I just offered a comment on a case related to this (2016-00142) as both are related to the Martin County Water District. Please put our water district into receivership! I have researched the statutes of what is defined as "abandoned" in terms of the water district. They have failed to abide by past PSC orders dating back to over a decade. They are unable to meet their currently financial obligations to pay vendors. They are unwilling to consider any actions that might enable them to continue -- namely an offer by Prestonsburg City Utilities to purchase the tank that supplies the federal prison. Granting this 50 percent rate increase will be a slap in the face of water customers who will be forced to bear the burden of past mismanagement when the district could have taken steps to sell a substantial amount of water to the prison and

shared in the bounty of having a new customers needing 250,000 gallons of water per day. Think of the money the district could have made simply by getting their act together. Unfortunately, that ship has already sailed. We have no one to blame but our own leaders. Putting it into receivership, from a water customer standpoint, is our only hope of ever getting reliable, safe drinking water. My name is Gary Ball, and yes, unfortunately, I am a customer of the Martin County Water District. If I lived a mile across the river in West Virginia, I would have Kermit water -- good water. For your information, during the recent water crisis, Kermit sold Martin County roughly 400,000 gallons of water and billed MCWD \$1,022 (a very good rate at a little over \$2 per 1,000 gallons). The bill was due yesterday. If not paid on time, a later charge of \$100 will be added. I know this because I ran across the Kermit mayor yesterday, thanked him for helping us out in a crisis and asked if the water district had paid its bill to Kermit. I was told they hadn't. He saw a story in our paper where MCWD owed Prestonsburg City Utilities over \$63,000. He was not optimistic about receiving payment, saying that during the crisis when John Mills (MCWD operations manager) called him to ask that they be hooked to Kermit again, he told Mills only if he gave him his word that they would be paid. He said Mills told him yes. A lot of people living in that area have kinfolk here. The mayor said they were willing to help -- and even went to the point of repairing a line break on their side of the river when it failed -- to service that section of Martin County. It's a very small water district capable of treating about 700,000 gallons per day. They don't have a water board. The city council oversees operations and it's ran in a very efficient manner. They've dealt with MCWD in the past and had trouble getting paid. The mayor told me that next billing cycle shows they will owe around \$2,000. He seemed almost apologetic to me, saying he hated what happened and he knew they were taking a chance selling water here. But, as he said, they are a small operation and have bills to pay.

A rate hike should not be permitted for this institution that has clearly mismanaged the funding it has received.

The PSC has repeatedly found that the MCWD has not maintained the system, has often had water loss rates around

60 percent over the past decade (four or more times higher than the state-directed 15 percent loss rate). The PSC should provide training to the MCWD's new board members and facilitate onsite training by the Kentucky Rural Water Association.

Residents should not be forced to pay more for bad service. I urge you to reject this rate increase, which is not in the best interests of the residents of Martin County.
