Keep cool in the summer heat

Amid Kentucky’s extreme summer temperatures, high humidity and prolonged heat can make being outdoors uncomfortable and dangerous. During this time, you need to know the signs and symptoms of heat-related illnesses and how to treat them. These include heat exhaustion, heat cramps and the most serious—heatstroke (also known as sun stroke).

Heat-related illnesses occur when a person’s body cannot properly cool itself. These sicknesses can occur at any age, but people at greatest risk include infants and children up to four years old, adults 65 and over and those who are overweight. Additional factors that may lead to heatstroke include exertion in hot weather, sudden exposure to hot weather

and lack of air conditioning. Certain illnesses and medications, such as antihistamines and antipsychotics, can also increase risk of heat-related illnesses. Wearing too many layers or clothes that prevent sweat from evaporating, drinking alcohol and becoming dehydrated may trigger heatstroke.

Older adults are at risk for many reasons. Sweat glands, which help cool the body, often diminish in number with age, and those remaining may not function as well as they once did. Existing health problems, especially involving the heart, lung and kidneys and some medications can also increase older adults’ risk of heat-related illness.

You can take steps to protect yourself and your loved ones from overheating. Here are some tips from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention:

- Keep up-to-date on the weather forecast and stay in your home or another air-conditioned facility, such as a mall, public library or heat-relief shelter if the temperatures and humidity are forecasted to be extreme.

- Avoid strenuous outdoor activities, such as exercise or gardening, during the hottest hours of the day.

- Stay hydrated by drinking plenty of water, fruit or vegetable juices. Drink even when you are not thirsty. Avoid caffeine and alcohol.

- Wear loose, lightweight and light-colored clothing.
- Avoid using your oven and cover windows that receive direct sunlight to keep your house cooler.
- Take cool showers or baths to help yourself cool down.

Know the signs of heatstroke—high body temperature, dizziness, fatigue, lack of coordination, cold and clammy skin, racing heart rate, headache, nausea/vomiting, changes in cognition and/or behavior, rapid breathing, muscle spasms and/or cramps and ankle swelling. Heatstroke is a potentially life-threatening condition that requires immediate medical attention.

If you are a neighbor, friend or family member of an older adult, regularly check on them during warm days and extended/excessive hot periods to ensure they stay cool and hydrated and have access to air conditioning and proper clothing. Seek immediate medical attention if someone has signs of a heat-related illness.

His departure comes as Kentucky's schools continue to recover after the pandemic and natural disasters.

The tornadoes that struck western Kentucky in December 2021 and the severe flooding in eastern Kentucky in July 2022 resulted in devastating losses, affecting many communities, schools and families. Glass visited the many districts impacted in both regions and held weekly huddles with superintendents in an effort for KDE to offer additional support to school staff, students and families.

Glass also has been an avid supporter of student voice. Under his leadership, the Commissioner's Student Advisory Council moved from quarterly meetings to monthly meetings. During the 2022-2023 school year, the council worked on a school safety project. In January, they presented a white paper on potential actions to increase school safety to stakeholders, including Rep. James Tipton, chairman of the House Education Committee.

A native of Brandenburg and a third-generation Kentucky educator, Glass previously served as superintendent of Jeffco Public Schools in Colorado for three years and was superintendent

of Eagle County Schools in Colorado from 2013 to 2017. He also was an administrator at the Colorado Department of Education and was Iowa's chief state school officer from 2010 to 2013. He began his career as a social studies teacher at Hazard Independent Schools.

In 2016, President Barack Obama nominated Glass to the National Board for Education Sciences. He has received numerous awards for his work, including the 2019 Frank D'Angelis Inspiration Award, Christian Science Monitor's 8 School Chiefs to Watch, 2018's #1 State Education Chief to Watch, the 2021 Kentucky Teachers In the Know Decision Maker Award and the Amici Linguarum Award in support for language education by the Kentucky World Language Association.

In June, Glass was named a state champion for Problem & Project Based Learning (PBL) at the PBL World Conference in California, the premier event for PBL.

Under his leadership, Kentucky joined the Deeper Learning Dozen, a community of practice dedicated to transforming school districts to support equitable access to deeper learning experiences and outcomes for all students. Kentucky is the first state-level team to join the Deeper Learning Dozen.

