The proposed environmental surcharge needs to be wrapped into an increase in the per-kWh charge customers pay. If not, customers will continue to lose the already marginal economic incentives to conserve energy and/or install renewable energy systems on their home or business.

Those who use more energy should be paying more to clean up the problems created by generating energy from coal. Those who use less should be rewarded by shouldering less of the costs. If we do not use this opportunity to raise per-kWh rates, we will continue to see more poverty and energy inefficiency, and slower growth in the deployment of distributed renewable energy systems. That is not the future we need and deserve.

I fully support a rate increase and paying the full cost of our energy use, but ONLY if those rates are directly tied to the amount of energy consumed during each billing period. Any other rate structure is wrong and should be opposed by the PSC.
