Best in Kentucky honors pair of local favorites

Voters in the Kentucky Living Best of Kentucky contest again recognized the appeal of Green River Lake State Park, which won three awards in the 2025 rankings.

Whether on the ground or in the water, Green River Lake continues to be seen as a superior spot in all of Kentucky.

And the Campbellsville area also has the airwaves covered as the magazine saluted Larry Joe Smith of The Big Dawg as the top local radio personality in all of the Commonwealth.

The winners were celebrated at the Kentucky State Fair and will be featured in the next issue of Kentucky Living, a product of the Kentucky electrical cooperatives and distributed as a member benefit and is considered the most widely circulated publication in the state with more than 1 million readers.

The state park, which covers 1,331 acres of land along the 8,210-acre lake, received the first-place award for best Camping or RV Spot. It was a repeat win in that category and the RV park and campsites already are listed on Kentucky Living's Hall of Fame for its repeated wins in this reader-voted contest.

The accompanying description praised "picture-perfect camping right on Green River Lake. Every campsite, including 167 RV sites with water and electricity and 60 primitive tents, snuggles up along the shoreline."

It goes on to list the abundance of recreational activities including fishing, boating, skiing, swimming, hiking, biking, horseback riding, miniature golf and four playgrounds. The details also promoted Green River Lake's annual Halloween in the Park theme weekends, which this year will be Oct. 10-12 and 17-19.

A frequent honoree in this recognition program, the park placed second in two other categories: public hunting and fishing area plus water tourism.

Larry Smith of 99.9 The Big Dawg attended the presentation in Louisville where he was celebrated.

"This is such an honor to not only win once but be nominated a second time for this great award," said Smith, who is station manager of WVLC-FM.

Smith serves as host of Mornings on Main Street, Flea Market and Southern Fried Friday Night, an all-request classic rock program.

In addition to the local winners, many nearby favorites were recognized including first-place honorees such as Marion County Ham Days, Maker's Mark in Loretto, My Old Kentucky Home State Park, Backroads Cookin' and Manny's Kitchen in Bardstown, The Amp at Log Still in Gethsemane plus

Hinton's Orchard, Vibe Coffee and The Sweet Shoppe, all in La Rue County.

Lindsey Wilson University Chapel Service offers community an opportunity to recharge

Lindsey Wilson University Chaplain the Rev. Tyler Brumfield knows that the energy and enthusiasm that permeate college students during the first week of classes often dissipate a week or two later.

That's why Brumfield is holding the university's first weekly chapel service of the 2025-26 school year during the first week of September.

The first chapel service of the school year -- which will include a message from Brumfield -- will be at 10:45 a.m. CT on Wednesday, Sept. 3, in the historic

John B. Begley Chapel, nine calendar days after the first day of classes on Aug. 25. The services are open to the public.

"You often notice a shift in the mood of college students around week four or five," said Brumfield. "It seems that people don't quite have the energy they had at the beginning of the school year. So we hope that starting our weekly chapel service in early September will give people, especially our students, an opportunity to check in."

Even holding weekly chapel on a Wednesday morning has a purpose.

"It's a space for us to come together and look up, literally, to connect with God and breathe."

"Holding it in the middle of the week is also a good way for people to check in with themselves and be nourished spiritually," said Brumfield.

Brumfield said that the weekly 30-minute service will usually feature songs and a brief message, and occasionally communion

will be offered. Subsequent chapel messages will be delivered by School of Professional Studies Dean Curt Lee (Sept. 10) and the Rev. Landon Harting '17 (Sept. 17), who is a campus minister at Western Kentucky University. Music at the Sept. 3 service will be led by William '25 and Yayi '23 Sonnabend.

In addition to giving the campus community and guests an opportunity to recharge, Brumfield said the weekly chapel service "celebrates our roots."

"Our roots are in the Christian tradition, so we provide a welcoming

space for people to come to a formal communal gathering," he said.

"It's a space for us to come together and look up, literally, to connect with God and breathe."

Some services will feature more music, such as when the Lindsey Wilson Singers perform.

"The sound doesn't get much better than that," said Brumfield. "Music always sounds fantastic in the Begley Chapel."

And on Oct. 22, chapel will be held in V.P. Henry Auditorium for Church-University Day, when the Lindsey Wilson community

celebrates its founding by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South and its affiliation with The United Methodist Church. The Rev. Tami Coleman, who is chief ministry officer in the Kentucky Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, will deliver the message that day.

Brumfield said that one of the best things about weekly chapel is that "it reminds us who we are as an institution."

"It helps us slow down, take a few moments and connect personally in the middle of our week with God," he said.

Lindsey Wilson University Lucretia C. Begley Art Gallery to feature six shows in 2025-26

Exhibits include works by gallery's namesake, university alumni and employees, two photographers, student artists

An exhibit that honors the gallery's namesake, works by university alumni and employees, two photography exhibits, and the culmination of students' undergraduate work highlight this year's exhibition schedule at Lindsey Wilson University's Lucretia C. Begley Art Gallery.

The half-dozen shows will offer visitors a wide diversity of art, created in several mediums.

"As Edgar Degas said, 'Art is not what you see, but what you make others see,'" said Lindsey Wilson Performing Arts Director Kristyne Gilbert.

Gilbert said that "with the excitement of this school year being the first one as Lindsey Wilson University, I'd like visitors to see the importance of having a gallery on campus that is for everyone, including for area residents and schools."

Gilbert said she aimed for this year's gallery schedule to celebrate Lindsey Wilson's nearly 125-year heritage.

"This year the exhibition schedule pays homage to those who have played a vital role in Lindsey Wilson arts, starting with Lucretia Begley's exhibit," said Gilbert.

"The year will be filled with a new alumni art show, a faculty and staff show, and a fabulous, thought-provoking collection of work from award-winning, nationally recognized photographer. I look forward to seeing everyone in the gallery."

The season opens Aug. 25 with "Lucretia Begley Retrospective: A Delicate Expression of the Seasons," a retrospective of the career of Adair County artist Lucretia C. Begley, whose gallery bears her name. Begley was

a public school teacher, served for nine years as an art professor on the Lindsey Wilson faculty and became a well-known Southcentral Kentucky artist.

Begley's works will be on display through Oct. 10.

The second show will be the Lindsey Wilson Alumni Fine Art Exhibition, which will be in both the Begley Gallery and in the foyer of the W.W. Slider Humanities Center. It will show from Oct. 20-Dec. 13 with a public reception set for 5-7 p.m. CT Oct. 24.

Original works by Lindsey Wilson faculty and staff will be on display from Jan. 20-Feb. 27, with a public reception to be announced later in the school year.

The fourth show will feature works from March 16-April 10 in the Begley Gallery by award-winning and nationally recognized photographer Natalie Jackson of Peoria, Illinois. Jackson's works have won numerous awards, and her art has been featured in galleries throughout the U.S.

Also on display March 16-April 10 in the Slider Humanities

Center foyer will be works that pay tribute to Women's History Month, which is celebrated every March.

The Lindsey Wilson Senior Show will feature works by university seniors in both the Begley Gallery and Slider Humanities Center foyer from April 20-May 2, with the gallery talk to be announced later in the school year.

The final show of the year in the Begley Gallery will be photographs of flora, still life and other scenes by regional artist and farmer Paul Bela. It will be on display May 11-July 31.

The Lucretia C. Begley Art Gallery is located in the W.W. Slider Humanities Center. Gallery hours are 8 a.m.-4 p.m. CT Monday-Friday and by special appointment.
