spokeswoman Alyssia Oshodi called the decision a “key step in CenterPoint Energy’s long-term electric generation transition plan.”

Area activist groups feel different. Organizations such as Energy for All and the Citizens Action Coalition called the turbines “outrageous” and “unnecessary.”

“Natural gas has proven to not be affordable or have a reliable or stable price, as we all learned the hard way from our bills during the last heating season,” representatives from Direct Action Against CenterPoint Energy, a ratepayer advocacy group, wrote in a statement. “We need to spend our money wisely on renewable generation that is not tied to unpredictable and speculative fuel markets.”

CenterPoint has claimed the turbines will add anywhere from \$10 to \$23 to a typical monthly bill. But that could

change.

The IURC hasn’t officially approved a rate increase, and the cost of the project has already fluctuated, climbing from \$323 million when it was first submitted to \$334 million the day it was approved.

## Water and sewer

Average water bills for city residents have spiked by about 58 percent in the last five years, the Courier & Press found.

In 2017, a person using 5,000 gallons a month would have paid \$30.53. By 2022, that had climbed to \$48.28.

City sewer residents, meanwhile, have watched their bills rise by 32 percent – largely due to the decades-long effort to eliminate combined sewer overflows in Evansville’s aging infrastructure.

County residents, who pay higher sewer rates already, have seen about a 37 percent jump.

And just like with CenterPoint, those increases will continue.

Earlier this year, the Evansville Water

& Sewer Utility got the IURC’s approval to build a \$220 million water treatment plant to replace one that was first built in the 1890s.

That’s expected to increase the average user’s bill by about \$11 a month between now and 2026.

The Evansville City Council approved the use of American Rescue Plan dollars to partially offset that cost. Households that bring in less than \$30,000 a year will get a \$10 credit, while those who make between \$30,000 and \$50,000 will receive \$3 a month.

Despite their approval, several city councilors criticized those small dollar amounts of assistance.

“You can’t even get a full gallon of gas for \$3 a month,” councilor Missy Mosby said.

## Gas

As of Tuesday, AAA listed the average price for a gallon of gas in Vanderburgh County at \$4.54. That’s a dip from last week, when it stood at \$4.80. And it’s

much different from a year ago, when it hovered around \$3.10.

Still, that’s a (very) relative bargain compared to other locales. The statewide average in Indiana was about \$4.70, down slightly from last week’s mark of \$4.93. Last month, it surpassed \$5.

California residents were paying the most, at \$6 a gallon.

## Food

Compared to last year, Evansville residents – and all Americans – are paying a lot more for food as well.

According to the U.S. Consumer Price Index, the cost of “food at home” – items bought at a grocery store – ballooned by 11.9 percent last month compared to May 2021.

Restaurant items went up too, albeit slightly less. “Food away from home” rose by 7.4 percent compared to the same period last year.

# Newburgh native hits big screen in ‘Stranger Things’

Jerri Tubbs knew she wanted to be an actress since her first play in kindergarten, when she played a mother hen.

“I just thought it was super cool that I could do stuff and like people would clap,” Tubbs said.

Since then, the Newburgh native has made appearances in “The Walking Dead,” “Stranger Things,” “Ozark,” and now the new film “Where the Crawdads Sing,” which opened Friday. In between, she spends her time teaching acting to the next generation.

She grew up attending St. John the Baptist Catholic School, and then Reitz High School her freshman year. There she did theater and played basketball.

Then she moved to California to live with her mother.

“I think it wasn’t really until I moved to California where I actually thought, ‘OK, how can I make a living at this?’” Tubbs said.

**From Reitz to ‘Y’allwood’**

After high school, she went to San Jose State University for her bachelors in theater arts then UCLA for her mas-

ters in acting. She then spent 12 years in Los Angeles doing theater and small roles in music videos an independent productions.

“It was virtually impossible to even get an audition to be in television and film,” she said.

She then decided to move to Atlanta, which has become a movie and TV juggernaut over the past years so much so that it earned the moniker, “Y’allywood.”

From there, her career took off. Tubbs had been in Georgia for eight months when she booked her guest star role in the AMC drama, “Into the Badlands.”

“I’ve been doing this for since I was about 5. It has literally taken me that long in order to actually start working in television and film,” Tubbs said. “So, when I when I booked that within eight months of being here, I thought, ‘oh my god, like I can actually do this.’”

She said her agency, Atlanta Models and Talent, sends her info on a role and when to audition. She then shows up hopes for a call-back.

“You can actually audition 100 or 1,000 times and maybe book one job or two jobs or five jobs,” she said. “There’s no rhyme or reason to it.”

