APPLICATION

Kentucky Power Company applies to the Public Service Commission of Kentucky pursuant to KRS 278.020(4) and 807 KAR 5:001, Section 15(1) for an Order to be issued on or before April 5, 2024 for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity authorizing the Company to apply for and obtain a franchise to use the streets and rights-of-way of the City of Worthington, located in Greenup County, Kentucky, for the provision of retail electric service, and in support thereof states:

APPLICANT

1. Kentucky Power was incorporated in 1919 under the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and is in good standing in the Commonwealth.1 The Company’s mailing address is 1645 Winchester Avenue, Ashland, Kentucky 41101. Its electronic mail address is kentucky_regulatory_services@aep.com. Kentucky Power is engaged in the generation, purchase, transmission, distribution and sale of electric power.

1 A certified copy of the Company’s Articles of Incorporation and all amendments thereto was attached to the Joint Application in In the Matter Of: The Joint Application Of Kentucky Power Company, American Electric Power Company, Inc. And Central And South West Corporation Regarding A Proposed Merger, P.S.C. Case No. 99-149. The Company’s March 25, 2024 Certificate of Existence is attached as EXHIBIT 1.

2. The Company serves approximately 163,000 retail customers in the following 20 counties of eastern Kentucky: Boyd, Breathitt, Carter, Clay, Elliott, Floyd, Johnson, Knott, Lawrence, Leslie, Letcher, Lewis, Magoffin, Martin, Morgan, Owsley, Perry, Greenup, and Rowan. In addition, the Company also supplies electric power at wholesale to other utilities and municipalities in Kentucky for resale. Kentucky Power is a utility as defined by KRS 278.010.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY

3. The Company currently is rendering, and for a number of years has been rendering, retail electric service in and to the City of Worthington in Greenup County, Kentucky.

4. The provision of retail electric service in and to the City of Worthington requires that Kentucky Power place its facilities on, under, above, and along the streets, alleys, public grounds, and rights of way, or otherwise make use of the streets, alleys, public grounds, and rights of way, of the City of Worthington.

5. The public convenience and necessity requires that Kentucky Power continue to provide retail electric service to and in the City of Worthington. The City of Worthington lies within the certified territory of Kentucky Power, as that term is defined in Chapter 278 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, and such as Kentucky Power possesses the exclusive right to provide retail electric service in and to the City of Worthington. KRS 278.018(1).

6. Kentucky Power's existing franchise to place its facilities on, under, above, and along the streets, alleys, public grounds, and rights of way, or otherwise make use of the streets, alleys, public grounds, and rights of way, of the City of Worthington for the purpose of providing retail electric service expires May 9, 2024.

7. The Company desires to bid for a franchise to use the streets, alleys, public grounds, and rights of way of the City of Worthington for the provision of retail electric service

to and in the City of Worthington. Kentucky Power respectfully requests the Commission issue its Order on or before April 5, 2024 granting the Company a certificate of public convenience and necessity so that it may bid for the required franchise on April 8, 2024.

8. A copy of the ordinance providing for the advertisement and sale of the City of Worthington franchise is attached hereto as **EXHIBIT 2**.

9. The advertisement to receive bids on the City of Worthington franchise was published in a newspaper of general circulation in Greenup County on March 21, 2024. A copy of the published advertisement is attached hereto as **EXHIBIT 3**.

10. If successful in obtaining a franchise from the City of Worthington, Kentucky Power will file a copy of the franchise with the Commission using the Commission's electronic tariff filing system.

(b) Granting the Company all further relief to which it may appear entitled.

ORDINANCE NO. 10- 2024

An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Worthington, Kentucky, Providing for the Advertisement and Sale of a Franchise Authorizing the Owner Thereof to Own, Maintain, Construct and Operate Electric Power Transmission and Distribution Lines Upon, Along, Over and Under the Streets, Thoroughfares, Alleys, Sidewalks, Bridges, Public Ways and Other Public Places of the Said City.

WHEREAS, the City of Worthington, Greenup County, Kentucky is incorporated under the provisions of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, and desires to grant a franchise for an electric power company to own, maintain, construct and operate its electric power transmission and distribution lines upon, along, over and under the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and other public places of the City of Worthington, Greenup County, Kentucky, and

WHEREAS, there exists a public necessity for adequate service of electric power and energy to the citizens of the City of Worthington, Greenup County, Kentucky, and

WHEREAS, it appears that it is in the interest of the public that a franchise be advertised and sold, granting and entitling the grantee to use the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and public places for the erection, operation and maintenance of lines for the transmission and distribution of electric power to the citizens of the City of Worthington, Greenup County, Kentucky, and to persons, firms and corporations beyond the limits of the City of Worthington, Greenup County, Kentucky.

