ORDINANCE NO. T-2017

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING AN AD VALOREM TAX ON ALL REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF TAYLORSVILLE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF TAYLORSVILLE AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I.

The tax rate on all real property for 2017 taxes shall be and is fixed at 14.60 cents per \$100.00 of the assessed valuation. The tax rate on all personal property, including automobiles, for the 2017 taxes shall be and is fixed at 10.06 cents per \$100.00 of the assessed valuation. Aforesaid taxes are to be applied to the ordinary dues and expenses of the City, payment due on December 31, 2017, with 2 % discount if paid by November 30, 2017, regular payment due by December 31, 2017, and with penalty of 4 % of face value if paid by January 31, 2018, and subject to a penalty of ten percent (10%) of face value of the taxes due and unpaid by March 31, 2018, plus an additional interest of 10% per annum compounded monthly on face value plus penalties if not paid by April 1, 2018. Levy is hereby made accordingly.

SECTION II.

The taxes shall be collected by the City Treasurer or Secretary.

SECTION III.

This ordinance shall apply to the assessment of real and personal property made as of January 1, 2017 by the Spencer County Property Valuation Administrator as finally certified by the Department of Revenue.

SECTION IV.

It is hereby ordained that the tax bills of all persons, including corporations, partnerships, etc., who have not paid their taxes on March 31, 2018, may be advertised for sale of taxes due on the 1st Monday in April, 2018, regardless, a tax lien shall attach for all unpaid taxes on the property assessed plus interest of 10% per annual and the city may take all other legal action allowed by law for the collection of the taxes owed.

SECTION V.

This Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and publication. Enacted this the 29th day of September, 2017, by the City of Taylorsville.

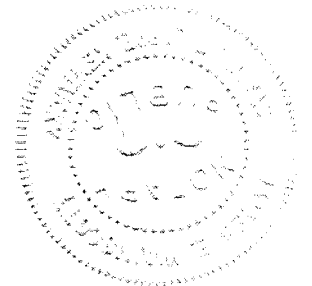

ACC hopes success of Jackson, Clemson provides financial boost

The Atlantic Coast Conference hopes its success of last season can boost the league this year — on the field and the balance sheet.

The ACC returns the Heisman Trophy winner, the reigning national champion and has two top-five teams in the national polls. The league's success has helped make the conference even more attractive to fans and viewers — starting with a list of opening-week matchups that include Florida State-Alabama, Virginia Tech-West Virginia and Georgia Tech-Tennessee.

In an interview with The Associated Press, Commissioner John Swofford said 2016 "may well have been the best year in our league's history" while saying the league has trended up for about five years.

"And in today's world, from the conference's standpoint, that's really important," Swofford said. "It's helped us tremendously in terms of where we're headed, television-wise. It's helped us tremendously in terms of our bowl associations that we now have and will have for a good while to come."

He hopes that success will buoy the entire league as it prepares for the launch of its ESPN-affiliated television channel in two years, added to its roster of corporate sponsors and begins work on negotiating the next round of bowl contracts.

"Everybody wants to be associated with something that's high-quality, something that's successful, something that wins," Swofford said of those sponsors.

ACC football certainly seems like an easy sell this year.

Louisville's Lamar Jackson is back for his junior season after earning the top individual honor in the sport. No. 5 Clemson is out to defend its first national championship since 1958. And No. 3 Florida State shapes up as a top contender for another College Football Playoff berth.

Andrew Zimbalist, an economics professor at Smith College in Massachusetts who has written dozens of books on the business of sports, expects a bump in general across the ACC.

"Whenever you have star charismatic players who get a lot of publicity, and you have a championship team, you get more attention," Zimbalist said. "There will be more interest at the schools, and therefore stronger attendance at the schools that have not been selling out their games. ... Because of the increased interest, there will probably be more sponsorship money available. There will be a boost. Usually, all of these things interact."

If so, such a box-office boost figures to be tough to tangibly measure.

The last Heisman winner to return to school was Jameis Winston.

Florida State in 2014 after leading the Seminoles to their most recent national title. Their home attendance increased by 9 percent that year — probably due to several factors including Winston and Florida State's schedule that season included home games against Clemson, Notre Dame and Florida.