**‘Stranger Things’**

The Netflix show “Stranger Things” came not long after. She played Diane, the estranged wife of Sheriff Jim Hopper (David Harbour). During development, the show was just called “Untitled Montauk Project” and then “Untitled Duffer Brothers Project.” She was originally told she would just appear as a photo, then maybe as a voice on the phone.

But after speaking to the Duffer brothers, the part expanded, allowing her to appear in flashbacks.

“Stranger Things” is set in the 1980s, around the time Tubbs was growing up in Newburgh.

“I literally looked like my mom looked back in Newburgh, back in like the late ‘70s, early ‘80s,” Tubbs said. “Same hair, same makeup. I had this red leather coat I remember she used to wear.”

Tubbs recalls shooting a scene in season one where Hopper is on the phone with her character and she was behind the camera, wearing a microphone and watching him act out the scene.

“It was just cool just to be there and watch him do his thing,” she said of Harbour. “I mean, because he’s amazing and every time he did it, it would be slightly different,” Tubbs said.

She’s since reappeared in the newest season during a flashback, which she didn’t know was going to happen.

**‘The Walking Dead’**

A few year after her appearance on

“Stranger Things,” she appeared in a few episodes of the 10th season of the zombie hit “The Walking Dead.”

She was nervous to be on set with an entire cast and crew that had been there since the beginning of the show. She said for her first scene, the director told her she could do her thing and they would follow her.

“The entire crew and everybody actually gave me a round of applause and they welcomed me to set and I started crying,” Tubbs said. “I said, ‘I’m on the (expletive) Walking Dead’ and everyone was just like, ‘Yeah!’ That was an incredible experience.”

While her character was killed off she wishes she could go back and play Margo again.

“I feel the closest to who I am as a person,” Tubbs said. “She was just, like, kick ass.”

**‘Where the Crawdads Sing’**

Her latest role is in the film “Where the Crawdads Sing,” where she plays the mother of a boy who is murdered.

“That was my first experience doing a courtroom scene, and I was acting opposite this amazing actor, David Strathairn,” Tubbs said. “That to me was just like, incredible.”

The film was produced by Reese Witherspoon’s company. And it stood out to her that the director and director of photography were women.

“A lot of the heads of the crew and stuff were women and that was awesome,” she said.

**Teaching**

When Tubbs isn’t acting, she’s teaching at Drama Inc. in Atlanta.

“I had no desire to teach (before),” Tubbs said. “But I was able to teach because it was a good job while I was pursuing acting.”

Tubbs teaches Chubbuck technique: a way of breaking down a role and getting to know it well. Ivana Chubbuck was Tubbs’s acting coach in Hollywood. When Tubbs moved to Atlanta, she asked her to teach the method.

“It’s cool to see other actors once they start to understand it and get it and apply it. How it changes their work,” she said.

Since being an actress can be unpredictable, it’s been important to have a day job.

“Something that pays you enough, where you don’t have to stress about money and still have it be flexible,” she said. “Because if you book a job, at the last minute, you need to be ready. It’s a total balancing act.”

While she lives in Atlanta she does make an appearance in Newburgh every now and then for family reunions.

“I have a big family,” she said. “They’re all still kind of in that area.”

After five years as the assistant athletic director at Webster County High School, Zack LaGrange has been promoted to AD for the school.

LaGrange was the assistant athletic director under long-time AD Matt Bell, who resigned in June to take a position with Caldwell County Schools as technology director. Bell served in the role for 12 years.

"I feel very blessed and honored to be named the new athletic director, and to get the opportunity to have an impact on our student athletes in the entire athletic program as a whole," he said. LaGrange has been the

football coach for the Trojans since the 2016 season. He will continue that role along with his new responsibilities. He said he wants to continue the tradition of making the players the central focus.

"It's always going to be about what's best for our kids, and to give them the best experience we can," he explained. "We want to make a connection with the community and to continue to grow."

Before leaving, Bell had started the process to add bass fishing as a new part of the athletic department. LaGrange stated that is still the plan for the upcoming season.

"We're taking it day by day," he said. "We want to offer every opportunity we can. If we can do it, then we're going to do it."

But adding new programs isn't the only thing LaGrange has in mind during his tenure.

"We can improve on every little thing we do," he said. "We're going to have a growth mindset in this department. There's facility upgrades, figuring out how to improve attendance, and bring in community engagement."

## Sebree to start new youth soccer league in the fall

Sign-ups set from 10 a.m. until noon Saturday

Young soccer players are getting a new league in Webster County.

