If the second reading passes, the ordinance states that in the November 2020 election, only 9 council members shall be elected.

Councilman Terry Bunnell said, "I think there are several options available to us and we need to look at all the various forms of government."

"You know, is nine the right number? Is seven the right number? Is this a city commissioner form, a city manager commissioner, the right form of government?" Bunnell asked.

Councilman Patrick Gaunce said he felt the citizens had spoken for him after using the social media platform Facebook to ask citizens what they wanted with this particular vote. He said after 2,200 people viewed the video, he received zero feedback stating there should be 12 seated on the council.

Councilwoman Marina Kirkpatrick said she wanted to clarify that her yearly pay is \$7,300 after taxes.

Kirkpatrick also said there is more to being a council member than showing up for two council meetings a month, noting that all the members are involved in several committees. She detailed many additional tasks that come with sitting on committees, noting she sits on five now.

While she does not think it is a "bad idea" to go from 12 to 9 members, she felt that those 9 members "would need to be even more dedicated than the dedication is now, obviously."

Kirkpatrick said the deduction in council members would save the City "roughly" \$25,800 per year.

"If saving money is the real issue, what would the plan for that reinvestment to [sic] be?" Kirkpatrick said, adding her concern would be those 9 council members "would want more pay after a short period of time because they're having to serve on more committees" that result in more duties.

Mayor Harold MD Armstrong followed by saying, "I don't know if this is of order or not, but I'd like to make a point clear that since January this year, we have been posting on all our committee meetings who is on that committee, who is attending it, and it's on our website. But I urge the public that if it goes to 9 to use that as a yardstick when they go to the [voting] polls. Look and see who's working behind the scenes. Not who's in here making comments the night of the meeting."

Councilman Freddie Norris said he thought there are some merits from both sides. He referenced the effort made to move in the same direction around 12 to 14 years ago to which, at that time, discussion was held on joining some of the committees and that might be considered before the vote Monday night.

Right before the vote, Councilman Wendell Honeycutt said he had rather be governed by 12 than 9 council members and explained how he believed the diversity of having 12 was a positive thing.

"Having this diversity

within our council, and you can see it in our 6-6 votes and our 5-7 votes, we do look at things in different ways," Honeycutt said, "Everybody has an opinion and it's valuable; I think it's worth more to have that than it is for the cost savings."

Ultimately, the mayor called for a roll call vote.

Those opposed to the reduction: Terry Bunnell, Sheri Eubank, Wendell Honeycutt, Marna Kirkpatrick, and Marlin Witcher.

Those in favor: Patrick Gaunce, Brad Groce, Chasity Lowery, James "Happy" Neal, Gary Norman, Joe Trigg, and Freddie Norris.

GARBAGE PICKUP CHANGES

The second reading of an ordinance for amendments to the City's garbage collection was on the agenda and after discussion, a motion was made to amend the ordinance, which shifted it back to a first reading.

The unanimous approved amendments, suggested by Honeycutt, changed the time frame to sit garbage carts on the curb no earlier than 6:00 PM the night before to no earlier than the day before. The other amendment he suggested was to allow the City Clerk to approve exemptions for citizens who have circumstances preventing them from meeting the deadline such as shut-ins and elderly. Armstrong said the exemptions would be permanent if eligible for one.

Once the second read-

ing has been approved, which is expected at the next meeting, the Barren County Progress will run the ordinance in its entirety.

ANIMAL ORDINANCE TABLED

The ordinance relating to Animal Control for the City has not been updated since 1980 and City Attorney Danny Basil read the changes presented during the first reading.

The current ordinance requires city residents to license their dogs at age six months or older. However, one of the new revisions, if approved, will require those licenses to become an annual purchase at Barren River Animal Welfare Association.

Bunnell suggested changing some of the wording in a section regarding shelter and tethering of dogs.

After discussion, it was

"We know because of that \$18,000, we still have supporters here," she said. Lawson said that in 2018, Barren County raised \$8,000 for the same t-shirt fundraiser and has set a personal goal to reach \$10,000 this year. Forms will be available for those who wish to purchase a t-shirt and may be found in churches, organizations, businesses, banks, schools, etc.

OTHER BUSINESS

-First reading approved for an ordinance setting the 2019 ad valorem tax rate for Glasgow: .173 per \$100 of assessed value on real property and .176 per \$100 of assessed value of personal property;

-Approval of a resolution authorizing the City

of Glasgow to dispose of all items pursuant to law that the Glasgow Fire Department has designated as surplus items;

-At the last meeting, Mayor Armstrong broke a 6-6 vote to appoint Jackie Brown to the IDEA Board as the representative for the City.

