Established under the Smith-Lever Act of 1914, the Cooperative Extension Service is a collaborative effort between landgrant universities and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). In Kentucky, it is managed by the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, Food, and Environment. If the Public Service Commission approves the proposed water rates, then the monthly water bill for a customer using an average of 4,000 gallons per month will increase from \$33.40 to \$42.78. This is an increase of \$9.38 or 28.08%. The chart below shows the current and proposed rates for an average customer's bill by meter size:

If the Public Service Commission does not receive a written request for intervention within thirty (30) days of the initial publication of this notice, the Public Service Commission may take final action on the application.

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
