

Curry wins 'Dugan's Got Talent with vocal percussion skills

hen 16-year-old Jakovie Curry took center stage at the Dugan Best Recreation Center for Owensboro Parks and Recreation Department and Independence Bank's "Dugan's Got Talent" competition Friday night, he was simply looking to bring the world of beatboxing to the masses.

But after all 11 contestants performed and the six-person judging panel's scores were tallied, the Owensboro High School junior came out at the top of the leaderboard as the first-place winner and the recipient of a \$5,000 college scholarship.

'It was amazing," Curry said of his win during an interview Monday. "... I wasn't 100% sure if they were gonna rock with beatboxing. I didn't know if they would understand and feel the same way I feel about it, so it really was a good feeling to know that they understood as well as I (do) that this is

amazing and really cool." For Curry, beatboxing and vocal percussion has been something he's been into for nearly a decade.

"When I was younger, about 6 or 7, I would be in the living room with my family and we would have miniature beatboxing battles," he said. "... Me, my sister and my brother would just beatbox in the living room and I was like, This is really fun. I want to do more with this."

Curry began researching more about the artform online and found there to be a "whole world of beatboxing."

"There's something called the GBB — the Grand Beatbox Battle — and I was introduced to beatboxers from around the world doing a lot of crazy things, and I was like, 'I want to learn that," he said. "So I spend a lot of my time, thousands of hours of practice, learning what they do (to where) I

could do it myself" It was around the age of 12 when Curry decided to take his talent more seriously before performing in more public settings

within the last two years. "I wasn't very good compared to this year," Curry said with a laugh. "... I've improved a lot in the last year."

Curry said he would take time watching videos of other beatboxers and watching their performances, while also viewing tutorials on how to emulate specific sounds.

One of Curry's influences includes English artist D-low, real name Dan Lowes, who has earned numerous wins at the UK Beatbox Championships and recently won the "Solo" category at the GBB in Warsaw, Poland, in 2019.

Curry said that his own style of beatboxing is a mixture of creating melodies and sound effects.

"I can do the typical fast beatbox (where someone's like), 'Oh my god, he's doing crazy stuff,' and I can do a little musical thing," he said. "It's just amazing what (you can do) with (beatboxing)"

Showing off his skills in a show setting seemed to be part of a plan Curry had in mind.

"This (was) my first time doing anything beatboxing

in (a show capacity)," Curry said of the contest. "(At) the start of sophomore year or end of freshman year, I set a goal (where) I was like, 'I am going to practice beatboxing so hard that I'm ready to (put on a show) my junior year.'

His composition for "Dugan's Ĝot Talent" was set into three parts — an original song, a rendition of Snoop Dogg and Pharrell Williams' No. 1 song "Drop It Like It's Hot" and a section where he integrated seven different sounds together such as inward bass, humming, inward yodeling, falsetto singing and a drum beat before adding in two

surprises elements. Curry hopes to find a way to make his talent more profitable in the future, though he said his main objective is to continue introducing his passion of

beatboxing to others. "... I love beatboxing. I could listen to it for days and hours on end. ... I do it every day of my life, he said. "... I want to let (people) in on what I feel just a little bit. I want them to understand that this is amazing, this is cool, this is awesome. I want them to feel that too.'

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





Do you have a godly testimony?

ake time to read the amazing story of Phillip's testimony to the Ethiopian

eunuch. Acts 8:26-40

There are some biblical words we use far too freely — and amazingly — too loosely. Testimony is one of those words. Many Christians define the word testimony too narrowly. Sharing Jesus is much more than just telling our story or talking about God's work in our lives. although those things are important. We need to be prepared to meet

unbelievers at the point of their spiritual need, even if our own story is very different. Each person coming toward God is not coming from the same background, they are not coming from the same bed of

sin, nor from the same knowledge level about God.

We can learn a lot from Phillip's encounter

with the Ethiopian eunuch. While this young Israelite had friends and family to disciple him in his faith, a foreign convert often had to work alone to discern the meaning of the Scriptures. So, by asking, "Do you understand what you are reading?" Philip was acknowledging that he understood the Ethiopian's disadvantage. That one question enabled him to discover that the man had a genuine thirst for God's truth but did not

know of the Messiah.

Philip used that information to tailor fit a gospel testimony for this Ethiopian listener.

