Girl riding kids' ATV killed

WHITESBURG
Kentucky State Police said a 9-year-old girl riding an all-terrain vehicle has been killed in a crash in the eastern part of the state.

State troopers responded to a call requesting medical assistance Sunday evening in the Gordon community in Letcher County. Police determined the girl was driving a Tao Tao kids' ATV in the driveway of her home when she lost control of the vehicle and hit a tree. The smaller ATVs are designed for young riders. No one else was hurt.

The Letcher County coroner pronounced the child dead at the scene.

Officials will tour Bevin's home

LOUISVILLE
Tax officials in Kentucky will get a second tour of Gov. Matt Bevin's mansion amid a long-running dispute over whether the home is assessed too low for tax purposes.

The Courier Journal reported the Jefferson County Board of Assessment Adjustment decided Friday to revisit the 150-year-old mansion. The inspection was requested by the property valuation administrator's office.

Bevin bought the mansion in the Anchorage community in 2017 for \$1.6 million and argues it's now worth \$1.39 million, citing age and deterioration. The administration set the property value in 2018 at \$2 million.

Assistant County Attorney Jeff Derouen says members of the board visited the home in 2017 but were barred from the top floors.

Bevin's lawyer, Mark Sommer, objected, saying he wasn't given ade-

quate notice of the request.

KSP investigate multiple deaths

LOUISVILLE
Kentucky State Police said the discovery of two deaths in LaRue County lead investigators to a third death at a different crime scene in Jefferson County.

News outlets report that state police responded Monday to a report of shots fired. They

arrived to find a home fully engulfed in flames.

State Police Trooper Peter Binkley says a woman was found dead inside a vehicle on the property. When the flames were extinguished, another victim was found.

A news release from state police says the investigation led authorities to a third dead body at a different crime scene. Authorities are investigating this death as a separate but related in-

cident.

The cause of the fire hasn't been released. Neither have the victim's names. The investigation is ongoing.

UK overbooks beds

LEXINGTON
The University of Kentucky overbooked its

dorms by hundreds of students and is now scrambling to create makeshift dorms and double up private rooms usually reserved for resident advisers.

News outlets reported about 2,400 returning students want to stay on campus, along with a majority of the school's 5,450 incoming students.

University spokeswoman Sarah Geegan says all students will be assigned a room for the upcoming school year, just some of those rooms will have been converted from multipurpose rooms.

Blanton said a more concrete housing plan would be released this week.

Summer camp is not like it was

When I was a farm kid in Ohio in the 1950s and 1960s, my family — Mom, Dad, my three older sisters and me — only took two family vacations.

One was during the Christmas break when I was 6. We took a long trip to Florida on two lane highways where we visited my great aunt near Miami and got to swim in the Atlanta Ocean on Christmas

Day. (It was really too cold to swim, but my sisters and I had been talking about doing it for so long, we went anyway, if

for only a few frigid minutes just so we could tell our friends in Ohio that we had swam on Christmas.)

The other family vacation was the only time we got away from the farm in summer. I was 10 or 11 and we went first to Niagara Falls and then on to New York City, where we were in the audience for "Beat the Clock," a popular game show. I have many fond memories of that trip, and since we took so few trips, I think my memories of those times are more vivid than they would have been if they had been more frequent.

However, there was one summer "vacation" that I eagerly anticipated each August. It was the five days of 4-H camp where this farm boy got to do what I thought the town kids did every day: play baseball and other games with the guys, go to the swimming pool and just goof off. Instead, I spent most of June and July helping Dad on the farm.

Camp was such an important part of growing up, that my first job off the farm was as a counselor at a 4-H camp on Long Island between the freshman and sophomore year of college, a job made possible through the contacts I made during a week at National 4-H Congress in Washington, D.C., just before going to college.

Camp was so important to me that I wanted my children and then my grandchildren to have similar experiences. They all went to camp (in fact, my soon-to-be mother-in-law spent the morning of my wedding day picking up my new stepson at camp), but none of them became camp fanatics like me, and time is running out with only one grandchild still the right age.

