

Zoo's cheetah mom Willow dies

Cincinnati Zoo & Botanical Garden officials are mourning the loss of Willow, the cheetah who gave birth to five cubs on March 8.

Zoo vets had hoped that the five-year-old cheetah would recover after a rare C-section at Mast Farm, the zoo's regional cheetah breeding facility in Clermont County. However, she remained lethargic and lost her appetite over the weekend, according to zoo officials.

"Cheetahs are a fragile species, and this difficult birth proved to be too much for her to pull through," Thane Maynard, director of the Cincinnati Zoo & Botanical Garden, said in a news release. "Willow was able to contribute to the survival of her species by producing five cheetah cubs. Without the C-section, we likely would have lost both the mom and the cubs."

Mark Campbell, the zoo's director of animal health, said last week that the cubs' birth was only the third C-section he has been involved in, and the only one on a cheetah, during his 25 years at the Cincinnati Zoo.

It's not all bad news from the zoo: The premature cubs' condition has improved during the last few days, zoo officials said. The cubs — three boys and two girls — have been getting around-the-clock critical care in


The Tri-State Freethinkers group said it raised more than \$3,000 to erect several billboards titled "Genocide & Incest Park: Celebrating 2,000 years of myths." In a rendering, the billboard shows people drowning around an ark.

The campaign is meant to argue that "it's a genocide park that celebrates the destruction of humankind, minus whoever was on the ark," said Freethinkers spokesman Tony Arnold, including "repopulation through nefarious means."

The Ark Encounter, a 510-foot wooden ship as described in the Old Testament, is under construction in Grant County near Interstate 75. It will include a petting zoo, theater, cafes, gift shop and 4,000-space parking lot. The ark park is 45 miles south of the Creation Museum, which presents a literal interpretation of Genesis and argues the Earth is only 6,000 years old and that dinosaurs and humans co-existed.

Both are products of a group called Answers in Genesis. Last month, AIG President Ken Ham said the ark would feature animal replicas including dinosaurs.

On Friday, he said the campaign amounted to an attack on Christianity. "We appreciate the fact that they are paying for the billboard to now bring more publicity to the Ark Encounter," he said. "Millions will visit

the Ark Encounter."

The Freethinkers group — advocates for equal rights and the separation of church and state that includes 1,300 members in Kentucky, Indiana and Ohio — got the idea after seeing billboards about the ark park. The group raised more than \$3,000 in less than 24 hours, Arnold said. Those who donate \$500 can have their photo on the billboard as one of the people drowning around the ark, he said.

After finding a billboard provider "willing to take the heat," the group could erect the billboards soon. Arnold would not say which company was involved or exactly where the

signs would be placed.

Last year, Answers in Genesis filed a federal lawsuit after the Kentucky Tourism, Arts and Heritage Cabinet rejected the group's application for up to \$18 million in state tax incentives based on its "religious purpose and message." In January, a U.S. District Judge ruled the state could not exclude the ark attraction based on those reasons, and Kentucky Republican Gov. Matt Bevin declined to appeal.

Groups such as the Americans United for Separation of Church and State have objected to Answers in Genesis using religious preferences in hiring.

The group raised more than \$3,000 in less than 24 hours, Arnold said. Those who donate \$500 can have their photo on the billboard as one of the people drowning around the ark, he said.

After finding a billboard provider "willing to take the heat," the group could erect the billboards soon. Arnold would not say which company was involved or exactly where the

signs would be placed. Last year, Answers in Genesis filed a federal lawsuit after the Kentucky Tourism, Arts and Heritage Cabinet rejected the group's application for up to \$18 million in state tax incentives based on its "religious purpose and message." In January, a U.S. District Judge ruled the state could not exclude the ark attraction based on those reasons, and Kentucky Republican Gov. Matt Bevin declined to appeal.

Groups such as the Americans United for Separation of Church and State have objected to Answers in Genesis using religious preferences in hiring.