Seek Medical Truth, Enjoy Your Life

Does your doctor make you feel good? Does he or she tell you what you want to hear just to make you happy? If so, you probably should look for another doctor. No one enjoys leaving the doctor's office feeling bad. We don't want to hear, "You need to change your lifestyle." We don't want to hear, "You need to cut way back on your sugar intake." We enjoy our habits. Habits are hard to break. My wife's grandfather loved smoking. He wouldn't give it up even after numerous cancer surgeries. He died at age 65. A friend died recently. She died from what is often called fatty liver disease. Six months before she died, she told me she was terminal. She said, "I guess I drank too much alcohol throughout my lifetime." She went on to tell me that her family doctor two years prior had said her issue wasn't severe and

that she didn't have to worry." She was very displeased with her doctor's passive attitude about her condition that would soon take her life. Another friend of mine was diagnosed with prostate cancer. His doctor's approach to his condition was that, "They would watch it. When it became worse, they would do something about the cancer." They watched it and they watched it kill my friend. Within a year it was out of control and had spread outside his prostate. The doctor's relaxed attitude about a serious situation did not go well for my friend. Many doctors want to make you to feel good. Of course, we don't want a doctor whose goal is to make us feel bad. Typically, they don't want to lose you as a patient. Still, they should diplomatically tell you what you may not want to hear. Keep in mind the doctor ordinarily knows more than

we do. However, you do know how you feel. Be aware of your family history. In this information age you have to do some self-study. There is a lot of information on-line about most conditions you are facing. You have to research thoroughly though because often you can find whatever response you want on the Internet. Ask your doctor questions about your research. Tell him or her that you want to make good choices. Be willing to travel to another town if your doctor refers you or seek out someone who might be able to provide the care you need. The bottom line is we have to take personal responsibility for our health and do the best we can do. Even when we do everything, we can think of to do, these bodies are subject to disease and death. 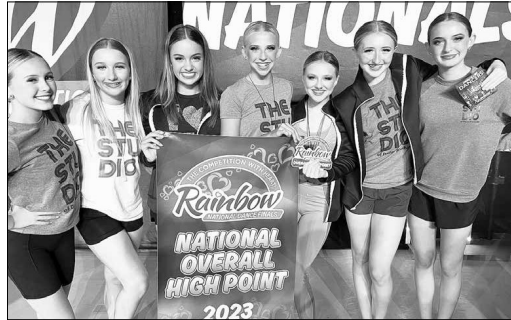

IJC on Local Government: Lawmakers discussed local government revenue sources and budgeting. Stakeholders shared an overview of the three primary methods of city tax revenue: property, occupational license, and insurance premium taxes. Occupational taxes are used by cities to pay costs associated with public safety, including our police, fire, emergency medical services, and 911 dispatchers. Additionally, occupational taxes are used towards maintenance and snow removal on our roads, local parks and recreation, school services, environmental services, planning and zoning administration, animal care and control, mental health services, and senior

citizens services.

IJC on State Government: Legislators heard from the Attorney General's Office and the State Treasurer's Office, alongside an overview of construction and renovation projects on the Capitol campus. The Attorney General's Office shared an update on some of the cases they are working on at this time. This includes the defense of redistricting efforts, right to life legislation, and SB 150, which introduces parents' rights to school discussions on gender and gender ideology. Also present was the Kentucky State Treasurer, who shared the progress her administration has made concerning unclaimed property, fraud mitigation, and governmental financial transparency. Finally, the committee heard from coordinators in the various renovation projects in and around

the capitol building and annex, which are currently in progress with more projects on the way. According to the report, renovations should be complete in less than four years.

Kentucky Health and Human Services Task Force: Panel members heard testimony from Kentucky's Cabinet of Health and Human Services and its Department of Community Based Services regarding reports of foster children and staff sleeping in state government offices. According to the cabinet, this practice happens far too frequently and often with children in state care who have behavioral issues. These children are often turned away from more appropriate care providers. Members asked specific questions about how the administration's failure to increase reimbursement rates for providers is contributing

to the lack of care available to these at-risk youth. Other testimony was given by Court Appointed Special Advocates and its expansion to 92 counties in 2024, representatives from the Kentucky Board of Emergency Medical Services, Medicaid Services, and the Administrative Office of the Courts.