My wife showed me a segment that aired on the Today show Monday that reported that the fastest growing "camps" this summer were teaching elementary school, middle school and high school kids how to become YouTube stars.

That segment struck us as both humorous and ironic because earlier this summer Memaw and Pepaw had coerced our 9-year-old granddaughter to go the church camp for the first time in hopes it would get her off YouTube, not to encourage her to use it more. In the opinion of this old fogey who has only listened to YouTube second hand when trans-

porting my granddaughter somewhere, she spends way too much time with her eyes glued to YouTube.

I googled "YouTube camps" and found they were numerous. One said, " ... Capture footage with professional equipment and use tools like Adobe Premiere and Adobe After Effects to enhance your project. Put your creative endeavors together into a polished channel that's sure to draw followers.

"Prerequisite: Ability to work in a team. Each student will be provided with an individual computer for editing and will share video equipment."

OK, I admit there is some value to such camp but a kid is not going to see the beauty of nature by hiking a mountain trail or learning to swim by sitting at a computer and becoming the star of YouTube videos. A few kids actually make money from YouTube segments, but I think they are few and far between. Instead, these camps may be giving kids false hopes of stardom.

There is little danger of my granddaughter going to a YouTube camp. For one thing, they are way out of our price range. But even if we could afford it, I still want my youngest grandchild to know the joys of a real camp where you live in rustic cabins, have no access to TV or the Internet and become great friends with your fellow campers.

Those are my childhood memories that I most cherish.

an early and ongoing champion of her writing, which he called “so precise, so faithful to speech and so charged with pain and wonder that the novel becomes poetry.”

Setting her stories in segregated communities, where incest and suicide were no more outrageous than a sign which reads “COLORED ONLY,” Morrison wrote of dreamers for whom the price was often death, whether the mother’s tragic choice to murder her baby girl — and save it from slavery — in “Beloved,” or the black community that implodes in “Paradise.”

Like Faulkner, her characters are burdened by the legacy, and ongoing tragedy, of slavery and separation. For Faulkner’s white Southerners, losers of the Civil War, the price is guilt, rage and madness; for Morrison’s slaves and their descendants, supposedly liberated, history follows like the most unrelenting posse.

“The future was sunset; the past something to leave behind,” Morrison wrote in “Beloved,” in which the ghost of the slain daughter returns to haunt and obsess her mother.

“And if it didn’t stay behind, well, you might have to stomp it out. Slave life; freed life — every day was a test and a trial. Nothing could be counted on in a world where even when you were a solution you were a problem.”

Morrison’s breakthrough came in 1977 with “Song of Solomon,” her third novel and the story of young Milkman Dead’s sexual, social and ancestral education. It was the first work by a black writer since Richard Wright’s “Native Son” to be a full Book-of-the-Month selection and won the National Book Critics Circle award. It was also Morrison’s first book to center on a male character, a novel which enabled her “get out of the house, to de-domesticate the landscape.”

But the mainstream was another kind of education. Reviewing “Song of Solomon,” author

Reynolds Price chided Morrison for “the understandable but weakening omission of active white characters.” (He later recanted.) When “Beloved” was overlooked for a National Book Award, a letter of protest from 48 black writers, including Angelou and Amiri Baraka, was published in The New York Times Book Review, noting that Morrison had never won a major literary prize.

“Beloved” went on to win the Pulitzer and Morrison soon ascended to the very top of the literary world, winning the Nobel and presiding as unofficial laureate of Winfrey’s book club, founded in 1996. Winfrey chose “Song of Solomon,” “The Bluest Eye,” “Paradise” and “Sula” over the years and would list all of Morrison’s works as among her favorites. Winfrey also starred in and helped produce the 1998 film version of “Beloved.”

