Hazel Green Had Flour Mill As Recently As 1938

HAZEL GREEN, Ky., Jan. 11—As recently as 1938 Hazel Green had its own flour mill, grist mill and saw mill. All three were built under the same roof by Monroe Russell around 1930. He operated the mill until his death in December 1938.

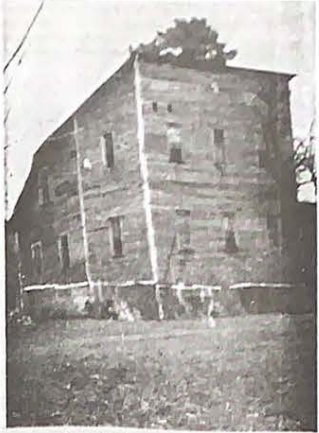
He had a flour and grist mill at the end of Johnson Street here before he built the last mill he operated on State Street. Part of the building to his first mill still stands and has been converted into a garage.

People from throughout the community brought their corn and wheat to Hazel Green to be ground. Not much wheat was grown around here so Russell usually bought the wheat and ground it into flour which he sold to the farmers.

When the grinding season was slack, he operated his saw mill, shaping up timber for the land owners or purchasing a tract of timber and sawing it to sell.

On December 8, 1938, Russell was working on the engine at the mill while it was in operation and his clothing caught on the fly wheel. He was injured internally and only lived a few days thereafter.

His widow sold the machinery. The building still stands and is now used to store tobacco in for curing.

First-Half Scoring Outburst Propels Football to 31-14 Win Saturday

Quarterback Mark Pappas and wide receiver BJ Byrd connected for two touchdowns, while Pappas added a third through the air, and Morehead State football made a 28-7 halftime lead stand up Saturday as the Eagles ousted Stetson 31-14 in the 2021 spring home opener at Jayne Stadium. The Eagles moved to 1-2. Running back Isaiah Agüero also had a big day, rushing for season-high 86 yards and a touchdown on 20 totes. Without Thomas Campbell-Clay piled up a career-best 96 receiving yards on six catches and his first career touchdown.

HOW IT HAPPENED

Stetson actually got on the scoreboard first before the next 28 points were scored by the home team. With 4:39 left in the first quarter, Campbell-Clay ended an eight-play, 68-yard drive with a two-yard score from Pappas. Frye picked off a pass at the Stetson 33-yard line and nearly took it for a pick six. He was downed at the one, but

Agüero punched it in on the next play to make it 14-7.

Two second-quarter TDs from Byrd highlighted the 28-7 halftime lead. The first came on a six-yard strike with 6:49 left. The second came on a nine-yard connection after Barrett's interception at the Hatter 45 yard line that he returned to the 28. Piccirilli scored on an 11-yard run in the third quarter. Kicker Andrew Pos-

ter finished off the scoring with a 27-yard field goal with 1:07 left in the third period.

The Eagles had a season-high 16 first downs. MSU was 8-of-15 on third down chances and was 4-of-5 in the red zone.

ply. It applies to state-regulated, comprehensive, private health insurance plans and the Kentucky employee health plan. It does not apply to Medicaid, Medicaid, or self-funded health plans.

For too long, the high cost of insulin has caused patients to ration their supply, resulting in a loss of life. Others have had to make desperate financial decisions to maintain their access to their insulin. Kentucky ranks eighth in the nation in diabetes prevalence and is the fifth highest state in diabetes-related deaths. Between 2000 and 2018, the percentage of Kentuckians diagnosed with diabetes doubled. Diabetes can be associated with heart failure, stroke, blindness, and more.

Senate Bill (SB) 8 provides for opting out of mandatory vaccinations for people with religious or conscientiously held beliefs. The bill maintains employer immunization policies for employees of schools, universities, and health care organizations.

House Joint Resolution 77 extends certain COVID-19 and regulations an additional 60 days. This joint resolution, which can carry the force of

law, will be effective only if the court ultimately rules in favor of the legislature on pending litigation. The Governor is challenging HR 1 and SBs 1 and 2. Those three bills, if upheld, provide the legislature a seat at the table as life-altering executive decisions are made. It is worth noting that Kentucky is the exception to the rule regarding executive authority during a state of emergency. The bills being challenged by the Governor would merely bring Kentucky more in line with other states in regards to oversight of executive authority during times like these.

Some progress has been made at reaching a compromise on Senate Bill 75. This bill would create a pilot project within the Kentucky Mountain Regional Recreational Authority (KMRA) counties to permit limited use of ATVs on certain public roadways. I anticipate that a version of SB 75 will emerge from the General Assembly in the last two days of the session. This legislation is desperately needed in Eastern Kentucky for the development of the trail system.

