RESPONSE OF CAK TO DATA REQUESTS SERVED ON IT BY COMMISSION STAFF

Comes now Community Action Kentucky, Inc. (CAK), 101 Burch Court, Frankfort, KY 40601, by counsel, and for its response to the Data Requests served upon it by the Commission staff, states as follows:

Data Request No. 1

Page 2 of the Testimony of Thomas "Kip" Bowmar ("Bowmar Testimony") refers to the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program ("LIHEAP") funds available and the households helped in Kentucky for the 2005-2006, 2006-2007, and 2007-2008 heating seasons, noting that the LIHEAP funding for the 2007-2008 heating season was much less than the two prior heating seasons.

- a. Provide the amount of LIHEAP funds expected to be available to Kentucky for the 2008-2009 heating season.
- b. Provide CAK's estimate of the number of households in Kentucky that will receive LIHEAP assistance in the 2008-2009 heating season.

Page 6 of the Bowmar Testimony indicates that the current 10 cents per meter Home

Energy Assistance ("HEA") charge generates around \$1.3 million annually for Louisville Gas

and Electric Company ("LG&E") and Kentucky Utilities Company ("KU") on a combined basis

and helps approximately 2,500 households. Mr. Bowmar states that increasing the HEA charge

to 25 cents per meter would generate \$3.2 million annually and would help over 6,000 LG&E

and KU households.

Provide a breakdown of the annual HEA funds of \$1.3 million which shows the a.

amounts collected from LG&E customers and KU customers.

b. Provide an estimate of the average KU bill for the 2007-2008 heating season for a

household eligible for the HEA program.

Explain how CAK determined that 6,000 is the appropriate number of customers c.

to serve under its proposal to increase the HEA meter charge.

d. Mr. Bowmar state that the HEA program has been shown to reduce arrearages and

shutoffs, thereby reducing the burden on ratepayers and shareholders. Provide

any studies, papers, articles, etc. that demonstrate that the HEA program produces

these results.

Approximately \$750,000 for LG&E and approximately \$550,000 for KU a.

- b. Unknown
- c. 6,000 is the number that increasing the surcharge from 10 cents to 25 cents allows the program to serve under the current program design. The unmet need is far greater as nearly 17% of all Kentuckians are below the poverty line, which equates to nearly 680,000 Kentuckians or approximately 340,000 households.

 Between KU and LG&E there are approximately 125,000 customer households that are at or below the federal poverty guidelines. Allowing the program to serve 6,000 households is positive step in the right direction.
- d. The Commission ordered that an evaluation be performed on the KU and LG&E Home Energy Assistance Programs. Those evaluations were performed by RLW Analytics in 2007 and I believe were submitted to the PSC. If you do not have a copy as part of the record, please let me know and we will contact the Companies to get copies for you.