As with so many other laureates, Morrison’s post-Nobel fiction was viewed less favorably than her earlier work. Morrison received no major competitive awards after the Nobel and was criticized for awkward plotting and pretentious language in “Love” and “Paradise.” But a novel published in 2008, “A Mercy,” was highly praised. “Home,” a brief novel about a young Korean War veteran, came out in 2012 and was followed three later by a contemporary drama, “God Help the Child.”

Morrison’s other works included “Playing in the Dark,” a collection of essays; “Dreaming Emmet,” a play about the slain teenager Emmett Till; and several children’s books co-authored with her son,

Slade Morrison (who died of cancer in 2010). In November 2016, she wrote a highly cited New York essay about the election of Donald Trump, calling his ascension to the presidency a mark of what whites would settle for to hold on to their status.

“So scary are the consequences of a collapse of white privilege that many Americans have flocked to a political platform that supports and translates violence against the defenseless as strength. These people are not so much angry as terrified, with the kind of terror that makes knees tremble,” she wrote.

“William Faulkner understood this better than almost any other American writer. In ‘Absalom, Absalom,’ incest is less of a taboo for an upper-class Southern family than acknowledging the one drop of black blood that would clearly soil the family line. Rather than lose its ‘whiteness’ (once again), the family chooses murder.”

She taught for years at Princeton University, from which she retired in 2006, but also had an apartment in downtown Manhattan and a riverfront house in New York’s Rockland County that burned down in 1993, destroying manuscripts, first editions of

Faulkner and other writers and numerous family mementoes. She had the house rebuilt and continued to live and work there.

“When I’m not thinking about a novel, or not actually writing it, it’s not very good; the 21st century is not a very

nice place. I need it (writing) to just stay steady, emotionally,” she told the AP in 2012.

“When I finished ‘The Bluest Eye,’ ... I was not pleased. I remember feeling sad. And then I thought, ‘Oh, you know, everybody’s talking about “sisterhood,” I

wanted to write about what women friends are really like. (The inspiration for ‘Sula’). All of a sudden the whole world was a real interesting place. Everything in it was something I could use or discard. It had shape. The thing is — that’s how I live here.”

Grandpa could get some peculiar notions about cooking in his mind sometimes. In mine I always assumed he could cook. He could stir up a pretty good pan of pone bread on one of those little old cast iron pot bellied stoves. He just stirred it up and kept it on top of the stove until it was crispy or golden brown and he would eat it with a splash of jam or honey or something else. Sometimes I would stop by and partake of whatever hospitality he offered. Usually it was the other way around. Mom saw to it that Grandpa and Granny ate well during their days and their refrigerator contained treats they enjoyed such as ice-cream sandwiches, apple pies, brownies, etc. We kept their little refrigerator better stocked than the one in our own house.

It was mid to late 1950s and Grandpa and Grandma had become our star boarders. Grandpa was approaching eighty and Granny was ten or twelve years behind. As far as we could tell, his health was still fairly good. Most of the time he could outwork me or my big oafish cousins if you put him down in a cornfield or garden with a gooseneck hoe. Because Granny was sick from time to time and working her way through her senior years, Dad and Grandpa wanted her living close to the big gravel road where she could be picked up by someone in a car or ambulance. Their old farmstead was located near the headwaters of a small branch of Walkers Creek, on top of the cliff. It was about two miles from there to our place and another half mile out to the Big Andy gravel road. There was no bridge across the

creek and the muddy road was impassible, come winter. Pa and Granny decided to build another house on the other side of the creek and closer to town. Dad and Uncle Jim would help him build. Out behind our house we had a wooden utility building with a metal roof. Once Jackson County RECC decided to bring electric to our place a decision was made. Renovate the old building, wire it and put in a refrigerator, beds and a couple of old railroad stoves. I remember the short one very well. It had belonged to the L&E Railroad. They kept the place warm and they could do a minimum of cooking. They were comfortable there until their new house was completed. It was handy for us to keep an eye on them. Grandpa parched corn and peanuts and popped some popcorn on top of the stove. We would kill hogs and he could roast a pig's tail in a fireplace grate. They could scramble up gravy or a couple of eggs, but truthfully they were better off to let Mom take care of the cooking and she really didn't mind. However, Grandpa had a stubborn streak and liked to do for himself and her. Unfortunately he was always asking me to share their fare. His snacks were ok but the main events might be best forgotten and left unsaid.

