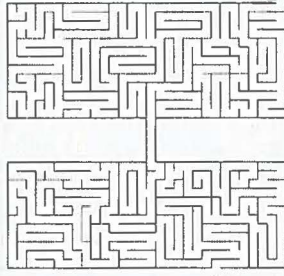

Independent Auditor's Report

Report on the Financial Statement
We have audited the accompanying statement of receipts, disbursements, and excess fees - regulatory basis of the County Clerk of Gallatin County, Kentucky, for the year ended December 31, 2014, and the related notes to the financial statement.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statement
Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of this financial statement in accordance with accounting practices prescribed or permitted by the laws of Kentucky to demonstrate compliance with the Commonwealth of Kentucky's regulatory basis of accounting as described in Note 1. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of a financial statement that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility
Our responsibility is to express an opinion on this financial statement based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and the Audit Guide for County Fiscal Officials issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement is free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statement, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statement in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statement. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Basis for Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles
As described in Note 1 of the financial statement, the financial statement is prepared by the County Clerk on the basis of the accounting practices prescribed or permitted by the laws of Kentucky to demonstrate compliance with the Commonwealth of Kentucky's regulatory basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

The effects on the financial statement of the variances between the regulatory basis of accounting described in Note 1 and accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, although not reasonably determinable, are presumed to be material. **Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles**
In our opinion, because of the significance of the matter discussed in the Basis for Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles paragraph, the financial statement referred to above does not present fairly, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of each fund of the County Clerk, as of December 31, 2014, or changes in financial position or cash flows thereof for the year then ended.

Opinion on Regulatory Basis of Accounting
In our opinion, the financial statement referred to above presents fairly, in all material respects, the receipts, disbursements, and excess fees of the County Clerk for the year ended December 31, 2014, in accordance with the basis of accounting practices prescribed or permitted by the Commonwealth of Kentucky as described in Note 1.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards
In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated October 1, 2015 on our consideration of the Gallatin County Clerk's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Gallatin County Clerk's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards in considering the entity's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.




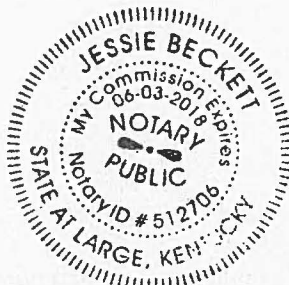

Combine two cups of shredded cheese your choice and then add 3 tablespoons parmesan cheese, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon oregano, 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder, 1/4 teaspoon black pepper. Sprinkle on top. Cut slightly with pizza cutter. Bake 15-20 minutes in preheated 450 degree oven or until slightly golden.

that killed a local runner.

Cincinnati Police said in a news release that Thomas Stidhum, 24, drove up onto the sidewalk and hit 57-year-old Cathy Chatfield during a race the morning of Dec. 6 on Dorchester Avenue. The impact killed her almost instantly, authorities said.

Stidhum is facing one charge each of aggravated vehicular manslaughter, vehicular homicide, tampering with evidence and failure to stop after a crash, according to documents filed in Hamilton County Court of Common Pleas.

He has not been arrested.

Previously, police said they didn't want to identify Stidhum to prevent him from skipping town, said Cincinnati police spokesman Lt. Steve Saunders.

Stidhum is also wanted for domestic violence and drug abuse charges, police stated in the Wednesday news release.

The case was presented to a grand jury. That body indicted Stidhum on four felony charges.

There were almost 400 pedestrian-related crashes in Hamilton County last year. Chatfield was one of at least nine pedestrians killed by a car. She was one of at least 27 people killed or injured who were on the sidewalk when struck.

She was one of the first to take off from the starting line of the 38th annual Seven Hills Run and had just begun the second hill when a Chrysler 300 jumped the curb and struck her around 9 a.m.

At least four people called 911 and reported the driver, who police said was in his 20s, was fleeing the scene.

"Please hurry, she's really hurt," one caller told police dispatchers.

"I didn't think something like that could happen," said Chatfield's running coach, Joe Fung, in an Enquirer interview last month. "It makes you angry and sad and you just want to do something, but really there's nothing to do except to remember and think about each other."

Chatfield's running team, House of Run N Tri in Columbia Tusculum, hosted a run in her honor that drew

hundreds.

What makes the pain even deeper is that Stidhum didn't stop to help, friends said.

Instead, after hitting Chatfield, Stidhum ripped the license plates off of the car and ran away, according to police.

Police questioned the woman who was sitting in the front seat, but said she didn't cooperate with the initial investigation.

It is unclear if she will face any criminal charges. Authorities have not named her.

City officials reported Dorchester Avenue was not closed for the race, which features about 80 runners. The participants were directed to use the sidewalk during the event, which takes them through Mount Adams, Mount Auburn, Clifton, Fairview, North and South Fairmount, and East and Lower Price Hill.

The street is in the third mile of the route for the Seven Hills Run, a 13.2-mile annual race organized by the Cincinnati Recreation Commission, a city government organization.

The agreement was signed 15 years ago in the aftermath of the 2001 riots. It guides how officers handle arrests.

"Does it need to be looked at, does it need to be tweaked?" He asked. "I am sure it does. Everybody wants to keep this alive as a model for nation. That is the work we have ahead of us."

Rickell Howard, of the Covington-based Children's Law Center, said there are too many juvenile arrests - and a disproportionate number of those arrested are black.

A look at court data shows, warrants were signed for 1,277 children under 18 in 2014 compared to 1,309 kids in 2013.

In 2014, 227 were white; 990 were black. In 2013, 227 were white and 1,030 were black.

"The young people that are arrested today end up adults wrapped
