Comes Joann Estates Utilities, Inc. ("Joann Estates") and the Paducah-McCracken

County Joint Sewer Agency ("JSA"), through the undersigned counsel, and for their response to

Commission Staff's Initial Request for Information, state as follows :

1. State whether notice of the proposed transfer of assets and subsequent rates was

provided to customers of Joann Estates.

Response: JSA has provided two notices to the Joann Estates' customers in

the Joann Estates and Wilmington Chiles subdivisions. Copies of those notices is attached

hereto as Exhibit "A".

Joann Estates has provided no separate notice.

2. Explain why Joann Estates' sewer facility serving the Timberland subdivision was not included in the proposed transfer.

Response: The facilities serving the Timberland subdivision are

approximately 3 miles from JSA's current facilities. The facilities serving the Joann Estates subdivision are approximately 1,000 feet from JSA's current facilities. The facilities serving the Wilmington Chiles subdivision are approximately 1/2 mile from JSA's current facilities. The cost of connecting to the facilities serving the Timberland subdivision would far exceed that to connect to the facilities serving the Joann Estates and Wilmington Chiles subdivisions.

3. Provide the effect upon the average bill for Joann Estates residential customers. Response: JSA estimates that the average bill for a Joann Estates customer will be reduced from the \$34.71 flat fee charged by Joann Estates to \$27.01 to be charged by JSA based upon average water usage for Joann Estates and Wilmington Chiles subdivisions for the months of July, August and September.

4. Refer to Exhibit A of the Application, Transfer Agreement, Item 2.3, Condition of Facilities and Operation; this section states among other things, that Joann Estates is in compliance, with the exception of those violations identified on Schedule 2.3 attached hereto. Response: No Schedule 2.3 was attached to the Transfer Agreement. Joann Estates has provided JSA notice of the violations attached hereto as Exhibit "B."

Response: Joann Estates charges a \$34.71 flat monthly fee that is not based

on water usage.

 Response: The current water provider is Paducah Water Works.

- 7. State whether the current water provider will continue to provide water for the customers of Joann Estates if the proposed transaction is approved.

Response: Paducah Water Works will continue to be the water provider for

Joann Estates and Wilmington Chiles.

8. Provide the average monthly water usage of customers of Joann Estates.

Response: In July 2018 the average monthly water usage for Joann Estates

and Wilmington Chiles residents was 5,800 gallons. In August 2018 it was 4,200 gallons. In September it was 3,900 gallons.

9. Provide the calculation for the average monthly bill if the proposed transaction is approved, using the average water usage of customers of Joann Estates and the proposed new rate of \$5.83 per 1,000 gallons.

Response: JSA computed the average water usage of 4,633 gallons for Joann Estates and Wilmington Chiles by averaging the average water usages for July, August and September 2018. JSA included all water bills in its calculation including unusually high bills and no usage bills. JSA's minimum residential billing amount is \$17.49, which includes up to 3,000 gallons. An additional \$5.83 is added for the next 1,000 gallons. The next 633 gallons are billed at \$3.69 or .00583 per gallon based on JSA's residential rate of \$5.83 per 1,000 gallons.



Public Service Commission staff performed a periodic inspection of the JoAnn Estates Utilities, Inc. waste water system on August 27 and 31, 2018, reviewing utility operations and management practices pursuant to Commission regulations. The report of this inspection is enclosed with this letter.

Based on the inspector's observations, the following deficiencies were identified:

- 1. The utility is not conducting daily inspections on all mechanical equipment at each treatment facility as required by 807 KAR 5:071, Section 7(4).
- 2. At JoAnn estates wastewater treatment facility, the entrance gate to the plants has a gap between the fence post and gate large enough for animals and unauthorized persons to enter. This is contrary to 807 KAR 5:071, Section 7(1).
- 3. At JoAnn estates wastewater treatment facility, the gate behind the chlorine contact basin that allows utility personnel access to the effluent discharge was not locked or secured to keep unauthorized persons from entering the facility. This is contrary to 807 KAR 5:071, Section 7(1).
- 4. At Wilmington-Chiles, plant #2 has a leak at the effluent pipe that leads to one of the lagoons. This leak is before any type of disinfecting takes place.