When spring rolled around he wanted me to go fishing with him. He couldn't fish worth a nickel. His idea of a great catch was to catch these little bluegill and dump them in a half bushel galvanized tub. I was getting pretty good at putting some very nice stringers of fish on the dining table. However, Grandpa was grandpa. He

was going to catch and prepare my supper. He insisted on cleaning all those little bluegill. The biggest probably wouldn't exceed four inches. When the little fish were clear of their scales, he washed them off, filled the tub ¾ full again and cooked the little ras-cals. When they were done to his satisfaction he took his pole, tub and mushy fish and headed for home. He took a sausage grinder out of a cabinet and began turning it, grinding up the tiny fish bones and all. When he was done he took flour and meal and rolled out fish patties and began frying. Within minutes you could smell the fish patties frying all over the place.

Before long he dipped Granny three or four patties out of the skillet and onto a plate. I didn't like his looks. Some were brown. Others were black as coal. "Try them Bo," he implored and handed me a fish before going back for some for himself. I could have sworn one of those black patties moved. "Tell me them ain't the best fish you ever cat," he continued. He sat there waiting, not so patiently. "Lord, how am I going to get out of this," I silently prayed. Whatever Grandma said came out as a groan at first and then changed to, "Mose Cox, you get them rotten fish out of here! That' stuff is awful." He never said a word, but looked like he had been shot between the eyes. He was horror stricken, but didn't utter a sound. Neither did L. Finally he took his catch down over the hill and dumped it somewhere. He never brought it up again and neither did I. It certainly wasn't one of our most transparent moments.

