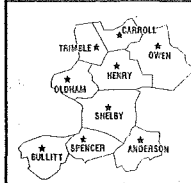



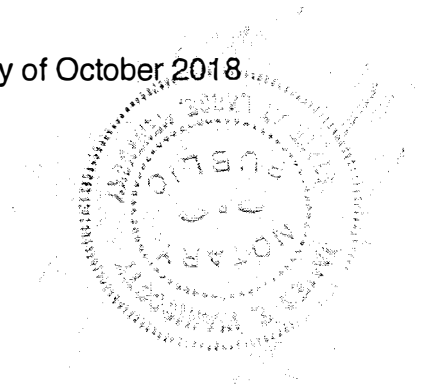

Murray withdraws from U.S. Open with hip injury

NEW YORK (AP) — His voice choking, Andy Murray unexpectedly announced Saturday that he was withdrawing from the U.S. Open because of a hip injury, adding to the lengthy list of top players who will miss the year's last Grand Slam tournament.

Murray was seeded No. 2 at Flushing Meadows, where play begins Monday.

"Did pretty much everything that I could to get myself ready here and took a number of weeks off after Wimbledon. I obviously spoke to a lot of hip specialists. Tried obviously resting, rehabbing, to try and get myself ready here," said Murray, who won the 2012 U.S. Open for the first of his three major championships.

"Was actually practicing OK the last few days," he added, "but it's too sore for me to win the tournament. And ultimately, that's what I was here to try and do."

Murray, who yielded the No. 1 ranking to Rafael Nadal this week, has not played a match since

July 12 at Wimbledon, where he was the defending champion and clearly was hampered by his hip during a five-set quarterfinal loss to Sam Querrey.

The 30-year-old from Britain revealed during a news conference at the U.S. Open site Saturday that the hip first bothered him during his semifinal loss to Stan Wawrinka at the French Open in June.

Murray said he will decide in the "next couple of days" whether to end his season because of the injury.

He has dealt with hip problems off and on for years, but not to the point where it forced him off the tour for an extended absence.

"I certainly wouldn't have been hurting myself more by trying to play. It was more a question of whether it would settle down in time," Murray said. "Obviously I kind of ran out of time."

Murray's exit from the U.S. Open further depletes an event that already was missing three of last year's four men's semifinalists, including 2016 champion Wawrinka, runner-up Novak Djokovic and Kei Nishikori.

Three-time major champion Wawrinka recently had surgery on his left knee, 12-time major champion Djokovic has a bad right elbow and 2014 U.S. Open runner-up Nishikori has an injured right wrist. All three have said they are done for the year.

Add in 2016 Wimbledon runner-up Milos Raonic, who has a problem with his left wrist, and Murray, and now five of the top 11 men in this week's ATP rankings will be absent.

That leaves No. 1 seed Nadal and No. 3 Roger Federer — who has been dealing with a bad back himself — as the two clear favorites for the men's trophy. They were drawn Friday into the same half of the bracket, meaning they could only meet in the semifinals in New York.

"Obviously there has been a lot of players with injuries this year," Murray said. "Look, I want to be back on court as soon as I can. If it means that I can play before the end of the year, then that's what I would love to do. I miss competing, and I'll try to get myself back on court as soon as I can."

If Murray had pulled

out of the field anytime before the draw was conducted Thursday, then Federer would have moved up to the No. 2 seeding and automatically would be in the bottom half of the bracket, setting up the possibility of a final between him and Nadal.

Instead, Federer stays where he is at No. 3.

No. 5 Marin Cilic, the 2014 champion, shifts to Murray's slot in the bracket and takes on the man who was supposed to face Murray in the first round, Tennis Sandgren of the United States. Under Grand Slam rules, the man seeded 17th — in this case Querrey — moves to Cilic's vacated spot and will play Gilles Simon of France. Querrey's old line in the draw gets filled by the highest-ranked man who was not seeded originally, Philipp Kohlschreiber of Germany; he becomes seed No. 33 and plays qualifier Tim Smyczek of the U.S.