New strain of the virus at East Ky. nursing home shows risk of variants

But also shows the effectiveness of getting Corona vaccinations

March 16 — An outbreak of COVID-19 in an Eastern Kentucky nursing home shows the risk of new variants of the virus, but also the power of vaccines to prevent serious illness and hospitalizations from the disease.

That was the dual message from Gov. Andy Beshear's March 16 briefing. After announcing that there had been an outbreak in a nursing home and saying "We believe we have detected a new variant here in Kentucky," the governor turned to the health commissioner Steven Stack for details and lessons.

Stack said the nursing home has 27 residents and 14 staff who have tested positive for novel coronavirus, after 85% of its residents and 48% of its staff had been vaccinated.

Only 30% of those who had been vaccinated showed symptoms, but 83% of the unvaccinated did, showing that

the vaccines "markedly reduced symptomatic disease," Stack said. He added, "It appears that an unvaccinated person brought Covid-19 into the nursing facility."

Five residents, including one who had been vaccinated, have been hospitalized, Stack said. "Here too, the vaccination appears to have markedly reduced the risk of serious infection and hospitalization."

Put another way, only one of the 71 vaccinated people is hospitalized, while four of the 13 unvaccinated are.

Stack said genetic mapping of the variant strain found in the nursing home is continuing, but "It looks like it's the same infection in a group of individuals."

He said it will be compared with other variants around the country to "see if we can find any patterns or lessons we need to learn here."

Stack did not identify the nursing home, beyond saying it was in the eastern part of the state, but the state's daily report on long-term-care facilities shows that the one with by far the largest number of cases is Life Care Center of Morehead,

with 22 active cases and 45 total cases. No other facility in the eastern third of the state has more than eight active cases, and the one with that number has none among its staff.

Stack did not say the variant was more contagious, like one that was first identified in the United Kingdom and is expected to become dominant in the U.S. But he said the presence of a new variant does not reduce the risk of producing more variants by allowing more infections to happen.

"We have to be very attentive about this, because the more opportunities we allow the virus to spread, the more people get infected, the more opportunity it has to mutate and create more variants, some of which will be more dangerous," he said.

"The important news going forward is that everybody's got to continue to get vaccinated as soon as you're able to and eligible, and continue practicing those public-health measures we keep reminding people of," such as masking, social distancing, avoiding crowds and good hand hygiene.

Spring calves bring rush of management duties for producers in the state

Driving around rural Kentucky in spring brings sights of new calves in the pastures. For cattle producers, it signals a new cycle of management on the farm.

University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, Food and Environment beef specialist Les Anderson said there's a lot to remember to ensure healthy calves and to successfully rebreed cows.

"You need to observe spring calves closely and check them at least twice a day and check your first-calf heifers even more than that," he said. "Be ready to assist those heifers after one to two hours of hard labor or 90 minutes after the 'water bag' is visible. Be prepared to dry and warm chilled calves as soon as possible." Each calf should get colostrum within an hour of birth. It's also im-

portant to begin to identify calves with ear tags or tattoos while they are still young and easy to handle. Record the birthdate and the dam ID. Anderson said that commercial male calves need to be castrated and implanted as soon as possible and producers should weigh registered calves within the first 24 hours of birth.

"Go ahead and separate cows that have calved and increase their feed," he said. "Supplemental energy is important for cows receiving hay to prepare them for rebreeding."

A 1,250-pound cow giving about 25 pounds of milk per day will need about 25 pounds of fescue hay and 5 pounds of concentrate daily to maintain good condition.

"If you need to go from a condition score of 4 to 5, you will need to add an ad-

ditional 2 pounds of concentrate to support that cow," Anderson said. "Cows have to be in good condition to conceive early in the upcoming breeding season."

Calf scours is something to keep watch for in the herd. If scours becomes a problem, producers will need to move cows that have not calved to a clean pasture.

"We've had a lot of rain this year, and that means a lot of mud," Anderson said. "You need to avoid feeding hay in excessively muddy areas to avoid contaminating the cows' udders." Calves with scours may become dehydrated and will need fluids to reverse the situation. Producers can consult their veterinarians and send fecal samples to the UK Veterinary Diagnostic Lab to determine the

most effective drug therapy. Producers should plan to vaccinate calves for clostridial diseases like blackleg and malignant edema as soon as possible. It's also a good time to get yearling measurements on bulls and heifers if necessary, for special sales. Producers may need to increase bulls' feed to increase their conditioning for breeding or order semen if they plan to use artificial insemination.