Consider how easily the man could have become confused or frustrated if Phillip—whose Jewish background was so different from the Ethiopian's—had told only his own conversion story. Phillip wisely relied on the text at hand and allowed the power of God's Word to introduce the man to Jesus Christ. Remember, the gospel is "the power of God to salvation."

Phillip's testimony began with the passage the Ethiopian was reading. He effectively spoke to the man's spiritual interest in general terms while specifically answering his questions about Isaiah 53. We, too, must be sensitive to unbelievers' concerns so we can explain how God will meet their needs.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statement referred to above presents fairly, in all material respects, the receipts, disbursements, and changes in fund balances – regulatory basis of the McCracken County Fiscal Court, for the year ended June 30, 2023, in accordance with accounting practices prescribed or permitted by the Commonwealth of Kentucky as described in Note 1.

Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles
In our opinion, because of the significance of the matter discussed in the Basis for Adverse Opin-

ion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles section of our report, the financial statements do not present fairly, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of each fund of the McCracken County Fiscal Court, for the year ended June 30, 2023, or the changes in financial position and cash flows thereof for the year then ended.

Basis for Opinions

NEW YORK — They compete for a trophy, a ring, the chance to be called a champion and, sometimes, a place in history. Most of the world's best athletes in all sorts of sports compete for cold, hard cash, too.

After more than 100 years of striving to earn Olympic gold — but individual countries they're the trailblazers nothing else from the folks organizing the event - track and field athletes at the Paris Games will join that money-making club thanks to the sport's governing body, World Athletics.

In a first-of-its-kind development, the runners, throwers and jumpers lining up at the Stade de France in August will be trying to win a \$50,000 check to go with the gold. It's a novel — some might say overdue concept that has athletes in other sports wondering if they can get a piece of that action.

"I mean, who would want to turn down money, you know?" said artistic swimmer Daniella Ramirez, who is a junior at UCLA.



Providence City Council Fills Vacant Seat

Providence City Council met Monday evening with only three council members—Mike Syers, Mark Turner and Shannon Layton—attending the meeting in person. Councilmember Scott Frederick joined the meeting by telephone.

Following an 18-minute closed session that Mayor Butch Hackney called for the purpose of reviewing letters of interest from individuals wishing to fill the vacant council seat, the council returned to open session and voted to appoint Jeff Marshall to the position. Marshall was scheduled to be sworn into office Tuesday morning at the city building.

The council also heard the FY 2023 audit report presented by ATA accountant Quinten Stone. Stone reviewed the risk management process and finances of the city noting that the city's net position decreased by \$970,000 in 2023. The audit reflects an income of \$9.3 million for the city with an outflow of \$8.2 million. Stone told the council that the revenue from utilities was down eight percent but personnel costs were up by 22 The audit also reflects a \$92,000 operating loss in the utility fund with a \$150,000 change in net position. Stone reported that the city's tax revenue is consistent with previous years. The report also shows that 41 percent of general fund expenditures are for general expenses and administration.

The audit also shows that the expenditure trend from 2017 to 2023 shows an increase in personnel costs. The city's audit numbers show that based on the cash balance, the city could meet expenses for 25 days.

The audit also shows a need for segregation of duties, something Stone says is an issue for all small communities and the auditor reported that the city went over budget with transfers out in 2023. Initially, the audit showed that tourism had failed to register as a special government entity, but that has already been taken care of. The audit also shows that the city dropped from 17 findings to three in 2023; thus, a "clean" opinion was received.

Other reports to come before the council were the police, public works, fire and code enforcement monthly reports.

Police Chief Ray Agent reported that his department made 183 total responses including answering 85 complaints, conducting 29 traffic stops, writing 15 citations, making eight arrests, conducting 16 building checks, 39 special details, three hours in court and undergoing 53 training hours.

According to Terry Rice, public works employees picked up tons of trash during spring clean-up, laid gas lines on Baptist Hill, replaced 20 street lights and completed one sewer hookup in addition to performing other work throughout the city.

Fire Chief Cameron Brown reported 285 9-1-1 calls; 18 fire runs; 56 EMS runs and two state fire trainings in his department.

In other business, the council opened one bid for a property on West Main Street. The council agreed to accept James and Lana Martin's \$1000 bid.

