Kentucky's 24 hours of giving returns

Kentucky Gives Day, the statewide 24-hour online giving event, returns for its 12th year next Tuesday as nonprofit organizations across the state join in a unified effort to raise money and rally support for their causes.

Hosted by Kentucky Nonprofit Network, the state association of nonprofits, the event aims to inspire Kentuckians to donate to their favorite causes and use social

"The donations and visibility from Kentuck-

ians near and far is an opportunity for Kentucky to come together and lift up the important work happening with our participating nonprofits to strengthen Kentucky communities," Clore said in a news release.

Representing an array of causes including human services, healthcare, children's welfare, the arts, humanitarian aid, animal welfare and environmental conser-

vation, the 273 participating nonprofits are all registered 501(c)(3) organizations.

Donors can browse and support their favorite causes by visiting kygives.org, where profiles of each participating nonprofit are available. Real-time updates on their fundraising progress also will be available Tuesday.

Throughout the day, updates will be shared

on Facebook, Instagram and X using the hashtag #kygives24.

To incentivize donations, prizes will be awarded to organizations throughout the event and many have secured matching gifts or challenges as further encouragement for donors.

Also, the Central Kentucky Community Foundation in Elizabethtown is offering prize incentives to nonprofits in its nine-county service area which

includes Breckinridge County.

Since its debut 12 years ago, participating nonprofits have collectively raised more than \$5 million through Kentucky Gives Day. In 2023 alone, the generosity of Kentuckians propelled 232 nonprofits to raise \$833,028.

INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Breckinridge County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 6 through May 20, 2024. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator (PVA) or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 2024, assessment on which state, county, and school taxes for 2024 will be due about Fall 2024.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours of 8:00 am and 4:00 pm Monday through Friday or 8:00 to 10:00 on Saturday, May 11 and 18, 2024.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period. Written documentation supporting your opinion of value will continue to be required. However, you will be instructed on the best method to submit your documentation after contacting our office regarding your request to have a conference.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period. Please contact the county clerk's office to receive instructions on the method the office is using to accept appeals this year and to obtain a form that can be used to file your appeal.

Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property.
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Revenue, Office of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Department of Revenue may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

State to invest in health care training program incentive funds

FRANKFORT — The Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education (CPE) is currently accepting external funding for the Healthcare Workforce Investment Fund (HWIF).

Created during the 2023 regular session of the Kentucky General Assembly through House Bill 200, the HWIF is a groundbreaking framework for

public-private partnership to cultivate a robust healthcare workforce. CPE is seeking healthcare industry investors to donate to the incentive fund portion of the HWIF, which will be matched dollar-to-dollar by state funds for program incentives to reward performance and excellence among eligible programs.

CPE is directed to eval-

uate and award HWIF incentive funds to industry and postsecondary programs based on:

- Workforce demands and capacity for the credential
- If/how the program is meeting healthcare workforce needs in an underserved county
- The passage rate of graduates of the program

on the healthcare credential examination

- Other relevant factors related to meeting community workforce needs as determined by CPE

Notice is hereby given that the Ohio County Water District expects to file an application with the Kentucky Public Service Commission on or about May 3, 2024, seeking approval of a proposed adjustment to its water rates. The proposed rates shall not become effective until the Public Service Commission has issued an order approving these rates.

If the Public Service Commission approves the proposed rates, then the monthly bill for a residential customer using an average of 4,000 gallons per month will increase from \$47.55 to \$55.96. This is an increase of \$8.41 or 17.69%.

The rates contained in this notice are the rates proposed by Ohio County Water District. However, the Public Service Commission may order rates to be charged that differ from these proposed rates. Such action may result in rates for consumers other than the rates shown in this notice.

Ohio County Water District has available for inspection at its office the application which it submitted to the Public Service Commission. A person may examine this application at Ohio County Water District's office located at 124 East Washington St., Hartford, KY 42347. You may contact the office at 270-298-7704.

A person may also examine the application at the Public Service Commission's offices located at 211 Sower Boulevard, Frankfort, Kentucky, 40601, Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., or through the Public Service Commission's website at <http://psc.ky.gov>. Comments regarding the application may be submitted to the Public Service Commission through its website or by mail to Public Service Commission, PO Box 615, Frankfort, Kentucky, 40602. You may contact the Public Service Commission at 502-564-3940.

A person may submit a timely written request for intervention to the Public Service Commission, PO Box 615, Frankfort, KY, 40602, establishing the grounds for the request including the status and interest of the party. If the Public Service Commission does not receive a written request for intervention within thirty (30) days of the initial publication of this notice, the Public Service Commission may take final action on the application.
