation, may require improvements when it appears right and proper that such upgrades should be made. In no event, however, will the pressure at the customer's service pipe under normal conditions fall below thirty- (30) psig nor will the static pressure exceed 150 psig.

- 2. Pressure surveys. At least once a year the utility will make a survey of pressures in its distribution system of sufficient magnitude to indicate the quality of service being rendered at representative points in its system. Pressure charts for these surveys will show the date and time of beginning and end of the test and the location at which the test was made. Records of these pressure surveys will be maintained at the utility's office and will be made available to the Public Service Commission upon request.
- U. Service Lines & Connections.
 - 1. The utility will furnish and install at its own expense for the purpose of connecting its distribution system to the customer's premises that portion of the service connection from its main to and including the meter and meter box. The utility will recoup this expense from the customer in accordance with KRS 278.0152.
 - 2. In areas where the distribution system follows well-defined streets and roads, the customer's point of service will be located at that point on or near the street right-of-way or property line most accessible to the utility from its distribution system. In areas where the distribution system does not follow streets and roads, the point of service will be located as near the

customer's property line as practicable. Prior to installation of the meter the utility will consult with the customer as to the most practical location.

- 3. Depth of service line. All service lines must be laid at a sufficient depth to prevent freezing during the coldest weather normally experienced except where services are not intended for use during freezing weather and are actually drained during such periods.
- 4. A plumbing permit from the appropriate regulatory agency is required before the utility can set the meter.
- 5. The applicant/customer must furnish and lay the necessary pipe to make the connection from the point of service to the point of usage and be financially responsible for all costs associated with the installation and maintenance of his/her service line plumbing, including a shut-off valve and one-way check valve, installed on his/her property beginning at the outlet side of the water meter. The service line must be kept in good repair and in accordance with utility and Public Service Commission rules and regulations.
- 6. The installation and maintenance of the water service line must be in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Kentucky Department of Health.
- 7. A cross-connection of the utility's system with any other source is strictly prohibited.
- 8. A well that has or is being used on the premises must be inspected by utility personnel to verify disconnection and separation.
- 9. Absolutely no galvanized pipe or fittings can be used in the installation.
- 10. If the applicant/customer's point of usage is at a higher elevation than the meter, the customer should consult with a reputable engineering firm to properly size the service line from the meter to the point of usage.

- 11. Should an applicant/customer desire a higher pressure due to location or other need, provisions must be made by the applicant for an individual pressure booster system. The manner of connection, location cross-connection protection and type is subject to approval by the utility. The utility reserves the right to require discontinuance and disconnection should the private booster system have a detrimental effect on the utility's system.
- 12. Piping on the premises of the applicant/customer must be installed so that connections are conveniently located with respect to the utility's lines and mains. A place must be provided for metering that is unobstructed and accessible at all times.
- 13. The utility may require the applicant/customer may, at his/her own expense, to install a backflow preventor and/or pressure regulator.
- 14. All meters will be installed, renewed, and maintained at the expense of the utility, and the utility reserves the right to approve the size and type of meter used.
- 15. All taps and connections to the mains of the utility must be made by and/or under the direction and supervision of utility personnel and will incur a meter connection/tap-on charge, an amount that has been approved by the Public Service Commission for such service. Payment of this fee is for the privilege of connecting to the water system and the payment of the fee does not constitute the purchase of a water meter.
- 16. The installer shall verify that payment has been made for the meter, that all easements have been obtained, and in addition, said installer shall note the serial number of the meter being installed. If a meter is removed from a particular residence for a temporary period of time for testing or other purposes, it shall be labeled as to which property location it belongs and shall be reinstalled if at all possible. The installer shall also verify the obtaining of a health department permit for said meter.
- 17. No connections to the water lines of the system shall be made except by or under the supervision of a duly authorized officer, agent or employee of the District, an only after

approval of the application submitted with the required tap on or connection fee for the particular meter.

- 18. Any customer having boilers and/or pressure vessels that receive water from the utility must have a check valve on the water supply line and a vacuum valve on the steam line in order to prevent a collapse were the water supply from the utility be interrupted or discontinued.
- V. <u>Underground Leak Adjustments</u>. A customer may make a request for a bill adjustment in the event of a leak under the following conditions:
 - 1. The customer must request a leak adjustment in writing to the utility.
 - 2. One adjustment in a twelve-(12) month period shall be allowed upon proof of unintentional cause of the leak and correction of said problem. Proof that the repair has been made such as meter reader verification, plumbing receipt or materials for customer repair will be required. The customer's bill will be based on two components. The first step will be to calculate the customer's average monthly usage over a twelve-month period. (A lesser consumption history may be used if a twelve-month period is not available). The second step will be to deduct the customers average monthly usage (as calculated in the above) from the total amount of water that passed through the meter. The usage calculated in step one will be billed at the utility's regular rates, while the remaining usage will be billed at the District's wholesale rate.
 - 3. If meter readings are not available for an entire twelve-month period, the water bill will be estimated by the utility, subject to an upward or downward adjustment once a twelve-month average of actual meter readings can be calculated.
 - 4. If the amount of the adjusted bill shall be in excess of one hundred dollars (100), the customer shall have ninety (90) days to pay the entire bill. If the bill is under the (100) the customer must pay same in sixty (60) days for the date of the calculation.

