Ledbetter Water District hereby requests approval for a Purchased Water Adjustment. Pursuant to Case number 2018-00414, Crittenden-Livingston Water District has raised the rate that it charges us for water. The old rate was \$3.08 per thousand gallons, and the new rate is \$3.34. Attached is the application form for the requested PWA. Also attached is the notice from Crittenden-Livingston regarding the rate increase, and the minutes showing approval of the PWA application by the Ledbetter Water District commissioners.

Ledbetter Water District published notice of the rate increase, according to PSC regulation, one time prior to rendering bills at the new rate.

During the twelve month period from June 1, 2020 to May 31, 2021, Ledbetter Water District purchased 32,074,300 gallons of water from Crittenden-Livingston Water District. During the same period Ledbetter also produced 45,552,000 gallons. Water sales to customers during the period were 54,835,781 gallons.

The PWA factor calculates to 0.152. In order to recover the full cost of the purchased water increase the PWA factor was rounded to 016. If you need more information please contact us.

The privilege and free-dom we have to share what is on our mind are liberties that have come at a great price and we should always remember the cost of

One of these residents is a man named Edward Hicks who willingly stepped forward when his country needed him the most. He was only 22 years old and had just married his lovely bride Mary Lou 4 months earlier. He received the call to join the front-line and bravely responded to what would be known around the world as 'Operation Overlord."

Edward and his com-Edward and his com-pany were assigned to six miles of beach that was code-named "Oma-ha" which has been recorded as one of the bloodlest first wave battles of Normandy. Only 600 men survived out of 2600 that came ashore. He recalls when he jumped out of the amphibious vehicle, how the water was up to his neck and icy cold. With being loaded down with full gear that was now water-logged, he said it was very difficult to keep from drown-ing. As bullets were splashing the water and whizzing past his head, all he knew to do was to stay as low as

possible. Using floating bodies as shields, he was numb with fear. As he slowly crawled upon the sand, he immediately began to dig a hole where he dig a hole where he could partially avoid the onslaught of constant machine gunfire Somehow throughout the day and thankfulness. ly with the Germans running out of ammu nition, the small group managed to slowly make their way inland, and went on to accom plish the mission. Edward received several medals for bravery including a silver star and 4 bronze stars but there is much more to being a hero than human fortitude and earning awards. It is recognizing the depth of spiritual love. The love that Jesus demonstrated on the cross is strated on the cross is the type of compassion that inspires individu-als to love and protect others as much as they love themselves. John 15:13 reminds us that, "Greater love bath no "Greater love hath no man than this, that a

PRINCETON, Ky. - Grain crop producers can learn ways to min-imize potential grow-ing season challenges during the University of Kentucky's Pest Management Field Day. The event is from 8:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. CDT June 29 at the UK Research and Educa-tion Center in Prince-

ton. "The field day will give participants insight into the latest research being con-ducted by University of Kentucky specialists," said Travis Legleiter, UK weed scientist and field day organizer. "This ongoing research provides the basis for our recommendations for weed, disease and insect management on Kentucky corn, soybean and wheat acres." Legleiter's research that focuses on herbicide-resistant weeds including Palmer amaranth, johnsongrass, water hemp and Italian ryvegrass is Kentucky specialists.

Miscellaneous Business:


Alan said that they had rated the engineering companies last month. This month they will need to show in the minutes which company we will accept.


Arnie made a motion to accept the contract proposal with Rivercrest Engineering. Bill seconds the motion. All were in favor, none opposed. Motion carries.