Sign-ups for a fall season will be held Saturday from 10 a.m. until noon at the Tee-ball field concession stand at Sebree Springs Park. Registration will be

held at the same time as Tee-ball sign-ups. A second sign-up session is planned, but a date has yet to be set.

Registration fee will be \$30.00 per player. That covers the team t-shirt for the player, with the remainder being placed in a fund to purchase new goals and nets.

The league will be led by commissioner Caitlyn Tapp, who says she hopes the response will allow for several teams in each division.

"We don't have an

exact number of teams yet, but my hope is to have enough for three or four teams for each age group," she said.

Organizers are anticipating fielding teams for 3-4, 5-6, 7-8, and 9-11 year olds.

Games will be played at the campus of Sebree Elementary School, and Tapp believes they can play two games simultaneously. She added that it's possible a smaller field for the youngest players could be marked off for a third game.

"All practices and games will be in Sebree," she said, noting that the league is open to all comers regardless of where they live.

In addition to the shirt provided by the league, players will need soccer shorts, cleats, soccer socks, and shin guards. The colors of those items will not be mandated by the league, Tapp said. The cleats, however, must be designed specifically for soccer, she added.

"Cleats for baseball and softball tend to be sharper," she said. "Our first concern is for safety."

Games will begin after the start of the school year on August 16. The target dates for the first games are August 21 or 28, with the season wrapping up prior to fall break in Webster County.

"We hope to play for eight weeks," Tapp said. "Depending on how many teams we have, hopefully we'll play one game each Saturday

for each team. If we get more teams, one may play two games."

Tapp is no stranger to the game. She has played since she was five years old in Arkansas. After competing as part of a travel team, she started all four years in high school. She continued with intramural soccer while in college at James Madison University. She helped coach U9 and U12 teams to championships in the Webster County Youth Soccer league last season.

## Burton wasn't sure he'd ever get UK HOF selection

Keenan Burton really can't rank where being selected for the University of Kentucky Athletics Hall of Fame falls on his long list of accomplishments.

"It is right up there with everything. Selfishly, I have been waiting for this call for a long time. In life everything should be earned. I feel like I did that. I did everything I was supposed to do and to be in position for this to happen makes me feel really good," said Burton.

He certainly had Hall of Fame numbers for the Kentucky football

team when he finished his career in 2007. He ranked fourth in school history in pass receptions (189) and second in both receiving yardage (2,376) and touchdown catches (25). He also set a UK career record for kickoff return average — 25.6 yards per attempt. Burton

put those numbers up despite a wrist injury in 2004 and foot injury in 2005

He helped Kentucky coach Rich Brooks rejuvenate the UK program with regular-season wins over eventual national champion LSU and Georgia along with

Music City Bowl wins over Clemson and Florida State.

Three of his teammates — linebacker Wesley Woodyard, tight end Jacob Tamme and quarterback Andre Woodson — are already in the UK Hall of Fame.

Burton admits he wondered if another member from the same team would make the Hall of Fame.

"I will be honest about that. For a long time I tried to figure out what the criteria was. I am not taking anything away from teammates. They were all amazing. There are some not in who may deserve it, too," Burton said.

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# Big-name stars make up NHL free agent class

This NHL free agent class already had the most high-end talent in several years. Then Evgeni Malkin made it known he's testing the market.

Join the club. The longtime Pittsburgh cornerstone, Colorado Stanley Cup champions Nazem Kadri and Darcy Kuemper, Calgary MVP candidate Johnny Gaudreau and Dallas defenseman John Klingberg headline one of the deepest groups of free agents in recent history. Even though the salary cap is only going up \$1 million per team, record revenues have made for the first increase since 2019, setting the stage for significant money to flow when the market opens Wednesday.

"There is some money to be spent out there," Carolina general manager Don Waddell said. "I think there were 21 teams that were cap teams last year and another five or six that were real close. There's some money to be spent, and players are going to make a lot of money."

Probably no one more than Gaudreau, who set career highs with 40 goals, 75 assists and 115 points in leading the Flames to the Pacific Division title. His next deal will almost certainly shatter the richest contract signed last year: \$63 million to Dougie Hamilton from New Jersey.

Gaudreau, a South Jersey native who grew up rooting for the Flyers, has unsurprisingly been linked to Philadelphia and also the New York Islanders, though Calgary has put on a full-court press to keep the dynamic winger who turns 29 in August.

"Johnny's a really good player — there's going to be a lot of attention," Calgary GM Brad Treliving said. "They're big decisions. They're life decisions. If he doesn't sign with us, he's earned the opportunity to look at the market."

That market got better when Malkin on Monday signaled his intent to the Penguins to see what other options he might have. The 36-year-old was a point-a-game player last season even after

returning from knee surgery.

