# Kentucky Actor Nominated For Tony Award

Colton Ryan, an alum from The Kentucky Governor's School for the Arts (GSA) and Lexington native, has been nominated for a 2023 Tony Award, the highest honor in live Broadway theater.

Ryan received the nomination for the Best Performance by an Actor in a Leading Role in a Musical category for his current role as Jimmy Doyle in the new Broadway musical, New York, New York.

Before starring in Tony-nominated Broadway musicals, Ryan was a student-artist in the Kentucky Governor's School for the Arts 2011 class, where he studied Musical Theatre. A Lexington native, Ryan attended Lafayette High

School – School for the Creative Performing Arts (SCAPA) before going on to attend Baldwin Wallace University.

“We are so proud of Colton as he receives this nomination,” said Nick Covault, executive director of GSA. “We are honored that GSA was a part of his journey to reach this moment and will be cheering him on as he continues to proudly represent our program and other Kentucky student-artists at the Tonys.”

Ryan is currently performing in New York, New York at the St. James Theatre. The new musical officially opened on Broadway on April 2, 2023 and features music and lyrics by John Kander and Fred Ebb, a book by

David Thompson and Sharon Washington, and additional lyrics by Lin-Manuel Miranda.

New York, New York received nine Tony Award nominations, including one for Best Musical.

GSA is a public/private partnership inaugurated in 1987 by The Kentucky Center, the Commonwealth of Kentucky and numerous private supporters.

GSA seeks applicants of all backgrounds and identities, and while the GSA application is online, students without access to reliable internet are encouraged to contact the program to discuss accommodations.

# ASK Dr. Angelia ~ Love is patient, love is kind

Last week, I shared that my family is struggling with normal problems in living – relationships shattered with some no longer talking with one another. Family relationships can be difficult, and we know that many families struggle. It is deeply painful to all involved. I know I am not alone in this struggle.

Family issues are when conflict between or related to family members becomes especially intense, to the point that it interrupts your day-to-day life. Some degree of conflict within families is normal. But when a family cannot resolve conflicts and emotional intensity around the relationship becomes overwhelming, it can lead to symptoms of common mental health conditions such as anxiety or depression. Because family problems vary,

and these concerns are deeply personal, we don't want to share our pain with anyone.

However, evidence suggests that various types of discord within families are fairly common overall. For example, one study on tension in relationships between parents and adult children found that 94% of participants reported at least a little tension in their parent/child relationships. There are a multitude of family issues you might experience; whatever your challenges are, there are likely countless other people facing similar issues with their families.

Family problems are different for everyone, and people vary widely in their emotional and psychological responses to these issues. That said, some of the most common symptoms include:

Preoccupied with concerns about your family, hard to focus on other things. Over an extended period, this can translate into mental health issues. Feelings of tension, conflict, or disconnection from your family might make you feel sad, alone or hopeless. You may have trouble sleeping or experience

physical symptoms including muscle tension, headaches, and digestive troubles.

Family worries come in many shapes and sizes – Leaving members to struggle in isolation. Reach out to someone you can talk with confidentially. Sometimes it's hard to talk about something so close. You may need the help of a professional. I am a professional counselor and I have had to reach out to another professional to help me. It is true – “Every good therapist has a good therapist” None of us are exempt from problems in living out this life.

Remember I Corinthians, “Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.” Love God and All People. Amen.

## National Pollinator Week

National Pollinator Week is June 18-25, 2023. It is an annual celebration of the many animals that move pollen to help plants make fruit or seeds.

The US Senate, 15 years ago, unanimously approved and designated a week in June as National Pollinator Week. It is a necessary step toward addressing the declining pollinator population.

Many people think of honey bees when the word pollinators are mentioned. But, in fact flies, bats, hummingbirds, beetles and so many more are also pollinators.

Pollinating animals travel from plant to plant carrying pollen on their bodies in a vital interaction that allows the transfer of genetic material critical to the reproduction system of most flowering plants – the plants that bring us countless fruits, vegetables and nuts. Provides 1/2 of the world’s oils, fibers and raw materials. Help prevent soil erosion and increase carbon sequestration.

Pollination by honey bees and other insects contribute to nearly \$10 billion of crops in 2010. Pollinators provide pollination to over 180,000 different plant species and more than 1,200 crops. That means 1 out of every 3 bites of food you eat is there because of

pollinators.

Somewhere between 75% and 95% of all flowering plants on earth need help with pollination – they need pollinators. Pollinators add \$217 billion to the global economy and honey bees alone are responsible for between \$1.2 to \$5.4 billion in agricultural productivity in the United States. In addition to the food that we eat.
