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This Week at the State Capitol

The biggest issue of the General Assembly's 2021 session advanced this week as the Senate and House approved a budget to guide spending in the upcoming fiscal year.

The recent work on a one-year budget was unusual because lawmakers normally craft budgets that cover two-year cycles. But with the pandemic spreading at the time budget negotiations were occurring last year, lawmakers decided to limit themselves to making a one-year spending plan at that time so that they could return this year and handle next year's budget. The thinking was that the economic uncertainty caused by the pandemic would make it difficult to make revenue projections two years in advance.

The state spending plan lawmakers approved this week is largely a continuation budget, with some modifications. Steps to strengthen the budget's structural integrity are key features of the spending plan, according

to its supporters. As part of this effort, lawmakers plan to add more money to the state's budget reserve trust fund - better known as the "rainy day" fund. By raising the rainy day fund's balance to \$956 million, the state would have a reserve to cover the cost of emergency operations for 29 days rather than the 10-14 days that could be covered by the current reserve.

Lawmakers also took steps to ensure road funding goes toward road projects, as intended by the state constitution. Supporters of the measure say this will allow an extra \$58 million in funding to go into Kentucky's Road Fund instead of being siphoned off for other matters so that state will be in a better position to help transportation projects move forward.

The budget lawmakers approved also stripped an accounting maneuver that recouped the last payroll of a fiscal year in the upcoming year's ledgers. This caused state employees to be

paid slightly late once a year. By ending that practice, lawmakers signaled that the state will make payroll payments in the year they are due.

Besides the budget, many other pieces of legislation were approved and sent to the governor's desk this week. Bills that received final passage by the General Assembly included measures on the following topics:

Diabetes: House Bill 95 is aimed at helping those with diabetes by capping co-sharing requirements for prescription insulin at \$30 per 30-day supply in state-regulated health plans.

Crime: House Bill 126 would increase the threshold of felony law, stealing anything worth \$500 or more is a felony.

Commission on race and opportunity: Senate Bill 10 would create a Commission on Race and Access to Opportunity in the legislative branch. The commission would conduct studies

and research on issues where disparities may exist in areas including educational equity, child welfare, health, economic opportunity, juvenile justice, and criminal justice.

Workers safety: House Bill 475 would prohibit the Kentucky Occupational Safety and Health Standards Board or the secretary from adopting or enforcing any occupational safety and health administrative regulation that is more stringent than the corresponding federal provision.

Newborn safety: House Bill 150 would allow the use of a "newborn safety device" when a newborn is being transported by a participating police station, fire station, or hospital. The device would allow a parent transporting an infant to do so safely using a receptacle that would trigger an alarm once a medical care provider could immediately respond and provide

care to the child.

Peace officers: Senate Bill 80 would strengthen the police certification process by expanding the number of acts considered professional wrongdoing. Such acts would include unjustified use of excessive or deadly force and engaging in a sexual relationship with a victim. The bill also would require an officer to intervene when another officer is engaging in the use of unlawful and unjustified excessive or deadly force. It would also set up a system for an officer's automatic decertification under certain circumstances and would prevent an officer from avoiding decertification by resigning before an internal investigation is complete.

Broadband: House Bill 320 would expand broadband internet service to underserved areas with \$250 million for the broadband deployment fund. The bill would also reduce barriers for electric cooperatives to offer the service.

Vaccinations: Senate Bill 8 states that any child, emancipated minor, or adult would not be subject to mandatory vaccination if he or she or the parent or guardian submits a written sworn statement objecting to the immunization based on conscientiously held beliefs, religious beliefs or medical reasons.

Lawmakers are now in the veto review, the period of time in which they return to their home districts while waiting to see if the governor issues any vetoes. Once that time period runs out, lawmakers will return to the Capitol for the final two days of the session, March 29 and 30, and will consider whether or not to override any vetoes.

Spring Calves Bring Rush of Management Duties for Farmers

Driving around rural Kentucky in spring brings sights of new calves in the pastures. For cattle producers, it signals a new cycle of management on the farm. University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, Food and Environment beef specialist Les Anderson said there's a lot to remember to ensure healthy calves and to successfully rebreed cows.

"You need to observe spring calves closely and check them at least twice a day and check your first-calf heifers even more than that," he said. "Be ready to assist those heifers after one to two hours of hard labor or 90 minutes after the 'water bag' is visible. Be prepared to dry and warm chilled calves as soon as possible." Each calf should get colostrum within an hour of birth. It's also important to begin

to identify calves with ear tags or tattoo while they are still young and easy to handle. Record the birthdate and the dam ID. Anderson said that commercial male calves need to be castrated and implanted as soon as possible and producers should weigh registered calves within the first 24 hours of birth.

"Go ahead and separate cows that have calved and increase their feed," he said. "Supplemental energy is important for cows receiving hay to prepare them for rebreeding." A 1,250-pound cow giving about 25 pounds of milk per day will need about 25 pounds of fescue hay and 5 pounds of concentrate daily to maintain good condition. "If you need to go from a condition score of 4 to 5, you will need to add an additional 2 pounds of concentrate to support that cow," Anderson said. "Cows have to be in good condition to conceive early in the

upcoming breeding season." Calf hours is something to keep watch for in the herd. If scours becomes a problem, producers will need to move cows that have not calved to a clean pasture. "We've had a lot of rain this year, and that means a lot of mud," Anderson said. "You need to avoid feeding hay in excessively muddy areas to avoid contaminating the cows' udders."

Calves with scours may become dehydrated and will need fluids to reverse the situation. Producers can consult their veterinarians and send fecal samples to the UK Veterinary Diagnostic Lab to determine the most effective drug therapy. Producers should plan to vaccinate calves for clostridial diseases like blackleg and malignant edema as soon as possible. It's also a good time to get yearling measurements on bulls and heifers if necessary, for special sales. Producers may

need to increase bulls' feed to increase their conditioning for breeding or order semen if they plan to use artificial insemination.
