Dear Sir:

Please be advised that I strongly oppose the letter dated May 2, 1996, that we received from Mr. Sam G. McNamara, Attorney for Kentucky CGSA, Inc., in which he advised my wife and I of the intent to erect a 190 foot tall cellular radio tower at 5612 Old Heady Road, Louisville, Kentucky, 40299.

I object to the placement of the tower in the residential area where we reside. It will not only be unsightly structure, but it could also compromise the property value. We live in the country for the quiet beauty which this tower will sharply curtail.

As an alternative thought, consider that if the tower must be placed in the area, why does it have to be placed there? Why not consider placement at Fisherman's Park, a 65 acre Jefferson County Park which is located in the immediate area. It seems that this alternative site would not only enhance the wheels of progress, but it would also protect the value of the taxpayer's property. The 65 acres provides a lot of ground in which to "hide" the unsightliness of the tower.

I am responding later than requested as my wife and I have been travelling which precluded us from responding sooner. Your reconsideration of this proposed location is greatly appreciated.