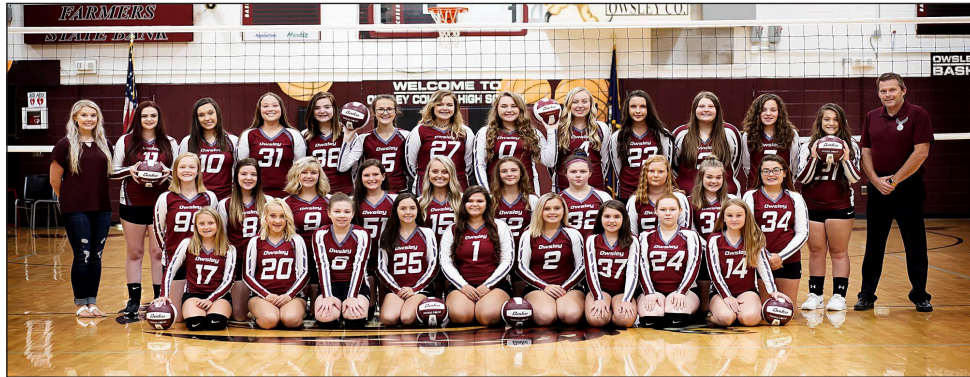

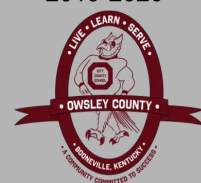

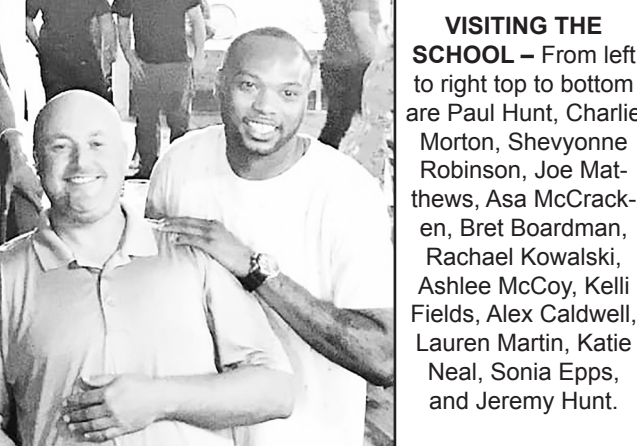

Winter Preparations for Livestock

By David Appelman, CEA for Ag and Natural Resources

Thinking about cold weather is really not on our minds this time of the year, but before you know it, Old Man Winter will be here. The muddy challenges of the last two winters have left a devastating impact on many herds. This included pasture loss, pastures destroyed, weed infestation, and poor animal performance. We are still concerned with the recent breeding season and the effect of cows with poor body condition, and whether they will conceive or not.

Now is the time to start making plans for this winter. You should have

two goals in mind - to reduce stress on the animals and to reduce stress on you. Many of our producers are getting older and need easier ways to care for the animals. By reducing the challenges with mud, it will make caring for the livestock easier and safer for producers.

Many of our farmers have off-farm employment, leaving livestock care during the dark hours. Fence Line feeders can allow for feeding and care of the animals without entering the fields. Cows will be on a hardened surface, reducing the stress of mud, and the animals can be viewed more readily to assess their condition. Plans

for these feeders, that are in use at the Eden Shale Farm, are now available with different designs you can choose from. There are also plans for a large round bale self-feeder, along with numerous publications for heavy use areas and using geotextile materials to create hardened surfaces.

We all are hoping for a mild, dry winter, but it seems that seasons are changing and wetter is more the normal. Now is the time to prepare for a better option for both you and your livestock. Contact the Bracken County Extension Office at 735-2141 to help guide you on your project.

Ewing woman is back in jail on more felony charges

A Ewing woman, indicted on felony theft charges in March, now faces additional felony charges, following her arrest last week.

Cassandra Marie Case, 24, was free on bond pending a felony theft charge, after having been indicted by Members of a March 15, 2019 Fleming County Grand Jury on a theft by unlawful taking charge, when, on July 15, Fleming County Sheriff Gary Kinder responded to a single, 4-wheeler accident on Tea

Run Road, involving Case. "She didn't look hurt and I was going to give her a ride home," Kinder said of his arrival at the scene.

But when Case went to enter the sheriff's vehicle she wanted to load up two backpacks and Kinder found stolen items from the Brian and Jennifer Stokes residence, when he inspected the contents.

"They had moved to a new home recently and had a few items they hadn't moved yet and it looks like she had ransacked their old home and taken all kinds of things," Kinder said.

That garnered Case a charge of burglary, 1st de-

gree.

As Kinder continued his investigation, it became apparent that Case had stolen a bicycle from the Stokes residence and then rode it to another home on Tea Run Road, belonging to Ty Bailey, where she had stole the four-wheeler before wrecking it, which Kinder subsequently charged her with another charge of burglary and theft.

During Case's arraignment in Fleming District Court on July 18, Kinder interviewed her again and when he walked out of the interview room at the Fleming County Justice Center and then returned, it was

revealed she had taken the holding cell keys and secreted them until Kinder confronted her about it.

"She said she saw the keys laying there and wanted to make sure she gave them to someone so they wouldn't be misplaced or lost, but she didn't say anything about having them until I confronted her," Kinder said.

So Case was addition-

ally charged with felony attempted escape due to that incident.

Case was originally charged with theft by unlawful taking, more than \$500, but less than \$10,000 for allegedly taking a direct deposit card, which belonged to another individual (Bianca Fontaine), on Dec. 11, 2018, and withdrawing \$909 from an ATM machine and making pur-

chases from Wish.com. She also allegedly bought candy from the Dollar General Store, according to court documents.

She remains lodged in the Mason County Detention Center on \$7,500 cash bond.

