PETITION OF LOUISVILLE GAS AND ELECTRIC COMPANY FOR CONFIDENTIAL PROTECTION

Louisville Gas and Electric Company ("LG&E" or "the Company") petitions the Kentucky Public Service Commission ("Commission") pursuant to 807 KAR 5:001, Section 13 and KRS 61.878(1) to grant confidential protection for the information described herein, which LG&E is providing in response to Commission Staff's Post-Hearing Request for Information Item No. 18 in the above-captioned proceeding. In support of this Petition, LG&E states as follows:

Confidential or Proprietary Commercial Information (KRS 61.878(a)(c)(1))

- 1. The Kentucky Open Records Act exempts from disclosure certain commercial information.¹ To qualify for the exemption and maintain the confidentiality of the information, a party must establish that the material is of a kind "generally recognized as confidential or proprietary, which if openly disclosed would permit an unfair commercial advantage to competitors of the entity that disclosed the records."²
- 2. In the response provided to Commission Staff Item No. 18, LG&E is providing information regarding contractor costs for line locating services. The response includes the names of the contractors the Company hired and their base ticket rates and hourly rates. Because

the Company uses a competitive bid process to award these contracts, this pricing is considered sensitive commercial information. Confidential protection should be granted to the prices in this response because disclosure would affect the Company's ability to obtain the most reasonable prices for such services in the competitive marketplace and the Company's ability to negotiate rates for services in the future. Furthermore, public disclosure would prejudice the winning bidder by allowing its competitors to know how it offers and prices its services.

- 3. The information for which LG&E is seeking confidential treatment is not known outside of LG&E, and it is not disseminated within LG&E except to those employees with a legitimate business need to know the information.
- 4. LG&E will disclose the confidential information, pursuant to a confidentiality agreement, to intervenors with a legitimate interest in this information and as required by the Commission.
- 5. If the Commission disagrees with this request for confidential protection, however, it must hold an evidentiary hearing (a) to protect LG&E's due process rights and (b) to supply the Commission with a complete record to enable it to reach a decision with regard to this matter.³
- 6. In compliance with 807 KAR 5:001, Sections 8(3) and 13(2)(e), LG&E is filing with the Commission one paper copy that identifies by highlighting the information for which confidential protection is sought and one electronic copy with the same information obscured.
- 7. LG&E requests that confidential protection be granted for five years due to the sensitive nature of the information at issue.

Commission grant confidential protection to the information designated as confidential.
