JOINT PETITION OF
LOUISVILLE GAS AND ELECTRIC COMPANY
AND KENTUCKY UTILITIES COMPANY
FOR CONFIDENTIAL PROTECTION

Louisville Gas and Electric Company (“LG&E”) and Kentucky Utilities Company (“KU”) (collectively “Companies”) petition the Public Service Commission of Kentucky (“Commission”) pursuant to 807 KAR 5:001 Section 13 to grant confidential protection for certain information the Companies are providing in its response to Commission Staff’s Sixth Request for Information (“PSC”) Item No. 2. In support of this Joint Petition, the Companies state as follows:

Confidential or Proprietary Commercial Information (KRS 61.878(1)(c)(1))

1. The Kentucky Open Records Act exempts from disclosure certain records which if openly disclosed would permit an unfair commercial advantage to competitors of the entity that disclosed the records.¹ Public disclosure of the information identified herein would, in fact, prompt such a result for the reasons set forth below.

2. In response to PSC 6-2, the Companies are providing confidential workpapers in Attachment 2. The workpapers are confidential for three reasons. First, portions of the

workpapers contain RFP response data. Confidential protection of the RFP data is necessary because disclosure would disrupt the competitive bid process. Public disclosure would place the Companies at a considerable disadvantage when negotiating future contracts and could disadvantage them in the wholesale energy market. Furthermore, public disclosure would provide insight into the Companies' evaluation of bids to the detriment of the Companies and their ratepayers. The Commission previously granted the Companies' request to protect this information from public disclosure.²

3. Second, the workpapers contain unit planned outage schedules. The disclosure of this information would unfairly advantage the Companies' competitors for wholesale power sales. The information would allow the Companies' competitors to know when generating plants will be down for maintenance and thus know a crucial input into the Companies' generating costs and need for power and energy during those periods. The commercial risk of the disclosure of this information is that potential suppliers will be able to manipulate the price of power bid to the Companies in order to maximize their revenues, thereby causing higher prices for the Companies' customers.

4. Third, the workpapers contain projections of what the Companies expect to pay for fuel. If the Commission grants public access to this information, LG&E and KU could be disadvantaged in negotiating contracts to buy fuel in the future. The Companies could also be disadvantaged in the wholesale energy market because fuel costs are important components of energy pricing. All such commercial harms would ultimately harm LG&E's and KU's customers, who would have to pay higher rates if the disclosed information resulted in higher fuel prices or adversely affected the Companies' off-system energy sales.

Confidential Information Subject to this Petition

5. The information for which the Companies are seeking confidential treatment is not known outside of LG&E and KU, their consultants with a need to know the information, and the Companies' counsel, is not disseminated within LG&E and KU except to those employees with a legitimate business need to know and act upon the information, and is generally recognized as confidential and proprietary information in the energy industry.

6. The Companies will disclose the confidential information, pursuant to a confidentiality agreement, to intervenors with a legitimate interest in this information and as required by the Commission.

7. If the Commission disagrees with this request for confidential protection, it must hold an evidentiary hearing (a) to protect the Companies' due process rights and (b) to supply the Commission with a complete record to enable it to reach a decision with regard to this matter.³

8. Pursuant to 807 KAR 5:001, Section 13(2)(b), for Attachment 2 to PSC 6-2, the Companies are filing with the Commission one electronic copy that identifies with "CONFIDENTIAL" notations in the file structure the files within Attachment 2 to PSC 6-2 for which confidential protection is sought. In the public version, the "CONFIDENTIAL" folders are empty. In accordance with the Commission's March 24, 2020 and July 22, 2021 Orders in Case No. 2020-00085, the Companies will upload the complete copy of Attachment 2 to PSC 6-2 to its encrypted file-share site for the Commission's retrieval. Access to the encrypted file-share site will be provided to intervenors upon request pursuant to a confidentiality agreement.

9. The Companies are also providing a confidential version of the response to PSC 6-1 because the question contains confidential information that the Commission Staff identified

as confidential and subject to a prior Petition for Confidential Information filed in this proceeding.

10. The Companies request that confidential protection be granted for five years due to the sensitive nature of the information at issue.

WHEREFORE, Louisville Gas and Electric Company and Kentucky Utilities Company respectfully request that the Commission grant confidential protection for all of the information described herein.