- 2. No person shall maliciously, willfully, or negligently break, damage, destroy, uncover, deface, or tamper with any structure appurtenance or equipment which is a part of the utility's water system. Any person violating this provision will be subject to immediate arrest and/or discontinuance of water service and shall pay the cost of repairing or replacing the utility's facilities.
- 3. If any loss or damage to the property of the utility or any accident or other injury to persons or property is caused by or results from the negligence or wrongful action of a customer, members of his/her household, his/her agent or employee, the cost of necessary repairs or replacements shall be paid by the customer of the utility and any liability otherwise resulting shall be that of the customer.
- 4. For purposes of fire protection, including any customer's fire protection system, the utility cannot guarantee a water supply at any particular flow rate or pressure. The fire flow may vary depending upon other water demands on the system, various water facility limitations, or other circumstances. The customer will indemnify and hold harmless the utility and its employees from and against all claims, damages, losses, and expenses incurred as a result of insufficient water supply or deficient system facilities.
- Y. <u>Fire Departments</u>. Any city, county, urban county, charger county, fire protection district, or volunteer fire protection district ("User") may withdraw water from the utility's water distribution system for the purpose of fighting fires or training firefighters at no charge on the condition that it maintains estimates of the water used for fire protection and training during the calendar month and reports the amount of this water usage to the utility no later than the 15th day of the following calendar month.

Any city, county, urban count, charter county, fire protection district, or volunteer fire protection district that withdraws water from the utility's water distribution system for fire protection or training purposes and fails to submit the required report on water usage in a timely manner shall be assessed the cost of this water.

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A non-reporting user's usage shall be presumed to 0.3 of the utility's total water sales of the calendar month. A non-reporting user may present evidence of its actual usage to rebut the presumed usage. The utility shall consider this evidence and may adjust the presumed usage amount accordingly.

The non-reporting user shall be billed for this usage at the lowest usage block regardless of customer classification that the utility charges. A non-reporting user shall also be assessed a penalty of \$25.00 for each failure to submit a report in a timely manner.

Z. Fire Hydrants:

- 1. In accordance with 807 KAR 5:066 Section 10(2)(b), a new fire hydrant will not be installed unless:
 - a) A professional engineer with a Kentucky registration has certified that the system can provide a minimum fire flow of 250 gallons per minute, and
 - b) The system supporting this flow has the capability of providing this flow for a period of not less than two (2) hours plus consumption at the maximum daily rate.
- 2. The location, installation, and the responsibility for maintenance of fire hydrants, public and private fire protection facilities, connecting mains, and their ownership may be subject to negotiation between the utility and the applicant/customer. Fire hydrants and public and private fire protection facilities shall be installed as required by the utility and if owned by the utility shall be subject to any conditions the Public Service Commission may impose, based upon the compensation received for this service.
- 3. Installed throughout the service area are hydrants that are for the operation and maintenance of the water distribution systems of the District. The District is not in the business of providing fire protection. The hydrants are flush hydrants are for the internal operation of the

system and are necessarily designed for fighting fires. The hydrants may be used for fire protection but the District makes no commitment whatsoever as to the flow rate, pressure, or duration of flow that a particular hydrant is capable of performing based on the last inspection of the hydrant.

- AA. Extension Procedures for Developers and/or New Subdivisions.
 - 1. Nothing contained herein shall be construed to prohibit the utility from contracting to make extensions under different arrangements if such arrangements have received prior approval of the Public Service Commission. The following requirements were approved by the Commission in Case No. 9720 on September 14, 1994.
 - a) All residential subdivisions including but not limited to single family residential subdivisions whether such consist of single family, detached dwellings; condominiums, townhouses, patio homes and the like, ("subdivision") located within the District shall install an individual residential water meter for each individual residential dwelling located within the subdivision. The subdivision developer shall install up to the lot line of each individual subdivision lot or residential dwelling unit, as the case may be, waterlines for the purpose of making water meter connections for such individual living unit. All such installation of waterlines within the subdivision shall also be required to pay a tap-in or connection fee to the District as provided for in this tariff for each water meter installed by the District.
 - b) All waterline installation required to be installed by the developer of the subdivision as provided for in the above section, shall done in accordance with the existing rules, regulations and specifications of the District and shall be done at the developer's expense.
 - c) No waterline installation in any subdivision shall be constructed without first receiving written approval from the District, after application by the developer.