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF Worthington, Greenup County,
KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:**

SECTION 1

That there be sold at public auction to the highest and best bidder, the franchise, privilege, right and authority to acquire, maintain, construct and operate in, above, under, across and along the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and other public places (as the same now exist or may hereafter be laid out) of the City of Worthington, Greenup County, Kentucky, lines, poles and equipment for the distribution of electric energy, either by means of overhead or underground conductors, with all the necessary or desirable appurtenances, for the purpose of supplying electric energy to said City and the inhabitants thereof, and persons and corporations beyond the limits thereof, for light, heat, power and any other purpose or purposes for which electric energy is now or may hereafter be used, and for the transmission of the same within, through or across said City.

SECTION 2

Said lines and appurtenances shall be constructed so as to interfere as little as possible with the traveling public in its use of the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and other public places.

SECTION 3

The franchise, privilege, right and authority shall be in full force and effect for a period of twenty (20) years from the date of passage of the Ordinance granting the franchise.

SECTION 4

The grantee of this franchise shall save the City harmless from any and all liability arising in any way from negligence in the erection, maintenance or operation of said lines and appurtenances.

SECTION 5

The grantee of this franchise shall have the right and privilege to take up such portion or part of any pavement and make such excavation in the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and other public places of the City of Worthington as may be deemed necessary for the construction and maintenance of its lines, wires or cables, but, whenever the grantee of this franchise shall begin the erection of any lines or other equipment, it shall promptly and diligently prosecute the work to completion, and leave the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and other public places where such work is done in as good condition of repair as before such work was commenced.

SECTION 6

Whenever in this franchise either the City of Worthington or the grantee thereof is referred to, it shall be deemed to include the respective successors and assigns, of either, and all rights, privileges and obligations contained in this franchise shall be binding upon, and inure to the benefit of, the respective successors and assigns, of the City and said grantee, whether so expressed or not.

SECTION 7

The grantee of this franchise may make such rules and regulations covering the furnishing of said electric energy as may be fair and reasonable and consistent with the standard practice of the grantee. Said grantee may charge such rates for electric service as shall be fair and reasonable. The said grantee shall render service under said franchise of like quality, that is, adequate, efficient and reasonable, to that now being rendered to said City.

SECTION 8

The consideration paid by the successful bidder for the franchise, privilege, right and authority provided for herein, shall be complete compensation and consideration for said franchise, privilege, right and authority, and for the use and occupancy of the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and other public places of the City, in lieu of any street or alley rental or of any charge for the use or occupancy of said streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and other public places of said City, and in lieu of any pole tax or meter tax.

SECTION 9

Vicki Ruby, City Clerk for the City of Worthington, Greenup County, Kentucky, is hereby appointed Special Commissioner, to sell said franchise, privilege, right and authority hereby ordered sold subject to the approval of the City Council, and said Special Commissioner is directed to offer said franchise for public sale to the highest bidder on the 8th day of April, 2024, at 11:00 a.m. at the front door of the Worthington City Building, at 201 Stewart Ave, Worthington, Kentucky, after she has advertised the date, time, terms, conditions and place of sale, pursuant to law, by inserting a notice of sale in *Greenup Gazette*, Greenup, Kentucky, a newspaper of general circulation in Worthington, Greenup County, Kentucky, one time, which shall be not less than seven (7) days nor more than twenty-one (21) days prior to the date of said sale, said advertisement to include this Ordinance or a summary thereof.

SECTION 10

Bids and proposals for the purchase and acquisition of the franchise, privilege, right and authority hereby granted shall be in writing and shall be delivered to the Special Commissioner upon the date and at the time fixed by the Special Commissioner in said

advertising for receiving bids. Thereafter, the Special Commissioner shall report and submit to the City Council at the time and place of its next regular meeting said bids and proposals for its approval, and said City Council reserves the right for and on behalf of the City of Worthington to refuse any and all bids for said franchise, privilege, right and authority. In the event the bids reported by the Special Commissioner shall be refused by the said City Council, it may direct, by resolution or ordinance, said franchise, privilege, right and authority to be again offered for sale from time to time until a satisfactory bid therefor shall be received and approved. Each bid shall be accompanied by a deposit and each bidder shall post bond in accordance with the provisions and requirements of KRS 96.020. However, such deposit and bond need not be made by a corporation or person already owning, in or adjacent to the City of Worthington, Greenup County, Kentucky, a plant and equipment sufficient to render the service required by this Ordinance.

SECTION 11

Each bidder for said franchise, privilege, right and authority shall file, as a part of its bid, a certified copy of a Certificate of Convenience and Necessity from the Public Service Commission of Kentucky, issued under the authority of KRS 278.020.

SECTION 12

The Ordinance granting this franchise shall be accepted by the grantee thereof within sixty (60) days from the date of its passage.

Spring Covid booster recommended for 65+

In my mind, the spring season will always be associated with Covid-19.

