Introduction

- Q. Please state your name, your business address, and your relationship to
 Farmdale Water District.
- A. My name is Jonathan Dailey, my business address is 100 Highwood Drive,

 Frankfort, Kentucky, and I am Secretary of Farmdale Water District's Board

 of Commissioners. In my testimony, I will refer to Farmdale Water District as

 "Farmdale District" or "the District."
- 8 Q. How long have you served on the Board at Farmdale Water District?
- 9 A. I was appointed to the Board in May 2022.

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- 10 Q. What is your vocational and professional background?
- A. I am a life-long Franklin County resident. My family has farmed in Franklin 11 County for years. After graduating from Western Hills High School, I pursued 12 a career in structural steel fabrication. I worked for other companies such as 13 Jacobs Sheet Metal and Bottoms Engineering until 2001, when I opened my 14 own business in Frankfort, Dailey Steel, Inc. I currently have seven 15 employees. In addition to the steel business, I have owned and managed rental 16 properties in the Frankfort area. At one point I owned 12 rental properties and 17 did all of the plumbing and maintenance on those myself. When housing 18 prices were on the rise a few years ago, I sold the rental properties. I have 19

continued to farm. I raise cattle, corn, and beans. I own three farms in Franklin
County and lease acreage from a dozen more.

Q. Other than serving on the Board at Farmdale Water District, do you have any experience in the water business?

I don't have any experience working in the water business, at least not in terms of serving customers. My company did welding and steel work for Kentucky American Water when Kentucky American was building the treatment plant on the Franklin-Owen County line about 14 years ago, and I have run water lines on my own property. I tend to pick up construction-related skills fairly quickly. At one of my farms, I ran two miles of water line and at another I ran one mile of water line. In raising cattle, you have to get water into the fields used for grazing, and I did that myself, I did not hire anyone to do it.

As I mentioned before I also did all of my own plumbing and maintenance work on my former rental properties. I do have experience in being a large-volume Farmdale Water District customer. At one of my farms, we use between 40 and 60 thousand gallons of water a month, and at another we use between 30 and 40 thousand gallons a month.

Q. What is the purpose of your testimony?

1 A. The purpose of my testimony is to update the Commission on recent actions
2 taken by Farmdale District's Board and to provide my perspective on what I
3 feel to be in the best interest of the District and its customers.

4 Q. What update would you like to offer the Commission?

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The Board of Commissioners at Farmdale District has taken the Commission's investigation into merging Farmdale with another utility very seriously. We have met with Kentucky American Water, the Frankfort Plant Board, the Franklin County Judge Executive, representatives from Kentucky Rural Water Association, and Peaks Mill Water District. We have discussed what is in the best interest of our customers. I believe that it is in the best interest of our customers to continue operating without a merger with another water district or being acquired by a for-profit utility. It is my opinion that if Farmdale District were to be acquired by a for-profit utility, the rates our customers pay would almost certainly increase. Also, it is by no means certain that an office would be maintained locally to serve the people of the community close to their homes and businesses. Merger with another water district would likely increase the challenges Farmdale District is facing rather than decrease them.

Prior to the Commission opening this merger investigation, Farmdale District had a cooperative relationship with the Frankfort Plant Board. The

Plant Board had helped us with some excavation that required specialized equipment, and they were doing meter testing for us. Our Chairman retired from the Plant Board. He is well regarded by the folks running the Plant Board and has maintained good relationships with the people there over the years. Because Farmdale District's Board realizes that Farmdale District needs assistance with large projects like meter replacement, developing a capital spending plan, and technical endeavors like applying for grants and loans, we approached the Plant Board.

We were very pleased that the Plant Board decided to formalize our relationship and enter into a five-year Assistance Agreement where Farmdale District can pay the Plant Board for help with specific projects. This keeps Farmdale District from having to go out and find a consultant to help with certain things or hire temporary employees or third-party contractors to work on short-term construction projects. In addition, Farmdale District and the Plant Board executed a Mutual Aid Agreement and will help each other in times of emergency.

At the Franklin County Water Workgroup meeting held last fall, I met Mr. Casey Cash from the Bluegrass Area Development District. Since that workshop, I have met with him to discuss grants and loans that could possibly be available to Farmdale District in the near future to help fund needed upgrades like replacing the rest of the AC pipe in our system. Mr. Cash is scheduled to visit Farmdale District's office soon. This is a first step and a prerequisite to any grant or loan application we might make. In addition, I have met with Sharmista Dutta, P.E., the engineer and water manager at the Plant Board to discuss possible funding applications. Ms. Dutta has promised to provide technical assistance with any grant or loan application we decide to pursue.

In my opinion, the top priorities of the District at this time should be finishing the AC line replacement project that has been started and installing the meters we recently received permission to purchase with surcharge funds. These projects are almost certain to help further reduce our water loss. Water loss was trending down last summer before the construction replacing the AC lines started and the contractor hit the lines several times. We must also remain vigilant and regularly evaluate the sufficiency of our rates. It won't do our customers any favors to keep rates low if we allow the system to fall apart for lack of money to maintain it.

Farmdale District's staff is growing. We hired another person to provide office assistance a few months ago. We recently advertised and interviewed two applicants for a field staff position. We were impressed with both candidates, and we decided to hire them both. Hopefully they both will work

out and we will have adequate field staff to install our new meters while keeping up with the day-to-day work. One of our current field staff members is scheduled to take the certification test to obtain his certified distribution operator's license very soon. It would be very helpful to have another certified operator in addition to our Field Manager, Chris Ralph. The Board is making preparations for filing the rate case that the Commission ordered the District to file by August 31, 2025. Overall, I am quite optimistic that things are moving in the right direction for Farmdale District.

Q. What do you believe the next step for Farmdale District should be?

I think the Board and management at Farmdale District should aggressively utilize the provisions of the Assistance Agreement for the next five years and avail themselves of any and all assistance the Plant Board can offer. We can replace the 1,000 meters in our system that need to be replaced, investigate ways to read the meters more efficiently, and pursue funding to replace or repair areas of the system that are prone to leaks. I am encouraged by the assistance we have already received from the Plant Board, and I would like to see Farmdale District have the opportunity to participate in the arrangement formalized by the Assistance Agreement without the worry of a forced merger occurring.