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- d) After all waterlines in any subdivision are installed, the District shall test the respective lines to insure that such line installation complies with all rules and, regulations and specifications of the District. Testing shall be effective with ten (10) days after the completion of all waterline installations or at the earliest possible date. The District shall supervise and or apply any and all tests to the lines installed in any subdivision, as the District may deem appropriate. All waterline installations must be in compliance with the rules, regulations and specifications of the District, prior to the acceptance thereof of the District.
- e) The subdivision developer/owner shall install a meter setter, meter crock and meter lid, suitable for meter installation,
- f) Following approval by the District of waterlines installed in a subdivision, and for a period of not less than one year thereafter, the developer shall bear the responsibility for all maintenance an repair for all lines and water meters installed within a subdivision until the date of written acceptance of said lines and meters by the District. Upon the expiration of said one year period and upon acceptance by the District, all responsibility for all such waterlines and meters shall be assumed and discharged by the District and the developer shall no longer have any responsibility for said maintenance and repair.

BB Mobile Home Parks

The following language relating to mobile home parks was approved in Case No. 9720. dated September 14, 1994.

All mobile home parks located within the District shall install an individual residential water meter for each mobile home unit located within the park. The park owner shall

install up to the mobile home living unit waterlines for the purpose of making a water meter connection. All such installations shall be done at the at the owners expense. The owner of the park shall also be required to pay a tap fee or connection fee to the District as provided in this tariff for each water meter installed by the District.

All waterline installation required to be installed by the owner shall be done in accordance with the existing rules, regulations and specifications of the District and shall be done at the owner's expense.

No waterline installation in any park shall be conducted without first receiving written approval by the District after application of the owner.

After all waterlines in any park are installed, the District shall test the respective lines to insure that such installation complies with all regulations of the District. Testing shall be effected after the completion of all waterline installation at the earliest possible date. The District shall supervise and /or apply any and all tests to the lines installed in any park as the District may deem appropriate. All waterline installation shall be in compliance with the regulations of the District.

The owner/developer shall install a meter setter, meter crock, and meter lid suitable for meter installation for each mobile home lot/pad at the developers/owner's cost and expense.

Parks served by master meters, which were installed and paid for by the owner thereof, shall receive reimbursement for the cost of such installation from the District in the event that the park owner should decide to install individual water meters for each unit. The park owner shall be responsible for the installation of all water lines with in the park.

As of the effective date of this tariff amendment any park serviced by a master meter or any water meter which services two or more units shall be billed as follows: A monthly water bill shall equal the product of the number of mobile homes serviced by such meter

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times the current minimum monthly bill as set forth in the District's tariff. In the event that the total number of gallons consumed exceed the product of the number of mobile home units serviced by such meter time the minimum gallon usage, all water used in excess of the minimum gallon usage shall be billed per the District's tariff.

Responsibility for payment of water bills from any respective mobile home living unit shall be the responsibility of that individual in whose name the water meter is installed or other individual name in which the particular account is registered.

CC. Apartments

Any owner of an apartment building where the apartment building consists of two or more living units, the apartment building owner may at their election, have individual meters installed for each individual apartment unit. In the event that individual water meters are installed for each individual unit, all charges, fee and water rates, including disconnect and reconnect fees shall be the same as those provided in this tariff. The District shall charge a separate tap fee as approved by the Commission.

WATER SUPPLY AGREEMENT

This Water Supply Agreement (hereinafter "Agreement") dated as of the *Mart* day of *Occember*, 2007, is made and entered by and between the Northern Kentucky Water District, 2835 Crescent Springs Road, P.O. Box 18640, Erlanger, Kentucky 41018 (hereinafter "NKWD") and the Bullock Pen Water District, One Farrell Drive, Crittenden, Kentucky 41030 (hereinafter "BPWD"). NKWD and BPWD will be collectively referred to herein as the "Parties."

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, BPWD desires a reliable source of water for its present and future needs, and NKWD desires to continue to provide BPWD with a reliable source of water for its present and future needs; and

WHEREAS, BPWD desires to expand its provision of water service to certain residents in southern Kenton County and NKWD is willing to allow such expansion in certain locations and pursuant to certain terms; and

WHEREAS, NKWD and BPWD desire to establish certain terms for the possible sale of BPWD's current and future water lines and appurtenances located in southern Kenton County and the possible sale of BPWD's assets; and

WHEREAS, NKWD and BPWD desire to work together to promote and encourage responsible growth and development in Kenton County and Grant County; and

WHEREAS, NKWD and BPWD desire to have NKWD be BPWD's water supplier of choice for certain designated areas:

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and the mutual covenants and agreements contained herein and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are expressly acknowledged, NKWD and BPWD hereby agree as follows:

ARTICLE I

EFFECTIVE DATE, TERM AND TERMINATION OF PRIOR AGREEMENT

A. This Agreement will take effect on the date that this Agreement and the rates and service set forth herein are approved by the Public Service Commission of the Commonwealth of Kentucky (hereinafter "PSC") or the date that the PSC declares that its approval of this Agreement and the rates and service set forth herein is not required, whichever occurs first (hereinafter the "Effective Date"); provided that such approval of Pudeulatation (Pudeulatation (Pudeulatatio)

B. Once it takes effect on the Effective Date, this Agreement 2/1/2008 force and effect until December 1, 2040. SECTION 9 (1) C. The Water Supply Agreement, dated as of the 16th day of April, 2000, by and between the Bullock Pen Water District and the Northern Kentucky Water Service District will be automatically terminated on the Effective Date, with no action required by the parties thereto to effectuate such termination.