IJC on Veterans, Military Affairs, and Public Protection: Committee members heard testimony regarding veteran care, missing persons alerts, and JROTC education. There was extensive discussion on the use of hyperbaric oxygen therapy (HBOT) for veterans suffering from traumatic brain injuries (TBI). While there are case studies supporting the use of HBOT for TBI veterans, members with medical backgrounds expressed concern over the true efficacy

of the treatment as there isn't enough data to support its use. Members also heard testimony about proposed legislation to fill a gap in the missing persons alert system; the implementation of the Ashanti Alert System would allow for missing persons alerts for those that do not fit the age requirements for Amber or Golden alerts, as well as disseminating the missing individual's information across state lines.

Commission on Race and Access to Opportunity: Committee members heard from three organizations in regards to how race plays into access to opportunity in Kentucky: the Kentucky Center for Statistics, Advance Kentucky, and Harbor House Intergenerational Life Center. The Kentucky Center for Statistics presented information with an emphasis on race trends in school aged

children—discipline resolutions, out of school suspensions, graduation rates, post-secondary education pursuits. Advance Kentucky reported on efforts to introduce computer science to students at younger ages. Harbor House Intergenerational Care Center shared how they are expanding their care and services along with property expansion, they are also creating employment and apprenticeship opportunities for their participants.

Raceland makes a splash

Raceland City Administrator, Dustin Burchette comments regarding the success of the splash pad and how it was funded.

"The Raceland Splash Pad has become a bigger success than we could have ever imagined. Every day our park is now filled with families enjoying the outdoors and our community. This project it-

self was heavily discussed over a year and half ago during council meetings. We knew that our current city park was in desperate need of renovations and an identity. We chose to use the ARPA funds that were granted to our community to reinvest in the park and that is how the splash pad was funded."

Burchette explained in detail how the funds were allocated for Splash pad.

"The park has seen new fencing, new bathrooms, new concession stand, new awnings, and a pavilion seating area. What is exciting, is we still have new siding, new roofs, new cornhole boards, and new playground equipment that are still to come. The siding and roofs of the shelter, stage, and community center will all be redone in the next couple of months. The playground equipment is scheduled for next year, we received \$87,500 in grant money from the Land Water Conservation Fund as part of that project."

Burchette elaborates on how the new addition of the Splash Pad has really brought new life to the city.

"We have tied all this into our other events in the downtown district and it really has brought the

city back to life. We have movies nights for the first time ever and several other events lined up. On August 19 the ACE Cyclist Club, Time Trails will be here in Raceland, their route takes them through Wurtland and around the Historic McConnell House. We recently had the Tri-State BBQ Brawl in our park and are excited to announce on October 14 we will be partnering with them again, for the Tri-State Holiday Baking Brawl. So, we are definitely excited to be bringing all of these opportunities to our community and neighbors."

ABC Administrator Tyler Bradley shares his admiration for Burchette.

"Firstly, I'm so proud of Dustin and his work in the city as a whole. This city has grown exponentially in the last 2 years, and he has been the general leading the charge. When it comes to the park, Dustin has made it a mission to make the city park a destination park, and every day we are completing more of that mission.

I work with Dustin on a variety of projects across the city. But most recently in the park, assisting him and the city council in passing the first reading

for the "entertainment destination center" ordinance. This will allow us to turn the area around and including the park into an EDC (which we call RED Raceland Entertainment District.) In part, it will allow vendors to easily apply for licenses to sell beer at specific events and festivals. We feel that this will be a tremendous boom to the economic growth of the city, as well as the growth of the surrounding area.

Bradley shares excitement for the future of the park.

"Whenever someone mentions something good about the park I can't help but to get excited and say "if you think that's neat wait until..." because there are so many projects, so many upgrades, so many people working for the love of the city, that you won't recognize the Raceland City Park in two years. In a good way."

In conclusion, Raceland City Park is getting a makeover and the splash pad has become a very popular and welcome attraction for locals. Load up the children and bring them down for hours of water, play, entertainment and cool down during this scorching summer heat.

Gov. Beshear: Kentuckians can start betting on sports in less than 60 days

Herald Report

On July 10, Gov. Andy Beshear joined the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission and lawmakers to announce that Kentuckians can make their first-ever sports bets in Kentucky in less than 60 days.

The announcement followed the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission meeting, where members unanimously approved emergency administrative regulations that will govern sports wagering. The Governor then immediately signed the regulations at the Red Mile, a gaming and racing venue that is eligible to apply to be a sports betting location.

Retail locations are set to open Thursday, September 7, 2023, just in time for the NFL kick-off, tailgating and the college football season, followed by mobile applications Thursday, September 28, 2023.

