

INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The BARREN COUNTY real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 1 through May 15, 2023. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator (PVA) or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 2023, assessment on which state, county, and school taxes for 2023 will be due.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county building and may be inspected between the hours of 8:30 AM and 4:00 PM Monday-Friday. To schedule an appointment on Saturday, May 6th or May 13th an appointment must be made prior to those days with the PVA or deputy.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period. Although COVID-19 restrictions have eased we will continue to offer taxpayer conferences remotely. Conferences may be held via videoconference, where available, or by telephone; or you may exchange correspondence requesting a conference with the PVA via email or fax. Additionally, our office will be open for in person conference this year as well. Written documentation supporting your opinion of value will continue to be required, However, you will be instructed on the best method to submit your documentation after contacting our office regarding your request to have a conference.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period. Please contact the county clerk's office to receive instructions on the method the office is using to accept appeals this year and to obtain a form that can be used to file your appeal.

Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall **not** be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property.
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Revenue, Office of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Department of Revenue may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Caverna is known as a small school but through the hard work of some of their students and staff, they showed up big at a recent state competition.

The state STLP(student technology leadership program) competition was held at Rupp Arena in Lexington last week and Caverna had a huge presence with a total of eight projects making the cut to go to the state event

A team from Caverna Elementary presented their project Minecraft Dinosaur World and one student competed in the Sumobot Live competi-

The Caverna Middle School got in on the act by taking four showcase projects to the state level titled "Take a Bite Out of Bullying", "Escaping Vaping", "Chromebook Lair of Repair", and "Minecrafting the Community". This was the first time that Caverna Middle has taken so many projects to

Not to be outdone, the Caverna High School STLP competed with three showcase projects; "Making Elderly Connections", "Independent Queens", and "Growing Colonels". Growing Colonels was developed by two senior students, Kayla Wood and Natavia Gonzalez, to help increase student ownership of learning, goal setting for future growth, and accountability all while helping implement the use of a digital binder as the Profile of a Colonel in their school district. They worked on training teachers and students on uploading pieces of evidence, creating exemplar binders, and developing videos with tips and tricks for the digital binder.

Caverna High School STLP also competed in the digital product section of the state competition. Allyssa Carter competed in the Logo Design Category and Krrish Patel competed in two categories, Manipulated Images and Original Photo.

Caverna Instructional Technology Coach Melissa Tobin described one of the competitions: "Sphero Hero was a new competition to Caverna High School STLP, this was the first year that we had ever competed in it. This competition required students to develop a story that met specific criteria, build a robotics course, and program a Sphero robot to move along the course in sync with the story while being read."

Students compete in teams with some students qualifying for individual events as well with only the highest performers qualifying at each regional event to be eligible for state competition.



Lost History: The Patterson link to Grace **Union Church**

Unknown to most of today's church membership, Thomas Whitfield Patterson (1811 – 1904) is the missing link in the history of Grace Union Baptist Church. Of Irish descent through his father, Thomas was born in Adair County from the union of John

Newton and second

Selby Patterson.

wife, Sarah Katherine

Upon reaching maturity, Thomas purchased approximately 97 acres in what was then Adair County on the waters of the South Fork of the Little Barren River where he settled and farmed with his wife, Sarah (Sally) Ann Pace

Patterson (1826-1873) who he married in 1849.

Thomas and Sally had nine children, John Thomas (1849-1909); James William (1850-1917); Millard Selby (1851-1943); Joseph Newton (1854-1941); Henry Nicholas (1856-1946); Sarah Docia (1858-1946); Elvira Frances (1860-1921); Valorie Ann (1863-1944); and a ninth child, Robert Christian (1865), who died in infancy.

At some point after the death of Sally in 1873 (but prior to 1880), Thomas and his children followed eldest son John Thomas to Humboldt, NE. However, he maintained ownership of his property in Metcalfe County.

Around 1893, during construction of Winfrey Chapel Methodist Church, a disagreement arose within the membership and a split occurred. Although long parted from Metcalfe County, Thomas Patterson donated an acre of ground on the Subtle Road for a second church building, a union of the Cumberland Presbyterian and Baptist faiths, subsequently named Grace Union. He donated an additional acre for the cemetery located on the southwest corner of the property where several members of his family were already interred.




Decades of neglect have rendered the Patterson Cemetery easy to miss.