Lukas Lacko of Slovakia, who lost in qualifying, gets into the 128-man field as a "lucky loser," replacing Murray. Lacko will play Benoit Paire of France.

SOUTH WILLIAMSPORT, Pa. (AP) — Mark Requena hit a two-run, go-ahead home run in the sixth inning and Lufkin, Texas, overcame a five-run deficit to beat Greenville, North Carolina, 6-5 on Saturday and earn a spot in the Little League World Series championship.

Greenville was previously undefeated in the tournament, having given up just one run and one hit in three games — both to Lufkin, on Wednesday — before things changed in a hurry Saturday. Pinch hitter Clayton Wigley's two-run homer to center started the rally for Lufkin in the fourth inning.

Lufkin will face Japan, which cruised through the international bracket and shut out Mexico 5-0 earlier Saturday, in Sunday's championship.

to the Rams) and Anquan Boldin (retired) are gone. The Jets are odds-on to be the worst team in the NFL.

AFC SOUTH

Many observers believe you can put a blanket over Houston, Tennessee and Indianapolis because their talent bases are that close. We demur.

The Texans have a terrific defense that gets back the incomparable J.J. Watt and could be enough to overcome a mediocre offense with an unproven QB and suspect passing game. They are well coached and rarely beat themselves — until the playoffs, that is.

No team appears more ready to make the next big step in the AFC than the Titans. They are deep at running back, secure at quarterback and on the offensive line, and have a developing D with play-makers such as Jurrell Casey and Brian Orakpo.

The coaching staff is innovative, which fits nicely in Music City — and maybe at the division.

Indy is a far bigger question mark because of the uncertainty of Andrew Luck's right shoulder. Just as uncertain is the O-line charged with protecting the franchise quarterback. As for the defense, it doesn't measure up to Houston's or Tennessee's. Could be a tough year for Chuck Pagano to hold onto his coaching job.

Jacksonville will be tougher with Tom Coughlin in the executive offices. Better? A bit.

AFC WEST

A three-team scramble is likely, with only the San Diego — oops, Los Angeles — Chargers unable to make a charge.

Oakland appeared headed for a showdown with New England until Derek Carr went down late in December. Should he stay healthy, the Raiders are the favorites to hold off the Chiefs, who sneaked past them to win the West last season, and the Broncos.

The Raiders have difference makers throughout their offense, and a line equal to the Patriots. Defensive Player of the Year Khalil Mack is by far their best defender and that unit must come through in a big way in the NFL's best sector.

Kansas City will be stout on defense, somewhat dull but effective enough on offense, and well coached. The Chiefs' season could be made or broken in a six-game stretch when they face Houston, Pittsburgh, Oakland, Denver, Dallas and the Giants.

Denver is the wild card out West. Its defense could carry it very far, as it did in winning the Super Bowl two seasons back. There are standouts at receiver and a deep backfield, but the quarterbacking is precarious and the protection is problematic. Never underestimate Von Miller and cohorts, though.

AFC NORTH

Everything in this division depends on whether Baltimore rebounds from a mediocre season. If the

Ravens don't — and their need for QB Joe Flacco to remain healthy is paramount — the Steelers will romp.

Baltimore added talent in the secondary with safety Tony Jefferson, but needs to revitalize the pass rush, as well as its pass protection.

Pittsburgh is the class of the North regardless. No offense is more dynamic, and the defense, while no Steel Curtain, has stoppers such as Bud Dupree and Ryan Shazier. It's not a long shot that WR Antonio Brown, RB Le'Veon Bell and QB Ben Roethlisberger will be in the running for league MVP.

Cincinnati coach Marvin Lewis enters his 15th season in charge and needs a turnaround from 6-9-1, plus, at last, a post-season victory to secure his status. The Bengals are pretty good with the ball, not much without it.

Cleveland won't go 1-15 again. That doesn't mean the always-rebuilding Browns won't contend for the top overall draft selection.