Also, the financial impact of Jackson and Clemson to the league's bottom line won't be known publicly for a while.

The ACC's most recent tax documents cover the fiscal year that ended in June 2016. That covers the 2015 football season, which ended with Clemson losing to Alabama in the CFP title game.

They show total revenues of \$372 million, with payouts to schools ranging between \$27.9 million (Clemson) and \$22.5 million (Wake Forest and Georgia Tech). The league brought in \$226 million that year from its television deal with ESPN, and — in yet another indication of how football drives the finances of college sports — its nearly \$86 million in bowl revenue was more than four times larger than its NCAA basketball tournament money.

That money helps the schools pay for improvement projects and other expenditures.

Shortly after Jackson won the Heisman, Louisville began work on a \$63 million expansion of its stadium to increase capacity by 10,000 seats. Clemson recently gave coach Dabo Swinney a new eight-year, \$54 million contract.

North Carolina is building a \$25 million indoor facility as part of its new practice complex. Duke put the latest touches on its three-year remodeling of its stadium. Boston College is pumping \$200 million into its athletic facilities, including a new weight room for football and an athletics field house.

"Everything is momentum," BC coach Steve Addazio said.

Additionally, the ACC in recent months added a new corporate sponsor (Mellow Mushroom) and renewed a sponsorship deal with another longtime partner (Food Lion), though terms were not disclosed. Among individual schools, Louisville extended its apparel deal with Adidas for a deal worth \$160 million.

Swofford also said the league has opened discussions with some of its affiliated bowls on renewing their agreements even though the current contracts don't expire until after the 2019 season. He says the progress on the upcoming ACC Network is "right where we would want to be."

"It all fits together," he said. "The reality is, the quality of our football has been a tremendous help, tangibly and intangibly."

ROLLIE MASSIMINO: NOV. 13, 1934 – AUG. 30, 2017

Rollie Massimino, who led 'Nova to 85 title, dies at 82

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. — Rollie Massimino, who led Villanova's storied run to the 1985 NCAA championship and won more than 800 games in his coaching career, died Wednesday after a long battle with cancer. He was 82.

Massimino's death was announced by Keiser University, where he was still the men's basketball coach. He spent the final days of his life in hospice care.

Best known for that national title at Villanova, Massimino also coached at Stony Brook, UNLV and Cleveland State. He spent the last 11 years of his life at Keiser, where he started the program and turned it into an NAIA power.

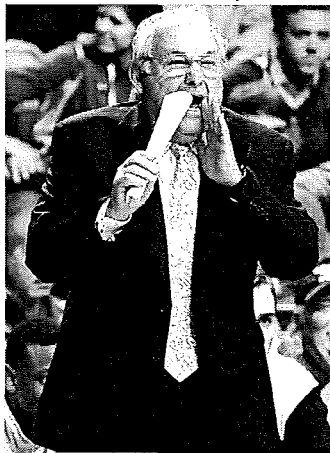
"We are so truly honored to have shared this time with him and take some degree of comfort in knowing the positive impact he has had on college students for the last four decades remains immeasurable," Keiser Chancellor Arthur Keiser said.

Massimino faced numerous health issues in recent years yet never stopped coaching. And even though he left Villanova 25 years ago, he was still considered family by the Wildcats and coach Jay Wright.

"If not for Rollie Massimino, I'm not even a part of this," Wright once said. "If not for the Big East, Rollie Massimino is not Rollie Massimino. I know it. He knows it. And if not for the Big East, no one knows about Villanova."

Wright was given a championship ring from 1985, and Massimino was given a championship ring from 2016. Wright wasn't working at Villanova during the first title season; Massimino wasn't officially there for the second one. But Wright worked Massimino's camps in the mid-1980s before coming to Villanova, so that made him part of the family.

Massimino went out of his way to take care of

those he considered family. So Wright got that 1985 ring. And the only moment when Wright teared up at Villanova's 2016 ring ceremony was when he handed Massimino his piece of championship jewelry.

"When you're a young coach and you grow up in Philly, Rollie Massimino is a legend to you," Wright said.

Roland Vincent Massimino was born Nov. 13, 1934, in New Jersey, played his college basketball at Vermont and got his master's degree from Rutgers. His first head coaching job was at his alma mater, Hillside High School, in 1962. His college coaching career started at Stony Brook in 1969, and after two seasons he became an assistant at Penn — under Chuck Daly.