All persons are to be presumed innocent until proven guilty or pleading guilty.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF MOUNT OLIVET, KENTUCKY as follows:

- If in any fiscal year subsequent to a fiscal year in which the City has adopted a Budget Ordinance in accordance with Kentucky Revised Statutes and other applicable laws, no budget ordinance is adopted, the budget ordinance of the previous fiscal year has full force and effect as if readopted.
- That the City Council of the City of Mount Olivet may amend this Budget Ordinance at any time after its adoption, provided that the amended Budget Ordinance complies with all legal requirements, including those set forth herein.
- That attached hereto are the revenues and expenditures of the City of Mount Olivet for the budget year, in summary form by fund account, (and where deemed appropriate by the Mayor, expenditures in summary form by department), such attachment being incorporated herein by reference as if fully set forth herein.

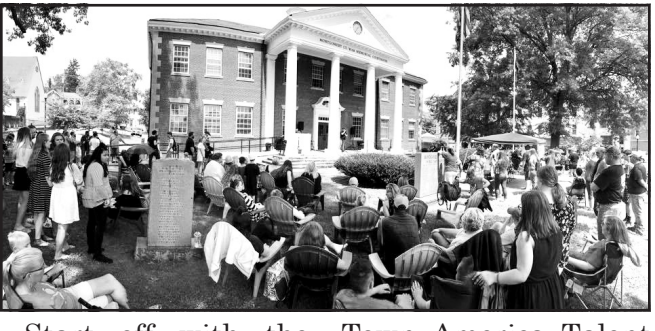

Child Find for Children with Disabilities in Need of Special Education or 504 Services

Child Find
 The Nicholas County School District keeps educational records in a secure location in each school and Board office.
 The Nicholas County School District obtains written consent from a parent or eligible student (age 18 or who is attending a postsecondary institution), before disclosing personally identifiable information to an entity or individual not authorized to receive it under FERPA.
 For students who have been determined eligible for Special Education, educational records will be destroyed at the request of the parents when they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. The Nicholas County School District may destroy the educational records of a child without parent request three years after they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. Parents are advised that data contained in the records may later be needed for Social Security benefits or other purposes. The Nicholas County School District may retain, for an indefinite period of time, a record of the student's name, address, telephone number, grades, attendance records, classes attended, grade level completed, and year completed.
 Children eligible for Special Education include those children with disabilities who have autism, deaf-blindness, developmental delay, emotional-behavior disability, hearing impairment, mental disability, multiple disabilities, orthopedic impairment, other health impairment, specific learning disability, speech or language impairment, traumatic brain injury, or visual impairment and who because of such an impairment need Special Education services.
 Children eligible for 504 services include those children in a public elementary and secondary education program who have a current physical or mental impairment that currently substantially limits some major life activity which causes the student's ability to access the school environment or school activities to be substantially limited.
 Children eligible for the State-Funded Preschool program include three- and four-year-old children identified with disabilities and four-year-old children who are at-risk, as defined by federal poverty levels up to 160%. Preschool children eligible for special education must have an Individual Education Plan (IEP) instead of a 504 plan to receive State-Funded Preschool program services.
 The Nicholas County School District has an ongoing "Child Find" system, which is designed to locate, identify and evaluate any child residing in a home, facility, or residence within its geographical boundaries, age three (3) to twenty-one (21) years, who may have a disability and be in need of Special Education or 504 services. This includes children who are not in school; those who are in public, private, or home school; those who are highly mobile such as children who are migrant or homeless; and those who are advancing from grade to grade, who may need but are not receiving Special Education or 504 services.
 The district's "Child Find" system includes children with disabilities attending private or home schools within the school district boundaries that may need special education services.
 The Nicholas County School District will make sure any child enrolled in its district who qualifies for Special Education or 504 services, regardless of how severe the disability, is provided appropriate Special Education or 504 services at no cost to the parents of the child.
 Parents, relatives, public and private agency employees, and concerned citizens are urged to help the Nicholas County School District find any child who may have a disability and need Special Education or 504 services. The District needs to know the name and age, or date of birth of the child; the name, address, and phone number(s) of the parents or guardian; the possible disability; and other information to determine if Special Education or 504 services are needed.