ARTICLE II QUANTITY AND QUALITY OF WATER

A. During the term of this Agreement and any renewal or extension thereof, BPWD will purchase from NKWD and NKWD will supply to BPWD a minimum volume or flow rate of water of three hundred thousand (300,000) gallons per day, averaged on a monthly basis, at the Points of Delivery hereinafter specified. If desired by BPWD, NKWD will supply to BPWD a volume or flow rate of water up to six hundred thousand (600,000) gallons per day, averaged on a monthly basis, at the Points of Delivery. NKWD will not be obligated to provide water to BPWD in excess of six hundred thousand (600,000) gallons per day, averaged on a monthly basis, but, if desired by BPWD, NKWD will provide water to BPWD in excess of this volume or flow rate to the extent NKWD determines, in its sole discretion, that it has excess water available.

B. In the event that BPWD anticipates an increase in its need for water from NKWD which exceeds by twenty-five percent (25%) its then average monthly volume purchased from NKWD, BPWD shall notify NKWD of such anticipated increase in demand no later than fifteen (15) months before the period of time that such additional demand will commence. If NKWD determines, in its sole discretion, that it does not have excess water available, BPWD may purchase the excess water from another supplier of water on a temporary basis until NKWD does have excess water available, but NKWD will remain the provider to BPWD of at least three hundred thousand (300,000) gallons per day, averaged on a monthly basis.

C. NKWD will not be required, and will have no obligation, to supply to BPWD a volume or flow rate of water in excess of five hundred (500) gallons per minute, averaged on an hourly basis, through the existing Point of Delivery located near the intersection of U.S. Route 25 and Kentucky Route 14 and will not be required, and will have no obligation, to supply to BPWD a combined or total volume or flow rate of water through all Points of Delivery in excess of seven hundred and fifty (750) gallons per minute, averaged on an hourly basis, if and when BPWD constructs a second Point of Delivery on the 16 inch diameter water main located along Kentucky Route 17.

D. BPWD agrees that any and all water it supplies to customers located within the area in southern Kenton County depicted on attached Exhibit A, which is incorporated herein, (hereinafter "Special Area") will be purchased exclusively from NKWD.

E. BPWD agrees that any and all water it supplies to customers be areas in Grant and Pendleton Counties depicted on attached Exhibit B, which Electroperated herein, will either be produced by BPWD at its own treatment plant or purchased? The NKWD, except that BPWD, if acting in good faith, may purchase water from the CAN of William Stown to SECTION 9 (1)

the extent necessary and during the times necessary for BPWD to meet the demand for water within the area depicted as "B-1" on attached Exhibit B.

F. Subject to the requirements of this Article II, BPWD may serve other areas with water purchased from NKWD.

G. The water provided by NKWD to BPWD will be potable, treated water meeting all applicable quality and purity standards of all appropriate state and federal regulatory agencies. The water will be of the same quality as that furnished to NKWD's retail and other wholesale customers. In the event NKWD is unable to provide water that is potable, treated water meeting all applicable quality and purity standards of all state and federal regulatory agencies, BPWD's obligation to purchase a minimum volume or flow rate of water of three hundred thousand (300,000) gallons per day, averaged on a monthly basis, under Section II.A of this Agreement and its obligations under Sections II.D and II.E of this Agreement will be suspended during the period of time commencing when BPWD provides written notice to NKWD of NKWD's failure to provide such water quality and continuing until NKWD is able to again provide such water quality. BPWD may purchase water from other suppliers of water during any such suspension period.

H. BPWD agrees that it will not rechlorinate water supplied by NKWD without NKWD's written approval. In the event that NKWD is unable to provide the water quality described in Section II.G above, BPWD may provide written notice to NKWD of its intention to retreat or provide additional water treatment to the water supplied by NKWD as may be reasonably necessary and within industry standards to ensure the water achieves the water quality described in Section II.G and may commence such retreatment or additional water treatment upon providing such written notice to NKWD.

I Subject to the minimum volume or flow rate of water of three hundred thousand (300,000) gallons per day, averaged on a monthly basis, which BPWD is required to purchase from NKWD under Section II.A of this Agreement and the requirements of Sections II.D and II.E of this Agreement, BPWD may purchase water from other suppliers of water. In addition, BPWD's obligation to purchase from NKWD a minimum volume or flow rate of water of three hundred thousand (300,000) gallons per day, averaged on a monthly basis, will be automatically suspended during any period that NKWD is not able to provide this volume or flow rate of water to BPWD, and BPWD may purchase water from other suppliers of water during any such suspension period.

