of the fair's pageants.

"The pageants are getting so big," Carmack said. "You like for it to be right for the people to enjoy it."

The fair plays a big role in the lives of many who live in southern Campbell County and is often called the "world's fair" by residents.

It is the oldest fair in Kentucky held on the original site, Carmack said. Hundreds of horses will be shown at the fair, which will run from Wednesday through Monday. People will come from all over Kentucky and from Illinois, Georgia, Tennessee and West Virginia to compete in the horse shows.

The 265 stables on the fairgrounds fill quickly, leaving about 30 people on a waiting list, Carmack said.

Residents volunteer many

hours working on the fairgrounds and preparing for the festival. One man, Junior McCormick, began raising chickens and roosters on the fairgrounds in May for the fair's chicken rodeo, Carmack said.

"Chickens are hard to come by," Carmack said. "Not many farmers raise chickens anymore."

Pete Gosney spends most of August every year working

on the fairgrounds. Gosney, 73, of Alexandria, fixes anything that needs repair on the fairgrounds throughout the vear.

Gosney cherishes the fair, something he's attended since he was a boy.

"I was born and raised in Alexandria," Gosney said. "When I was young, school started the day after Labor Day. This was the big blowout before school."

The rate contained in this notice is the rate proposed by Duke Energy Kentucky. However, the Public Service Commission may order a rate to be charged that differs from this proposed rate. Such action may result in a rate for consumers other than the rate in this notice. The year 1 unadjusted residential electric Rider SAW rate represents a 12% increase over the current adjusted Rider DSMR billing factor of \$0.001596/kWh. When Rider SAW is adjusted to net out the effect of the adjusted Rider DSMR, the result will be a net 0.2% increase in total residential electric rates. The year 1 unadjusted non-residential Rider SAW billing factor represents an 8% increase over the current adjusted Rider DSMR rate of \$0.000844/kWh. When Rider SAW is adjusted to net out the effect of the adjusted Rider DSMR rate of \$0.000844/kWh. When Rider SAW is adjusted to net out the effect of the adjusted Rider DSMR, the result is a modest 0.6% decrease in total residential gas rates.

Any corporation, association, body politic or person may by motion within thirty (30) days after publication or mailing of notice of the proposed rate changes request leave to intervene.