Armstrong said on Monday that Brown called him and declined to serve citing that since only half of council members had confidence in him, he decided not to take the position. Armstrong then successfully requested a vote to suspend a resolution requiring a two week notice for appointments and Joe David Houchens was appointed to fulfill Brown's unexpired term ending June 30, 2023.

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GREEN RIVER VALLEY WATER DISTRICT NOTICE OF PROPOSED RATE CHANGE

On or about August 29, 2019, Green River Valley Water District will apply to the Kentucky Public Service Commission for an increase in its rates for water service. The United States Department of Agriculture, Rural Development ("RD") has required a change in Green River Valley Water District's rates as a condition to the award of a loan of \$8,062,000, which will be evidenced by waterworks revenue bonds, and a grant of \$3,563,000. RD requires that Green River Valley Water District assess the following rates:

The proposed rates shall be effective for water sold on and after the date of the order of the Public Service Commission approving those rates, which is expected to be no later than 30 days after the filing of the Application.

Box 615, Frankfort, Kentucky 40602 or by e-mail to psc.info@ky.gov. Green River Valley Water District's application is docketed as Case No. 2019-00287.

The proposed rates are required under the terms of an agreement between Green River Valley Water District and RD. KRS 278.023 does not grant the Public Service Commission any discretionary authority to modify or reject any portion of the agreement between Green River Valley Water District and RD, or to defer the issuance of all necessary orders to implement the terms of the agreement.

The proceeds of the RD loan and grant will be used to expand the capacity of Green River Valley Water District's water treatment plant from six million gallons per day to eight million gallons per day, to construct the following improvements: a new river water intake on the Green River for the water treatment plant, a secondary raw water pump station to pump water from Rio Verde Spring, a new chlorine building and feed equipment, two new two-staged flocculation basins and two sedimentation basins, two filters, and a 1,200,000 gallon clearwell. They will also be used for yard piping improvements, refurbishing an existing laboratory, and acquiring and installing a new SCADA system for the water treatment plant and water distribution system.

iff's Office had a total of 5,158 with KSP having 4,120. All the combined fire departments had a total of 1,742. EMS with a total of 3,318, and the Rescue Squad reflected 18 runs.

Kitchens stated that Post 3 will be seeing many updates in the months and years ahead, including new recorders, phone system upgrades, and new radio consoles. They are in the process of building a next gen CAD system, which is expected to go live in the spring of next year.

"It's going to allow for more detailed notes, caution notes, caution indicators for all the agencies involved," Kitchens said. "It comes with new mapping, which is going to be more up to date. It comes from several resources in the state...It will open that up to get more notes and more updates, GPS locations. So, that may be something where if you can't find this house because of the address, GPS will actually let see where it's coming from. Each address will have to be validated to be dispatched through the new system."

Kitchens also explained the biggest concern for the law enforcement in Hart County which is the radio systems.

"We have a lot of issues with deputies getting out at places, even Horse Cave Police Department getting out at places, and we simply can't hear them," Kitchens said. "Their traffic never makes it out to Bowling Green. A lot of times the deputies and the Horse Cave officers are calling in on the phone to tell us what we need to hear because the signal never makes it to the Q site in Horse Cave to get down to us...It's a huge officer safety concern."

"There's a lot of time with Horse Cave or you get an officer at Dog Creek, they key up the radio and it sounds like static," Kitchens added. "My kids have walkie talkies, and they can talk to one another better from the neighbor's house than what we can communicate with law enforcement sometimes."

Weber voiced his concern for the safety of law enforcement when radio frequency is not able to reach Post 3.

"No matter which way you slice it, there definitely is a problem with law enforcement (radios)," Weber said. "If these folks are your family, and even if not, if you care about them, 80% of their issues are when they are out of the vehicles. That's when they're going to get shot. That's when they're going to get stabbed. That's when they're going to get run over. We do have a serious problem that does need to be addressed."

Hart County Sheriff Jeff Wilson said his concern is with the safety of all officers in the county.

"If you go out and respond to a call at night, sometimes you're going to be there by yourself" Sheriff Wilson said. "... If you're not able to talk off that portable to dispatch, then basically your lifeline is cut off and you just have to deal with the situation that's there and take care of it."

During the meeting, possibilities were discussed regarding budget, costs

of upgrades for law enforcement, and the possibility of purchasing surplus equipment from KSP.