In spring 2020, the federal government declared a nationwide emergency, and life drastically changed. Schools and businesses closed, and masks and social distancing were mandated across much of the nation.

In spring 2021, after the vaccine rollout, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention++ said those who were fully vaccinated against Covid-19 could safely gather with others who

were vaccinated without masks or social distancing.

In spring 2022, with the increased rates of vaccination across the U.S., the universal indoor mask mandate came to an end. In spring 2023, the federal declaration of Covid-19 as a public health emergency ended.

Now, as spring 2024 fast approaches, the CDC reminds Americans that even though the public-health emergency is over, the risks associated with Covid-19 are not. But those risks are higher in some groups than others. So the agency recommends that adults age 65 and older receive an addition-

al Covid-19 vaccine, which is updated to protect against a recently dominant variant and is effective against the current dominant strain. The shot is covered by Medicare. But do you really need yet another Covid-19 shot?

As a geriatrician who exclusively cares for people over 65 years of age, this is a question I've been asked many times over the past few years.

In early 2024, the short answer is yes.

Compared with other age groups, older adults have the worst outcomes with a Covid-19 infection. Increased age is, simply put, a major risk factor.

In January 2024, the average death rate from Covid-19 for all ages was just under 3 in 100,000 people. But for those ages 65 to 74, it was higher – about 5 for every 100,000. And for people 75 and older, the rate jumped to nearly 30 in 100,000.

Even now, four years after the start of the pandemic, people 65 years old and up are about twice as likely to die from Covid-19 than the rest of the population. People 75 years old and up are 10 times more likely to die from Covid.

These numbers are scary. But the No. 1 action people can take to decrease their risk is to get vaccinated and keep up to date on vaccinations to ensure top immune response. Being appropriately vaccinated is as critical in 2024 as it was in 2021 to help prevent infection, hospitalization and death from Covid-19.

The updated Covid-19 vaccine has been shown to be safe and effective, with the benefits of vaccination continuing to outweigh the potential risks of infection.

The CDC has been observing side effects on the more than 230 million Americans who are considered fully vaccinated with what it calls the “most intense safety monitoring in U.S. history.” Common side effects soon after receiving the vaccine include discomfort at the injection site, transient muscle or joint aches, and fever.

These symptoms can be alleviated with over-the-counter pain medicines or a cold compress to the site after receiving the vaccine. Side effects are less likely if you are well hydrated when you get your vaccine.

Repeat infections carry increased risk, not just from the infection itself, but also for developing long Covid as well as other illnesses. Recent evidence shows that even mild to moderate Covid-19 infection can negatively affect cognition, with changes similar to seven years of brain aging. But being up to date with Covid-19 immunization has a fourfold decrease in risk of developing long Covid symptoms if you do get infected.

Known as immunosenescence, this puts people at higher risk of infection, including severe infection, and decreased ability to maintain immune response to vaccination as they get older. The older one gets – over 75, or over 65 with other medical conditions – the more immunosenescence takes effect.

All this is why, if you're in this age group, even if you received your last Covid-19 vaccine in fall 2023, the spring 2024 shot is still essential to boost your immune system so it can act quickly if you are exposed to the virus.

The bottom line: If you're 65 or older, it's time for another Covid-19 shot.

Medicaid cuts being restored

FRANKFORT - The state Senate has largely eliminated cuts to Medicaid that were proposed in the House budget. A top state official had warned the House plan would create a hole next year in the federal-state health plan that covers 1.5 million low-income Kentuckians, a third of the state's population.

“We are pleased that the Senate's proposed budget restores funding to Medicaid so patients can continue to access the necessary health care services they're accustomed to,” said a statement from the Cabinet for Health Services, which manages the \$15

billion a year federal-state program. Cabinet Secretary Eric Friedlander appeared before the Senate Appropriations and Revenue Committee last month,

along with John Hicks, budget director for Democratic Gov. Andy Beshear, asking the Republican-majority Senate to consider restoring the funds.

ORDINANCE NO. 2024 - 03

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 1991-10 SETTING FORTH A UNIFORM PROCEDURE FOR PAVING PROJECTS IN THE CITY OF RACELAND

Each section is enacted separately and will continue in force even if another section is declared unconstitutional, all conflicting ordinances are specifically repealed to the extent of said conflict only. Following this publication, this Ordinance will become effective and enforceable. Under this Ordinance, every year the Council will decide on a budget for paving projects in the City based on a projected amount of funds that will be available. This budget may include funds collected from municipal fees. When funds are available, the decision of which road(s) will be paved will be made by the Mayor, or their representative, after a quote has been provided. The Mayor, or their representative, will decide which roadways are to be paved based on severity of need, and the availability of funds budgeted by the council for the new fiscal year.

Said grantee may charge such rates for electric service as shall be fair and reasonable. The said grantee shall render service under said franchise of like quality, that is, adequate, efficient and reasonable, to that now being rendered to said City.