ARTICLE III POINTS OF DELIVERY, METERING EQUIPMENT AND PRESSURE

A. NKWD will provide water to BPWD at the discharge side of the master matter of U.S. Route 25 and Kentucky Route 04 in Kentucky (hereinafter a "Point of Delivery"). BPWD may, at its expense, constructed at a location along Kentucky Route 17 to create additional new master meter and meter pit at a location along Kentucky Route 17 to create additional point of delivery (hereinafter, and after construction and installation, also a SECTION 97 Delivery). Upon completion of construction and installation of the additional Point of Delivery, the

ownership of the master meter and meter pit at the additional Point of Delivery will automatically transfer to NKWD without any further action by BPWD or NKWD.

B. The master meter and the meter pit located at the existing Point of Delivery were installed by BPWD and subsequently transferred to NKWD. NKWD will own, operate and maintain the master meters and meter pits at each Point of Delivery. NKWD will make annual tests and inspections of the meters and the meter pits and perform such other tests and inspections as NKWD may deem necessary. No correction will be made in the billing to BPWD unless a test or inspection shows that the metering is more than two percent (2%) slow or fast. If any test or inspection shows that the metering is inaccurate by more than two percent (2%) slow or fast, correction will be made to the billing to BPWD for the period during which NKWD and BPWD agree that the inaccuracy existed. If no such agreement is reached, it will be assumed that the error developed progressively from the date of the last meter test or inspection and an appropriate adjustment to billings will be made.

C. NKWD will use its best reasonable efforts to provide a delivery pressure of thirty (30) psi at each Point of Delivery, subject to the force majeure events described in Article VII of this Agreement. In the event that NKWD is unable to provide a delivery pressure of thirty (30) psi at each Point of Delivery and such failure to provide a delivery pressure of thirty (30) psi continues for a period in excess of twenty-four (24) consecutive hours or seventy-two (72) cumulative hours in any calendar month, BPWD may provide written notice to NKWD of such failure and BPWD's obligation to purchase a minimum volume or flow rate of water of three hundred thousand (300,000) gallons per day, averaged on a monthly basis, will be suspended for the period of time commencing when BPWD provides such written notice to NKWD and continuing until NKWD is again able to provide a delivery pressure of thirty (30) psi at each Point of Delivery. BPWD may purchase water from other suppliers of water during any such suspension period.

ARTICLE IV WATER RATES AND SURCHARGES

A. BPWD shall pay NKWD's water rates and charges for wholesale customers as such rates and charges may be adjusted from time to time. NKWD may, from time to time, increase its water rates and charges, but no rate or charge increase will take effect unless and until it has been reviewed and approved by the PSC.

B. Within three (3) days of the Board of Commissioners of NKWD taking official action to approve the filing of an application with the PSC for an increase in NKWD's rates or charges, NKWD shall notify BPWD of such action. NKWD will provide BPWD with a copy of its application with the PSC for an increase in its rates or charges within three (3) days of its filing of the application with the PSC. C. BPWD shall pay NKWD for the actual quantity of water o

to NKWD for the minimum volume or flow rate it is required to purchase under this Agreement which is three hundred thousand (300,000) gallons per day, averaged on a monthly basis.

D. In addition to paying to NKWD the water rates and charges described in this Article IV, BPWD shall pay to NKWD each month an amount equal to ten (10) surcharges for NKWD's Subdistrict C expansion project until the expiration of the forty (40) year surcharge term for each Point of Delivery. The Parties understand and agree that the amount of each surcharge may vary over time but will not exceed thirty dollars (\$30.00) per month. The Parties further understand and agree that BPWD's obligation to pay surcharges may vary over time but will not exceed three hundred dollars (\$30.00) per month for each Point of Delivery. NKWD will recalculate the amount of each surcharge annually. In the event that the surcharge for NKWD's Subdistrict C expansion project is eliminated due to prepayment, BPWD's obligation to pay the surcharges described in this Section IV.D will be terminated.

ARTICLE V BILLING AND PAYMENT

Once each month, NKWD shall submit to BPWD an invoice for the amount due to NKWD under the terms of this Agreement for the prior month. All invoices shall be due and payable by BPWD to NKWD within twenty-one (21) days of receipt. A ten percent (10%) penalty shall be added to each invoice that is not paid within twenty-one (21) days of its receipt by BPWD.

ARTICLE VI AUDITS

NKWD shall cause its accounts to be audited by a firm of certified public accountants on an annual basis. A copy of the certified public accountants' audit report will be supplied to BPWD upon BPWD's written request. BPWD may cause the accuracy of any cost charged to it to be verified, at BPWD's own expense, by an examination of the accounts and records kept by NKWD, and NKWD shall make its accounts and records available to BPWD at reasonable times and locations for such purposes.