"Right now we run off a 911 budget of \$205,000," said Hart County Judge/Executive Joe Choate. "Our revenue on it each year is going down. We get a dollar and a half on phone lines, and obviously each year there's less people who have a phone in their house. That's less money...This year we're budgeting over \$50,000 that will come out of our general fund and go to 911, and that's no money for upgrades. We're not spending a dime on our infrastructure....We need to look at options. We've got to improve our infrastructure of being able to talk here or not here...Right now, every year, we're putting more out of our general in to our 911 and we're putting no money into our system. We're not even maintaining...We definitely need to take a look at how to improve communication in our county."

Lee Miles, 5th District Magistrate, said good communication between law enforcement and dispatch is imperative.

"We need to start looking at what we need to do to get these radios in these cars like KSP has so that everyone has good communication, and see what the cost will be," Miles said. "We've got to get the cost on it, and then get a cost on what it costs us to maintain our tower

sites, maintain our 911, and then see what kind of revenue we're bringing in now as opposed to other ways to bring it in now."

Also addressed during the meeting was the order in which calls are dispatched to first responders. At a previous Fiscal Court meeting, issues were mentioned concerning dispatch time to fire departments in the county.

"I think we've got a good relationship here with everybody," said Captain Tim Adams, Post Commander for KSP Post 3. "...As of late, I had a little disappointment...I really don't want to read issues in the paper... There were some specific issues that supposedly existed. We looked at it. We looked at those alleged issues. They're not there. I think some of the issues was maybe fire was dispatched after police. Jimmy (Kitchen) pulled stats. There were 80 fire calls that we looked at from January to present. Out of those, and this is off the top of my head, like 80% of those were dispatched in less than like one minute after police. All of them were dispatched less than five minutes. "

"On a personal level, if there's an issue with the way we do business, I'm the post commander," Captain Adams continued. "...If there's a problem with the way we do it, come to me. Don't try to make a mockery out of what we're doing

for the county of Hart County. I don't appreciate it...Our goal is just to provide the best service we can. We're in all eight counties in our post area doing different things, and that's just our goal, to provide the best service. If there are issues with our service, just let us know and we'll work through those."

Kitchen provided the stats in relation to what Captain Adams had stated.

"Of the Hart County injury accidents, the ones that we've gotten the complaints on, 50% of those calls that were dispatched, which is 29 total calls, and this is January 1 through June 20, 50% of those calls were dispatched within on minute," Kitchens said. "Twenty-three of those calls, which is the remaining 39%, were dispatched in less than two minutes. Four of those calls were less than 3,

one of those calls were less than 4, and one of those calls were less than 5."

McDaniels added that he had asked Kitchens to look into the CADs on particular incidents that were previously addressed.

"I know there is an issue where the fire has asked if we've got an injury accident if they can be knocked out at the same time as the ambulance service because of the fact the ambulance service is always there and the fire department volunteers are not staged at the fire department," McDaniel said. "Sometimes three to five minutes is a big deal of trying to get ahead...I think sometimes there's a miscommunication between us and our expectations of dispatch. When we may not have a directive to them of what we want them to do...we need to try to discuss expecta-

tions." Judge Choate added that conflicts sometimes arise because of the passion that lies within the first responders.

"One thing I've learned about emergency service is we have a lot of people who are passionate about what they do," Judge Choate said. "They're serious about it, and I'm glad we've got that issue. When we're really passionate about things, things get bigger than they really are, but I like that we're all coming together. As we move into the future, if there's an issue, let's hit it quick. Let's hit it quick and talk about it. But I'm thankful for everybody we got. We have some great first responders, and they're passionate about what they do."

The plan is to possibly have another 911 Advisory Council meeting in the spring of next year.

The proposed rates are required under the terms of an agreement between Green River Valley Water District and RD. KRS 278.023 does not grant the Public Service Commission any discretionary authority to modify or reject any portion of the agreement between Green River Valley Water District and RD, or to defer the issuance of all necessary orders to implement the terms of the agreement.

The proceeds of the RD loan and grant will be used to expand the capacity of Green River Valley Water District's water treatment plant from six million gallons per day to eight million gallons per day, to construct the following improvements: a new river water intake on the Green River for the water treatment plant, a secondary raw water pump station to pump water from Rio Verde Spring, a new chlorine building and feed equipment, two new two-staged flocculation basins and two sedimentation basins, two filters, and a 1,200,000 gallon clearwell. They will also be used for yard piping improvements, refurbishing an existing laboratory, and acquiring and installing a new SCADA system for the water treatment plant and water distribution system.
