NORTHERN KENTUCKY HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL

Tornado relief brings Beechwood, Mayfield together before final

Mayfield is a small town in the southwestern corner of Kentucky located near the state's border with Missouri and more than 320 miles away from Beechwood High School.

The communities of both Beechwood and Mayfield high schools would have no reason to interact except for several occasions in recent years when one football team would travel to the other for a big playoff game.

But when tornadoes devastated Mayfield and other western Kentucky cities a year ago, on Dec. 10, 2021, the Beechwood community became one with their far-away rivals.

The kinship will be in the spotlight when the teams meet for the Kentucky High School Athletic Association Class 2A football championship 4 p.m. Friday at the University of Kentucky's Kroger Field.

"It's pretty amazing when you consider everything that happened about a year ago," said Brad Ratliff, a former Beechwood player and 1997 graduate. "There's a ton of respect of both sides for each other. A lot of people I've talked to feel it's amazing that it's worked out the way it did and they're going to do it for the state championship."

Ratliff was one of several members of the Beechwood community who delivered supplies to Mayfield and surrounding areas in the days after the tornadoes struck. Ratliff, the vice president of operations at Lighthouse Transportation, organized a donation drive. He originally loaned Beechwood one 53-foot trailer truck to deliver supplies.

However, the interest from the community resulted in six trucks going to Mayfield. The gym at Mayfield High School, which was untouched by the storms, was the home base for the supplies.

"It's a huge outpouring, more than we could have ever dreamed of, not just in the Beechwood community but cities all over Northern Kentucky," Ratliff said. "Monetary donations, the community members really stepped up. We didn't go in the office that week at all, we were going 12-14 hours a day all week, organizing the donations."

Beechwood principal Justin Kaiser and superintendent Dr. Mike Stacy were among Beechwood leaders who also made the trip.

Mark Talley, who is part of Beechwood's radio broadcasting team, travels to Mayfield on business and has a strong affinity for the town.

"They had a lot of stuff in the school gym," he said. "It was all being used. There were a lot of people in lines getting food, paper towels, clothes. They didn't have anything. Brad really did an amazing job."

Nobody was prepared for the devastation they saw. "It's a beautiful town that had these beautiful trees around downtown and a historic courthouse," Talley said. "The trees are all gone. There were stumps sticking out of the ground. All the homes were blown around for blocks and blocks."

Said Ratliff: "Nothing like I've ever seen before and hopefully I don't see again. Square block after square block was completely leveled to the ground. This team is a testament to the strength of their community that the football team is 14-0 after everything they've gone through. They've obviously rallied and pulled themselves together. It's great to see."

Beechwood head coach Noel Raah has a long relationship with Mayfield head coach Joe Morris, and they have gone against each other several times.

"I think it's an amazing accomplishment what Joe Morris and his staff has done, what their kids have done," Raah said. "I don't know what they're going home to. They're still living that nightmare and it's amazing what they've been able to accomplish."

Whoever scores more points Friday and takes home the championship trophy, Talley said the real victory will be the communities coming together again.

"You've got two of the best small school football programs in the state of Kentucky," Talley said. "Two great coaches. Two great communities. And it's fun. Those people are fantastic. I love that area. It's perfect that we're playing them. They're the program we probably respect more than any other school because of our long history playing against each other."

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A look at the Beechwood vs. Mayfield Class 2A football state final matchup

The Kentucky Class 2A state championship is a clash of two of the most accomplished programs in the state.

Beechwood has 16 state championships all-time, ranked third in the KHSAA record books, including the last two titles in Class 2A. Mayfield has 12 all-time, ranked fifth, and is second all-time in Kentucky history with 933 wins.

Mayfield is 12-12 all-time in state finals, and Beechwood, 16-5. Raah has seven of those championships and is 7-1 in state finals. Mayfield head coach Joe Morris is 6-6 in finals. Mayfield last won a title in 2015 and lost in the finals three straight seasons from 2017-19.

Beechwood and Mayfield have met twice before in the IA finals. Mayfield won both, 28-27 in 1995 and 14-7 in 2002. Mayfield was 8-0 all-time against Beechwood, all in the playoffs, until the Tigers prevailed 38-7 last year in the 2A semifinals in Fort Mitchell.

Mayfield running back Junior "Duke" Starks has rushed for 1,110 yards and 20 touchdowns on 121 carries, averaging 9.2 yards per carry. Starks had 183 yards and three TDs in the semifinals.

Zane Cartwright has thrown for 1,904 yards and 23 touchdowns. Isaac Stevenson and Brionne Dabney

have 36 catches apiece, combining for nearly 1,400 receiving yards and 17 touchdowns. Stevenson averages 22 yards per catch.

In last year's semifinal matchup, the Tigers overwhelmed the Cardinals, rushing for 345 yards. Mayfield rushed for 168 yards but Beechwood limited Cartwright to 16 yards passing.

