Kentucky Rural Water Association's 32nd Annual Technical Conference and Exhibition – Waves of Change August 29 - August 31, 2011 Hyatt Regency and Lexington Convention Center - Lexington, Kentucky

Learning Objective: This 3-day Annual Conference will be directed toward the operators, managers, office personnel, and decisionmakers of water and wastewater utilities in Kentucky. The expertise of peers, technical assistance providers, industry professionals, and government agencies will offer some buoyancy for our attendees as they navigate through the waves of change affecting our industry.

Day One - Monday, August 29, 2011

Updates in the Clean Water and Drinking Water Programs DW/WW Session #1 (1 hr)8:30-9:30 A.M. Julie Roney, Division of Water Regulations governing drinking water and wastewater can change frequently. While utilities have to respond to theses changes, so do

primacy agencies. This session will provide updates and changes being dealt with by the Clean Water and Drinking Water Programs within the Kentucky Division of Water and how those may affect utilities.

Water and Wastewater Laboratory Certification DW/WW (1 hr)Session #2 Patrick Garrity, Division of Water 9:40-10:40 A.M.

Many water and wastewater utilities operate laboratories that are at least capable of performing basic analyses. Changes in the laboratory certification requirements will potentially be impacting all of these utilities. This session will cover what the Division of Water is looking for in a certified laboratory such as QA/QC, method detection limit studies, and initial demonstration of capacity studies.

Been There, Done That, Now What? Reviewing the Challenges Faced by a Rapidly Growing Utility Session #3 10:50-11:50 A.M. Phillip Trzop, Boone County Water District DW/WW (1 hr)The growth of a utility can be a difficult process for managers and operators to handle and control. Rapid changes in size can bring difficulties in managing the infrastructure, resources, and finances and day-to-day operation of a utility. This session will give information from a general manager's first-hand experience with the rapid growth of his utility. This session will also cover new technologies, such as satellite read meters, and other techniques used by operators and employees to handle the rapid changes encountered at all levels within the utility.

1:00-2:00 P.M. Historically, electricity is one of the largest expenses encountered by a utility. Recent times have shown that electrical rates have substantially increased more rapidly than other operating expenses. This session covers the successful efforts by one utility to save electricity, increase operational efficiency, and reduce costs. This session will demonstrate how this utility worked to determined where electricity was being used efficiently, where it was not, the measures used save electricity, and the necessity of documentation to reflect these achievements.

Session #5 Endocrine Disruptors and Pharmaceuticals & Personal Care Products (PPCPs) – Part 1 2:10-4:20 P.M. Steve Crosman, Division of Compliance Assistance DW/WW (1 hr) Endocrine disruptors and PPCPs are the subject of EPA research and will likely be the topic of future regulations. This session will focus on potential upcoming regulations dealing with endocrine disruptors and PPCPs. Topics also covered will include: what are endocrine disruptors and PPCPs, which endocrine disruptors and PPCP's are the EPA concerned with, who (water or wastewater) will be responsible for their removal, and what are the best available technologies (BAT) for drinking water and wastewater.

WW (1 hr) From Babysitting to Operating: The Story of a Wastewater Plant Session #9A Pat Beamon, Environmental Consultant, Process Tech, LLC 8:30-9:30 A.M.

Wastewater plants are facing increasingly tight compliance standards and those plants already struggling with compliance issues will be even farther behind the curve as new regulations are instituted. This session will highlight a wastewater plant that had been having serious compliance issues but was brought back into compliance. The problems found, methods used to solve those problems, and how other utilities can learn from this experience will be discussed.

WW Session #10A **Rural Wastewater Treatment** (1 hr) Wes Combs, Clarus Environmental and Grondal Potter, Mountain Water District 9:40-10:40 A.M. The vast majority of rural wastewater treatment is handled with septic systems or in some cases, straight piped to a stream. Septic systems have their limitations, especially when a number of them are located in close proximity. In the past the treatment of wastewater in rural areas has been technologically limited. This session will discuss new technologies that make rural wastewater treatment a possibility and will also cover the use of these new technologies by a rural Kentucky utility.

DW/WW Division of Compliance Assistance Update Session #11A 10:50-11:50 A.M. Kenva Stump and Gene Harrison, Division of Compliance Assistance This session will cover the latest changes and updates at the Division of Compliance Assistance. Topics covered will include changes made to the regulations concerning operator certification, problems DCA has encountered involving operator certification and training, changes made to their website, and the new ability to report hours online.

Variable-Frequency Drives (VFD) are used to control the rotational speed of an electric motor by controlling the frequency of the electrical power supplied to the motor. VFD "controllers" are solid state electronic power conversion devices. This type of equipment is used in water and wastewater systems to control the operational speed of pumps, motors, fans, aerators, and other electronic equipment. This session will explain the various types of VFDs and methods to control their operation.

Andy Lange, Kentucky Rural Water Association Kentucky's public water and wastewater utilities are among the most advanced in America, especially in regards to the percentage of our citizens who are served and the relatively low number of utilities after 30 years of natural consolidation. This session will look at the reasons behind our successful public service experience and look towards the future of our industry. We will examine the roles of the Division of Water, the Public Service Commission and the organizational advantages that have contributed to our success.

Every "board" should adopt a set of board policies that outlines the roles, rules and responsibilities for board members. The management of the utility should lead the effort amongst the board to initially adopt appropriate policies and periodically review and amend the policies to keep them up-to-date and relevant. The session focuses on the normal activities of boards of water districts, water associations, and municipal utility commissions. The session will include information on board officers' responsibilities and duties, the conduct of effective board meetings, legal issues and other topics essential for utility board members.

Session #17CAvoiding Pitfalls by Simplifying Personnel PoliciesDV10:50-11:50 A.M.Vernon Azevedo, Engineer, Lexington Urban County Government

Personnel policies are the utility manager's most important policies to help maintain effective day-to-day operations. Many personnel policies adopted by Kentucky's utilities are too large, too complicated, and tend to cause more problems than they solve. Learn from the experience of a utility manager who went through the process of revising outdated personnel policies into a manageable policy document that is easy for employees to understand and easier for management to implement.