- 5. At the Timberland wastewater treatment facility, there's untreated wastewater bypassing the chlorine contact chamber and entering the receiving stream. This is contrary to 807 KAR 5:071, Section 7(1).
- 6. The grating near the bar screen at the Timberland wastewater facility has deteriorated and appears to be unsafe to walk on. This is contrary to 807 KAR 5:071. Section 7(1).
- 7. The utility doesn't have a backup blower/motor unit nor do they have an immediate access to one for each of the three wastewater treatment facilities in case of emergencies as per 807 KAR 5:071, Section 7(1).
- 8. The utility is out of compliance with the Division of Water's regulations. This is contrary to 807 KAR 5:071, Section 5(1).

For the eight deficiencies listed above, an explanation of why these deficiencies occurred and how these deficiencies will be remedied and prevented in the future needs to be provided. A letter addressing the organization's actions regarding the deficiencies needs to be submitted by November 13, 2018.

The following deficiency was noted on the previous inspection on December 3, 2015. This deficiency from the previous inspection has not been addressed. This deficiency will need to be addressed within this inspection response.

1. The utility is not conducting annual inspections of their collecting sewers and manholes as required by 807 KAR 5:071, Section 7(4). (Repeat)

Several other issues were observed during this inspection and they are mentioned on pages 15 and 16 under observations/areas of concern. Unaddressed maintenance issues can lead to deficiencies in future inspections.

- 4. Effluent plant has a small leak at Wilmington Chiles, will reseal our replace pipe.
- 5. Do to the age of Timberland plant the blocks of the chlorine contact chamber have deteriorated to a point that it needs to be replaced we have scheduled a contractor to replace the chamber in November of 2018.
- 6. Bar screen and walkway at Timberland plant, has deteriorated do to age and will be replaced.
- The utility does have access to blower/motor unit from Warden electric if need in a timely

General Comments: On October 26, 2017, a routine Waste Water inspection was conducted at Wilmington Chiles WWTP located at Craven Dr. West Paducah, KY. This facility is operating under permit # KY0078336. During this inspection the facility grounds were walked and I spoke with the operator Todd Teas, via telephone. The Plant was operating however the lift station that feeds the plant was not. There was a large amount of grease on the top of the water and water was leaking out of the side of the lift station. No pumps were running. I contacted Mr. Teas, he came out that afternoon pulled the pump and removed a mop head that had caused the pump to fail. I returned on October 27, and the lift station was back down to normal levels and operating properly. This effluent was also observed it appeared turbid, there is aeration in the chlorine contact Chamber and de chlorination area. The lagoons were observed and are both covered in duckweed. This facility is under an Agreed Order (Case No. DOW 130133). Please note that stipulated penalties, as explained in the Agreed Order, may be considered for violations of the KPDES permit or the Agreed Order. Comment: The facility is not being properly operated and maintained as required. The Chlorine contact chamber walls are deteriorating. The lift station was over flowing and the pump was clogged. Mr. Teas came out and fixed the pump that evening and the next day i returned the lift station was operating properly. It appears the plant is also leaking from the clarifier.



General Comments: On January 23, 2018, a Compliance Evaluation inspection was conducted at Timberland WWTP, located in West Paducah, KY. This inspection was conducted to observe compliance with KPDES Permit No. KY0083755. During this inspection the plant was in operation. The Aeration basin had good color and mixing, the return sludge and clarifier were operating properly and looked well maintained. The discharge to the lagoon appeared clear and free of solids. The levee around the lagoon is need of repair as there are holes from animals as well as low spot by the contact chamber. The levee is barely over the water line potential overflow and bypass of disinfection at this spot. Effluent was observed, photos were taken on site. There is significant beaver activity around the plant and lagoon, several large trees have fallen onto the plant or lagoon. Also the creek where the discharge enters has been dammed up. Mr. Teas is aware of the issue and working on possible solutions. Mr. Teas, the certified operator, presented his license and field certification to perform field analysis. Also chain of custody forms for sampling were observed. Field meter calibration logs and sampling logs were always reviewed. AGREED ORDER

WHEREAS, the parties to this Agreed Order, the Energy and Environment Cabinet (hereinafter "Cabinet") and Joann Estates Utilities, Inc (hereinafter "Joann") state:

STATEMENTS OF FACT

1. The Cabinet is charged with the statutory duty of enforcing KRS Chapter 224 and the regulations promulgated pursuant thereto.

2. Joann owns and operates the Joann Estates Subdivision wastewater treatment plant (hereinafter "facility"), located on Connie Sue Drive in Paducah, Kentucky.

3. Joann holds Kentucky Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (hereinafter "KPDES") permit number KY0045250 for wastewater discharges, issued by the Cabinet's Division of Water, for the facility described in paragraph 2.