ARTICLE VII FORCE MAJEURE

Except for the payments required of BPWD under Articles IV and V above, either Party may suspend its performance under this Agreement if such Party's performance is prevented or delayed by a cause or causes beyond the reasonable control of such Party which could not have been avoided by the exercise of reasonable diligence by such Party. Such causes may include, but are not limited to, acts of God, acts of war, riot, fire, disturbances, breakage or damage to machinery or pipelines system. The Party asserting a right to suspend performance must, within a Frasonable time of acquiring knowledge of the cause requiring the suspension, notify the other Patty of water the cause of suspension, the performance suspended, and the anticipated for anticipated for the suspension. Performance shall be suspended only during the time that it is prevented or delayed

by the type of cause or causes described in this Article VII, and the Party whose performance is prevented or delayed shall endeavor to remove or overcome the cause or causes with all reasonable dispatch. Should NKWD suspend its performance in supplying water to BPWD, BPWD's obligations to pay for the water rates and surcharges specified in Article IV of this Agreement shall be suspended for the duration of NKWD's suspended performance. In the event of a system-wide shortage of water in NKWD's system, BPWD's supply of water under this Agreement will be reduced in the same ratio or proportion that the supply to NKWD's retail customers is reduced.

ARTICLE VIII RESPONSIBILITY AND INDEMNIFICATION

NKWD and BPWD shall be solely responsible for the construction, operation and maintenance of their respective water systems. NKWD and BPWD, to the extent permitted by law, expressly agree to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the other against all claims, demands, costs or expenses asserted by third parties and proximately caused by their negligence or willful misconduct in connection with the construction, operation or maintenance of their respective water systems.

ARTICLE IX RESALE OF WATER

BPWD may resell any water it purchases from NKWD to any third party, subject to the written approval of NKWD, which approval will not be unreasonably withheld.

ARTICLE X WATER LINE PROJECTS IN SOUTHERN KENTON COUNTY

A. Subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, NKWD grants to BPWD the right and authority to install water lines and appurtenances and to serve customers within the Special Area depicted on attached Exhibit A, which is incorporated herein.

The grant of right and authority contained in this Article X is not intended to be an extension of BPWD's territory pursuant to KRS 74.115.

B. Projects for the installation of water lines and appurtenances within the Special Area may be designated and developed by BPWD at its discretion, considering standard engineering practices, customer potential and other factors. All projects and the location, proposed rates, surcharges and design of all projects shall be subject to the approval of NKWD, which approval will not be unreasonably withheld. The construction of all water lines and appurtenances in the Special Area by BPWD shall meet the minimum construction standards and specifications adopted by NKWD and in effect at the time of construction OF KENTUCKY EFFECTIVE

C. NKWD and BPWD shall cooperate in obtaining all necessary approved is from all governmental entities possessing authority and jurisdiction to approventies and appurtenances in the Special Area by BPWD. SECTION 9 (1)

D. Nothing in this Agreement shall restrict or prohibit NKWD from extending its existing water lines and appurtenances to serve customers within the Special Area if BPWD has not already installed water lines and appurtenances and is serving such customers.

E. Nothing in this Agreement shall obligate or otherwise require BPWD to install or extend new water lines in the Special Area.

ARTICLE XI POSSIBLE PURCHASE OF EXISTING BPWD WATER LINES AND APPURTENANCES

A. BPWD currently owns and operates the water lines and appurtenances and related easements located in southern Kenton County as depicted on attached Exhibit C, which is incorporated herein (hereinafter the "Existing Lines")

B. Should BPWD at any time decide to sell all or any part of the Existing Lines NKWD may purchase all or any part of the Existing Lines upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreed upon by BPWD and NKWD. Upon any such purchase, all affected customers shall become customers of NKWD without any additional payment to BPWD for such customers.

C. In the event that, at any time during the term of this Agreement or any renewal or extension thereof, BPWD entertains an offer or proposal from or to any person or entity to acquire or purchase all or any part of the Existing Lines, then BPWD shall notify NKWD of the offer or proposal in writing, setting forth all of the terms of such offer or proposal, including the price.

D. The sale of all or any part of the Existing Lines from BPWD to NKWD or to any other person or entity shall be subject to the approval of all governmental agencies possessing authority and jurisdiction to approve or disapprove of such sale at the time of sale.

E. Should BPWD sell all or any part of the Existing Lines to a person or entity other than NKWD, BPWD shall, prior to the sale of all or any part of the Existing Lines, ensure that its contract for sale of the Existing Lines to such other person or entity requires such other person or entity to purchase all water supplied to and through the Existing Lines from NKWD until at least December 1, 2040.

ARTICLE XII

POSSIBLE PURCHASE OF NEW BPWD WATER LINES AND APPURTENANCES

A. All water lines and appurtenances and related easements evend and operated by ON BPWD in southern Kenton County, including those installed or acquired after the ffective Date, which are not expressly included among the Existing Lines, as described in Afficie MVabove and depicted on attached Exhibit C, shall be known hereinafter as the "New Lines. 2/1/2008

Should BPWD at any time decide to sell all or any part of the New Lines, NKWD shall have the right to purchase such New Lines from BPWD, provided that NKWD either: (1) also purchases the Existing Lines from BPWD on such terms and conditions negotiated with BPWD; or (2) is able to serve the New Lines from NKWD's system without purchasing the Existing Lines. The purchase price for all or any part of the New Lines shall be equal to the initial, actual costs paid by BPWD for the water lines and appurtenances and related easements and any subsequent, actual costs paid by BPWD for improvements to them, based on a one hundred (100) year depreciation of the actual and unreimbursed construction costs of BPWD. The actual costs will not include any contributions toward the cost of installation from grants, service installations paid for through new service/tap fees, Fiscal Court contributions or any other sources of contribution toward the costs of the New Lines. Upon any such purchase, all affected customers shall become customers of NKWD without any additional payment to BPWD for such customers.

