KU is constantly sending notices of applications for rate increases.

Many of these proposals appear to be ordinary measures related to KU's segment of commerce.

KU has not proposed or offered information on cost-saving measures they could implement to offset these business costs.

Automation, technology, and efficiency measure could be implemented to reduce these rate increases.

Also, the salaries, workplace conditions, equipment, employee benefits, and overall workplace conditions are often better or higher than the average KY consumer of electricity. Company vehicles for employee use is another area where things are not equal. Having a vehicle available for company use is fine, but the fuel expense for employee transportation (personal use) is another area where cuts could be made. The perks should be the same as an average KU customer gets at their job, and that is not much.

In this case, it is important for the KY-PSC to challenge and push back regarding these increases.