4. On or about December 10, 2010, an authorized representative of the Cabinet conducted an inspection of the facility described in paragraph 2, and identified violations of KRS Chapter 224 and the regulations promulgated pursuant thereto. On January 6, 2011, the Cabinet issued Joann a Notice of Violation for the following violations:

- a) 401 KAR 10:031, Section 2: Degradation to the waters of the Commonwealth.
 Excessive solids were discharging at the time of this inspection.
- b) 401 KAR 5:065: Failure to comply with the effluent limitations contained in KPDES Permit Number KY0045250. Joann's Discharge Monitoring Reports (hereinafter "DMR's") were reviewed by the Cabinet's Division of Water Paducah Regional Office. Nitrogen/Ammonia exceedances were reported.
- c) KRS 224.70-110: Contribution to the pollution of the waters of the Commonwealth.

5. On or about November 21, 2012, an authorized representative of the Cabinet conducted an inspection of the facility described in paragraph 2, and identified violations of KRS Chapter 224 and the regulations promulgated pursuant thereto. On December 27, 2012, the Cabinet issued Joann a Notice of Violation for the following violations:

- a) 401 KAR 5:065, Section 2(1): Failure to properly operate and maintain the facility. The mixed liquor was dark and foamy, indicating an old sludge requiring wasting. At the time of this inspection, an accumulation of old rags stuck in the aeration basin was removed, which indicated a lack of regular maintenance.
- b) 401 KAR 5:005, Section 12: Failure to properly operate and maintain the facility. The effluent flow meter/recorder was inoperable at the time of this inspection.
- c) 401 KAR 5:065, Section 2(1): Failure to comply with the effluent limitations contained in KPDES Permit Number KY0045250. Joann's DMR's were reviewed by the Cabinet's Division of Water Paducah Regional Office.

Nitrogen/Ammonia, Phosphorus, Biochemical Oxygen Demand, and Total Suspended Solids exceedances were reported.

d) 401 KAR 5:065, Section 2(1): Failure to collect samples in accordance with the monitoring requirements outlined in KPDES Permit Number KY0045250.

6. On or about March 15, 2013, an authorized representative of the Cabinet conducted an inspection of the facility described in paragraph 2, and identified a violation of KRS Chapter 224 and the regulations promulgated pursuant thereto. On May 2, 2013, the Cabinet issued Joann a Notice of Violation for the following violation:

 a) 401 KAR 5:065, Section 2(1): Failure to properly operate and maintain the facility. Excessive solids were observed discharging at the time of this inspection.

7. Representatives of Joann participated in a telephonic conference with the Cabinet's Division of Enforcement (hereinafter "DENF") in Frankfort, Kentucky on August 14, 2013. Representatives of Joann admitted to the violations listed above, and agreed to the entry of this Agreed Order to resolve the violations.

NOW THEREFORE, in the interest of settling all civil claims and controversies involving the violations described above, the parties hereby consent to the entry of this Agreed Order and agree as follows:

REMEDIAL MEASURES

8. Joann shall perform the following remedial measures by the dates specified herein:

a) Within thirty (30) days of execution of this Agreed Order, submit to DENF a written Corrective Action Plan (CAP), detailing the steps Joann has taken, and

will continue to take, in order to return the facility to compliance and to maintain compliance.

- b) Within thirty (30) days of execution of this Agreed Order, submit to DENF a Best Management Practices (BMP) plan.
- c) Within ninety (90) days of execution of this Agreed Order, return to full compliance with all of the terms and conditions of KPDES Permit Number KY0045250.
- d) By July 1, 2015, connect the Joann Estates Subdivision wastewater treatment plant to the Paducah-McCracken County Joint Sewer Agency sewer system. At such time, the Joann Estates Subdivision wastewater treatment plant shall be properly closed and/or decommissioned.
- e) All submittals required by the terms of the Agreed Order shall be sent to:

Division of Enforcement Attention: Director 300 Fair Oaks Lane Frankfort, KY 40601

CIVIL/STIPULATED PENALTIES

9. Joann shall pay the Cabinet a civil penalty in the amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for the violations described in paragraph 4 through 6 above. The penalty shall be paid within thirty (30) days of execution of this Agreed Order.

10. Joann shall pay the Cabinet a stipulated penalty in the amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) within thirty (30) days of receipt of written notice from the Cabinet for each failure to comply with any remedial measures in paragraph 8 above. This penalty is in addition to, and not in lieu of, any other penalty that could be assessed. The stipulated penalty will be waived upon termination of this Agreed Order, if Joann has complied with the requirements of

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paragraph 8.