C. In the event that, at any time during the term of this Agreement or any renewal or extension thereof, BPWD entertains an offer or proposal from or to any person or entity to acquire or purchase all or any part of the New Lines, then BPWD shall notify NKWD of the offer or proposal in writing, setting forth all of the terms of such offer or proposal, including the price.

D. The sale of all or any part of the New Lines from BPWD to NKWD or to any other person or entity shall be subject to the approval of all governmental agencies possessing authority and jurisdiction to approve or disapprove of such sale at the time of sale.

E. Should BPWD sell all or any part of the New Lines to a person or entity other than NKWD, BPWD shall, prior to the sale of all or any part of the New Lines, ensure that its contract for sale of the New Lines to such other person or entity requires such other person or entity to purchase all water supplied to and through the New Lines from NKWD until at least December 1, 2040.

ARTICLE XIII MERGER OR SALE OF BPWD ASSETS

A. In the event that, at any time during the term of this Agreement or any renewal or extension thereof, BPWD entertains an offer or proposal from or to any person or entity to merge with BPWD or to acquire all or substantially all of BPWD's assets, then BPWD shall notify NKWD in writing of the offer or proposal, setting forth all of the terms of such offer or proposal, including the price

Should BPWD sell all or substantially all of its assets to a person or entity other than NKWD, then BPWD and its purchaser shall be relieved of any and all terms and conditions of this Agreement except for those requirements set forth in this Section XIII.C.

ARTICLE XIV COOPERATION BETWEEN NKWD AND BPWD

NK.WD and BPWD agree to work together cooperatively to ensure that the purposes of this Agreement are achieved for the benefit of their respective customers and their respective water systems. Such cooperation may consist of the exchange of laboratory services, meter testing services, emergency field services, equipment purchase opportunities, billing assistance, treatment plant assistance, water quality compliance services and other services and assistance, all on such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreed upon by the Parties. The Parties will also work together to explore the possibility of other points of delivery in order to provide more efficient water service between NKWD and BPWD.

ARTICLE XV NOTICES

Any notices allowed or required under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be hand-delivered or mailed by certified mail, return receipt requested. Notice shall be effective upon receipt. KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY FEDERALLY ASSISTED DRINKING WATER REVOLVING LOAN FUND CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT LETTER (F07-09)

Dear Chairman Burgess:

The Kentucky Infrastructure Authority ("the Authority") commends your efforts to improve public service facilities in your community. On December 6, 2007, the Authority approved your loan for water distribution main construction, water main replacement, new pump station construction, and construction of a new master meter subject to the conditions stated below. The total cost of the project shall not exceed \$2,320,700 of which the Authority loan shall provide \$2,192,700 of the funding. Other anticipated funding for the project is reflected in Attachment A. The final loan amount will be equal to the Authority's portion of estimated project cost applied to the actual project cost. Attachment A incorporated herein by reference fully describes the project.

An Assistance Agreement will be executed between the Authority and the Bullock Pen Water District upon satisfactory performance of the conditions set forth in this letter. A period of twelve months from the date of this letter (December 7, 2008) will be allowed for you to meet the conditions set forth in this letter and enter into an Assistance Agreement. A one-time extension of up to six months may be granted for applicants that experience extenuating circumstances. Funds will be available for disbursement only after execution of the Assistance Agreement.

The Assistance Agreement and this commitment shall be subject, but not limited to, the following terms:

- 1. The Authority project loan shall not exceed \$2,192,700.
- 2. The loan shall bear interest at the rate of 3.00% per annum commencing with the first draw of funds.
- 3. The loan shall be repaid over a period not to exceed 20 years from the date the loan is closed.
- 4. Interest shall be payable on the amount of actual funds received. The first payment shall be due on June 1 or December 1 immediately succeeding the date of the initial draw of funds, provided that if such June 1 or December 1 shall be less than three months since the date of the initial draw of funds, then the first interest payment date shall be the June 1 or December 1 which is at least six months from the date of the initial draw of funds. Interest payments will be due each six months thereafter until the loan is repaid.
- 5. Full principal payments will commence on the appropriate June 1 or December 1 within twelve months from initiation of operation. Full payments will be due each six months thereafter until the loan is repaid.
- 6. A loan servicing fee of 0.25% of the annual outstanding loan balance shall be payable to the Authority as a part of each interest payment.
- 7. Loan funds will be disbursed after execution of the Assistance Agreement as project costs are incurred.
- 8. The Authority loan funds must be expended within six months of the official date of initiation of operation.
- 9. Fund "F" loan funds are considered to be federal funds. OMB Circular A-133, "Audits of States, Local Governments and Non-Profit Organizations, requires that all recipients and sub-recipients expending \$500,000 or more in a year in federal awards must have a single or program-specific audit conducted for that year in accordance with the Circular. If the federal amount expended plus all other federal funds expended exceeds the threshold, you are required to arrange for an A-133 audit to be performed by an independent, licensed CPA, or in special cases, the Auditor of Public Accounts of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The Authority requires an annual audit to be preformed for the life of the loan.