Twenty-six headstones have been uncovered within the last several years. Those still legible are: (in order of oldest to most recent) Robert Christian Patterson (1865), Edwin S. Patterson (1873, son of John T.), Sally Ann Pace

Patterson (wife, 1873), Thomas Whitfield Patterson (1904), John T. Patterson (1909), Quintilla A. Beard Martin (1911), and Sarah E. Patterson (John's wife, 1919). The remainder of the headstones are broken or illegible and


additional stones may be buried under the vines covering the area. It is interesting to note that even after leaving Kentucky, Thomas and other family members were buried at Grace Union.



contains books by politicians and pundits attempting to raise their profiles, make sense of our current state of affairs or, more frequently, make a quick buck.

As I perused the section at Malaprop's, I noticed that despite having 8-10 shelves dedicated to the subject, not a single book was authored by someone from a conservative viewpoint. There were plenty of books from those on the political left and even some promoting anarchy, but none from anyone I would judge to be right-of-center.

This column isn't political, a point in which I take personal pride. Believe me when I say that it would have bothered me had the situation been reversed. My overriding concern is that it is just another visible symptom of people living within echo chambers that further polarize

society.

This polarization is evident everywhere. People on the right avoid MSNBC, just as those on the left abhor Fox News. The left avoids Chick-fil-A, while the right has a newfound aversion to Bud Light. And, it's not uncommon for people to defriend others on social media simply because they don't agree with their political stances. The list is seemingly endless.

Growing up, I lived in a small community and attended small schools

and churches. With minor exceptions, I couldn't have told you anyone's political views. This wasn't because I was ignorant of the issue, as politics has fascinated me since I was at least ten years old. No, it was because people didn't let their political views bleed over into every facet of their life. You may have avoided someone with good reason, but it was unlikely due to them having a D or R by their name.

Of course, this was a pre-internet time. Back then, we had three television stations from which to choose. Everyone watched the same news, which was void of opinion, and read the same newspapers, which kept the punditry restrained to the opinion page. Nobody cared about the politics of who made their ice cream, but rather whether it was available, affordable, and tasty.

As our world has shrunk, we find ourselves judging everything through more partisan lenses. Increasingly, people only watch, read, or talk to those who agree with them. And when that is all you see or hear, you begin feeling like that is the way everyone thinks. The gap between the left and right only widens to the point where people can honestly say they do not know anyone who thinks differently about a particular issue.

General George Patton once said, "If everyone's thinking

the same thing, then nobody's thinking."

The only way to get back to actual thinking is to stray from our comfort zone every once in a while. Watch the news that the "other side" watches occasionally. Associate with people who think differently than you. Go to a bookstore and pick up something you might not agree with. Force yourself to think.

Better yet, outside of actual elections and governmental issues, take the Rhett Butler approach and, frankly, stop giving a damn. The more we focus on our differences, the more divided we become. Let's focus on what brings us together as human beings and try to find common ground. Perhaps then we can move forward as a

society.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF TOURISM AND CONVENTION COMMISSION FOR HODGENVILLE, KY

WHEREAS, The Hodgenville City Council, after extensive study and review, determined that it is in the best interest of the city to establish a tourism and convention commission for the purpose of promoting and developing convention and tourist activities and facilities in the City of Hodgenville, KY; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF HODGENVILLE, KENTUCKY AS FOLLOWS:

§ 31.70 COMMISSION ESTABLISHED: TITLE.

(A) There is hereby established a Convention and Tourist Commission for the city pursuant to KRS 91A.350 for the purpose of promoting and developing convention activities and tourist activities and facilities in the said city.

§ 31.71 MEMBERS

The members of the Commission herein established shall be appointed pursuant to KRS 91A.360 in the following matter. There shall be seven members appointed by the City Mayor as follows:

(A) Two Commissioners shall be appointed from a list of three or more names submitted by the local city hotel and motel association and one Commissioner shall be appointed from a list of three or more names submitted by the local county hotel and motel association; provided if only one local and motel association exists which covers both the city and county, then three Commissioners shall be appointed from a list of six or more names submitted by it. In the event that no formal local city or county hotel and motel association is in existence upon the establishment of the Commission or upon expiration of the term of a Commissioner appointed pursuant to this section, then up to three Commissioners shall be appointed by the City Mayor from persons residing within the jurisdiction of the Commission and representing local hotels or motels. representing local hotels or motels.

(B) One Commissioner shall be appointed from a list of three or more names submitted by the local restaurant association or associations. If no formal local restaurant association or associations exist upon the establishment of the Commission or upon the expiration of the term of a Commissioner appointed pursuant to this section, then one Commissioner shall be appointed by the City Mayor from persons residing within the city representing a local restaurant

(C) One Commissioner shall be appointed from a list of three or more names submitted by the Chamber of Commerce.

(D) Two Commissioners shall be appointed by the City Mayor.