“This is a historic day for our commonwealth – sports wagering will open for the first time in Kentucky in less than 60 days,” said Gov. Beshear. “Bringing sports wagering to the state not only gives Kentuckians a much-anticipated new form of entertainment, but also brings money to the state to support pensions, freeing up money that can be used to build a better Kentucky through the funding of education, economic development, disaster recovery and other neces-

sary projects, like providing cleaner water, building roads and high-speed internet.”

After years of pushing to get sports betting passed, on March 31, 2023, Gov. Beshear signed bipartisan legislation – House Bill 551 – legalizing sports wagering in Kentucky. Since then, the commission has met with representatives in states that have recently launched sports wagering, as well as industry experts, to learn from best practices and shared experiences. Kentucky chose a tiered implementation date, which was used in multiple states and allows for testing of policy and procedure before the full rollout that will include mobile applications.

“We have worked hard to deliver sports wagering to Kentuckians with regulations designed to protect bettors,” said Public Protection Cabinet Secretary Ray Perry. “Kentuckians can be sure that their bets are safe, their money is protected and there is effective oversight and enforcement if the law is not followed.”

“The conversations we had with regulators and industry experts laid the groundwork for these clear and responsible regulations,” said Kentucky Horse Racing Commission Chairman Jonathan Rabinowitz. “The commission has a long history of pari-mutuel wagering integrity and is uniquely positioned to protect Ken-

tucky bettors. Wagering integrity was the top priority of these regulations. We also considered the importance of flexibility to meet the changing demands of the industry.”

In May, the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission announced that it was hiring additional staff to prepare for the sports wagering launch. The commission is in the process of filling 14 new positions. Job titles range from management to auditing and compliance. Many positions have been filled, including the director of sports wagering, with others still progressing through the hiring process.

“Our wagering compliance team is experienced and well-suited to lead this new area of wagering,” said Kentucky Horse Racing Commission Executive Director Jamie Eads. “Our next step is to open licensing and start reviewing applications.”

Opening Process
Starting Tuesday, July 11, each of Kentucky’s licensed horseracing facilities can apply for a retail sportsbook at their main location or at a licensed satellite location. The state anticipates that each facility will open a retail location, and many will be ready to launch September 7.

Each licensed facility will also be permitted to partner with up to three marketing platforms for mobile wagering, to be launched September 28.

Today’s regulations were signed as emergency regulations which allows them to take effect immediately after being filed with the Legislative Research Commission. An

ordinary regulation was filed at the same time, which includes a period of public comment and legislative review.

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In the first two months of resumed checks for Medicaid eligibility, almost half of Ky. members up for renewal lost their coverage

July 16 — The end of the pandemic meant resumption of eligibility verification for Medicaid, and almost half of the Kentuckians who have been asked to renew their Medicaid coverage in the first two months of verification have lost it, mainly because they did not respond.

Of the 153,386 people asked to renew so far, nearly 34 percent didn't respond, and 46 percent of the total were terminated for that or other reasons, according to state data.

Priscilla Easterling, outreach coordinator for Kentucky Voices for Health, called the number of terminations and the number of people who have not responded to a renewal request "worrisome."

More than 52,000 "of these terminations were for procedural reasons; people simply did not reply to those notices requesting information, and that's scary," she said. "These aren't folks who were determined ineligible. We don't know if they're ineligible. They didn't reply to a notice, and so they lost their coverage." But Easterling cautioned that it's too early to call it a trend.

The state Department for Medicaid Services resumed its annual renewal process for Medicaid members in April because the pandemic rules that allowed for continuous enroll-

ment ended. In April, Kentucky had 1.7 million people on its Medicaid rolls.

The process that allows state Medicaid agencies to restart the annual renewals or kick off those who no longer qualify has been dubbed the "Medicaid unwinding," a process that will take 12 months to complete in Kentucky; each Medicaid beneficiary has a renewal month.

During the renewal process, Medicaid members are getting a notice of eligibility, a renewal packet or a request for more information.

May was the first renewal month. Of the 74,004 individual renewals that were due May 31, state data shows 37,779, or 51% of them, were approved and 33,794, or nearly 46%, were terminated. And despite multiple notices, calls, texts and emails from the state, 23,756, or 32%, did not respond.

The non-response rate rose in June, when 79,382 individual renewals were due. The state says 40,333, or nearly 51%, were approved; 37,140, or nearly 47%, were terminated; and 28,281, or nearly 36%, did not respond.

