AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF WARSAW, IN GALLATIN COUNTY, KENTUCKY, AMENDING SECTION 116.11(A) OF THE CITY OF WARSAW CODE OF ORDINANCES IN ORDER TO CONFORM WITH KENTUCKY LAW TO ALLOW THE SALE ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ON ELECTION DAYS BY LICENSED ESTABLISHMENTS.

WHEREAS, Kentucky law has been amended to allow the sale alcoholic beverages on election days by licensed establishments.

WHEREAS, in order to bring Warsaw Code of Ordinances Section 116.11(A) into conformance with current Kentucky law, the City intends to adopt this Ordinance. **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF WARSAW, IN GALLATIN COUNTY, KENTUCKY,** as follows: **SECTION 1:** Section § 116.11(A) of the Warsaw Code of Ordinances, is hereby amended as follows:

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Ohio lawmakers move to protect 'thin blue line' flags

COLUMBUS — Two Ohio Republicans want to make it illegal for landlords, homeowner associations and others to ban the flying of "thin blue line" flags after the father of a fallen officer was told to take his down.

House Bill 712 — introduced by Reps. Tim Ginter, R-Salem, and Kevin Miller, R-Newark — would add thin blue line flags to the list of flags Ohio prohibits landlords, mobile home park operators and HOAs from prohibiting.

The flags on the current list are the U.S., state of Ohio, service flags belonging to "the immediate family of an individual serving in the armed forces," those honoring prisoners of war and those missing in action.

"For me, it's about public safety," Miller said. "It's for those that serve us on a daily basis."

But an HOA in Miller's district saw things differently.

Tom DiSario, the father of Kinkersville Police Chief Steven "Eric" DiSario, told the Newark Advocate in May that his homeowner's association sent him a letter saying his "political sign in the form of a flag" violated neighborhood deed restrictions.

"To be honest, when I saw the letter that people are fighting me over something very valuable to me and personal, I broke down and cried," DiSario said. "That's how much it meant to me."

His son was killed five years ago while responding to a shooting at a nursing home, and he told the Newark Advocate that he sees the black and white American flag with a bright blue stripe as a way to honor his son's sacrifice and those made by other officers across the country.

But the flag has also become controversially associated with white supremacy movements and those who opposed policing reforms.

In 2021, University of Wisconsin-Madison's police chief banned officers from displaying the flag while on duty, saying the flag had been "co-opted" by people who perpetuated "hateful ideologies."

Miller, who retired from the Ohio State Highway Patrol when he joined the Legislature, said that's not how he sees the thin blue line flag.

"The police protect everybody — whatever race, whatever nationally, whatever creed," he said.

A similar bill introduced by Ginter in 2017 passed the Ohio House 90-2. Republican Scott Wiggam and Democrat Stephanie Howse were the only no votes.

"I really think it's straightforward, and I think most everybody supports our law enforcement," Miller said. "This should be easy to pass, I hope."

Trump attacks McConnell, calls Chao his 'crazy wife'

Tirade follows senator doubting Trump-backed GOP candidates

LOUISVILLE — Former President Donald Trump derided Elaine Chao, who served in his cabinet, over the weekend and accused her husband, Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, of helping her and their family "get rich on China!"

"Why do Republican Senators allow a broken down hack politician, Mitch McConnell, to openly disparage hard working Republican candidates for the United States Senate. This is such an affront to honor and to leadership," Trump posted online Saturday. "He should spend more time (and money) helping them get elected, and less time helping his crazy wife and family get rich on China!"

Trump's comment came after McConnell said last week that the GOP's fight to take control of the U.S. Senate from the Democratic Party this November may not succeed, suggesting "candidate quality" is a factor.

The Republican Party has nominated some unconventional candidates who've never held elected office before to run against experienced Democratic candidates in several states, such as TV personality Mehmet Oz (aka Dr. Oz) in Pennsylvania and former NFL star Heschel Walker in Georgia. (Trump endorsed both those men.)

The Courier Journal contacted McConnell's office for a response to Trump's comment about Chao. A spokesperson for the Kentucky senator did not provide one at the time of this report.

Chao moved to America from Taiwan with her family when she was a child. Chao's father, James S. C. Chao, founded a shipping company, now called the Foremost Group, which her sister Angela helms today. The firm does significant business internationally, including in China.

Foremost Group has come under scrutiny over the years, particularly for whether Elaine Chao aided her father's firm through her government positions.

Chao, who has worked for multiple Republican presidents, led the U.S. Department of Transportation during Trump's four-year term in the White House. She resigned at the tail end of his presidency, though, after the insurrection at the U.S. Capitol on Jan. 6, 2021.

Trump's political relationship with McConnell also fractured — first after the ex-president lost the

2020 election to Democratic President Joe Biden, and especially after the Jan. 6 insurrection.

McConnell largely aided Trump throughout his presidency, and the duo worked together to transform the federal judiciary and appoint three Supreme Court justices, who went on to help overturn Roe v. Wade and eliminate a nationwide right to abortion.

After the insurrection, however, McConnell said Trump is "practically and morally responsible for provoking the events of" Jan. 6. However, he voted to acquit Trump of inciting the insurrection during the ex-president's second impeachment trial last year.

McConnell has mostly stayed mum about Trump in public since then. The ex-president has not returned the favor.