The council also heard first reading of amendment to a 1988 ordinance related to unlawful parking of vehicles on sidewalks, pedestrian pathways and city owned utility meters. The ordinance changes will go into effect upon adoption following the second reading.

Councilman Mark Turner raised questions about paving of city streets, something he says has not been done in three years. Turner cited the poor condition of many streets in the city as a reason to move forward with making repairs. The councilman also asked about the sidewalk project that has recently been completed and then turned to inoperable fire hydrants. Turner urged the city to make the necessary repairs on hydrants to ensure the safety of the community. The councilman identified at least seven hydrants that are not operating correctly, but public works directors Rice said there are at least 29 hydrants in the community that need work. He told the council that the cost is about \$3000 per hydrant for repairs plus the cost of the hydrant.

In response to the hydrant issue, Mayor Hackney noted, "We're going to start on that pretty quick and get those fixed."

Councilmember Shannon

Layton asked for a park update. Hackney reported that Blake Fisher has been hired to take care of the park this season.

The council also heard from a number of citizens regarding taxes, the need for street repairs, a vacant lot, dilapidate houses and a fourway stop with signs that cannot be seen.

The city clerk will reimburse one resident for charges that were not listed on his tax bill, and the city will address the issue of the four-way stop and get new signs up this week. Hackney said he will work with Ralph Walters who says he has taken care of a vacant lot for eight years and would like to buy it. Betty Thomas raised questions about why the city can't tear down several dilapidated houses on Wall Street where vagrants are sometimes spending the night. Attorney Bobby Murray addressed the process the city must go through to take possession of unkempt, unsafe properties, noting it is a lengthy legal process.

The next meeting of the Providence City Council is scheduled for Monday, May 6, at 6:00 p.m.

Clay Council Holds Annexation First Reading, Approves Resolution

Clay City Council met April 9, in a regular session with a number of items on the agenda for discussion and approval. All council members and Mayor Jack Edens were present to conduct the city's business.

Following the approval of the minutes of the previous meeting, the clerk's report and accounts payable, Jack Merrill of Health First provided an update on the construction for a new clinic in Clay.

Merrill told the council that the site engineering has been completed and the architect and engineer have completed their plans. Bids were sent to seven companies, Merrill said with three submitting bids. Downey Profes-

sional Construction of Madisonville will be the general contractor for the project and Merrill noted that a number of local companies will have subcontracts on the project. "We expect work to begin next week," Merrill told the council, adding that Associate Engineers has been retained to oversee the project. By winter, the project is expected to be competed. A gound breaking ceremony is expected to take place in the coming days, and once completed, Health First hopes to double the number of providers at the facility that will also feature a mental health clinic.

At the conclusion of Merrill's presentation, the council heard a brief report on public appeals. As they discussed new business, the council opted to forego increasing their or the mayor's monthly salary. Presently council members make \$200 a month and the mayor receives \$700 monthly. It was the consensus to the council that they are "compensated sufficiently".

ciently." Clerk Christy Freeman presented a resolution for a land/water grant for the council's approval. Freeman told the council that currently the pickle ball courts are being completed and the city is ready to apply for another grant to help offset the cost of lights for the park. The resolution calls for up to \$62,100 to be spent on the project which will

be funded by a 50/50 grant. The council gave Mayor Edens the okay to sign the necessary documents to make application for the funding.

The council briefly discussed a list of equipment/vehicles they plan to surplus, but took no action to declare the items surplus or set the method of sale. The group will do further research on the value of the items so they can set a reserve.

Clay Council members also heard a report regarding the city's sewer plant. Freeman told the group that the "numbers have been out of whack for some time and the city has been under an agreed order for a year or so." She added that "Tyler

(Gentry) knows someone, a consultant, who can help the city work through the sewer issues." That individual has been working for the city for about six months, Freeman said, adding that he is looking at changing the pump in the lagoon to a land system and making upgrades.

In other business the council approved first reading of an annexation ordinance that will allow the Billy G. Mitchell American Legion Post 289 to become part of the city. The annexation includes 3.16 acres. Second reading of the annexation ordinance is expected to be included on the May meeting agenda.

Other updates included an announce-

ment that work on the city's water project is expected to begin April

The meeting date for the council's May meeting has been changed to May 7, at 6:00 p.m. That will be a special called meeting due to the change of date.