Massimino and Daly would remain close until Daly's death in 2009. Like Daly, Massimino was always dapper on the sidelines. So when Daly died, Massimino took Daly's collection of sharp dress shoes and wore a pair in every game he coached for the remainder of his life.

"Chuck is always with me," Massimino said earlier this year.

After one season at Penn, Massimino took over

some fun. Do something you like. Play. Everybody's eyes exploded."

Villanova dominated that second half. Pasta was had afterward.

The Wildcats downed Memphis State in the national semifinals. That left a Villanova vs. Georgetown showdown, an all-Big East final. The Hoyas won both regular-season matchups between the rivals, but Villanova shot a staggering 79 percent in the title game and pulled off a 66-64 upset when it mattered most.

Villanova missed six shots from the field in the game, going 22 for 28.

"This is the greatest thing to ever happen to me," Massimino said that night.

Massimino spent two seasons at UNLV, seven more at Cleveland State and the last 11 at Keiser (which was called Northwood when he started). Keiser went to the NAIA national tournament nine times in his 11 seasons.

He was coaching until the very end, stomping on the sideline when angry with referees, doing the same pregame rituals this season as he did 30 years ago at Villanova. A leather desk chair was wheeled to the sideline for each practice for him to use if he needed a rest; most days, that chair went completely unoccupied.

"Some days, we do take him for granted," Keiser guard Andrija Sarenac said earlier this year. "But then you see him on TV so much, you see all these videos made about him, the movies about Villanova and everything, and it just hits you. You realize that he's a legend. I mean, your coach is a walking legend. With the energy and everything he comes in with, it's inspiring."

That game with the Tar Heels was the one where Massimino gave what those linked to that '85 team still call "the pasta speech" at halftime.

"He looked at all of us and threw his coat down," Chuck Everson, who played on that team, said Wednesday. "He said, 'If I knew it was going to come down to this, I'd rather have a bowl of pasta with clam sauce and a lot of cheese on it.' Everybody was looking at him like, 'What the heck does this have to do about playing?' What he was saying was just go out and have

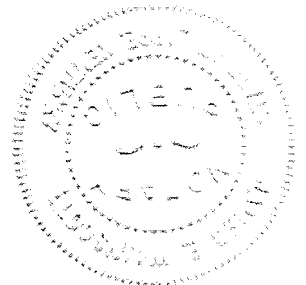

that cost the hosts 10 yards during the final minute pushed kicker Austin MacGinnis out of field-goal range. Despite long odds, MacGinnis attempted a 57-yard strike as time expired, but the kick fell short as the fans in the stands, players and coaches were left wondering what could have been instead of what just transpired.

Much like his coach, Kentucky standout running back Benny Snell blamed the loss on mistakes from start to finish.

"We were the better team," Snell said. "There's not a question. ... I felt like we were the better team. Whether it was a mistake with (their) guy being open or (the holding penalty), we beat ourselves."

The Kentucky locker room wasn't much better. Snell said his team was "deflated" after the loss and added you could have heard "a pin drop" as he tried to put a positive spin in his team's effort.

"That one's going to hurt because of what we

have invested," the Kentucky coach said. "These players have worked to put themselves in position to play like that and sometimes you're going to come up on the wrong end. That definitely hurts when you invest what we have invested."

Kentucky quarterback Stephen Johnson, one of the main staples in Kentucky's offense during the past two seasons, left the field with his head tucked in his jersey, an outward sign of his inward feelings after watching Florida celebrate on Kentucky's home turf.

"We knew they were going to come to play for all four quarters," said Johnson, who threw for 196 yards and three touchdowns. "It's a loss and it doesn't matter how well any does. We lost that game."

Stoops said the Wildcats will regroup in preparation for a non-conference encounter against Eastern Michigan Saturday and can build on the team's achievements during the first four encounters.

"I told (the team) that we're going to win together and we're going to lose together," he said.

best games," coach Mike McCarthy said. "I thought he was tremendous today."

The Packers flipped the script after the Bengals controlled the first half.

A.J. Green caught a 10-yard scoring pass on the game's opening drive for Cincinnati's first touchdown after two frustrating weeks for the offense. Bill Lazor made his debut as offensive coordinator for the fired Ken Zampese.

