tory and unique local character. I applaud the Clay County Historical Society and their efforts to make this downtown historic district a reality. The designation will play an important role in our downtown revitalization efforts by encouraging investment, creating jobs, and building local pride."

The National Register nomination was evaluated within the context of community planning and development as a significant example of a county seat in eastern Kentucky whose history and atypical form shed light on the process of county seat town development in the region. The period of significance begins with Manchester's reincorporation in 1930, which prompted a revitalization of the town, and ends in 1972 as the coal industry declined.

The contributing resources of the historic district date from the late-nineteenth century to the mid-twentieth century and include commercial, government, civic, office, medical, religious, and residential buildings, as well as a swinging footbridge and a network of stone retaining walls. The area includes approximately 7.83 acres, with 38 buildings and 2 structures.

Most resources in the Manchester Historic District are located along Main Street and include portions of Bridge and White Streets. One distinctive feature of the historic district is the use of sandstone for the walls and foundations of several buildings, and for a network of retaining walls. Some of the retaining walls arose from the Works Progress Administration (WPA) and Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) projects conducted in the 1930s and 1940s.

The National Register is the federal government's official list of historic and archaeological resources deemed worthy of preservation, and listing is honorary as it confers no restrictions on property owners. Among states, Kentucky has the fifth highest number of listings.

The Manchester Historic District listing was first approved by the Kentucky Historic Preservation Review Board during a meeting in February. The review board evaluates and recommends National Register submissions from the commonwealth.

lation included.

County attorney Joe White says the district would exceed the recommendation, but the court could proceed as it is and take the position as to why it exceeds the recommendation.

To process the reapportionment, the county is required to appoint a committee of three people. Those appointed were Lester Harmon, Terry Davidson and Janice Bowling. Those three, with county clerk Craft, made the proposal to present to the fiscal court for approval.

The second hurdle the committee wanted to accomplish was including all city residents inside a city precinct.

"Right now, we have split precincts at Garrard, Portersburg, White's Branch, Greenbriar, Hart's Branch and Horse Creek," Craft explained. "The city residents in those precincts are a very small number and in some cases you can clearly see who they vote for in city races. That doesn't need to happen."

The clerk showed the magistrates how they could incorporate all the city split voters into the city precincts of Manchester and East Manchester.

The court agreed and passed the recommendation at the meeting. A first reading of the new ordinance will be held Thursday, July 13th at the fiscal court meeting. A second reading will follow.

Once official, Craft says the county board of elections will then align the precincts.

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NMWA proposes increase

A much-beleaguered county water association has taken a step they say is much needed for the future.

The North Manchester Water Association has filed for a rate increase with the Public Service Commission. The association has come under fire recently over financial woes. One of the reasons is the lower-than-average water rates they offer customers.

Customers with a 5/8 and 3/4meter, are paying a minimum bill of \$21.60 for the first 2,000 gallons and \$6.22 per 1,000 gallons over the 2,000 gallons. The increase will be \$25.15 for the minimum bill and \$9.16 per 1,000 gallons.

A 1-inch meter is a \$40.21 minimum current bill is \$40.21 for the first 5,000 gallons and \$6.22 per gallon per 1,000 gallon usage. The new rate will be \$52.63 minimum bill and \$9.16 per 1,000 gallons.

The average increase for a customer on a 5/8" & 3/4" meter using 4,248 gallons is \$10.16 per month or 28.6%. The average increase for a customer on a 1" meter using 14,843 gallons is \$41.36 per month or 40.8%.
