PFAS chemicals, otherwise known as forever chemicals, have been found in water and wastewater effluent around the country, including Kentucky. The USEPA is implementing regulations in the attempt to limit and eliminate PFAS chemicals in drinking water. Utilities may be faced with significant infrastructure upgrade costs, monitoring and sampling costs, disposal fees, or even fines. As utilities are not the producers of these chemicals, the costs incurred by utilities to meet new standards will be unfairly passed on to their rate payers. In 2018, the National Rural Water Association engaged with the law firm of Napoli Shkolnik to represent the rural water network in PFAS cost recovery litigation. Attendees will receive the latest information from a legal perspective and learn the resources and efforts available to them.

2:40 – 3:40 Water Utility Tariff: Practical Considerations Gerald Wuetcher, Stoll Keenon Ogden, PLLC

A water utility's tariff offers a unique opportunity for them to structure the relationship with its customers. This presentation highlights various provisions that a water utility should include as part of a tariff to protect against financial and legal liability as well as avoid common customer disputes. In the first portion of his presentation, the presenter will discuss the statutory and regulatory framework for utility tariffs and the process by which a tariff may be revised. The presentation will conclude with some practical suggestions for improving a water utility's tariff. Recent PSC decisions on tariff matters will also be discussed.

The 2023 Kentucky General Assembly passed several laws which impact water and wastewater utilities. The presenters will discuss these new laws which include: HB 360, which creates a new sales tax exemption for materials purchased by a contractor and installed for a utility; HB 522, which increases the procurement amount from \$30,000 to \$40,000 before a utility is required to advertise for bids; amendments to HB 8, which modifies the residential sales tax exemption for utility customers; and SB 263, which creates numerous incentives for utilities to consider regionalization.