Teams looking for a younger option in the middle have Kadri, who like Gaudreau had a career year and extended that production deep into the playoffs. Kadri, who will be 32 by opening night, was one of the Avalanche's best players on their Cup run with 15 points in 16 games sandwiched around a broken right thumb he played through in the final.

Teammate Andre Burakovsky, longtime Flyers captain-turned-Panthers forward Claude Giroux, Rangers center Ryan Strome and Blues winger David Perron are also among the many intriguing options up front.

"It's going to be interesting," Waddell said. "It looks like there's an abundance of forwards and not as many defensemen."

The best in that shallow pool is Klingberg, highly coveted as a right-shot defenseman who can run the power play. Think Hamilton money for the soon-to-be 30-year-old Swede, who put up 47 points last season.

Alonso hit 74 total home runs in last year's Derby at Denver's Coors Field and beat Baltimore's Trey Mancini 23-22 in the final round. Alonso joined Ken Griffey Jr. (1998-99) and Yoenis Céspedes (2013-14) in winning consecutive titles. Griffey also won in 1994 and is the only three-time champion.

Pujols will participate in his fifth Derby after coming up short in 2003, 2007, 2009 and 2015. He and Detroit's Miguel Cabrera were added to the All-Star rosters as special selections by Commissioner Rob Manfred.

Pujols will make his 11th All-Star appearance and participate in the Derby at one of his former homes. He played 85 games with the Dodgers last season after being cut by the Los Angeles Angels, then signed with St. Louis before this season, which he has said will be his last.

The 42-year-old Pujols has five homers this season and 684 in his

career, fifth on the career list.

"It's an honor to be back in the All-Star Game and to have a chance to be part of the Home Run Derby, that's something I enjoy a lot and my kids will have a blast," Pujols said Monday night. "Hopefully, I can put on a good show for them, because at the end of the day, it's not about us, it's about putting a good show for the fans."

Schwarber posted a home run highlight reel on his Instagram page on Tuesday and the Phillies later confirmed their lone All-Star representative would participate in the Derby. Schwarber has 28 home runs in his first season with the Phillies.

Acuña, the Atlanta star who will be a starting outfielder for the National League, will compete in his second Home Run Derby. Acuña was eliminated by Alonso in 2019, when he set a career high with 41 homers.

Acuña will compete in the Derby even though he is not one of seven Atlanta players with 10 or more homers.

Acuña is hitting .274 with eight homers. He

missed 19 games at the start of the season as he continued his recovery from reconstructive surgery on his right knee.

Acuña was the NL's leader in All-Star voting.

Soto will be in the Derby for the second straight year. He hit the longest home run in last year's competition at 520 feet — the longest Derby drive in the Statcast era. He beat Shohei Ohtani 31-28 after two tiebreakers in the first round, then lost to Alonso 16-15 in the second round.

Soto is hitting .243 with 17 home runs this season.

Joey Gallo, Matt Olson, Salvador Pérez and Trevor Story also competed last year.

There was no Derby in 2020, when the All-Star Game scheduled for Dodger Stadium was canceled due to the coronavirus pandemic.

Alonso won the 2019 Derby at Cleveland as a rookie when he defeated Vladimir Guerrero Jr. in the final round, also by 23-22. Guerrero, whose father won the event in 2007, hit 91 total homers but tired in the final round.

Mayfield said he has no animosity toward the Browns, although he admits Carolina's home opener against Cleveland on Sept. 11 will be a "special" game.

Often viewed as fiery and outspoken, Mayfield was humble and introspective in his first interview since the Browns dealt him to Carolina for a 2024 conditional fifth-round draft pick.

To help facilitate the deal, Mayfield agreed to take a \$3.5 million pay cut. He'll still make a combined \$15.5 million from the Browns and Panthers.

In taking the pay cut, Mayfield is essentially betting on himself with free agency lingering after this upcoming season.

But first he has to win the starting job.

Mayfield joins Sam Darnold in the quarterback room, giving the Panthers the top two QBs from the '18 draft — but no clear starter heading into training camp.

Panthers general manager Scott Fitterer called it an "open competition" and predicts both will get equal reps in practice.

"The reason we have Baker here is to make the whole group better as a whole," Fitterer said. "Our philosophy is that we want competition, not just in the quarterback room but at every position."

But past success suggests Mayfield has a better chance of winning the job. He's 29-30 as an NFL starter, while Darnold is 17-32. Mayfield has thrown 92 touchdown passes and 56 interceptions compared to Darnold's 54 TD passes and 52 INTs.

Mayfield has also shown he can lead a team to the playoffs, helping the Browns go 11-5 in 2020.
