spokeswoman Alyssia Oshodi called the decision a "key step in CenterPoint Energy's long-term electric generation transition plan."

Area activist groups feel different.

Organizations such as Energy for All and the Citizens Action Coalition called the turbines "outrageous" and "unneeded."

"Natural gas has proven to not be affordable or have a reliable or stable price, as we all learned the hard way from our bills during the last heating season," representatives from Direct Action Against CenterPoint Energy, a ratepayer advocacy group, wrote in a statement. "We need to spend our money wisely on renewable generation that is not tied to unpredictable and speculative fuel markets."

CenterPoint has claimed the turbines will add anywhere from \$10 to \$23 to a typical monthly bill. But that could

The IURC hasn't officially approved a rate increase, and the cost of the project has already fluctuated, climbing from \$323 million when it was first submitted to \$334 million the day it was approved.

Water and sewer

Average water bills for city residents have spiked by about 58 percent in the last five years, the Courier & Press found.

In 2017, a person using 5,000 gallons a month would have paid \$30.53. By 2022, that had climbed to \$48.28.

City sewer residents, meanwhile, have watched their bills rise by 32 percent - largely due to the decades-long effort to eliminate combined sewer overflows in Evansville's aging infrastruc-

County residents, who pay higher sewer rates already, have seen about a 37 percent jump.

And just like with CenterPoint, those increases will continue.

Earlier this year, the Evansville Water

& Sewer Utility got the IURC's approval to build a \$220 million water treatment plant to replace one that was first built in the 1890s.

That's expected to increase the average user's bill by about \$11 a month between now and 2026.

The Evansville City Council approved the use of American Rescue Plan dollars to partially offset that cost. Households that bring in less than \$30,000 a year will get a \$10 credit, while those who make between \$30,000 and \$50,000 will receive \$3 a month.

Despite their approval, several city councilors criticized those small dollar amounts of assistance.

"You can't even get a full gallon of gas for \$3 a month," councilor Missy Mosby said.

Gas

As of Tuesday, AAA listed the average price for a gallon of gas in Vanderburgh County at \$4.54. That's a dip from last week, when it stood at \$4.80. And it's much different from a year ago, when it hovered around \$3.10.

Still, that's a (very) relative bargain compared to other locales. The statewide average in Indiana was about \$4.70, down slightly from last week's mark of \$4.93. Last month, it surpassed

California residents were paying the most, at \$6 a gallon.

Food

Compared to last year, Evansville residents - and all Americans - are paying a lot more for food as well.

According to the U.S. Consumer Price Index, the cost of "food at home" – items bought at a grocery store – ballooned by 11.9 percent last month compared to May

Restaurant items went up too, albeit slightly less. "Food away from home" rose by 7.4 percent compared to the same period last year.

Newburgh native hits big screen in 'Stranger Things'

Jerri Tubbs knew she wanted to be an actress since her first play in kindergar ten, when she played a mother hen.

"I just thought it was super cool that I could do stuff and like people would clap," Tubbs said.



Since then, the Newburgh native has made appearances in Walking Dead," "Stranger "Ozark," and Things," now the new film "Where the Crawdads Sing," which opened Friday. In between, she spends her

time teaching acting to the next genera-

She grew up attending St. John the Baptist Catholic School, and then Reitz High School her freshman year. There she did theater and played basketball.

"You can actually audition 100 or 1,000 times and maybe book one job or two jobs or five jobs. There's no rhyme or reason to it."

Then she moved to California to live with her mother.

"I think it wasn't really until I moved to California where I actually thought, 'OK, how can I make a living at this?'" Tubbs said.

From Reitz to 'Y'allwood'

After high school, she went to San Jose State University for her bachelors in theater arts then UCLA for her mas-

ters in acting. She then spent 12 years in Los Angeles doing theater and small roles in music videos an independent productions.

"It was virtually impossible to even get an audition to be in television and film," she said.

She then decided to move to Atlanta, which has become a movie and TV juggernaut over the past years so much so that it earned the moniker,"Y'allywood."

From there, her career took off. Tubbs had been in Georgia for eight months when she booked her guest star

role in the AMC drama, "Into the Bad-

"I've been doing this for since I was about 5. It has literally taken me that long in order to actually start working in television and film," Tubbs said. "So, when I when I booked that within eight months of being here, I thought, 'oh my god, like I can actually do this."

She said her agency, Atlanta Models and Talent, sends her info on a role and when to audition. She then shows up hopes for a call-back.

"You can actually audition 100 or 1,000 times and maybe book one job or two jobs or five jobs," she said. "There's no rhyme or reason to it."

'Stranger Things'

The Netflix show "Stranger Things" came not long after. She played Diane, the estranged wife of Sheriff Jim Hopper (David Harbour). During development, the show was just called "Untitled Montauk Project" and then "Untitled Duffer Brothers Project." She was originally told she would just appear as a photo, then maybe as a voice on the

But after speaking to the Duffer brothers, the part expanded, allowing her to appear in flashbacks.

