My name is Gary Ball, a customer of the Martin County Water District, and I want to comment on Case No. 2018-00017, the request for an emergency rate increase for the Martin County Water District. This is in reference to watching the Feb. 28 hearing and a question to Linda Sumpter, CPA for the water district.

References were made to collections of past due accounts receivable and a host of customers paying past due bills due to disconnection notices sent out by the water district. There was a question by the commission of how many public officials (I believe that was the term or county officials ... something of that nature) were on the list and could not be answered by Sumpter. Could the commission make a request for

a copy of that list -- not for public viewing but to determine if the reasons for nonpayment have to do with political clout and/or positions. They would cut mine off without hesitation. I think this would show whether an increase is really needed and justified.

A question I have -- and I saw this recently in the statutes -- is the question of unpaid bills that go back two years or more. I saw KRS 278.225 that states "All service supplied by a utility be billed within two years of service. No customer shall be liable for unbilled service after two year from the date of service unless the customer obtained the service through fraud, theft or deception."

I also heard reference to "bad debt" or debt the district deems to be simply being written off. I believe it would be important to see if anyone is currently receiving services who at one time had their debt written off. In the interest of transparency and just simply following the law, no one -- including political leaders -- should benefit by simply not paying their bill for two years, having that amount written off and go on to receive services. I agree that the folks who pay their monthly bill are subsidizing those who don't pay for whatever reason. It's one thing if a laid-off coal miner cannot pay and makes other arrangements according to terms of the Customer Bill of Rights and someone else with the political standing or clout not paying. I would appreciate your looking into this.