The following is a list of the standard conditions to be satisfied prior to execution of the Assistance Agreement or incorporated in the Assistance Agreement. Any required documentation must be submitted to the party designated.

- 1. The Authority to Award (bid) package must be submitted to the Division of Water (DOW) for approval within 14 days of bid opening. DOW must perform the MBE/WBE reviews, conduct a pre-construction and project management conference and approve executed contract documents.
- 2. The Assistance Agreement must be executed within six (6) months from bid opening.
- 3. The Borrower must agree to expend all Authority loan funds within six months of the date of initiation of operation.
- 4. Documentation of final funding commitments from all parties other than the Authority as reflected in the credit analysis shall be provided prior to preparation of the Assistance Agreement and disbursement of the Ioan monies. Rejections of any anticipated project funding shall be immediately reported and may cause this Ioan to be subject to further consideration.
- 5. The loan must undergo review by the Capital Projects and Bond Oversight Committee of the Kentucky Legislature prior to the state's execution of the Assistance Agreement. The committee meets monthly on the third Tuesday. At this time we know of no further submission required for their review; however, they may request information as needed.
- 6. Any required adjustment in utility service rates shall be adopted by ordinance, municipal order or resolution by the appropriate governing body of the Borrower. Public hearings as required by law shall be held prior to the adoption of the service rate ordinance, order, or resolution. Any required approvals by the Kentucky Public Service Commission shall be obtained.
- 7. All easements or purchases of land shall be completed prior to commencement of construction. Certification of all land or easement acquisitions shall be provided to the Division of Water.
- 8. The Borrower must complete and return to the Authority the attached "Authorization For Electronic Deposit of Vendor Payment" Form.
- 9. The environmental assessment shall be approved by the Division of Water, for all construction projects receiving DWSRF funds, prior to bidding the project.

- 10. Technical plans and specifications and a complete DWSRF specifications checklist shall be approved by the Division of Water prior to bidding the project.
- 11. A clear site certificate shall be obtained and DOW representatives shall be notified for attendance of the pre-construction conference.
- 12. Project changes or additions shall require a complete environmental and change order review before they can be included in the DWSRF loan project.

Any special conditions listed below and/or stated in Attachment A must be resolved.

- 1. The Bullock Pen Water District must enact a water rate increase of 13% prior to July 1, 2008 to go in effect no later than January 1, 2009.
- 2. The Bullock Pen Water District must enact a water rate increase of 5% prior to July 1, 2008 to go in effect no later than January 1, 2010.

Please inform the Authority of any changes in your financing plan as soon as possible. We wish you every success for this project, which will benefit both your community and the Commonwealth as a whole.

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General Description of Project

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Bullock Pen Water District serves approximately 5,500 customers in Grant, Boone, Kenton, Pendleton and Gallatin counties. Potable water that supplies the district comes from the Bullock Pen Water Treatment Plant, City of Walton, City of Williamstown and Northern Kentucky Water District.

The proposed project will construct a pump station near the existing master meter for Northern Kentucky Water District (NKWD) in the area of the Highway 14 and 25 intersection. The current master meter gravity feeds the Crittenden elevated water storage tank. The water is then pumped to three tanks within the water service area. Due to the gravity feed the flow received from Northern Kentucky Water District is restricted. With the new pump station water will be pumped to the three tanks (Sherman, Dry Ridge and Mt. Zion) directly.

Potable water that supplies the district comes from the Bullock Pen Water Treatment Plant, City of Walton, City of Williamstown and Northern Kentucky Water District.

> The proposed project will consist of 10.55 miles of water line extension to serve a potential 183 new customers in Kenton County. The project will consist of new water line extension along Bagby Road (2046), Parkers Grove Road, Carlisle Road, Peoples Cemetery Road, Courtney Road, Stephenson Road, Lunsford Road and Paxton Road. The potential customers currently use cisterns and bottle water for their water needs. The Bullock Pen Water District has a master meter from North Kentucky Water Service District at the intersection of Highway 25 and Highway 14 which will provide water for all these lines except for Courtney Road.

Preliminary hydraulics have been done for the potential water line extension which shows that the areas can be served by the existing water lines, water storage tanks and master meters.

No funding has been obtained yet for this project but plans are for a KIA grant, contribution from Kenton County and/or a surcharge loan.