"Stranger Things" is set in the 1980s, around the time Tubbs was growing up in Newburgh.

"I literally looked like my mom looked back in Newburgh, back in like the late '70s, early '80s," Tubbs said. "Same hair, same makeup. I had this red leather coat I remember she used

Tubbs recalls shooting a scene in season one where Hopper is on the phone with her character and she was behind the camera, wearing a microphone and watching him act out the

"It was just cool just to be there and watch him do his thing," she said of Harbour. "I mean, because he's amazing and every time he did it, it would be slightly different," Tubbs said.

She's since reappeared in the newest season during a flashback, which she didn't know was going to happen.

'The Walking Dead'

A few year after her appearance on

"Stranger Things," she appeared in a few episodes of the 10th season of the zombie hit "The Walking Dead."

She was nervous to be on set with an entire cast and crew that had been there since the beginning of the show. She said for her first scene, the director told her she could do her thing and they would follow her.

"The entire crew and everybody actually gave me a round of applause and they welcomed me to set and I started crying," Tubbs said. "I said, 'I'm on the (expletive) Walking Dead' and everyone was just like, 'Yeah!' That was an incredible experience."

While her character was killed off she wishes she could go back and play Margo again.

"I feel the closest to who I am as a person," Tubbs said. "She was just, like, kick ass."

'Where the Crawdads Sing'

Her latest role is in the film "Where the Crawdads Sing," where she plays the mother of a boy who is murdered.

'That was my first experience doing a courtroom scene, and I was acting opposite this amazing actor, David Strathairn," Tubbs said. "That to me was just like, incredible."

The film was produced by Reese Witherspoon's company. And it stood out to her that the director and director of photography were women.

"A lot of the heads of the crew and stuff were women and that was awesome," she said.

Teaching

When Tubbs isn't acting, she's teaching at Drama Inc. in Atlanta.

"I had no desire to teach (befre)," Tubbs said. "But I was able to teach because it was a good job while I was pursuing acting.'

Tubbs teaches Chubbuck technique: a way of breaking down a role and getting to know it well. Ivana Chubbuck was Tubb's acting coach in Hollywood. When Tubbs moved to Atlanta, she asked her to teach the meth-

"It's cool to see other actors once they start to understand it and get it and apply it. How it changes their work," she said.

Since being an actress can be unpredictable, it's been important to have a day job.

"Something that pays you enough, where you don't have to stress about money and still have it be flexible," she said. "Because if you book a job, at the last minute, you need to be ready. It's a total balancing act."

While she lives in Atlanta she does ake an appearance in Newburgh ev ery now an then for family reunions.

"I have a big family," she said. "They're all still kind of in that area."



COVID-19 Numbers On The Rise In Many Kentucky Counties

By Tom Latek Kentucky Today

While the number of COVID-19 related deaths in Kentucky dropped, most of the other metrics continue to increase, as the pandemic continues.

Forty-nine new deaths appear in the data released Monday, which is down from the 62 from the previous week. That is still well above the 38 and 30 respectively from the two previous reports and brings Kentucky's pandemic total to 16,293.

There were also 12,798 new COVID cases reported to state public health officials. That was 1,849 higher than the previous week's 10,949, which was 758 more than on the report released on July 5. The have now been 1,432,660 cases, since the first one was confirmed on March 6, 2020. That also represents nearly 32% of Kentucky's population, according to the 2020 census.

Thirty-one of Kentucky's 120 counties reported 100 or more new cases in the July 18 report, one more than last week.

The top 10 counties were: Jefferson 2,297, Fayette 766, Hardin 370, Warren 347, Daviess 329, Kenton 326, Boone 288, Madison 205, Campbell 204, and Pike 187.

Kentucky's current positivity rate is 17.7%, an increase of 0.74%from last week's 16.96%. The two weeks before that were 15.75% and 13.36% respectively.

"All active variants in Kentucky continue to be Omicron variants," said state Public Health Commissioner Dr. Steven Stack. "BA.5 has become the predominant variant nationwide at about 65% of the total COVID sequenced, and Kentucky is seeing a similar pattern. BA.5 does not appear to cause increased hospitalization or death, but it is causing more reinfections because previous strains confer less immunity to BA.5."

The hospital census also shows an increase in patients. A total of 587 Kentuckians are currently hospitalized. Of them, 78 are in the ICU and

18 are on a ventilator. Last week the numbers were 483 in the hospital, 72 in ICU and 28 on a ventilator.

The latest weekly COVID Community Level map, which accompanies this story, shows many more counties are in the red (high level), or yellow (medium level) than the number in the green for low level.

The CDC says a new study found second boosters can restore vaccine protection against hospitalization that might have dropped over time. Everyone 50 and older and those between 12 and 50 with a weakened immune system are urged to get the second booster.