Press defense will be key as Mayfield is one of the top passing attacks the Tigers have faced this season.

The matchup could put Antonio Robinson Jr. in the spotlight. The Beechwood senior, who moved in from Florida over the summer, is a Wake Forest commit currently ranked as the top defensive back in Kentucky and 39th in the nation by 247Sports.com.

Robinson has two of Beechwood's 22 interceptions, and senior Carson Craycraft seven, including two pick-sixes. The Tigers have 372 yards in interception returns, about 37 percent of the total passing yards they have allowed (1,013).

The Mayfield defense has four shutouts and three other games giving up one touchdown. The defense has 17 interceptions.

Clay Hayten has thrown for 1,706 yards and 20 touchdowns in just nine games in his first year replacing four-year starter Cam Hergott at quarterback. Sophomore Chase Flaherty has rushed for 653 yards and 18 touchdowns, most in the postseason. Robinson and Liam McCormack have been the top receivers.

Beechwood has stifled potential offenses all season, the lone exception being SA power Covington Catholic in a 31-14 loss to the Colonels. Evan Pitzerer threw for 156 yards for CovCath, and Owen Leen rushed for 150 in that game.

Beechwood has only allowed two 100-yard passers and one 100-yard rusher in the rest of the schedule.

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Court rejects bid to restore federal student debt plan

The Biden administration's student loan forgiveness plan remains stalled, after the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals refused to lift an order blocking the sweeping program.

Wednesday's ruling by a three-judge panel of the New Orleans-based court is the latest blow to a plan that has been shadowed by legal doubt since Biden announced it in August. The decision left in force a ruling from a federal judge in Texas declaring the program unlawful.

The debt relief program is facing potentially months of additional uncertainty as action now moves to the Supreme Court. The administration is already asking the conservative-majority court to lift a separate order blocking the program in a suit filed by six Republican-led states.

"We are confident in our legal authority to carry out the student debt relief program and will be taking this fight to the Supreme Court as well," said White House spokesman Abdullah Hasan.

"Republican officials and special interests are

trying to rob middle-class families of the relief they need and deserve, but the president doesn't back down from a fight, especially one for middle-class families."

Both sides in that case have suggested the high court might hear arguments on a fast-track basis in February, putting the matter on course for a definitive ruling by June at the latest. The administration has previously said it would also ask the Supreme Court to lift the Texas order if the 5th Circuit declined to intervene, as happened Wednesday.

Court orders across multiple lawsuits have blocked the distribution of any debt relief under the plan since late October. The government has ceased collecting applications for it while the legal battles proceed.

The biggest issue for opponents has been establishing standing to sue — that is, showing they are being directly harmed by the policy.

Wednesday's order comes in a case brought by the Job Creators Network Foundation, a conservative advocacy group, on behalf of two Texas borrowers who claim that their education debt was

unfairly excluded from the program. A federal district judge appointed by former President Donald Trump agreed, saying the borrowers "have a concrete interest in having their debts forgiven to a greater degree."

In a separate lawsuit, six GOP-led states are asking the Supreme Court to keep the plan on hold while their legal challenge moves through the courts. State officials argue that the president overstepped his authority by authorizing the program without congressional approval and that it will negatively impact local loan servicers.

The 8th US Circuit Court of Appeals said the states had standing because of the impact on a Missouri loan servicer that has financial ties to that state's treasury.

The plan would forgive as much as \$20,000 in federal student loans for eligible borrowers earning less than \$125,000 per year or \$250,000 for households. About 26 million people had requested forgiveness before the Department of Education stopped accepting applications.

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In addition to guaranteeing that girls have confidential access to their attorneys, DiLoreto also recommended the state look at further limiting the use of pretrial detention and detention for contempt of court.

"In this COVID time, the visits with family are already so limited," she said. Well, if instead, a kid is four hours from home, that's not going to happen."

More significant changes to the juvenile detention system in Kentucky could be announced as early as next week, Beshear said.

left DJJ staff members injured.

Rebecca Ballard DiLoreto, an attorney and long-time child advocate, said she sees some potential positives from the move, including the opportunity to hire a primarily female staff and reduce the number of adult males who have contact with the girls.

A 2021 Herald-Leader investigation found two separate incidents of male youth workers escorting girls to the shower room and waiting at the door despite their protests and in violation of department policy.

But in addition to raising concerns about where transgender youth will be held, DiLoreto cautioned that separating males and females could provide a "false sense of security." "If you talk about sexual abuse, you're talking about a power play rather than desire," she said. "That can and has likely happened male-on-male or female-on-female. ... So it's critical not to assume this removes those concerns."

Beshear said during the press conference that changes must also take place to ensure that DJJ staff remains safe and that the department is able to recruit workers. "The model that we've