11. If Joann believes the request for payment of the stipulated penalty is erroneous or contrary to law, Joann may request a hearing in accordance with KRS 224.10-420(2). The request for hearing does not excuse timely payment of the penalty. If an order is entered pursuant to KRS 22.10-440 that excuses payment, the Cabinet will refund the payment. Failure to make timely payment shall constitute an additional violation.

12. Payments of the civil and stipulated penalties shall be by cashier's check, certified check, or money order, made payable to "Kentucky State Treasurer" and sent to the attention of the Director, Division of Enforcement, Department for Environmental Protection, 300 Fair Oaks Lane, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601; note DOW 130131 on the instrument of payment.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

13. This Agreed Order addresses only the violations specifically mentioned above. Other than those matters resolved by entry of this Agreed Order nothing contained herein shall be construed to waive or to limit any remedy or cause of action by the Cabinet based on statutes or regulations under its jurisdiction and Joann reserves its defenses thereto. The Cabinet expressly reserves its right at any time to issue administrative orders and to take any other action it deems necessary that is not inconsistent with this Agreed Order, including the right to order all necessary remedial measures, assess penalties for violations, or recover all response costs incurred, and Joann reserves its defenses thereto.

14. This Agreed Order shall not prevent the Cabinet from issuing, reissuing, renewing, modifying, revoking, suspending, denying, terminating, or reopening any permit to Joann. Joann reserves its defenses thereto, except that Joann shall not use this Agreed Order as a defense.

15. Joann waives its right to any hearing on the matters admitted herein. However, failure by Joann to comply strictly with any or all of the terms of this Agreed Order shall be grounds for the Cabinet to seek enforcement of this Agreed Order in Franklin Circuit Court and to pursue any other appropriate administrative or judicial action under KRS Chapter 224, and the regulations promulgated pursuant thereto.

16. The Agreed Order may not be amended except by a written order of the Cabinet's Secretary or his designee. Joann may request an amendment by writing the Director of the Division of Enforcement at 300 Fair Oaks Lane, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601 and stating the reasons for the request. If granted, the amended Agreed Order shall not affect any provision of this Agreed Order unless expressly provided in the amended Agreed Order.

17. The Cabinet does not, by its consent to the entry of this Agreed Order, warrant or aver in any manner that Joann's complete compliance with this Agreed Order will result in compliance with the provisions of KRS Chapter 224, and the regulations promulgated pursuant thereto. Notwithstanding the Cabinet's review and approval of any plans formulated pursuant to this Agreed Order, Joann shall remain solely responsible for compliance with the terms of KRS Chapter 224, and the regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, this Agreed Order and any permit and compliance schedule requirements.

18. Joann shall give notice of this Agreed Order to any purchaser, lessee or successor in interest prior to the transfer of ownership and/or operation of any part of its now-existing facility occurring prior to termination of this Agreed Order, shall notify the Cabinet that such notice has been given, and shall follow all statutory and regulatory requirements for a transfer. Whether or not a transfer takes place, Joann shall remain fully responsible for payment of all civil penalties and response costs and for performance of all remedial measures identified in this

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Agreed Order.

19. The Cabinet agrees to allow the performance of the above-listed remedial measures and payment of civil penalties by Joann to satisfy Joann's obligations to the Cabinet generated by the violations described above.

20. The Cabinet and Joann agree that the remedial measures agreed to herein are facility-specific and designed to comply with the statutes and regulations cited herein. This Agreed Order applies specifically and exclusively to the unique facility referenced herein and is inapplicable to any other facility.

21. Compliance with this Agreed Order is not conditional on the receipt of any federal, state, or local funds.

22. This Agreed Order shall be of no force and effect unless and until it is entered by the Secretary or his designee as evidenced by his signature thereon. If this Agreed Order contains any date by which Joann is to take any action or cease any activity, and the Secretary enters the Agreed Order after that date, then Joann is nonetheless obligated to have taken the action or ceased the activity by the date contained in this Agreed Order.

TERMINATION

23. This Agreed Order shall terminate upon Joann's completion of all requirements described in this Agreed Order. Joann may submit a written request for termination to the Cabinet when it believes all requirements have been performed. The Cabinet reserves its right to enforce this Agreed Order, and Joann reserves its right to file a petition for hearing pursuant to KRS 224.10-420(2) contesting the Cabinet's determination.