Andy Dalton was 21 of 27 for 212 yards and two scores. The Bengals were desperate to avoid their first 0-3 start since 2008. But they couldn't finish the Packers off in the second half.

"A disappointment is not finishing a football game now," Lewis said.

Green Bay's defense generated a little more pressure on Dalton in the second half, and rookie safety Josh Jones gave the injury-laden defense a boost with two sacks and 12 tackles.

Rodgers shook off his early struggles to guide the Packers to another win. He was sacked six times, mostly against just the Bengals' four-man rush, though the protection shored up after halftime.

Rodgers threw just his second career pick-six — and his first at home — when William Jackson returned an interception 75 yards for a touchdown for a 21-7 lead early in the second quarter.

"Oh, we took a step as a football team," McCarthy said. "This always pays forward when you go through adversity and you have success."

BENGALS OFFENSE

At least Cincinnati's offense finally got into the

endzone.

Green's score snapped a season-opening streak of 25 possessions without a touchdown. Until Sunday, they were only able to muster three field goals over the first two weeks, both losses.

NOTABLES

Rodgers' only other interception returned for a score came on Nov. 8, 2009, by Tanard Jackson in a 39-28 loss at Tampa. ... It was the warmest kickoff for a Packers home game at 89 degrees.

NATIONAL ANTHEM

Most members of each team interlocked arms on their respective sidelines when the national anthem was played before kickoff.

"We've got to stick together and show people that it doesn't matter what skin color or where you come from, we can stand as one. That's what we did today," Green said.

Across the field, Rodgers stood at the sideline locking arms with tight

end Richard Rodgers and backup quarterback Brett Hundley. Three Packers sat on the bench during the anthem: tight ends Martellus Bennett and Lance Kendricks, along with rookie cornerback Kevin King.

INJURIES

The Packers played without seven key players, including defensive lineman Mike Daniels (hip), outside linebacker Nick Perry (hand) and starting cornerback Davon House (quad).

On offense, left tackle David Bakhtiari (hamstring) and receiver Randall Cobb (chest) were inactive. Right tackle Bryan Bulaga made the start after being listed as questionable but did not return after aggravating his ankle injury in the second half.

Kyle Busch gets playoff win

LOUDON, N.H. — Kyle Busch saw little but billowing white smoke that engulfed the track and blinded enough drivers that it caused a tremendous wreck that sunk his toughest competition.

In his No. 18 Toyota, the driver nicknamed "Rowdy" knew there was only one way to handle the sudden pollution: Drive through it!

Busch slinked through the smoke clouds formed in the multi-car crash on the backstretch and dominated the rest of the way to win Sunday at New Hampshire Motor-

speedway.

"That was pretty intense," Busch said. "That was some 'Days of Thunder' stuff over there. You couldn't see anything."

He held on and saw a victory lane celebration for the third time this season. Busch earned a berth in the second round of NASCAR's playoffs and took his customary bow on the track. He even stuck a bag of M&M's on the claws of Loudon the Lobster, the 18-pound crustacean given to the race winner.

Busch, who won from the pole, put together a complete effort once the wreck derailed race leader and fellow Toyota driv-

er Martin Truex Jr. Truex, who won the playoff opener at Chicagoland, and Busch both earned automatic spots in the second round. Kyle Larson and Brad Keselowski advanced on points.

Truex led 112 laps until his run ended in the accident, though he rallied to finish fifth.

The playoff standings were shaken up in the wake of the massive multi-car wreck that sent playoff drivers Kurt Busch and Kevin Harvick to the garage. Harvick's car was hit by Austin Dillon on the last lap of the second stage. Harvick spun and smoke billowed over the track, leaving

drivers almost blinded to the traffic ahead. Busch, Harvick's teammate at Stewart-Haas Racing, slammed into Harvick. Truex backed up to straighten himself out and instead suffered left-rear damage when he smacked another car.

Kurt Busch, the Daytona 500 champion, will likely have to win next week at Dover to advance to the second round.

"It's all-in. We'll go there with everything we've got like we have been," he said.

Harvick, the 2014 series champion, had accumulated enough playoff points that one DNF shouldn't cost him a spot in the top 12.