The report also notes that of the 33,794 Kentuckians who were terminated in May, 5,808 of them were eligible for a federally subsidized or "qualified health plan" through Kynect, the state-based marketplace for health insurance. Of those, only 465, or 8%, enrolled in a

qualified plan.

That rate increased in June to 10.9%. Of the 37,140 Kentuckians who were terminated that month, the report says 5,142 would qualify for a qualified health plan, and 559 of them enrolled in one.

Easterling said there is a concern that people who have not responded won't realize they don't have coverage until they seek treatment and learn they are no longer on Medicaid. If that happens, she said a person has 90 days after their loss of coverage to be reconsidered.

She also encouraged people to not assume they don't qualify, especially if they have children, because it's easier for children to qualify.

Easterling said it's not clear why so many Kentuckians have not responded to renewal requests, so it's important for people on Medicaid to visit their account at kynect.ky.gov and make sure their address and income information are up to date. She encouraged Kentuckians who need help to reach out to a "Kynector," who can answer questions and help you understand your coverage options.

Managed-care organizations, mostly health-insurance company subsidiaries, which manage the care of Medicaid beneficiaries, are also working to help Kentuckians with the renewal process.

"MCOs are engaged in ex-

tensive outreach to capture the most up-to-date contact info for the state and providing referrals for other sources of coverage when necessary," Tyler Glick, Kentucky Association of Health Plans spokesman, said in an email. "In addition, MCOs are partnering with hyperlocal organizations to distribute renewal kits and host workshops to assist plan members with the redetermination process. The goal is continuous coverage, whether in Medicaid, via employer-provided coverage, or through Kynect with a qualified health plan or other options."

As an example, the Northern Kentucky Tribune reports that Anthem Kentucky Medicaid is joining with local agencies across the state to help its members redetermine their Medicaid eligibility by asking them to remember a simple acronym, ACT, which stands for: Address — make sure kynect.ky.gov has your correct mailing and email address, along with your phone number.

Check mail — you may receive a letter about your Medicaid or Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Plan renewal letting you know that you need to complete a redetermination form to maintain your coverage.

Turn the form in — if you get the form, fill it out and return it right away. This may help you avoid losing Medicaid or KCHIP.

Rep. Rogers, who wants a prison, tries a Manchin

Use an appropriations bill to override the other branches

July 22 - Rep. Hal Rogers of Kentucky's 5th District, the longest-serving member of the House, a member of the Appropriations Committee and its former chair, has wanted the federal government to build a maximum-security prison in Letcher County since 2006. The county is divided about the idea, and the Bureau of Prisons has soured on it. So Rogers put language in the his latest appropriations bill that would require the Justice Department to issue an environmental impact statement and final decision approving the prison within 30 days of the bill becoming law, and says the agencies' decisions "shall not be subject to judicial review."

Rogers is following a tactic employed by another longtime Appalachian politician, Democratic Sen. Joe Manchin of West Virginia, who bargained for and won a provision in the latest major funding bill to clear the administrative and judicial barriers to the Mountain Valley Pipeline in his state and Virginia. But Rogers' gambit faces many more obstacles.

Rogers' bill for spending by the Justice Department and other agencies "will need to clear several hurdles before it could become law," Jamie Lucke reports for the Kentucky Lantern. "The House's spending bills are likely to change significantly later this year," when its bill and the Senate's must be reconciled. "The Senate Appropriations Committee voted 28-1 earlier this month

to approve its version of the Commerce-Justice-Science spending bill, which does not include any provision mentioning the Letcher prison."

Rogers "touts the prison as a source of employment and economic development in a poor region that has lost thousands of coal-industry jobs. The 16-member Letcher County Planning Commission has long sought a prison," Lucke reports. "A coalition of opponents - local and national - question the potential economic benefits. They say a proliferation of prisons in Central Appalachia in recent decades has done little to improve the economy, while supporting mass incarceration and putting prisoners and their families at great distances from each other."

Two citizens' groups said this week that more public input is needed. "People in Letcher County deserve to have a say in this because we vote, we pay taxes, we live here, and we love this place," said Dr. Artie Anne Bates, a member of Concerned Letcher Countians. "We don't want Rep. Rogers stuffing something down our throats that we are not in agreement with." Rogers' office has not replied to the Lantern's or The Rural Blog's requests for comment.