§ 31. 72 TERMS

(A) The Commissioners shall be appointed for terms of three years, provided, that in making the initial appointments, the City Mayor shall appoint two Commissioners for a term of three years, two Commissioners for a term of two years and three Commissioners for a term of one year. There shall be no limitation on the number of terms to which a Commissioner is reappointed. Subsequent appointments shall be for a term of three years

(B) The Chairman of the Commission and the remaining members of the Commission shall serve on a

(C) In the event a vacancy shall occur on the Commission, the replacement shall be appointed as prescribed above for the remaining terms of the Commissioner who created a vacancy. § 31.73 MEETINGS.

The Commission shall meet at least monthly and have special meetings which may be called by the Chairman or any two Commissioners upon giving a five day advance oral or written notice. The Commission shall elect a Chairman at its first meeting following its establishment and annually on its first meeting in July of each subsequent year. The Commission shall further elect a vice-Chairman to preside over meetings in the absence of the Chairman. Action may be taken by a majority vote of the Commissioners at any properly convened meeting at which a quorum is present The Commission shall have the powers specified by the Kentucky Revised Statues.

§ 31.74 DIRECTOR, TREASURER & EMPLOYEES

The mayor shall appoint a Director, a Treasurer and may employ personnel and make contracts necessary to carry out the purpose of KRS 91A.350 to 91A.390. The contracts may include, but shall not be limited to, the procurement of promotional services, advertising services, and other services and materials relating to the promotion of tourist and convention business. Contracts of the type enumerated shall be made only with persons, organizations, and firms with experience and qualifications for providing promotional services and materials, such as advertising firms, chambers of commerce, publishers, and printers.

§ 31.75 REQUEST FOR FUNDS.

Pursuant to KRS 91A.390, the Commission shall annually submit to the City Council a request for funds for the operations of the commission. To provide funds for the operation of the Commission, there is imposed a transient room tax of 3% percent on the rent of each occupancy of a suite, room or rooms, charged by all persons, companies, corporations, or other like or similar persons, groups or organizations during business as motor courts, motels, hotels, ins, or like or similar accommodations businesses. The transient room tax shall not apply to the rental or leasing of an apartment supplied by an individual or business that regularly holds itself out as exclusively providing apartments. Apartment means a room or set of rooms, fitted especially with a kitchen and usually leased as a dwelling for a minimum period of 30 days or more. minimum period of 30 days or more.

§ 31.76 TRANSIENT ROOM TAX.

(A) The transient room tax shall be collected by the operators of the businesses described in \$40.05 and be paid over to the city and the said city is authorized to take all appropriate actions to provide for the collection and enforcement of these taxes. As required by KRS 91A.390(1), The proceeds of this tax shall be paid on a monthly basis. Each collecting agent shall file a return in duplicate on a form which is provided for such purpose. The failure to properly fill out and return said reporting form and the taxes shall be subject to such civil and criminal penalties as are available in the Kentucky Revised Statutes for failure to make required disposition of property as provided by the Kentucky Revised Statutes and this section. In addition, the failure to pay said taxes within the required time set out above, a penalty of 6% shall be added to the amount due. shall be added to the amount due

(B) All tax moneys received by the city from the collection of the 3% transient room tax shall be immediately disbursed to the Tourism and Convention Commission to be used for the purpose of promoting and developing convention and tourist activities and facilities.

(C) All moneys collected from the transient room tax and any restaurant tax which may be hereinafter imposed, shall be maintained in an account separate and unique from all other funds and revenues collected and shall be considered tax revenue for the purposes of KRS 68.100 and KRS 92.330.

The Treasurer and any other officer of the Commission writing checks and/ or handling funds shall be bonded in an amount commensurate with the largest amount of money on hand in any given year. The Commission shall make an itemized quarterly finance report to the City Council showing the expenses and income for each month and shall further present copies of its annual budget to said governmental

§ 31.78 AUDITING.

Pursuant to KRS 91A.360 (5), the books of the Commission and its account as established pursuant to § 40.06(C) hereof shall be audited as provided in KRS 65A.030. The independent certified public accountant or Auditor of Public Accounts shall make a report to the Commission, to the associations submitting lists of names from which Commission members are selected, to the City Mayor, to the State Auditor of Public Accounts and to the City Council. A copy of the audit report shall be made available by the Commission to members of the public upon request at no charge.

INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Hart County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 1 through May 15, 2023. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of inspection period. Please contact the county clerk's office to receive instructions on the method the office is using to accept appeals this year and to obtain a form that can be used to file your appeal.

Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.


Appeals of personal property assessments shall **not** be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property.
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Revenue, Office of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Department of Revenue may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.