The Bureau of Prisons approved construction of the prison in 2018, but in 2020 "the Trump administration pulled the plug, saying the prison was no longer needed because of a decline in prisoner numbers and that the \$505 million set aside for the project would be 'wasteful spending'," Lucke notes.

Did I commit a major faux pas? And did I miss a lesson in garage etiquette in all my years of driving? -- Tom

I think the manager of the shop was having a bad day, Tom.

He may have overbooked the shop, had two guys call out sick with hemorrhoidal flare-ups, dropped a car off the lift, and taken a sip of transmission fluid instead of orange soda with his burrito at lunch.

A manager not having a bad day (or with better people skills), would have said, "Hi Tom, we're pretty slammed today, are you able to wait a while, or make an appointment and come back?"

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Veteran suicide in a VA emergency room

A veteran with a documented history of suicid-

al thoughts and attempts, as well as drug abuse and PTSD, committed suicide while being left unattended

in a VA facility emergency room.

The Department of Veterans Affairs Office of Inspector General investigated, and they unearthed the facts ... which are not pretty.

It's this: The veteran showed up at the VA facility ER with bladder complaints and depression. He'd been there before, and it was noted in his file that he'd had admissions for substance abuse and suicidal thoughts.

The first medical person ("Nurse 1") did a triage, which is asking questions to decide how to classify the patient. Instead of using the computer to ask him specific questions (per policy) and record his answers, she did it from memory. Nurse 1 allegedly told the physician (who was resting in another room) there was a patient waiting. Another person, Nurse 2, did a bladder scan.

An hour later, no physician had shown up. An additional hour later, Nurse 1 left for the day and handed off the records to incoming staff.

Later a technician found the veteran on the floor of the room, dead by suicide, still unseen by a doctor.

The OIG investigation revealed:

During the investigation, Nurse 1 could not recall from memory the risk assessment questions she supposedly asked the veteran. Nurse 1 also did not actually alert the physician that patients were waiting.

The physician did not respond to an alert from Nurse 2 either about patients waiting and did not get up until the boss came on shift.

The "Door to Doc" policy was severely violated. That performance policy states that the target is 25 minutes from the time a patient walks in the door to the time he's seen by a doctor -- not the two hours and 20 minutes this veteran languished by himself.

Information surfaced that showed facility admin sought to interfere with the OIG investigation, instructing in emails that "appropriate responses to direct questions are: yes, no, I don't know, and I don't remember."

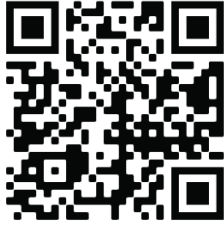

Accelerometer, not vehicle pedals, triggers brake lights in EV Hyundai

Dear Car Talk:
I just purchased a new Hyundai Ioniq 5 electric car and love it. I use the highest level of regenerative braking, so the car slows down quite a bit every time I lift my foot off the accelerator, and I rarely have to use the brake pedal. My question is: when this happens, I don't think the brake lights go on. So, the drivers behind me can't tell if

I'm slowing down. Seems like it is dangerous. What do you think? — August

Car Talk

Great question, August. Actually, your brake lights probably are coming on. All electric vehicles have a technology called regenerative braking. Traditional cars use friction to reduce speed. A couple of metallic pads squeeze a metal rotor attached

to each wheel, and as the car stops, that creates heat and dust, neither of which is terribly useful. EVs, on the other hand, use the motion of the wheels to make electricity. When you first step on the brake pedal, the wheels power a motor/generator that makes electricity and sends it back into your battery. And because it takes effort to turn that generator, that slows the wheels. If you need more stopping power than the generator can provide, the traditional friction brakes take over, and it's all managed by computer. But what about the brake lights, you ask? Well, the Department of Transportation sets standards for when brake lights must come on. And it has to do with the rate of the car's deceleration. So, your Hyundai has an accelerometer that measures deceleration in meters per

seconds squared. And before the car's deceleration rate hits the DOT limit, it turns on your brake lights — whether you touch the brake pedal or not. The same type of device, by the way, is often used in airbag deployment. If deceleration occurs almost instantly, the computer knows you've hit something, and you're saying hello to your airbag. If you want to confirm that your accelerometer works, August, have a friend follow behind you and get him on phone. Then try using the regenerative braking at different settings, and ask him to let you know when he sees your brake lights come on. And if he doesn't see them and rear-ends you, well, you already know him so you won't have to exchange information.
